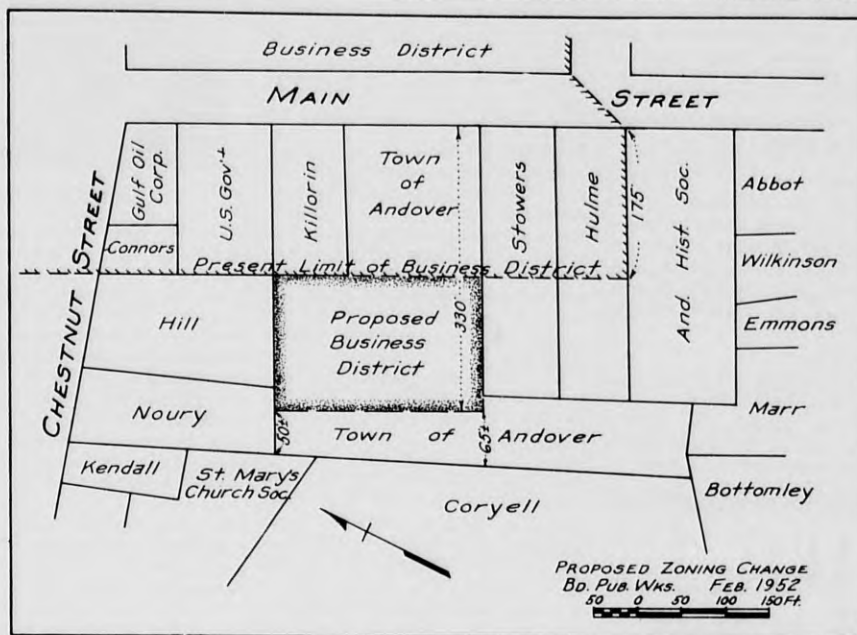

1952 Snow Removal Costs Up

Snow clearing operations for the present year cost the town \$15,104.43 up to Monday of this week while for the first two months of 1951 it was much less, or

\$11,561.15.

Discussing the snow storms and snow removal operations for the two years, Sidney P. White, chairman of the board of public works said:

"A comparison of the first two months of 1952 with the first two months of 1951 shows that the current winter is much more severe than that of a year ago. The total snowfall for January and February of 1951 amounted to 17.4 inches, and the total to Feb. 25 for 1952 now stands at 32.7 inches.

"The costs to the town for plowing vary almost in exact proportion with the snowfall. However, some of the other costs attributable to winter weather are not so easy to

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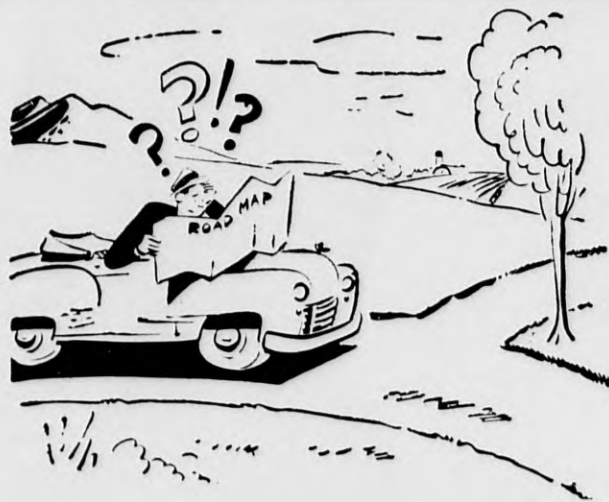

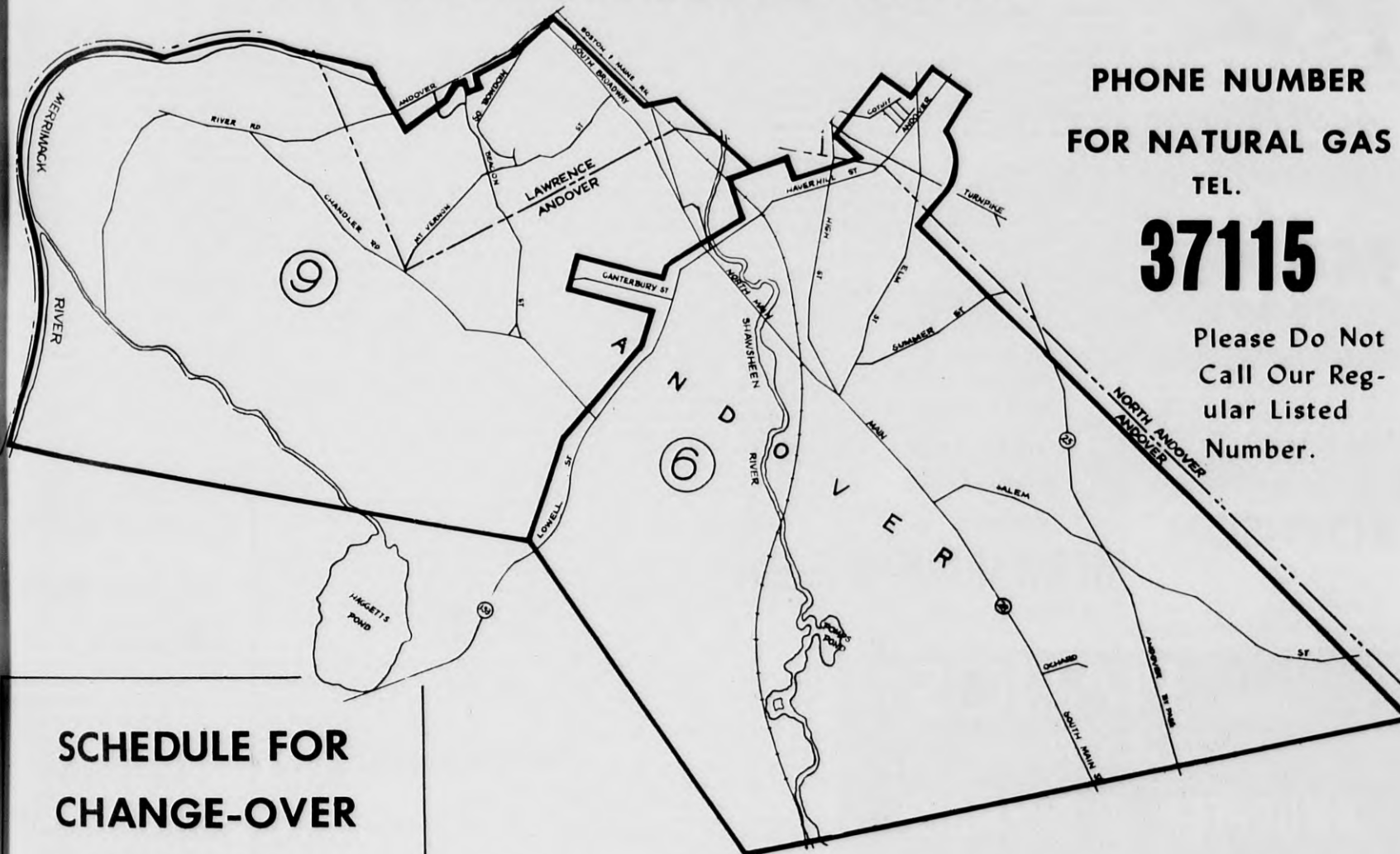

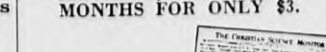

Tree Warden Makes Annual Report

Citizens of Andover:

Young trees of the desired planting size were in short supply last spring and good specimens hard to obtain.

Nurserymen report that this condition may continue for several years as few trees were started in the nurseries during the war years and a heavy demand recently from new homes and developments have caused the shortage.

Poison ivy control along our roadsides was continued through the generosity of the Andover Village Improvement Society in furnishing the tree warden with nearly \$300 worth of chemicals.

This work extended to nearly all parts of the town. Many roadsides, once a mass of poison ivy are now practically free of this dangerous plant due to control measures taken in the past several years.

Excessive rainfall in 1951 brought the moisture in the soil back to normal after several years of drought in which many trees suffered because of injury to their root systems. Until the roots recover, dead twigs and branches are likely to develop in these trees.

Modern paved roads and walks excluding moisture and air, contribute greatly to adverse effects on our public street trees by drought, storms, insects and disease.

For more efficient tree work I recommend the purchase of an electric saw which can be taken into the trees for pruning or removing branches from the top before falling a tree that is to be removed.

These saws are light in weight and are operated from a portable generator on the ground. A flood light can also be operated from the

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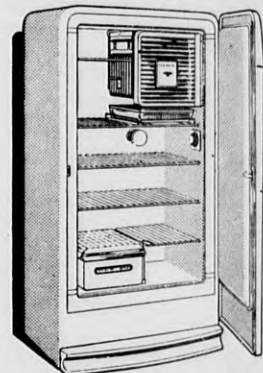

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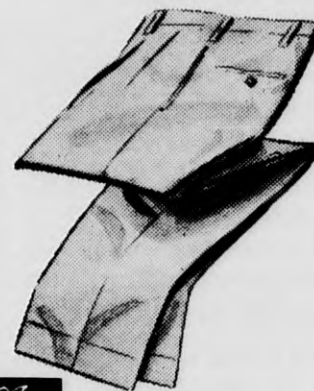

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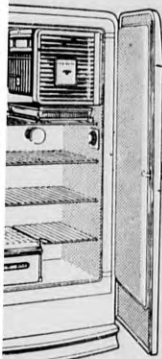

1952 SNOW REMOVAL COSTS HIGHER

(Continued from Page One) each night after the usual working hours and at overtime rates. "To date the board of public works has expended about \$15,104.43 for snow and ice removal in 1952. In 1951 the expenditure for January and February was \$11,561.15. Plowing expenditures have been nearly double this year what they were last year, while sanding expenditures have analyze. Salting highways and sanding streets and walks represent a large part of the total cost of the snow and ice program. Under one set of conditions a given amount of precipitation may call for only one treatment of sand or salt or both, whereas under other conditions the same amount of snow may call for treatment day after day. In general a steady run of temperatures well below the freezing point is much more to be desired than alternately warm days and freezing nights. The latter case generally requires sanding not been quite so heavy.

"As in the past, the board of public works proposes to request for snow funds at the town meeting the amount of \$6,000 plus the actual expenditures up to that date. The figure of 6,000 is only a guess; but it is a fairly educated guess of what it will cost the department to carry out its snow program for the remainder of the year. This program consists of handling any storms which may occur after town meeting in March or April, removing snow fences, building a stock pile of sand for the winter of 1952-53, setting out snow fences in the late fall, and handling snow and ice storms which may occur during November and December."

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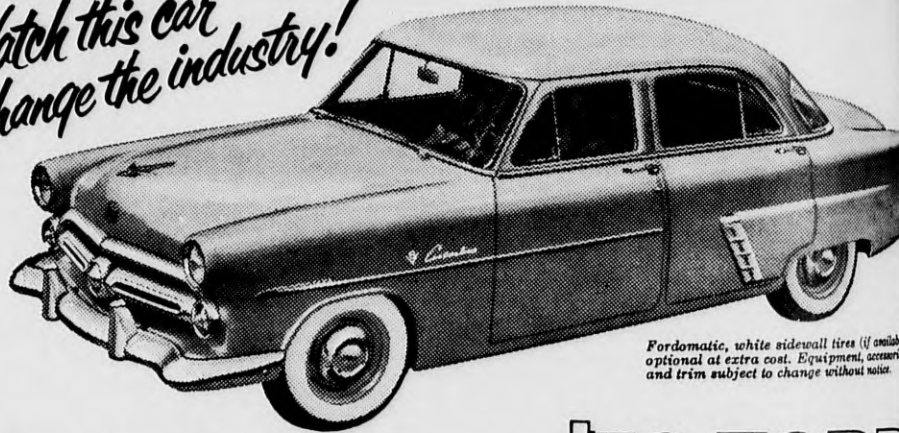

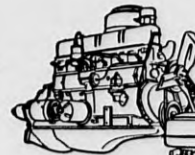

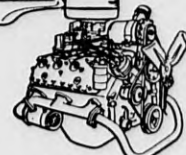
