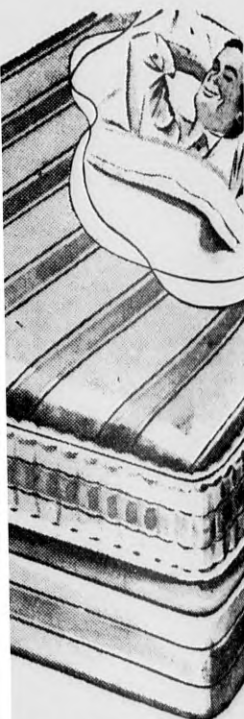

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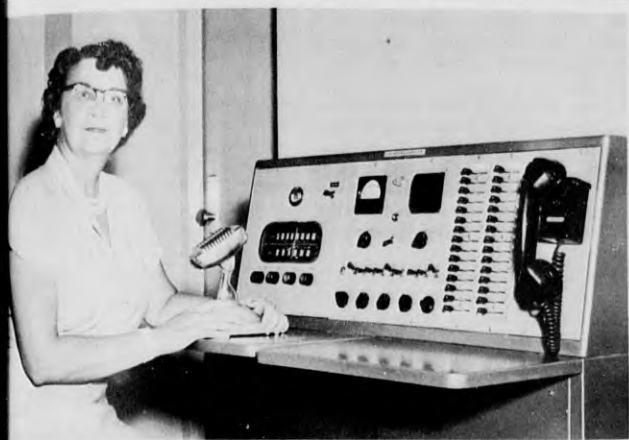

New Central School Receives First Pupils Monday

Central School Information

For the pupils who will attend the Central elementary school this year Miss Catherine M. Barrett, principal, has issued the following instructions:

(1) The school hours are 9 a.m. to 12 noon and 1:30 to 3:15 p.m. with the exception of Wednesday afternoons. Those afternoons will be spent by the teachers helping children who require individual attention due to absence from school or slow rate of learning. The children will know a day ahead so that they may plan accordingly.

(2) The first, second and third graders report just mornings for the first four weeks of the school year. If parents cannot transport bus children at noon, they will be under the supervision of their teachers until the school bus can take them home on one of their regular trips.

PUBLIC INSPECTION OF NEW BUILDING

A date for public inspection of the new 18-room Central elementary school on Bartlet street will be announced soon. It is expected that it will be arranged in connection with the dedication of the building which tentatively has been set for sometime late in September.

(3) Bus children who are excused at 12 o'clock on Wednesdays but have no way of getting home, will be expected to eat in the cafeteria and at the close of the noon hour return to their classrooms. They then will be under the watchful eye of the teacher until their buses arrive. These buses leave school earlier on Wednesdays.

About 600 Expected To Attend

The new Central elementary school will open for the first time next Monday morning when Miss Catherine M. Barrett, principal, and her staff will welcome some 600 pupils to the 18 grade and two kindergarten classrooms.

The recently completed structure replaces the John Dove school, built in 1876 and razed to make room for the present building; the Samuel Jackson built in 1904, which will house no pupils but which will be used for shop and music; and the Stowe school, originally erected in 1893 and rebuilt in 1896 after being destroyed by fire. This building is still standing but will not be used.

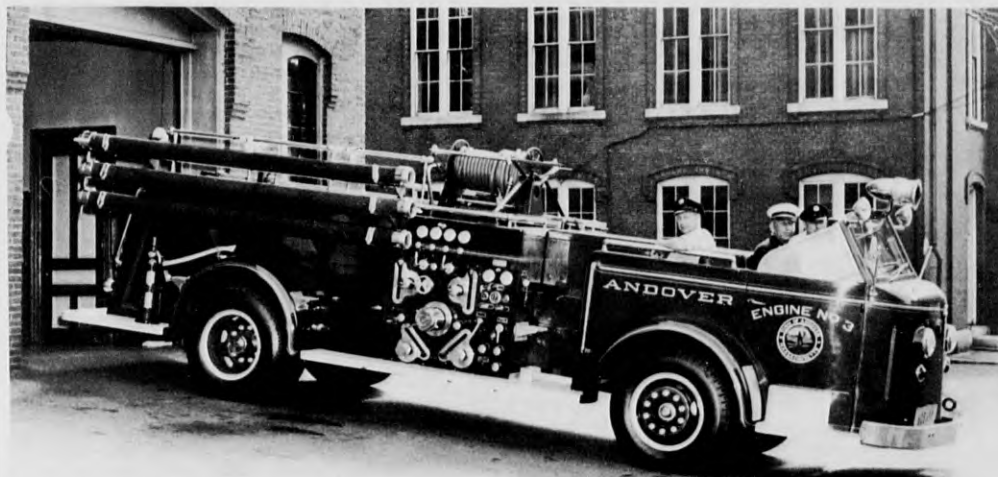

Town's New \$17,000 Fire Fighter

V-12 Motor Has 215 H. P.

The latest acquisition to the town's fire fighting equipment, a 1000-gallon triple combination pumping engine for which the town meeting last March appropriated \$17,000, arrived last week and after acceptance tests to be held this week will be placed in service.

The new piece replaces the former Engine 3, a veteran of 24 years' service in the department. Disposition of this piece of apparatus has not yet been decided.

The new engine was shipped from the American LaFrance Foamite Corp., of Elmira, N.Y., over a week ago but was held in Boston for several days for exhibition at the fire chiefs' convention.

Powered by a V-12 motor of 215 h.p., it has a capacity for 1600 feet of 2½ inch hose, a 150-gallon booster tank and 150 feet of 3/4 inch hose.

The driver's cab, which seats three, is placed ahead of the engine. (Continued on Page Four)

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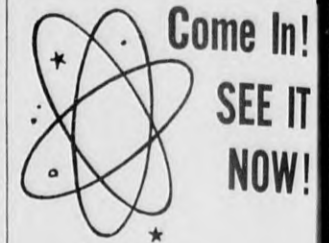

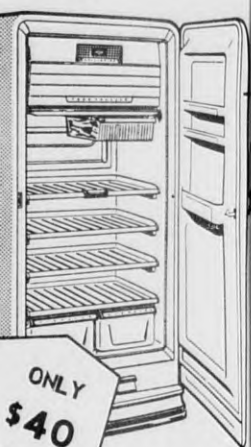

gine, and there are two single seats beside the engine, facing the rear, for firemen to ride to fire steps. It also has large rear and side steps.

Two large searchlights, each 140,000 candle power, are located just outside the cab, and it also carries several lanterns and hand extinguishers.

Carried on the left side are two ladders, one 24-foot extension ladder and one 14-foot side roof ladder with hooks. The panel board on the left side is illuminated.

Our Schools Open

Our town of Andover, long distinguished as a noted seat of learning, this month will admit some 4500 young people to its various schools.

It might be accepting a great many more were it not for the fact that its private schools and most of its public schools are again filled to capacity. Only the completion of two new buildings this year keeps the public schools out of that category, yet class room accommodations in Shawsheen Village and Ballardvale are just about stretched to their limit.

The greatest increase in school enrollment comes in the public schools, as revealed by The Townsman's survey of the situation last week.

Phillips academy, which has just announced the award of scholarships to 174 students; Abbot academy, which will welcome girls from several foreign countries as well as from all parts of the United States; the Sacred Heart school, with youngsters from many New England communities; the Pike and Marland schools, with over 200 pupils in the local area, and St. Augustine's, which will have more than 400 boys and girls in its kindergarten and eight grades, have room for no more than they have had in the past few years.

A big increase, however, will be noted in Merrimack college, a co-educational school still in its growing stages, and a whacking increase will come in the public schools where 2045 pupils are expected on the opening day, compared with the enrollment of about 1800 a year ago.

The increase is noted all through the system, in the senior and junior high schools as well as in the grade schools, with the bulk coming in the lower grades. This far surpasses the number estimated in the school survey a few years ago.

A large part of the increase is due to new families coming to Andover, the rest to the high birth rate that followed World War II.

All these young people in both public and private schools will be under the supervision and guidance of capable teaching staffs devoted during the next 10 months to the American system of education in training them to become better citizens.

**NEW CENTRAL SCHOOL
OPENS MONDAY***(Continued from Page One)*

When pupils step into this new building next Monday morning they will see a brand new and modern structure with many striking features which are a distinct departure from what they have experienced in other school buildings.

All walls are finished in different pastel tints with the latest lighting arrangements of glass blocks and windows which require no curtains. Ventilators and radiators in each room are enclosed. All rooms and corridors are sound-proofed and the concrete floors are covered with linoleum. In the corridors outside each room are metal lockers for clothing, each of which will be shared by two pupils.

Each room has a full-length mirror to assist the children with their posture, and each room has its wall cabinets, shelves, and sink with hot and cold water.

Class rooms on the street floor are for the first three grades. They are equipped with separate desks and chairs of blond maple, none of which is affixed to the floor.

Rooms on the second floor are

for the upper grades. Each pupil will have a combination desk and chair, not fixed to the floor. In each room the teacher has an individual filing cabinet beside her desk.

One striking departure from the school of other days is that the rooms have no "blackboards." Instead, they have "chalk" boards of green. White or yellow chalk can be used on them. Each room also has a cork board about the size of the "chalk" board upon which bulletins may be attached.

The southerly wing of the building contains two kindergarten rooms, an auditorium that seats 267, a gym-cafeteria with movable tables and benches, and a kitchen.

The office of the superintendent of schools and of the principal are located off the corridor in the central part of the building.

The new West Center school, which opened last spring for two classes from the old West school, will have all six rooms occupied when it opens Monday with Miss Isabelle Dobbie principal.

Pupils from the Indian Ridge school, now closed, will enter this new building Monday for the first time.

This school is finished like the Central school and has somewhat similar modern features, together with a gym-cafeteria, kindergarten, and offices.

Occupation of the two new school buildings is the result of a study started some years ago regarding local school needs.

The town meeting of 1949 appropriated \$1500 for a survey of the entire school plant. This was made by Jesse B. Davis of Boston university, and Cyril G. Sargent formerly of Phillips academy faculty but now with the Harvard School of Education, and the report presented to the citizens prior to the town meeting of 1950. This meeting authorized the appointment of a building committee to present plans and recommendations to the town.

This committee was made up as follows: C. Carleton Kimball, chairman, Kenneth L. Sherman, secretary, Herbert P. Carter, Gordon L. Colquhoun, Roy E. Hardy, Harold T. Houston and Stanley F. Swanton.

The architectural firm of Tucker & Rich Associates of Boston was selected with Dr. Homer Anderson employed as an educational consultant. The Bartlet street site of the Central school presented no problem but the committee had to find a suitable site for the West Center school and recommended the purchase of approximately 12 acres on Beacon street. It presented a plan for a six-room building in this district, and for the center of the town a two-story building of classrooms.

A table giving the costs was presented, the total for the West Center school being \$350,000 and

the Center \$750,000 with \$100,000 for contingencies, a grand total of \$1,200,000.

A special town meeting in November, 1950 voted to accept the recommendations of the school building committee for the two schools and appropriated the sum of \$1,200,000.

Bids were called for, and in March 1951 the contract for both schools was awarded to the Walter L. Ritchie Co., of Malden at a contract price of \$1,037,816 which represented \$674,310 for the Central school and \$363,506 for the West school.

Ground for both schools was broken Sunday, Apr. 1 in the presence of a large gathering of town and school officials, the contractor and local teachers.

Both schools are now ready for occupancy.

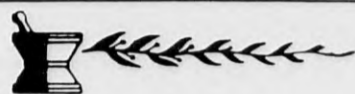
