New Fire Engine Bought By Town

The town has purchased a new American LaFrance fire engine which is expected to be delivered in August.

At the last town meeting the sum of \$17,000 was appropriated for a new 1000-gallon pumper to replace Engine 3 which has been in service for 24 years, and a call for bids was sent out.

The selectmen with Fire Chief C. Edward Buchan opened bids last Monday night as follows: Mack Mfg. Corp., \$16,899, American LaFrance & Foamite Corp., \$17,000., Seagrave Corp., \$16,845.

The board with the fire chief went over the different specifications, the extra equipment involved, and viewed several pieces of apparatus in neighboring cities and towns, before reaching a decision.

Two Teachers Appointed By School Board

Two grammar school teachers were elected by the school committee Tuesday night, an optometrist was added to the school staff, and a new janitor was appointed.

Miss Justine M. Devlin of Lawrence, daughter of Mark H. Devlin Jr., director of athletics at Lawrence High school, and Miss Joan L. Dennison of Harrisburg, Pa., were appointed teachers; Dr. William V. Emmons was engaged as visual consultant at a salary of \$200 annually; and Roger Whitcomb was named school janitor at \$2500 a year. His appointment becomes effective Apr. 21.

The board also reappointed Dr. Blake school physician at an annual salary of \$660., and Dr. Malcolm B. McTernan, school dentist, who serves gratis.

After some discussion in which it was stated that three fund drives had already been recognized, Member C. The Corruption Issue

Despite the rifts at Washington it does not seem possible that the current corruption issue will be allowed to sink into lethargy. Too much has been exposed and too much more has been rumored or revealed in some part.

In many circles it is now believed that the senate itself will have to do most of the investigating if real results are to be obtained.

It is an extremely ticklish subject, particularly in an election year, but reporters have found the American people are shocked and angry, want a real housecleaning, and mean to have it.

There seems to be little question that there is a national revulsion not only against outright graft and dishonesty, but against influence-peddling dealings which are just within the borderline of legality.

If this public feeling persists it will have to be satisfied, much as some politicians may want to forget the whole mess.

Bureaucracy Costly

Bureaucracy is mighty costly — both in money, and in the influence it has on the economy of the nation.

The Office of Price Stabilization is a good illustration. It is costing the taxpayers about \$65,316,000 a year. On January 1, there were more than 11,000 people on the payroll and no doubt the number has increased since.

All of this money and all of this labor is being expended for but one purpose — to interfere with the normal workings of the free market. This simply means that, in part, we are substituting a controlled economy for the established supply-and-demand economy.

Book-Plate Display At P.A. Library

Thomas Jefferson had no book-plate, but he did use a secret cipher to identify his books. The Oliver Wendell Holmes library at Phillips academy has on display a volume from his library borrowed from the Library of Congress, and everyone interested in seeing this rare and historically precious book is invited to come see it and a collection of book-plates before Apr. 15.

The library has been fortunate in the past in acquiring a few books in which are the book-plates of individuals distinguished in letters and public affairs. It has, too, books from the library of Samuel Phillips, grandfather of the founder of the academy, and these have a delightful book-label dated 1707. Among the books of Eliphalet Pearson, first headmaster of the school, is one with the label, "Margaret Pearson, Andover".

The Boston Athenaeum has very generously lent the library the separate book-plates of John Adams, second president of the United States, Daniel Webster, Woodrow Wilson, the spurious plate of George Washington, ones of Nelson, George V and Queen Mary, some of the Colleges of Cambridge and Oxford universities, a 1700 Italian plate of the Medicis, and numerous other artistic and rare plates.

Some of the academy book-plates have been designed by Andover artists and are exhibited together with the work of other Andover and Phillips people. One case is devoted to the work of the late H. Winthrop Peirce, a former Andover resident.

Moody's Financial Books At Library

The Memorial Hall library is now making available to its patrons Moody's manuals of investments and Moody's investment surveys. The four manuals of investments to which the library subscribes cover these areas of the financial field: Banks and Finance; Industrials; Public Utilities and Railroads. Here is the type of information that can be found in each of the manuals:

Moody's Banks and Finance: Detailed financial and operating statistics of banks, insurance companies, investment trusts, finance and holding companies and real estate enterprises. There are financial statements, security descriptions, tabular breakdowns and details of investment trust portfolios. Annual is published in April.

Moody's Industrials: Statements of about 4,100 industrial companies giving history, subsidiaries, nature of business, officers and directors, detailed income accounts and balance sheets, security descriptions, dividend records, ten year stock and bond price range and Moody's Bond Ratings. Annual is published in July.

Moody's Public Utilities: Financial statements of the entire public utility field— electric power and light, natural gas, telephone and telegraph, etc. Also details on franchises, rate schedules and production and sales statistics. The annual is to be published in August.

Moody's Railroads: Descriptions and statistics of over 1,100 railroads, information on mileage, equipment, freight and passenger statistics, as well as comparative income accounts and balance sheets over a period of years and descriptions of stock and bond issues. Maps of prominent railroads are also included. Annual is published in September. Each annual will be available as published. There are twice-weekly supplementary news items and data for these.

Moody's Investment Surveys are weekly publications which discuss current trends in the stock and bond markets and also analyze individual stocks and bonds. The library subscribes to Moody's Stock Survey and Moody's Bond Survey.

These investors' aids are all shelved in the reference room off the main reading room of the library.

4993 Get Negative Reports In Andover X-Ray Survey

Negative X-ray reports bearing the news that "the result of your chest X-ray is satisfactory" have been sent out by the Essex County Health association to 4,993 individuals or 96 per cent of the 5,184 counted as X-rayed in the Andover X-ray survey.

The final retake clinic took place Apr. 7. A series of these clinics was held by the state department of public health in cooperation with the Andover board

of health, local industries and school authorities for the 191 people whose X-rays were not satisfactory. In these cases, the picture might not have been a good one or else it showed an abnormality in the chest. This condition would not have to be tuberculosis since a number of other conditions may be found by chest X-rays.

Almost all the 191 have reported to the retake clinics. Another opportunity for a large X-ray will

be given those who were unable to keep their retake appointments.
