Offer Students 10 Prizes For School Work

To the Punchard High school graduates who meet certain requirements in their school work individual prizes of \$5 each will be presented by the Central PTA which has donated the sum of \$50 for these awards.

To the graduate in each course whose work has best prepared him to carry out the purpose of that course a prize of \$5. will be presented to a girl or boy in the classical, technical, and commercial courses, and one prize of \$5. for a girl and one prize for a boy in the general course.

Marine Reserves To Be Activated

The 3rd Ordnance Field Maintenance Co., U.S. Marine Corps Reserve, of Lawrence, serving the northeastern Massachusetts area, including Andover, will be activated in the near future, according to notice from the district headquarters at Boston.

The unit will be located at the naval and marine corps reserve training center, North Parish road and Crawford street, Lawrence. At full strength the company will have a compliment of 10 officers and 175 enlisted men. Capt. Roy W. Moran, U.S. Marine Corps, will be inspector-instructor for the company.

Several Bequests In Woman's Will

Several local organizations are recipients of bequests contained in the will of Miss Elizabeth F. Swift, late of 23 Central st., which was filed in probate court at Lawrence.

Under the terms of the first section of the will \$400 is left to the South Parish cemetery to be used for the care of family lots; Abbot academy receives \$1000, and the Andover Historical society \$500.

The second section of the will directs that several cousins and others receive gifts.

Under the third section provision is made for \$500 to Wilhelmina Reid of Andover and \$500 to Christ church.

Rules For Autoists In Atomic Bursts

Automobiles provide only limited protection from an atomic burst, reports the federal civil defense administration after a study of tests made in Nevada.

Sedans with steel tops and safety glass windows were used in the tests. As a result of the study motorists are advised by civil defense authorities as follows:

1. If there is a warning and you should be in a congested section like a downtown area, the car should be quickly parked at the side of the street. The occupants should leave the vehicle and hurry to the nearest designated shelter area. If no such area can be found within a blocks distance, the individuals should take refuge in the tallest nearby building.

2. If a warning is received but the car is a considerable distance from the nearest building, that offers shelter or if the car is in an outlying area, the occupants should roll down the windows to minimize danger from flying glass and should crouch down as low as possible in the car.

3. In case the first sign of attack is the bomb flash, vehicles should be stopped in its tracks and the occupants crouch as low as possible, remaining there until debris has stopped falling. The vehicles should then be driven to the side of the road in order not to interfere with civil defense traffic.

Occupants of cars with metal tops will have good protection from light flying or falling objects. However, automobiles would give no significant protection from penetrating atomic radiation. F.C.D.A. emphasized that automobiles will not provide 'safe' shelter but if safe places are not within quick, easy reach, an automobile is better than no shelter at all, provided rules about lowering windows and crouching down are closely observed.

Local Bull Wins Silver Medal Honor

Sidney P. White of Wild Rose farm is the owner of Newmont Ormsby Perfection Lad, registered Holstein-Friesian bull recently named a silver medal production sire by the Holstein-Friesian Association of America. Based on the superior milk production of the bull's daughters as compared to their dams, the silver medal honor marks him as an outstanding sire of the Holstein breed of dairy cattle.

His 10 qualifying daughters, producing an average of 530 pounds of butterfat on a twice-daily milking, 305-day basis, exceeded the production of their dams by 32 pounds of butterfat and averaged 3.7% test.

This award is based only on official herd improvement registry or advanced registry records supervised by the Holstein-Friesian Association of America in cooperation with the various state agricultural colleges.

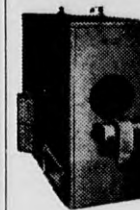
Local Students Win Senior Art Awards

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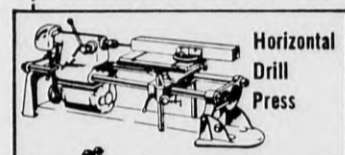

Nashua board of trade for several years before taking up his present position in Lawrence.

Mr. Hart described some of the activities of the Gloucester chamber in which the minimum membership fee is \$35 a year. He said that many summer residents of the city become members of the chamber because of the civic work it does in making Gloucester a little better place for all.

He urged members to take an active part in all community life and reminded them that the amount of money that circulates in the town is what their business is derived from.

Mr. Schmidt told the gathering that the merchants of a town should work for the whole community. In reply to a question regarding the securing of new industries for the town he said the board should have a committee representing a cross-section of the interests of the town; — schools, business, industry, — for long-range planning, and after deciding the type of industry wanted, look for prospective sites and then attempt to interest some concern of that type to locate here.

He assured his audience that the Lawrence chamber of commerce would cooperate in every way to assist the town in such an enterprise.

W. R. Hill, president of the board of trade, presided at the meeting which was held at Fieldstones. It was announced that the organization has 66 signed up for membership.

It was voted to keep business establishments open all day Saturday, Apr. 19, Patriot's day.

After some discussion it was voted to amend the constitution changing the regular meetings from the second Monday to the second Tuesday of each month, and to change the by-law so that 15 members instead of the present 25 would constitute the minimum for a quorum.

Mr. Hill announced that he would appoint a committee to bring in a slate of officers to be elected at the June meeting. He then turned the meeting over to Harold E. Haseltine, president of the Andover Service club who presented the featured part of the meeting.

This was the first dinner meeting held by the new board and it was highly gratifying to officers and members alike to see 45 present at the session.

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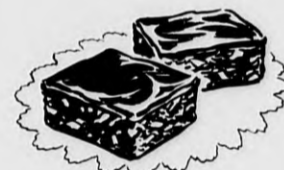
