7,419 Andover Voters May Cast Ballots At Primaries

Town Officials Report On Rent Control Issue

Editor's Note: The League of Women Voters of Andover has interviewed town officials in an attempt to provide information for local voters to assist in their balloting on the referendum question at the state primaries next Tuesday of whether or not rent controls should be continued or ended in this municipality. If a majority of the votes are cast in the affirmative (YES) it will indicate that a greater number of voters believe there is a shortage of housing accommodations in this town and the federal rent control law will continue after Sept. 30, 1952, until April 30, 1953. If a majority of the votes are cast in the negative (NO), the federal rent control shall cease to be in effect in Andover at the close of Sept. 30, 1952. Voters do not have to declare a party affiliation to get a ballot on this question.

The following reports will indicate to the reader that officials in two agencies, whose work is related to the problem, are not in agreement on this issue. Francis P. Markey, agent of the Office of Veterans Service here, states—"I have no choice but to admit that there is a shortage of suitable housing at reasonable rents here". Officials of the Andover Housing Authority state: "Construction of 56 dwelling units for families of veterans of low income has met the real need of housing of veterans." The Andover Board of Selectmen "differ on the acuteness of the housing shortage" and leave their decision to the vote of the Townspeople.

Question: "What is your opinion of the present housing shortage in Andover?"

Francis P. Markey, agent, office of veterans service, Andover: "Speaking strictly from my standpoint as Veterans service officer, I have no choice but to admit there is a shortage of suitable housing at reasonable

rents here. We do not have the acute housing shortage which existed during the period 1942 through 1950, but there is still a constant demand. Every week both veteran and non-veteran families solicit our aid in finding rentals. We have over 300

All Polling Places Will Open Tuesday

A record number of 7,419 Andover residents are eligible to cast their ballots at the state primaries which will be held on Tuesday next with polling places open in all six precincts from 7 a.m. through 7 p.m.

Of the total number of voters, as of July 1, 3600 were enrolled in the Republican party; 962 in the Democratic party and the others were not enrolled.

Each voter will receive two ballots. One will list the candidates for public office and the second will deal with the question of rent controls. It is not necessary for a voter to declare himself or herself in order to obtain a rent control ballot.

Several Andover residents are engaged in contests for nomination at the primaries. On the Republican ballot, John Adams, 15 Stratford rd., seeks nomination for state senator from the Fourth Essex District. He is opposed by

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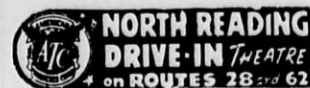

The lower grades in all schools were reported as highest on record, indicating that a continued increase may be expected in school enrollments during the next few years.

Punchard high school received 360 students as compared to 328 last year; Junior high school accepted 381 as compared to 372 in 1951; central reported 653 as compared to 588; Shawsheen reported 282 as compared to 243; West school reported 216 students and the Bradlee school registered 151. School authorities said that total enrollment was at an all time record.

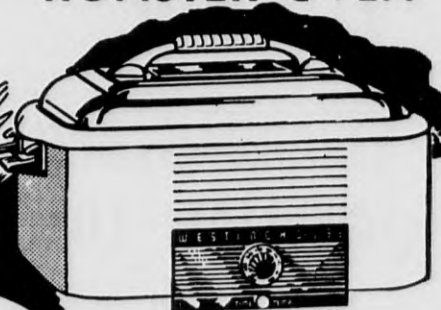

Andover men, now, who will be Korean campaign veterans. More enter the service each week. Under the rotation system, these new veterans are returning frequently and many of them are married and cannot find suitable housing to rent. We face the same problems which confronted us following World War II when housing was the most difficult problem to solve. The entire, gigantic veteran housing project was inaugurated throughout our Commonwealth to provide suitable housing at fair rents for the low income wage earner who is forced to rent a home. The "little guy" is still with us. I do not go along with controls too enthusiastically but from where I sit, meeting the public every day and hearing their problems, a find a lack of suitable housing to rent in Andover is still the biggest problem. I firmly believe my duty, in order to further assist those who have come to this office seeking a solution to their rental problem, is to vote YES for rent control on Tuesday, Sept. 16.

HOUSING AUTHORITY VIEW

"The Andover Housing Authority, with its construction of 56 dwelling units for families of veterans of low incomes, has met the real need of housing for veterans. We have on hand about 12 pending applications and the majority of these are from families of two persons. Normal moveouts have provided sufficient vacancies to provide housing for most new, urgent cases which arise. We have no information on the need of families

of non-veterans. Only veterans are eligible for our housing and families or non veterans do not apply and could not be given housing under the law."

STATEMENT FROM SELECTMEN

"There is a difference of opinion among the members of the Board of Selectmen concerning the acuteness of the housing shortage in Andover. The demand for low rent housing is, and always has been, greater than the supply. The majority of the Board is opposed to the artificial control of prices, and believe this procedure should be eliminated as soon as possible so that increased production may bring about lower prices. We have, however, decided to have our rent control decision based on the vote of the townspeople as registered at the primaries, September 16, 1952."

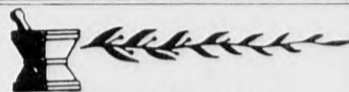
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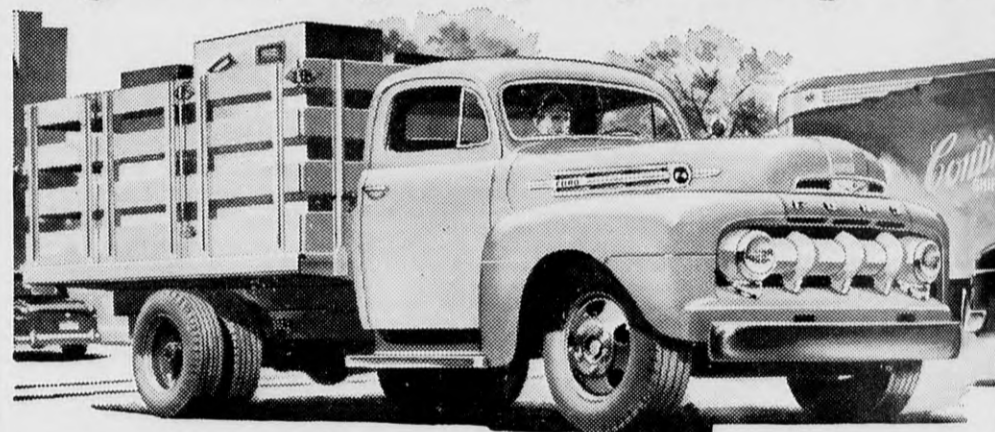

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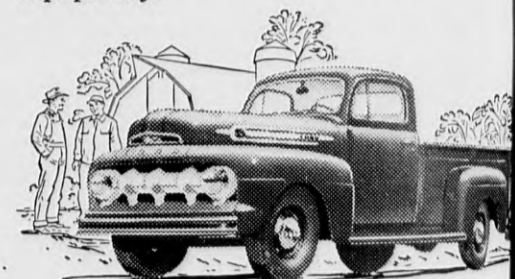
