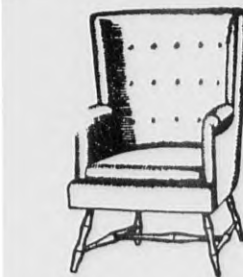

Public Invited To Visit Latest Addition To School System

Open house will be held at the new Central elementary school from 4 to 6 o'clock next Sunday afternoon at which time the people of Andover will have an opportunity to inspect the latest addition to the town's school system.

Those who pay a visit to the new 18-room structure off Bartlet street will see a model two-story building of the latest school design and with up-to-the-minute features that go to make up the present day school building.

To draw up plans for this structure the building committee which was authorized by the town meeting in 1950 selected the architectural firm of Tucker & Rich Associates of Boston with Dr. Homer Anderson employed as educational consultant. The West Center grade school, opened last May, was included in the new school lay out which was proposed to house the town's growing school population.

Both the Central and the West are practical schools. In the formative stages of the planning both Superintendent Kenneth L. Sherman and the Andover teachers were consulted. The teachers proved of great value in making these plans functional and of maximum service

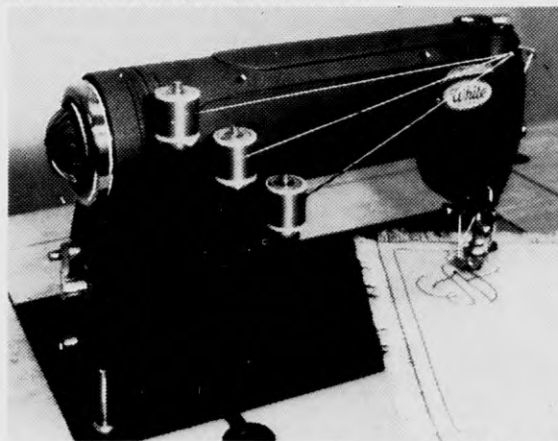

Discusses Social Security Benefits

If you are one of the people who receive monthly old-age and survivors insurance payments, Sept. 1 and Oct. 3 are two dates to remember.

Beginning Sept. 1 you can earn as much as \$75 a month and still cash your social security checks. About Oct. 3 your benefit check for September will go into the mail, and practically all families receiving benefits will get increased amounts beginning with these checks.

Miss Vose, manager of the Lawrence social security office, points out that no application need be made for the increase in payments already being made. It will be made automatically.

A person who is on the rolls but is not receiving checks because he is earning between \$50

and \$75 a month should call at or write to the social security office in order to get his payments started.

Self-employed people who receive the payments may average as much as \$75 per month throughout the year and still receive monthly benefit checks, according to Miss Vose. Thus, a self-employed person who works in his own business and makes no more than \$900 in a year will receive all the monthly checks. If he earns more than \$900 in the year, benefits for one or more months may not be payable. The number of months for which benefits are not payable depends on the amount of work he does in his business and the amount by which his earnings exceed \$900.

After a person reaches 75 social

security benefits may be paid to him regardless of how much he is earning.

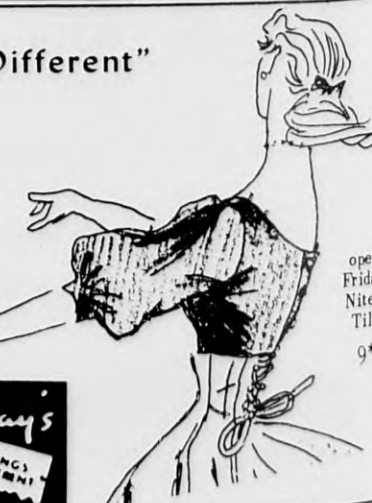

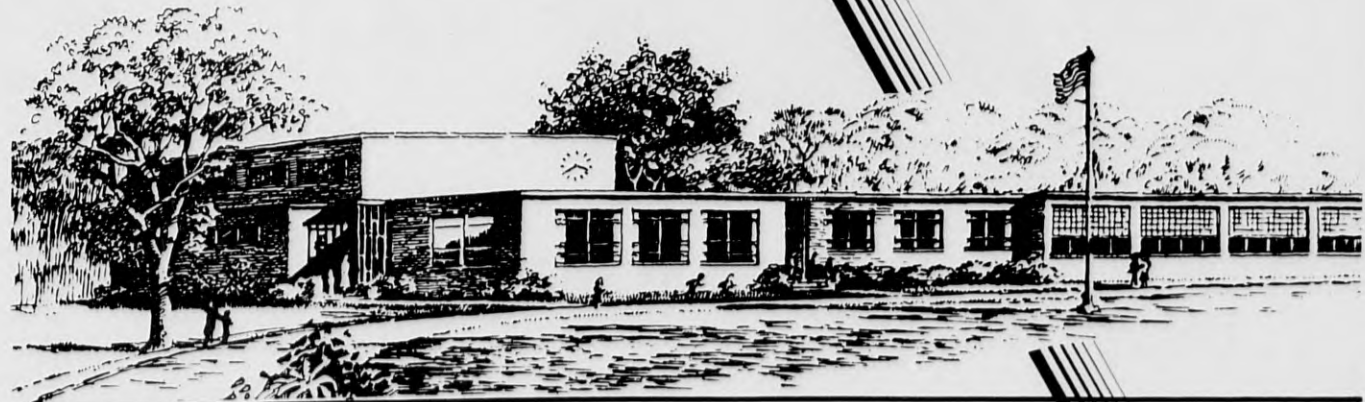

New School Designed As Practical Structure

Teachers in the new Central school are most enthusiastic about the new building, which they have occupied for about three weeks, and about the modern features it contains.

In discussing the new plant and its equipment from a teacher's point of view, Miss Catherine M. Barrett, the principal says;

"Today 650 children, who only a few months ago were going to school in small adjoining build-

ings are housed under the roof of one large modern architectural brick building, the design of which was intended to inspire these future citizens of Andover.

"In the short period of three weeks that this new school, namely the Central elementary School has been in operation it has proved to be a truly functional building with every improvement over the old type school building planned to do a specific duty. It is very evident that the entire building was designed and detailed for the purpose of obtaining the most practical school structure. It has been accomplished with the best of materials but at the same time without ostentation and without waste.

"American education today is faced with the challenge of having children experience the democratic manner of living. This means that opportunities need to be offered for pupils to learn the principles of democratic life by working and playing together under conditions which foster respect for the rights and privileges of others and tolerance for the viewpoints of others. It also means that the girls and boys must be helped in the understanding of what is meant by freedom, responsibility, rights and duties.

"Emphasis is being shifted from the mere acquisition of skills and knowledges to the acquisition of skills and knowledges in relation to their need and use. Every child should be acquiring information and facts, but, in addition, he must know how to use facts and to work through such problems as present themselves.

"It seems to me that this new school with its 18 classrooms, library, special class, kindergartens, auditorium, gymnasium, cafeteria, conference room, teachers' rest room, clinic and administrative offices provides a beautiful setting for the education of tomorrow's citizens."

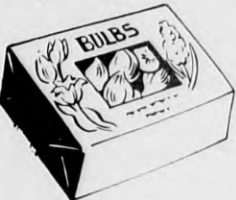

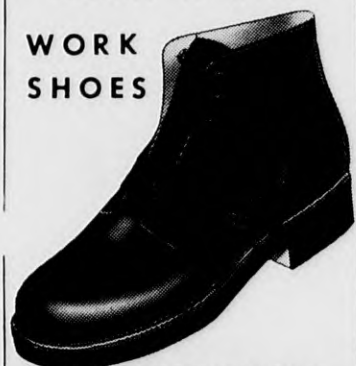
The Central school has a school library. In planning this library as an integral part of a modern school it was realized that its functions should be recognized; namely: it must provide boys and girls with

Our Road Mopes

Motorists will hail the action of the Automobile Legal Association in calling upon police and registry officials to move against one of the greatest menaces on the highway today, the "road mopes."

These slow pokes, known for years as "Sunday Drivers," are usually encountered weekends creeping along at 20 miles an hour at the head of a long line of cars trapped behind them on roads where 40 miles an hour is the normal driving speed.

They maintain their slow pace, up hill and down hill, regardless of others on the highway. They seldom get into accidents but often are the primary cause of others meeting with mishaps when they have to take chances in passing.

There is ample legislation to take care of them, in the opinion of Philip C. Thibodeau, general manager of A.L.A. He refers to the rules and regulations for motor vehicles issued in 1948 by the registry which says:

"No driver shall drive in such a manner as unnecessarily to obstruct the normal movement of traffic upon any highway. Officers are hereby authorized to require any driver who fails to comply with this section to drive to the side of the roadway and wait until such traffic as has been delayed shall pass."

Mr. Thibodeau further says that during the past year only one arrest for "moping" has come to the official attention of A.L.A.

For greater safety on the highways it is hoped that the move to eliminate this type of motorist will prove successful.

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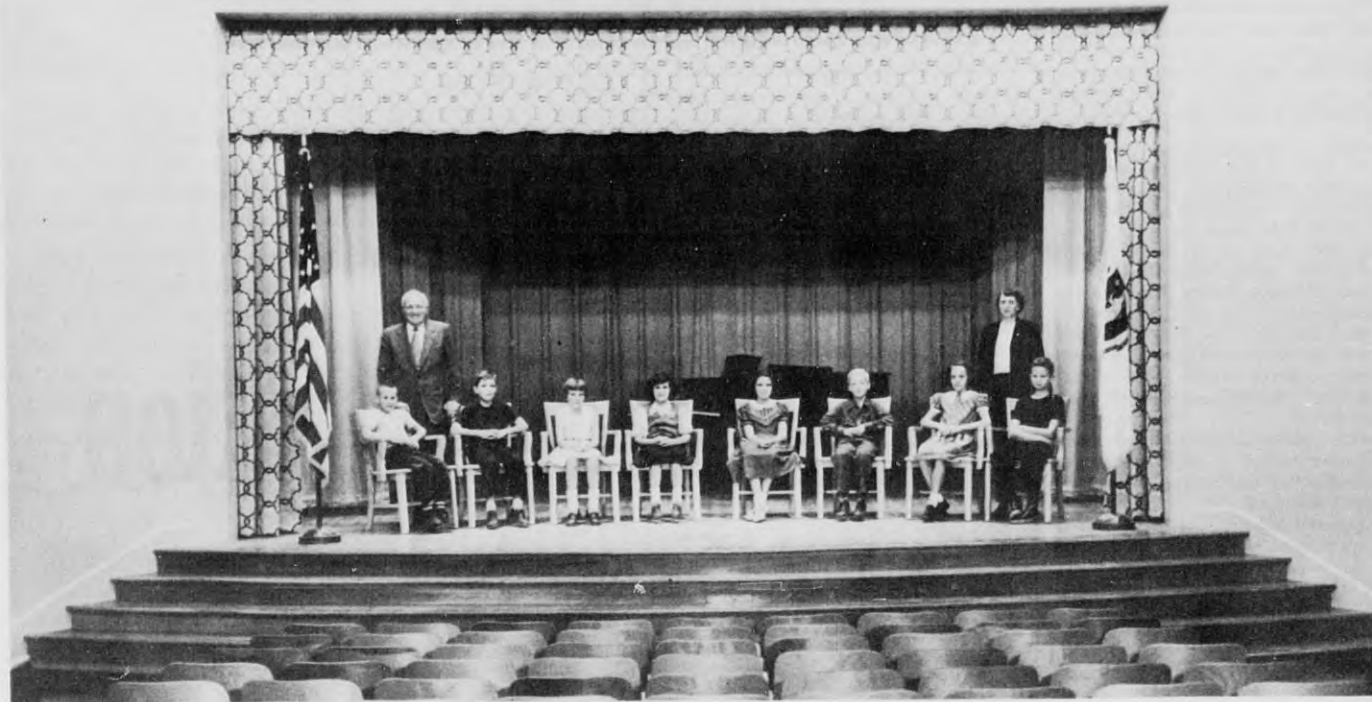

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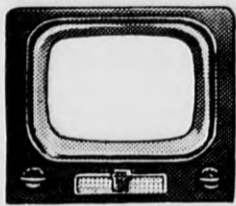

Language Exp With Sixth G

The Central elementary school in conjunction with three Phillips Academy French teachers is presenting an attractive experiment to the third grade pupils of Andover. 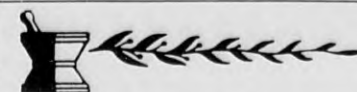
