Stone From Ancient Abbey Now At Cathedral of Pines

The many thousands of Scottish born residents in the Merrimack Valley will be pleased to learn, that a stone from the abbey in Arbroath, Angus, Scotland, has arrived at the Cathedral of the Pines, to be placed with other stones from all parts of the world, at this now famous outdoor cathedral.

The stone was secured through the efforts of an Andover man, George Keith, 6 Temple place, who was born in Arbroath, in the immediate vicinity of the abbey. The abbey was dedicated by King William the Lion to St. Thomas, the patron saint of Scotland, and given its charter in 1178.

Twenty-six years later, with the abbey still unfinished, the body of its royal founder was borne by the abbot and his monks, and in the simple words of history, "King William was buried here amidst the nation's tears."

In recent years strenuous efforts have been made to preserve every remaining stone in this ancient historical abbey, and for the past five years a colorful pageant has been held depicting the signing of the Declaration of Independence for Scotland by King Robert the Bruce, and his noblemen, in the presence of Bernard DeLinton, abbot of Aberbrothock, and chancellor of Scotland, the soldier churchman who composed the noble document, in 1320.

The abbot with his several bishops, and large aggregation of monks, canons, acolytes, cross-bearer and choir of monks, on one side, with the herald, Lord Douglas, Lord Randolph, Robert the Bruce, King of Scotland, and the barons make an imposing spectacle in their procession to the high altar for devotions, previous to the signing of the declaration, as originally done April 6, 1320.

This annual pageantry attracts visitors from all parts of the

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British Isles, Canada, and the U.S.A. and is growing in interest each succeeding year.

Many of the most picturesque figures in Scottish history spent the happiest days of their lives in the silent cloisters of the abbey. The unfortunate Mary Queen of Scots, was the last royal visitor to enjoy the hospitality of this fine old abbey. While awaiting her execution, she tenderly pulled a ring off her finger, to be given to the abbot as a token of appreciation for his kindness and sturdy support.

A part of the abbey is known as a landmark for sailors, whose ships pass by on their way up and down the coast. This part is commonly spoken of and known by all Arbroathians as "The Auld Rood O'", underneath which "O" is still the window where the abbot put the beacon or lantern each night centuries ago. During the week of the abbey pageant, a similar beacon is placed in this window.

All parts of the abbey are flood-lighted during the pageant, which makes an impressive spectacle as the light brings out the color of the soft red stone. The abbey was featured in news items all over the world, when the coronation stone, or the "Stone of Destiny" disappeared from Westminster abbey. It was handed over to town officers later at the high altar in the abbey, by three young Scots.

Board Of Trade Directors Meet

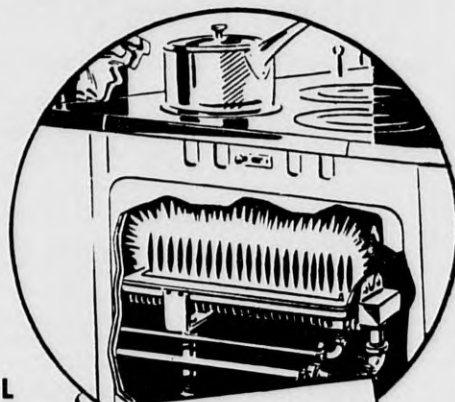

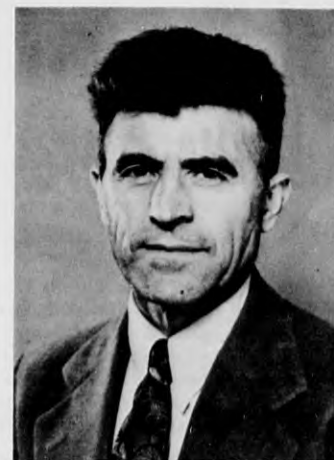

Our Tax Rate Goes Up

The \$4 increase in the tax rate announced last week by the assessors was not unexpected.

Early in the year Roy E. Hardy, chairman of the board, pointed out several factors that indicated a \$3 to \$4 increase, and at the close of the town meeting last March when a record sum of approximately \$1.4 million was appropriated by the voters, estimated that it meant an increase from the \$40 rate to a new high of \$44.

Coming after the \$4 increase a year ago it means that the tax rate in Andover has gone up \$8 over the \$36 rate of 1950, a substantial boost in a two-year period.

Causes of the upward surge are in keeping with the general trend of increases everywhere in the same period.

Locally, it was the building of two new elementary schools, salary increases, and a decrease in the amount received from the state that brought the 1951 rate up \$4. This year the cost of school operation increased more than \$40,000, charities went up \$15,000, department appropriations \$15,000 more, and the bond payment and interest account increased \$10,000.

This total of more than \$80,000 accounts for the additional \$4 this year. Then there was the action of the legislature boosting the exemption on personal property from \$1000 to \$5000 which made a reduction in the amount of local tax usually collected on this item.

It would be pleasant if one could predict where it was going to stop, just as it would be pleasing to know when federal and state taxes are going to stop going higher.

Andover residents expect the town to maintain its standards and improve them where financially possible. They are aware that many capable and conscientious officials are serving in office and that town funds under their control are spent with care.

If management or labor or both look to the government to solve their problems or seek the artificial method of legislation for settlement they will be letting some of the most important freedoms slip from their hands.

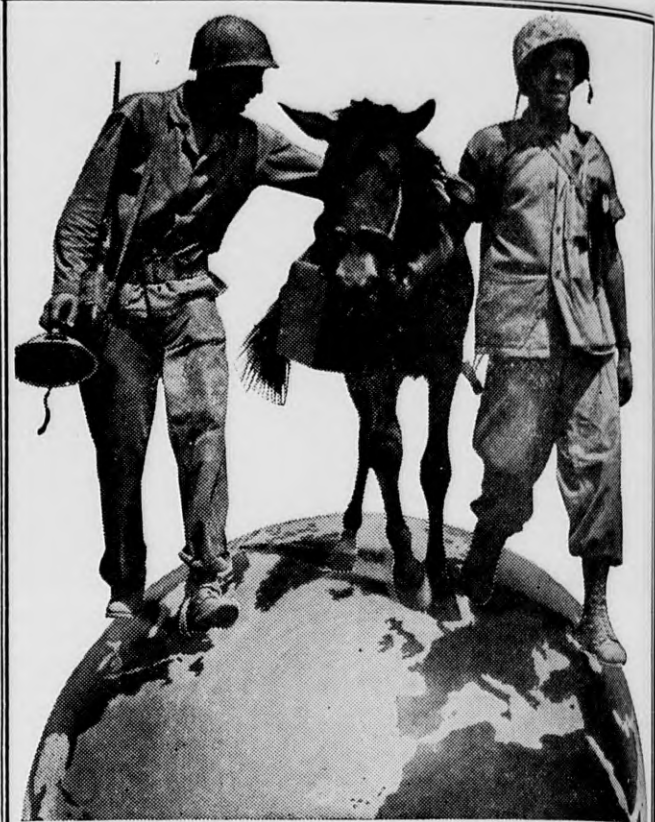

DO YOU KNOW THAT...The ten towns in Massachusetts which had the highest ratio of private new home building in the three years, 1949 through 1951, were Westwood, which built 51.4% as many dwelling units as it had in 1940, East Longmeadow 45.7%, Holden 43.4%, Bedford 37.9%, Sharon 37.3%, Natick and Auburn each 36.9%, West Boylston 33.6%, Agawam 33.3% and Lexington 33%.
