

Our Tax Rate Goes Up

The \$4 increase in the tax rate announced last week by the assessors was not unexpected.

Early in the year Roy E. Hardy, chairman of the board, pointed out several factors that indicated a \$3 to \$4 increase, and at the close of the town meeting last March when a record sum of approximately \$1.4 million was appropriated by the voters, estimated that it meant an increase from the \$40 rate to a new high of \$44.

Coming after the \$4 increase a year ago it means that the tax rate in Andover has gone up \$8 over the \$36 rate of 1950, a substantial boost in a two-year

Causes of the upward surge are in keeping with the general trend of increases everywhere in the same period.

Locally, it was the building of two new elementary schools, salary increases, and a decrease in the amount received from the state that brought the 1951 rate up \$4. This year the cost of school operation increased more than \$40,000, charities went up\$15,000, department appropriations \$15,000 more, and the bond payment and interest account increased \$10,000.

This total of more than \$80,000 accounts for the additional \$4 this year. Then there was the action of. the legislature boosting the exemption on personal property from \$1000 to \$5000 which made a reduction in the amount of local tax usually collected on this

It would be pleasant if one could predict where it was going to stop, just as it would be pleasing to know when federal and state taxes are going to stop going higher.

Andover residents expect the town to maintain its standards and improve them where financially possible. They are aware that many capable and conscientious officials are serving in office and that town funds under their control are spent with care.

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
