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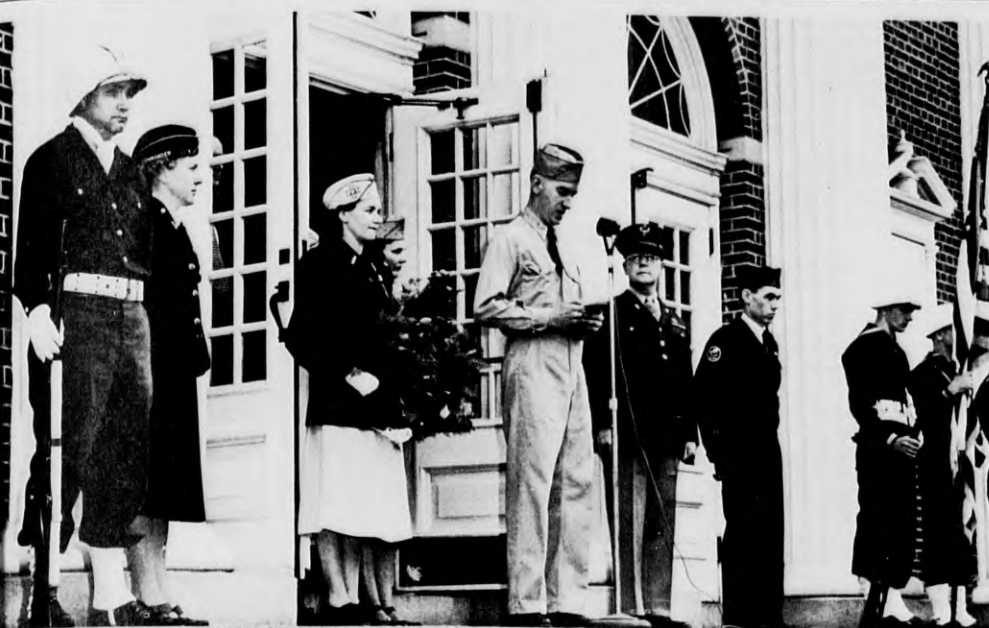

Fitting tribute to the memory of Andover's war dead was paid in traditional Memorial day exercises last Friday as veterans' organizations honored departed comrades with solemn ceremonies.

Despite the threat of leaden skies the route of the annual parade was lined with spectators who turned out to witness the various rituals held at the Memorial Hall library, the Memorial auditorium, and the Memorial Tower at Phillips academy.

Headed by a police escort, the board of selectmen, and a fire department escort, the chief marshal, Mrs. Ethel St. Jean and staff of commanders from the local veterans' organization, the parade formed in three divisions as follows:

New Building Operations Brisk

The estimated value of new buildings for which permits were issued during May was \$136,100, almost twice as much as that of a similar period a year ago. The estimated cost of additions and alterations for last month was \$33,450., making the total estimated cost of building operations \$169,550 for May.

Up to the end of last month permits for 50 new dwellings had been issued by Building Inspector Ralph W. Coleman, almost double that of a year ago.

Building operations here continue brisk. For the past five years the number of permits for new buildings has been more than 600, and at the present rate there will be more than 100 new dwelling units constructed here this year.

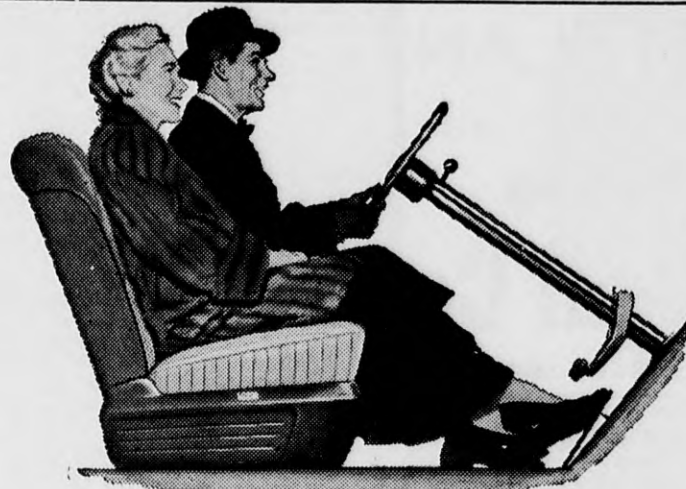

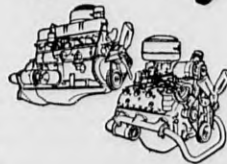

Ash Leaf Fungus Causing Damage

G. R. Abbott, moth superintendent, today issued the following statement:

Ash leaf fungus is now causing the leaves of the ash tree to turn black and fall to the ground. This fungus disease like many others develops in the spring during long periods of wet weather.

Ash leaf fungus first attacks marsh grass where it spreads to the ash tree leaves. They act as a host plant for the disease. This disease does not spread from one ash tree to another but each tree is infected from spores of the marsh grass that has the disease. After developing in the ash tree leaves this fungus must be carried back to the marsh grass to complete its life cycle.

This disease is not usually seri-

ous each year but during a wet spring like the present one it causes a strain on the tree by forcing it to send out a second crop of leaves. Several sprayings in the spring with a fungicide, keeping the leaves covered while they are developing to full size, would control this fungus but few citizens could afford the expense.

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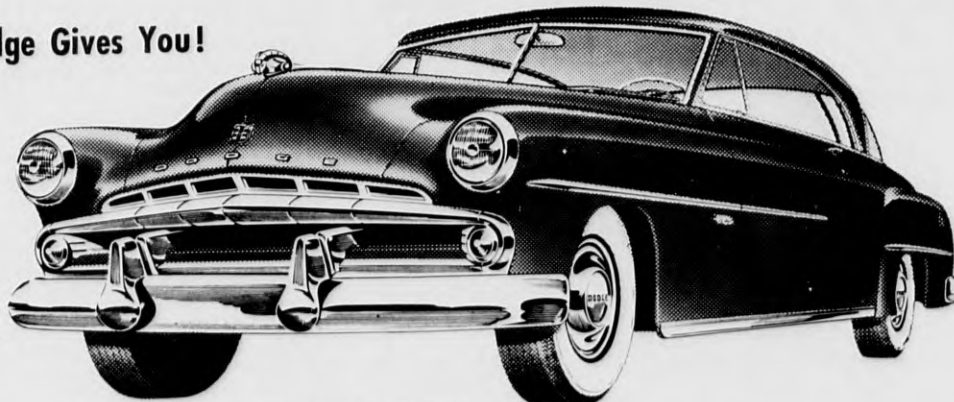

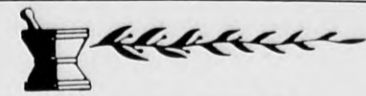
