## Heavy Rains Bring End To Drought

A torrential downpour Sunday afernoon did much with rains of the past week to break the drought which caused considerable loss to local farmers while at the same time it eased the threatening forest fire hazard and put a check to the heavy pull on the town's water sup-ply which earlier in the week had the level at Haggett's pond down more than 40 inches below normal.

Sunday's heavy downpour amoun-ted to 1.80 inches, according to records of the Essex Co., at Law-rence. The rainfall in the past wet period was as follows:
