Takes Issue With Abbot On Discharge

Leo E. Pimpare of Ballardvale, recently discharged from the tree department by Tree Warden G. Richard Abbott, takes issue with the latter on some of the statements credited to him in the controversy.

Pimpare says that the tree warden sent him a letter while he was on vacation and the letter did not mention that he was being replaced by a veteran of the tree department. He claims town records will show that he was temporarily employed in the department prior to the employment of Herbert Lister, who, he says, has been made a pawn in this issue, and that the records will also show that he replaced Lister as a permanent employee last fall when the latter resigned to take a position elsewhere.

He also questioned Abbott's statement that the latter had not heard that Pimpare intended to oppose him at the election next March.

Pimpare further claims that John Lynch, Harry Reidy and Herbert Lister were discharged by Abbott because they advised him of their intentions to voice their disapproval of his discharge before the selectmen. The men since have been reinstated.

Juveniles Damaged Church Property

Police have apprehended three juveniles who smeared paint over the walls and seats of St. Augustine's church about two weeks ago during the process of redecorating the interior of the edifice.

The three, it has been learned, are responsible for certain acts of vandalism which took place in the church just a few weeks earlier. It is expected that they will be arraigned later in juvenile court.

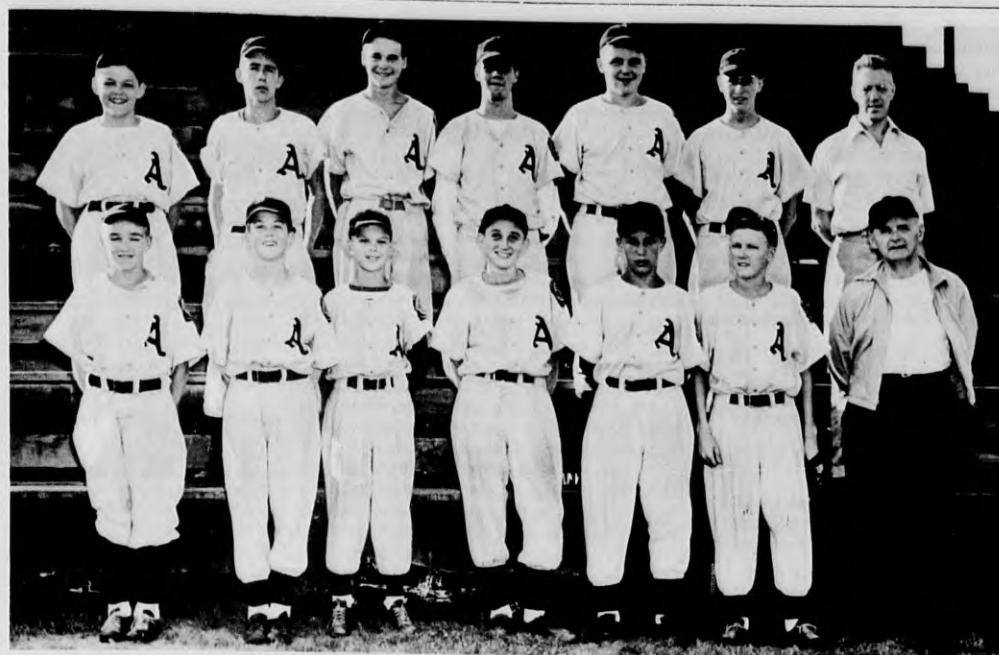
IN AIR FORCE

Red Cross Appeals For Blood Donors

Calls for blood for the sick and the injured continue to be received at Red Cross headquarters. During the past week 19 pints were required for Andover people in local hospitals.

Blood supplies are so low that most of these needs had to be filled by calling upon people on the chapter's blood donor list to go directly to the hospital as walk-in donors, often at considerable inconvenience.

The blood situation is in a state of real emergency all over the country, a state which can be greatly alleviated by a renewal of active support of the blood collection program of the Red Cross.

Every one in Andover who is between the ages of 18 and 60 who can possibly do so is urged to register as a blood donor when the Red Cross bloodmobile visits here, on Monday and Tuesday, Sept. 22 and 23. The local Red Cross office will take your name at any time. Just call Andover 1496.

The one-story building of two rooms has housed school classes for nearly 90 years. Pupils in that area now will attend the new elementary school on Beacon street.

Heavy Rains Bring End To Drought

A torrential downpour Sunday afternoon did much with rains of the past week to break the drought which caused considerable loss to local farmers while at the same time it eased the threatening forest fire hazard and put a check to the heavy pull on the town's water supply which earlier in the week had the level at Haggett's pond down more than 40 inches below normal.

Sunday's heavy downpour amounted to 1.80 inches, according to records of the Essex Co., at Lawrence. The rainfall in the past wet period was as follows:

Tuesday, Aug. 5 — .82
Wednesday, Aug. 6 — .93
Thursday, Aug. 7 — .14
Sunday, Aug. 10 — 1.80
August 12, 13 — 1.69

Sunday's rainfall was general throughout New England except in parts of Maine where it was not heavy enough to quench all the forest fires that had been burning for some time.

While truck farmers of Andover and throughout this area would lose a large percentage of their normal yield of crops the recent rains would be a big help to some of the second plantings for late crops.

In many heavily traveled areas Sunday, the skies opened and flooded streets and highways and slowed traffic of thousands of New England vacationists to a snail's pace. The late afternoon downpour came so heavily that catchbasins were unable to take the run-off quickly which caused great pools of water across scores of highways.

Locally there was very little damage caused by the storm and the board of public works had few minor spots to repair after it was over.

Political Signs To Be Removed

Political signs now beginning to appear outdoors in public and private places were the subject of a discussion by the selectmen at Monday's night's meeting.

All such signs that appear in public places in town will be removed and the selectmen are now looking into what authority they have to remove such signs from private property.

Many political signs in the past have been taken from public places and left at the police station until the owners called for them.

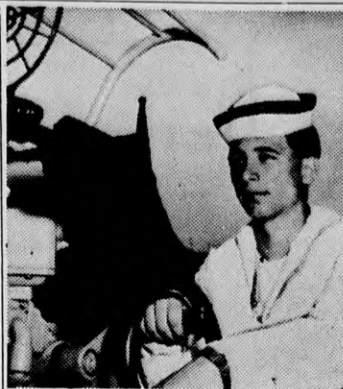

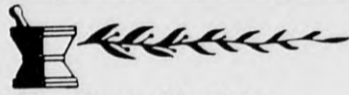
