Rules For Autoists In Atomic Bursts

Automobiles provide only limited, protection from an atomic burst, reports the federal civil defense administration after a study of tests made in Nevada.

Sedans with steel tops and safety along with steel tops and

safety glass windows were used in the tests. As a result of the study motorists are advised by civil defense authorities as fol-

1. If there is a warning and you should be in a congested section like a downtown area, the car should be quickly parked at the side of the street. The occupants should leave the vehicle and hurry to the nearest designated shelter area. If no such area can be found within a blocks distance, the in-dividuals should take refuge in

dividuals should take refuge in the tallest nearby building.

2. If a warning is received but the car is a considerable distance from the nearest building, that offers shelter or if the car is in an outlying area, the occupants should roll down the windows to minimize danger from flying glass and should crouch down as low as possible in the car.

3. In case the first sign of attack is the bomb flash, vehicles should be stopped in its tracks and the occupants crouch as low as pos-sible, remaining there until debris has stopped falling. The vehicles should then be driven to the side of the road in order not to interfere with civil defense traffic.

Occupants of cars with metal ops will have good protection from light flying or falling objects. from light flying or falling objects; lowever, automobiles would give no significant protection from penetrating atomic radiation. F.C.D.A. emphasized that automobiles will not provide 'safe' shelter but if safe places are not within quick, easy reach, an automobile setter than no shelter at all, provided rules about lowering windows and crouching down are closely observed. sely observed.

If the housewife thinks she has been over-charged or poorly treated in some store she won't go back. In our competitive system, there's always another merchant who's eager to please her and get the trade.

The proper training of new auto-mobile drivers, the statement says, is now recognized by all safety commissioners and councils, automanufacturers, dealers, and insurance companies as the most effective way of reducing

highway accidents.

It is common knowledge that more people are killed or injured through automobile accidents than by any other means, including the horrible wars we have had.

The safety of the public is of paramount consideration. Expense of teaching such a course in our public schools as driver training is very small in comparison with other activities. The extra cost to the school department for this driver school department for this driver training, as now carried on, is be-tween \$5 and \$6 per student. If these students were to train in a private school, the cost would be

approximately \$25 per student.

At the present time the training period consists of time during the activity period each day and one hour each afternoon for three days. An average of sixty pupils have been taught each year for the past four years.
