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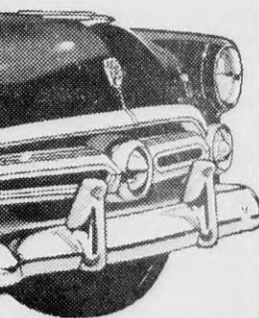

Junior High Pupils Visit Community Chest Agencies

Consider Proposed Highway Changes

A representative gathering of municipal officials and legislators from Andover and neighboring communities attended a meeting of the Essex County board of trade at the Andover Country club Wednesday noon when several highway proposals affecting routes in the town were brought up for discussion.

Walter Billings of Andover, president of the county board, presided.

One of the proposals was for the improvement of Main street near Phillips academy which would eliminate the grass plot that juts out into the roadway where the old electric car tracks were located.

Officials of the academy presented a plan showing this section of Main street changed to a two-lane highway with a traffic island from Chapel avenue to Highland road. The academy is seeking the support of the trade boards of Essex county in having this project undertaken by the state department of public works.

Another proposal considered was the relocation of Route 28 from Stoneham to Methuen, bypassing both towns as well as Reading, Andover and Lawrence.

A third consideration was the proposal advanced for the relocation of Route 110 to bring it down all the way on the south side of the Merrimack river from Chelmsford to Newburyport where it would join the new Route 1 where it crosses the river.

More than 60 Andover Junior high school pupils inaugurated the Greater Lawrence Community Chest's "Come-And-See" tours of various affiliated agencies last week.

The group visited three of the chest's member organizations, being transported to Lawrence by school bus and under the direction of one member of the faculty.

Through the activity, which was approved as part of the regular school program, the boys and girls visited the Y.M.C.A., the Y.W.C.A. and the Protectory of Mary Immaculate. Thus, the students were able to view first hand the programs and activities offered throughout the year.

Many of the pupils taking part in the tour are scheduled to participate in the Community Chest Junior Red Feather speaking program along with students from all sections of Lawrence, Andover, North Andover and Methuen. The visit gave these students an opportunity to better acquaint themselves with the activities fostered by the chest's 13 affiliated agencies and thus better prepare themselves for the speaking program which gets underway later.

The local drive under Eugene A. Bernardin Jr., Andover chairman, and his corps of workers will open Monday, Oct. 20 and continue until Nov. 3.

Discuss Repairs To School Cupola

Repairs to the cupola of the Shawshen school were discussed at length at Tuesday night's meeting of the school board.

Sect. William A. Doherty, who was appointed to look into the question, reported that he had a local contractor examine the structure which is now in poor condition, and estimated that the carpenter work and painting would approximate \$2500.

It was also brought out that removal of the cupola and repairs to the roof would be in the neighborhood of \$2000.

The possibility that a building committee may be appointed to make an addition to the building in the future and at the same time repair the cupola, was also discussed. All questions relating to the matter were postponed for further consideration.

A meeting of local merchants, businessmen and others interested in Christmas lighting was held last night in the Memorial Hall library.

The general effect drew many fine comments from visitors passing through the town as the display brought Andover in line with many of the other neighboring communities.

PATRONIZE THE ACADEMY

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A record number of 564 persons registered here since the state primaries in September, leading political observers to predict that the town will cast the largest vote in its history at the presidential election Nov. 4.

Registrations for the election were opened Sept. 17, the day after the state primary, and closed last Friday evening during which time the board of registrars held several sessions throughout the town adding a large number of names to the voting lists in addition to the number that registered daily at the office of the town clerk in the town house.

Last Friday, the final day for registration, a total of 192 names were added to the town's voting lists making a grand total of 8299 persons eligible to cast their ballots here in Andover.

This interest in the coming election is general throughout the nation as indicated by the reports that people everywhere are flocking in large numbers to get their names on the voting lists.

U. S. Fire Loss At All-Time High

Fire losses throughout the United States, when measured in dollars, are at an all-time high!

This was reported today as the nation, spurred by President Truman's Fire Prevention week proclamation appeal, took stock of its 1951 three-quarter billion dollar loss in property and 11,000 lives. Basis for the report were statistics of the National Board of Fire Underwriters that put fire losses for 1951 at \$730,084,000.

In commenting on these losses, Fire Chief C. Edward Buchan declared that the \$730 million loss for 1951 was \$80 million, or 12.3 per cent more than for the preceding year.

The NBFU statistics on the number of fires, compiled from reports submitted by fire chiefs throughout the country, reflect a substantial rise in the number of building fires in urban areas during 1951, when they amounted to 400,000 an increase of 7.4 per cent over the previous year.

Much of this loss in lives and property, he observed, resulted from fire in the home and cited the estimate of 856,703 fires in U. S. cities last year. Nearly half, or 418,871 of them, were building fires, nearly three-fourths of the building fires, or 293,776, being residences.

The major cause of these fires was careless use of matches and smoking. Such carelessness, he declared, accounts for close to 27 per cent of the nation's reported fire losses.

Other major causes of fire, he concluded, were misuse of electricity; exposure to fire originating off premises; sparks on roofs, overheated or defective chimneys or flues; lightning; overheated stoves, furnaces or boilers; ignition of hot greases; spontaneous combustion and explosions.

Much of this loss in lives and property, he observed, resulted from a fire in the home and cited the estimate of 856,703 fires in U.S. homes last year. Nearly half, or 387,100 of them, were building fires, nearly three-fourths of the building fires, or 293,776, being accidents.

The major cause of these fires, he said, was careless use of matches and candles. Such carelessness, he declared, accounts for close to 50 percent of the nation's reported losses.

Other major causes of fire, he concluded, were misuse of electricity; exposure to fire originating on premises; sparks on roofs, chimneys or defective chimneys; flues; lightning; overheated stoves, furnaces or boilers; ignition of hot greases; spontaneous combustion and explosions.

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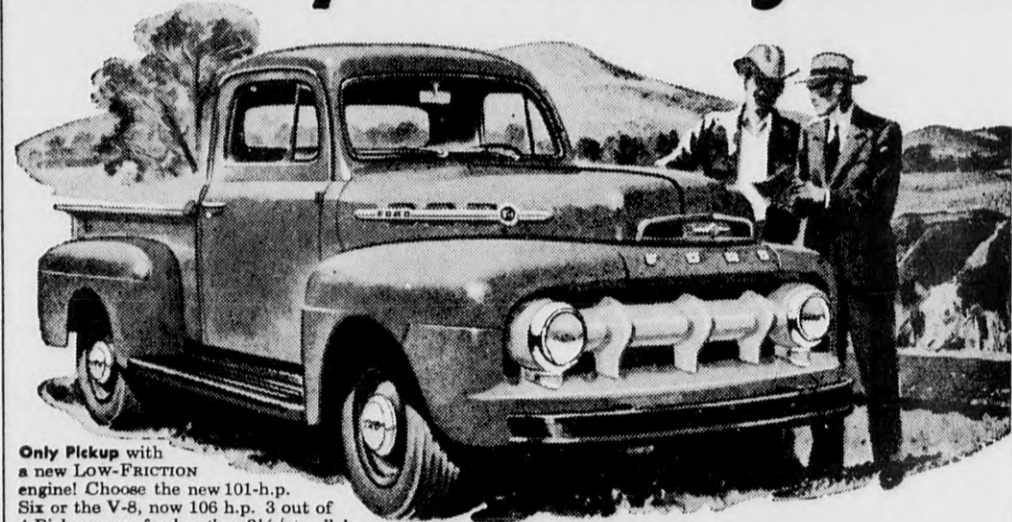
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
