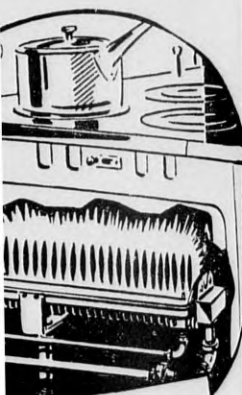

## 4 Local Boys Awarded P. A. Scholarships

A crowd of over 300 persons assembled at Pump's pond last Sunday afternoon to witness the annual water carnival that brought the season's activities at the beach to a close.

An excellent program of races, novelties and demonstrations in water safety was arranged by the life guards which proved highly entertaining for those who witnessed the events.

The carnival closed another successful season at the town's swimming beach which this year had an official attendance of 26,176. The highest weekly record was made during the exceptionally hot week of July 13 - 19 when the official check recorded 8115 in attendance.

## Over 4500 Enrolled For School Openings Here Next Month

### Old West School Sold At Auction

The old West Center school was sold at public auction last Saturday for \$200. Daniel F. Ferris, former Lawrence alderman was the successful bidder for the one-story two-room wooden building which has provided class rooms for children of the district for about 90 years. Mr. Ferris will remove the building and contents to a tract of land he owns on West Beacon street.

A good sized crowd was on hand when Roy E. Hardy, chairman of the board of selectman acting as auctioneer, started to call for bids.

The first bid was one of \$50 and four others were received until the price reached \$200.

Only the building and contents were for sale. The fence will be used later by the town and the corner now occupied by the playground will be widened. The building will be removed from the premises before next Jan. 1.

Shortly after the sale was made Mr. Ferris donated the flagpole on the building to the Rev. John G. Gaskill who will use it on the West Parish church grounds.

## 25,156 Attended Town Playgrounds

Closing of the playgrounds after eight weeks' operation of supervised play under the direction of the Andover Recreation committee showed that the attendance figures for the current season ran up to a total of 25,156.

This was divided as follows; Central, 7366; Ballardvale, 9799; Shawsheen, 2903; Indian Ridge, 2935; West Center, 2153.

These figures are slightly below the attendance of last year. Director James D. Doherty and his staff feel that the excessive heat during the early summer cut into the playground attendance but it would cause an increase in the attendance at Pump's swimming beach.

The registration on each playground was; Central, 280; Ballardvale, 390; Shawsheen, 130; Indian Ridge, 125; West Center, 124; total 1049.

The attendance and registration figures at Ballardvale topped the other play centers, due partly to the fact that the playground there was open evenings, as well as mornings and afternoons, and to the annual carnival that attracted so many during the closing week.

Andover's public and private schools will open next month with a total enrollment well over 4500, an increase of about 400 over a year ago.

When the school bells peal forth their summons beginning Monday, Sept. 8, it is expected that the public school enrollment will reach the record high figure of 2045 with increases all along the line from the kindergarten through the grade schools and into the junior and senior high. The opening day enrollment last year was 1792, but this was increased with the admission of more students shortly afterward.

It is expected that on the opening day a week from next Monday there will be 1315 in the grade schools, 350 in the junior high, and 380 in Punchedard high.

Another large increase is expected at Merrimack college when about 780 day and evening students will be on hand for the opening Sept. 17.

St. Augustine's school, which opens Monday, Sept. 8 will again have a capacity enrollment of more (Continued on Page 14)

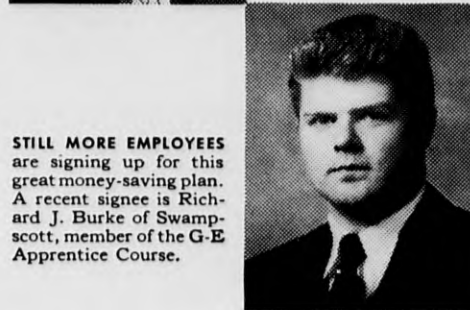

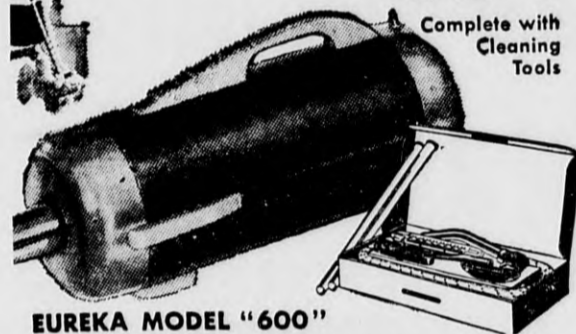

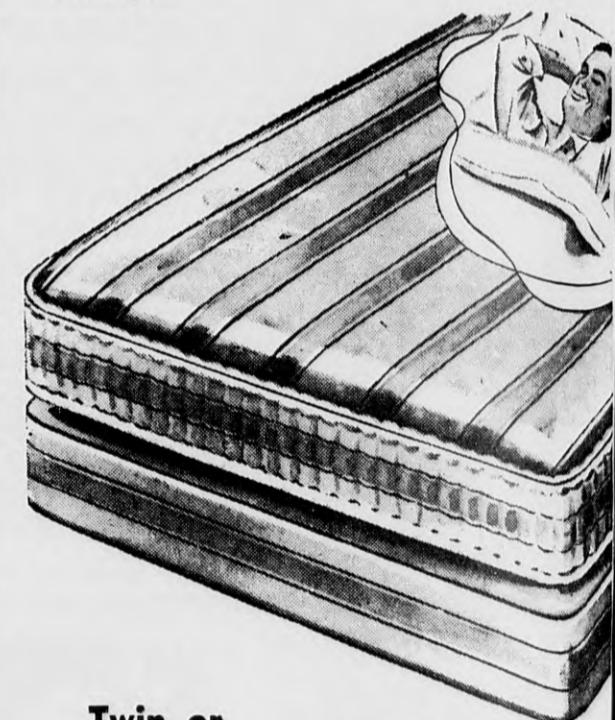
