Supt. Of Schools Office Located In New Building

The office of the superintendent of schools has been opened up in its new quarters in the Central elementary school where Supt. Kenneth L. Sherman and his secretary, Miss Barbara R. Greenwood are now busy with preparations for the school opening Monday, Sept. 8.

The office of Miss Catherine M. Barrett, principal, will be opened in the new building Sept. 2 where she will be available for preliminary work prior to the opening.

The new building will be ready for occupancy on the opening day of school when kindergarten classes and elementary grades one to six will occupy the 18-room structure for the first time.

To make room for the new building the John Dove school, built in 1876, has been razed. The old Samuel Jackson school will be used for shop and music but the Stowe school, which is still standing, will not be utilized.

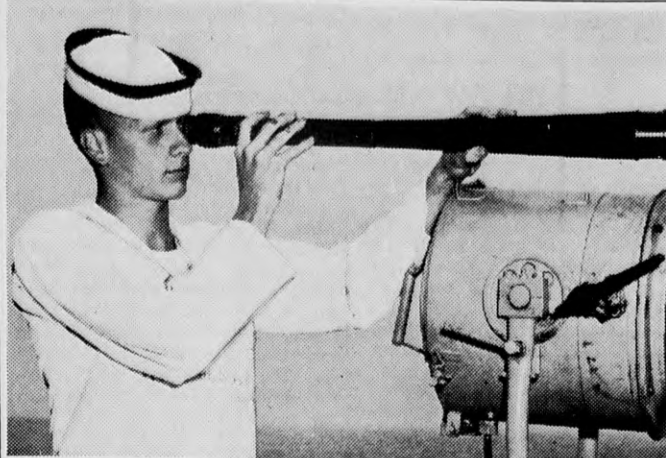

Well over 300 persons have appeared at recent sessions of the board of registrars to enroll as voters and efforts of the Andover League of Women Voters have been largely responsible for a goodly part of this number. Both the Democratic and Republican town committees were also engaged in getting people to register during this period.

Although Friday of last week was the final day to register for the state primaries the League will not remain inactive. Instead, the members will concentrate their efforts in getting voters to the polls Tuesday, September 16, when party candidates are to be nominated to run in the general election. The day after the primaries registration for the November election will open and the League will start all over again its campaign to get those qualified for registration to put their names on the voting lists.

Through the cooperation of The Townsman it will present as part of its service in political education basic facts pertinent to registering and to voting.

WHAT DO YOU DO when a piece of veneer chips off an article of furniture? The best answer is to save the fragment, if that is possible, and stick it in place as soon as you can. If you're unable to salvage the piece, you should be able to buy a small sheet of veneer at a shop that sells upholstery or cabinet maker supplies, which you can cut to fit. An alternative is to build up the bare spot with wood putty, or plastic wood, available at your hardware store. The putty first should be tinted to as nearly the correct color as possible with color-in-oil. You won't come up with a perfect result, of course, but it will be better than an ugly, veneer-less area.

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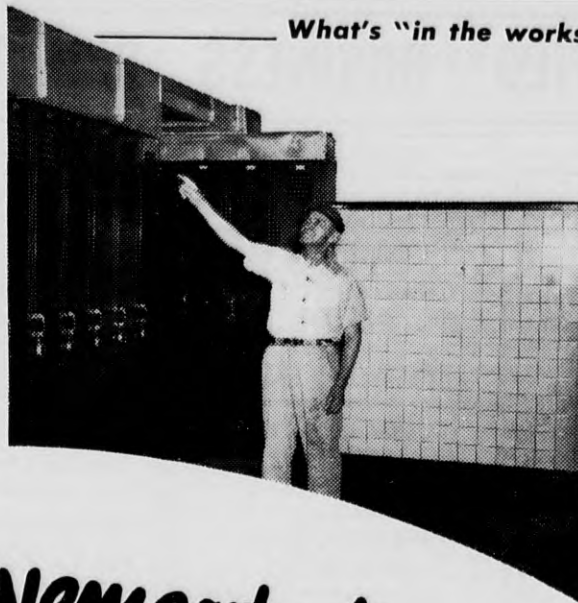
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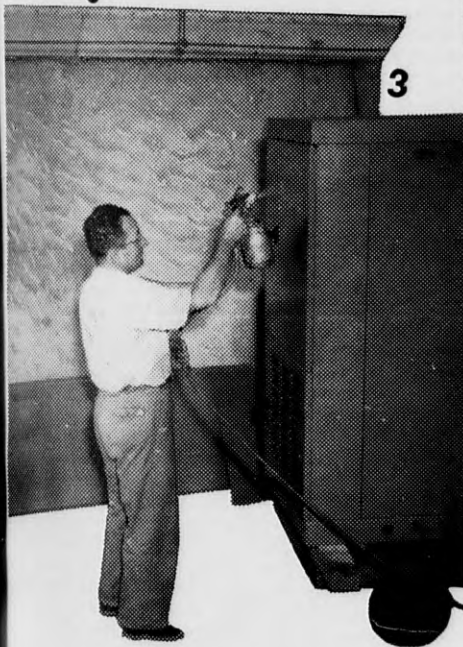

**Town To Vote
On Rent Law**

Local voters will have an opportunity to express their opinion on the continuation of rent controls through a special ballot which has been issued for the referendum in the Sept. 16 state primaries.

The short white ballots will carry a brief explanation of the provisions of the federal rent control act which allows continuation of rent ceilings after Sept. 30 in each city and town voting for it.

It reads, in part, "Shall a declaration be made by popular referendum . . . that a substantial shortage of housing accommodations exists which requires the continuance of federal rent control in this town after Sept. 30, 1952, until the close of April 30, 1953?"

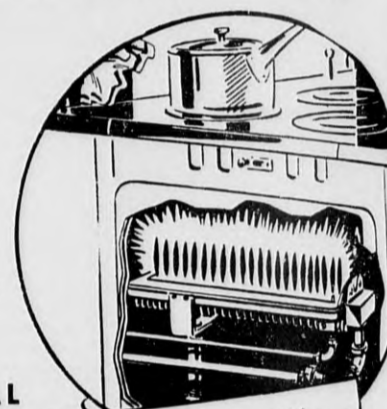
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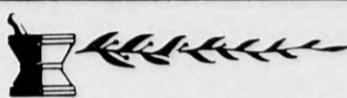
