Police Of Three Towns Chase Auto To Andover

Police of Reading, Wilmington, Lowell, Lawrence and Andover converged on the woods near Sid White's farm in West Andover early Wednesday morning after a car that had been chased by police cruisers in half a dozen towns ran out of gas and the two occupants jumped the fence and ran through the Wild Rose pasture.

One youth, John Armstrong, 23, of Peabody was caught and taken into custody by Reading police. The other, a former resident of Newburyport, was in the woods coatless while officers searched the area until daylight.

According to the police the car, owned by a resident of Peabody, first came to the attention of authorities in Newburyport. It was going at a good pace when officers started after it to slow it down. Instead it pulled away from

Name Candidates For Aquatic School

In preparation for the summer season at Pomp's pond, Andover's public swimming beach, two candidates have been selected to attend the Red Cross aquatic school at South Hanson, June 14 to 24. The local Red Cross chapter will finance the training as a part of its water safety program. James Dolan and Robert McCabe have been registered for the school, upon recommendation of Francis P. Markey, the chapter's chairman of water safety.

Red Cross first aid courses are now finishing up for the spring. Among the classes scheduled for early fall are standard, advanced and instructor courses to be given at the Sacred Heart school and at St. Augustine's parochial school, for the faculty.

Five new teachers were elected by the school committee Tuesday night at a meeting in the Bradlee school, Ballardvale, where a PTA committee discussed improvements in the building during which the possibility of a new school was suggested.

It was a regular meeting of the committee and four members were present, the fifth, C. Carleton Kimball, being on a trip to Europe. Minutes of the Apr. 8 meeting were read by the secretary, William A. Doherty, and approved.

The financial statement presented by Supt. Kenneth L. Sherman was approved as was the warrant of bills and accounts in the amount of \$1992.20, and the warrant of the P.H.S. Athletic Assn., in the sum of \$264.86.

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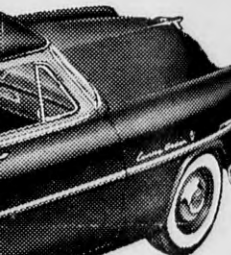
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Fiesta To Feature Music And Dancing

Colgate Scholarship Awarded Hathaway

Raeburn B. Hathaway Jr., has been awarded one of the alumni memorial national scholarships of Colgate university, Hamilton, N.Y., according to a recent announcement by university authorities. The award carries a stipend of \$700 annually during each of the four years of the college course. The honor is a distinctive one, in that 26 students are selected from more than 450 candidates from 15 states, the District of Columbia, and the Hawaiian Islands.

The scholarships were established at Colgate as ". . . living memorials to Colgate men who gave their lives in World Wars I and II, . . . to prevent a recurrence of these tragedies (by training) young men of character and general excellence . . . for responsible leadership."

Hathaway's entire career in the Andover public schools has proved him to be thoroughly eligible for such a designation. He has been a leader of his class in the central, Junior, and Punchard High schools. For the past two years, he has been president of the Punchard Student council, and has served as president of his class continually since Junior High school. As a senior, he has captained two varsity sports, football and track. He has maintained a high scholastic average throughout his course.

Safe Bicycling

Added emphasis on rules for the safe operation of bicycles on our streets is most essential today with some 700 to 900 children of Andover using this means of transportation.

The police department is alert to the situation and each year sends an officer to the schools to give members of the safety patrols and the children who ride bicycles special instruction in traffic regulations.

This instruction is to be supplemented with the application of reflector tape to the front and rear of bicycles as an added safety measure for night riding. Boys and girls can apply to have this tape put on free of charge next Saturday at Shawsheen. At the same time they will be asked to sign a pledge to comply with 12 safety rules for safe bicycling.

Motorists will appreciate these precautionary measures especially as they apply to many daring youngsters, usually found riding in groups, who need to learn the value of exercising just a little more care in passing approaching vehicles.

Any further step will have to be the registration of bicycles so that police can have more direct control over their operation.

Sherman Said It

Some of our soldiers in occupied Germany are going to recall what General Sherman said about war.

Bowing to a demand of the state department the army, according to a news dispatch from Frankfurt, is going to discontinue free maid service and some of the other luxuries which they have enjoyed in the past. Free maid service is given in the quarters of soldiers from non-commissioned officers up. Free servants are also used in clubs and messes.

A saving of 45 million dollars is involved in all the frills that are to be curtailed. The wages of several thousand free servants are paid from West German government funds as occupational costs.

From now on, non-coms will have to dig into their own pockets to see that the billet is cleaned and the comforts and luxuries of their clubs are maintained.

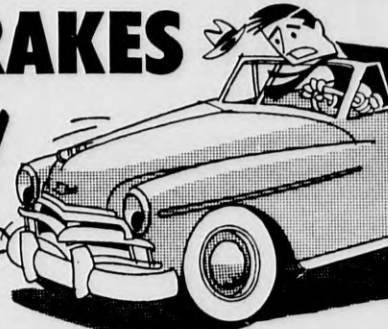

**Find 5 TB Cases
In X-Ray Survey**

Five active cases of tuberculosis of the lungs, none of them previously known, were discovered in the Andover X-ray survey which ran under the chairmanship of Francis J. Rodericks from Feb. 25 to Mar. 7, Dr. William V. Emmons, chairman of the Andover board of health, announced today following receipt of a statistical report on the survey from the division of tuberculosis of the state department of public health. The official count for the total number X-rayed was 5,177.

All five cases, Dr. Emmons said, were moderately far advanced instead of minimal cases as most often happens in survey discoveries.

Four of the five are men.
