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## Want Servicemen's Fund For Veterans' Building

### Fund Trustees Make Statement

The trustees of the Andover Servicemen's fund have issued the following statement:

A meeting of the Trustees of the Andover Service Men's fund was held at the town house on Wednesday evening, Oct. 14, 1953 for the purpose of discussing the Service Men's fund as it now stands, especially from the standpoint of a new group of veterans who will not be entitled to any benefit from this fund or vote regarding it. All veteran organizations were represented. The veterans present expressed a desire that the fund be used for the erection of a joint home for all veteran organizations and their auxiliaries, with the right of any veteran to enjoy the facilities of the home whether a member of a veteran organization or not with, of course, the exception of access to the rooms allotted to each veterans organization. The Trustees reserved an opinion in the matter until further information could be presented to them as to

### Post Leaders Suggest Plan

The commanders of the town's four veteran organizations have proposed that the Andover Servicemen's fund, now about \$18,000 be used to build a home for the local veterans' posts and their auxiliaries.

The wishes of the commanders were made known at a meeting with the trustees of the fund held last week.

Following the discussion it was decided to have the commanders take a vote of their respective organizations as soon as possible to see if they favor using the fund for a veterans' building. The results of the vote will be made known to the trustees at a meeting Nov. 18.

As a result, the veterans of World War II who went into the armed services from Andover from Sept. 16, 1940 to July 25, 1947 will be polled to determine their wishes as to the disposition of the fund.

This is being done in accordance with the deed of trust which says that when the trust is terminated (in November 1954) the fund shall be distributed by the board in accordance with the wishes of the veterans of World War II as determined by a poll to be taken by the board.

The fund, raised by various activities here during World War II, is used to assist veterans and their dependents.

The meeting, attended by the present commanders and presidents of the auxiliaries, was called in response to letters re-

### New Route 28 In Planning Stage

A new route 28 from Medford to the New Hampshire line which will pass through Andover is to be rebuilt, Commissioner John A. Volpe said last week.

In an address at the Medford Rotary club he said it will be a modern divided highway and will pass through parts of Stoneham, Reading, North Reading, Andover, Lawrence and Methuen.

He said the new road, which is in the advanced planning stage, is needed to relieve the presently overloaded Route 28. The exact location of the new route has not been determined but it is expected that the local section will enter Andover near Lowell Junction, pass through West Andover near Haggett's pond.

This project has been advocated for some time past by the Essex County Associated Boards of Trade of which Walter E. Billings is president.

## Favor B & M Plan For 12-Ride Ticket

After the presentation before the board of selectmen Monday night of a plan of the Boston & Main railroad regarding a new 12-ride and a new 20-ride ticket between Boston and Andover at a rate that would benefit local patrons of the road, the board voted to write the state department of public utilities favoring the issuance of such tickets.

The road's plan was presented by Stanley B. Hitchings of Shawshen, general passenger agent of the B & M, who outlined the advantages the new form of tickets would give local patrons over prevailing rates. No change in rate is contemplated in the monthly tickets.

The board also voted to advertise the sale of land near the old dump at Ledge, Greenwood and Chandler roads, as authorized by the last town meeting. About six acres are involved and there are two prospective buyers at present.

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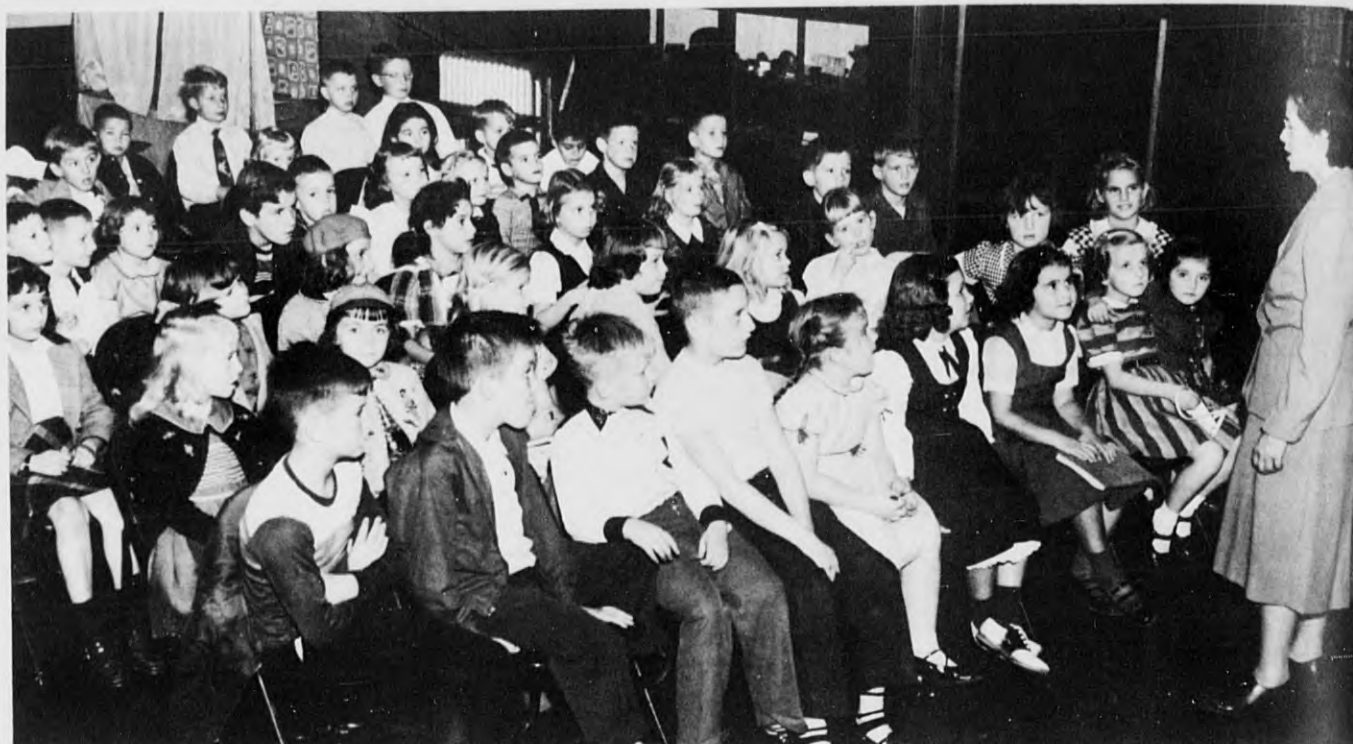

ceived some months ago by the trustees from each of the commanders.

In regard to the poll to be taken of World War II veterans the commanders will assist the trustees in the great amount of clerical work involved.

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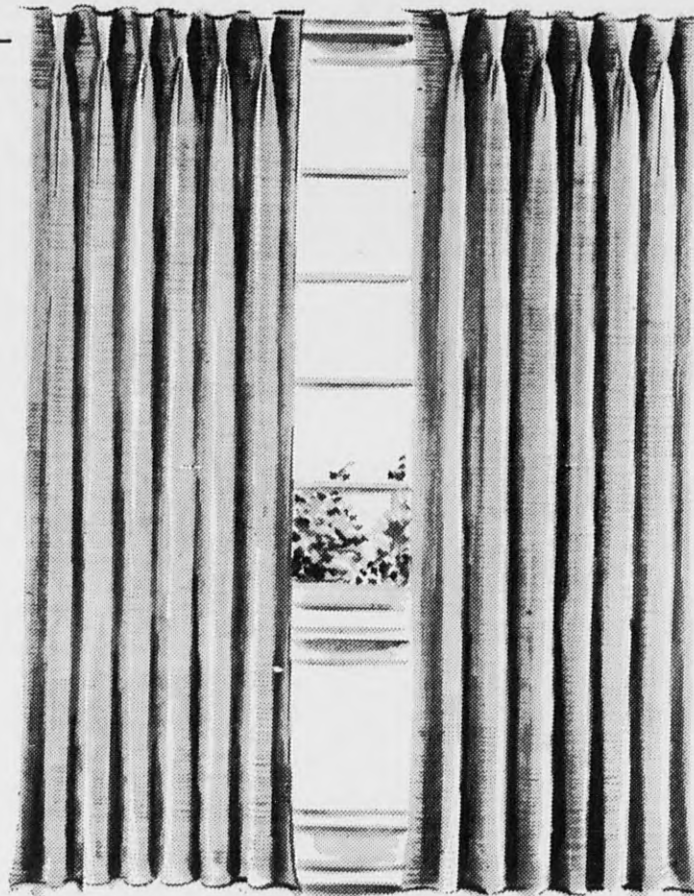

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## Do You Know Massachusetts?

The 1,464,000 workers in Massachusetts covered by employment security in the first quarter of 1953 received pay of \$1,203,740,805. This was an increase of 2.5% in employees and 6.9% in pay over the same period a year ago. Of the total sum, manufacturing payroll amounted to \$673,656,854, a gain of 8.9% above the corresponding quarter of 1952, as recorded by the division of employment security.

New home building privately undertaken in Massachusetts during August came within 1% of the relatively high volume a year ago, as indicated by permits issued in 133 communities, reported to department of labor and industries. There was no new public housing in August this year, but 160 units were started a year ago so that the total of all new building fell about 10% below the 1,805 dwellings in August 1952.

Massachusetts farms last year sold \$75,986,000 of poultry, \$49,554,000 of dairy products, \$20,046,000 of vegetables, \$13,280,000 of fruits and a total, including other items, of \$202,615,000.

Business students who are watching the volume of overtime work as an index of trend in factory activity will note that through July, the last month reported, the monthly number of hours per worker in Massachusetts factories ran consistently ahead of the same month last year, showing only the typical seasonal variations.

The division of planning, Massachusetts department of commerce has just published an annotation of the municipal planning and subdivision control enabling legislation, including the revisions enacted during the 1953 session of the legislature.

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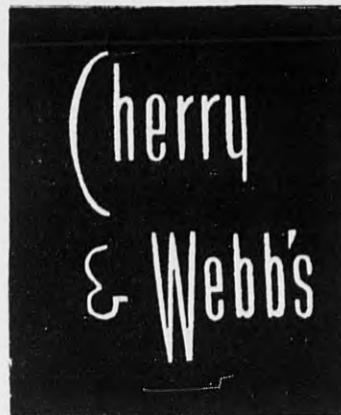
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## Who Is Responsible

From California comes an item concerning a controversy now before the courts of that state which is of great importance to all parents and school officials of the nation.

It concerns an action taken against the parents of three children who would not send their youngsters to the public schools on the grounds that they, the parents, had the right to see that their children were educated as they believed they should be.

The controversy raises the question of who is responsible for what youngsters are taught, the parents or the state. In other words they are asking whether the government is to be the master or the servant of the people.

It is a pertinent inquiry. The decision of the court will have a far-reaching effect. Many interested in the field of education feel that the controversy should go to the supreme court for a decision of such great importance.

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### RINGING IN THE EARS by Science Features

Dizziness, nausea, ringing noises in the ears, impaired hearing — these are symptoms characteristic of Meniere's disease. One of the most illustrious victims of this condition, which has become more and more prevalent in recent years, was Ludwig von Beethoven.

Today, if Beethoven were alive, he would undoubtedly be able to hear his own music, thanks to an operation devised by Dr. Samuel Rosen of New York's Mount Sinai Hospital. For the first time in the history of medicine, there is now hope of a normal life for sufferers from this crippling disease.

Meniere's disease is named for the French physician who first described it in 1861. Since that time, many theories have been advanced to explain its cause, ranging from emotional tension to vitamin deficiency. Today most scientists agree that it results from some disturbance to a nerve center of the inner ear.

Standard surgical treatment for this condition has been to destroy this center, called the labyrinth, a procedure that cured the major symptoms of the disease, but at the cost of causing total deafness in the affected ear. This is important since in from 10 to 15 per cent of all cases both ears are eventually affected.

Dr. Rosen's operation cuts only one nerve, called the chorda tympani, and does not destroy the vital labyrinth. Employed on fifty patients, this operation resulted in striking relief to 82 per cent of the cases, with no damage to the hearing or other untoward effects.

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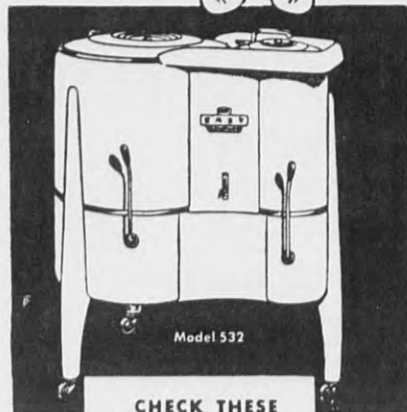

## Former State Guard Unit To Hold First Reunion

The first reunion of the Andover unit of the state guard which was organized for duty here during World War II will be held at 6:30 p.m., Saturday, Oct. 24 at the Elm lodge in North Andover.

Designated as the 20th Co., 24th Inf., of the guard the company was organized in March 1942 by Garrison Holt at the request of the selectmen and sworn in by the then Major William D. Millea. It was incorporated into the 24th Infantry regiment whose history forms an integral part of the history of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. It was the last company of the battalion to be demobilized in 1946, the final parade being at the head of the column celebrating the 300th anniversary of the founding of the Town of Andover.

In the course of its service 110 men served, many of them going on into the regular services and seeing action in many parts of the world. The company itself in many ways took its share of the wartime activities here in the town. It aided in the search for lost children on two occasions; it assisted in forest fighting in West Andover and at the scene of the crash of the fighter plane on Porter road. Stations were manned during air raid drills, traffic was directed and key points guarded.

In instructional work in rifle shooting, basic military training

and field exercises such as the famous "Battle of Ballardvale" the unit showed an enviable and excellent record, enabling those of its members who went into service to progress much more rapidly by reason of their preliminary training. Its record in the firing of rifle qualifications was 100%. It also attended two summer encampments, one at Hingham and the other at Framingham where on each occasion it served as honor guard. The officers took instruction under regular army officers in the school held at Sturbridge by the state, taking courses in infantry field exercises and weapons and demolition.

Capt. Garrison H. Holt who organized the company and established high standards of training and in leadership died in 1944. Lt. Clifford G. Emmons moved up to the post of captain and ably carried on with an energetic and inspiring leadership.

The guest speaker at this first reunion will be Lt. Col. William D. Millea who supervised and assisted the company throughout its existence.

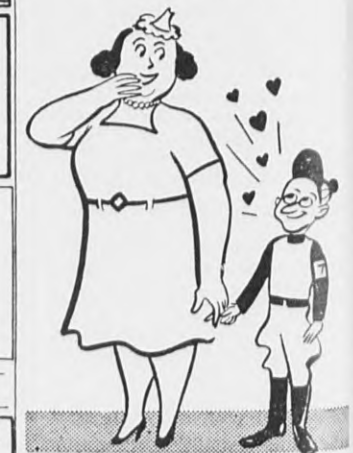

He recommended sending the entire superstructure to the company's shop for a complete reconditioning of the 26-year old machine.

The selectmen do not have the money required to make this improvement but will ask the finance committee for the sum.

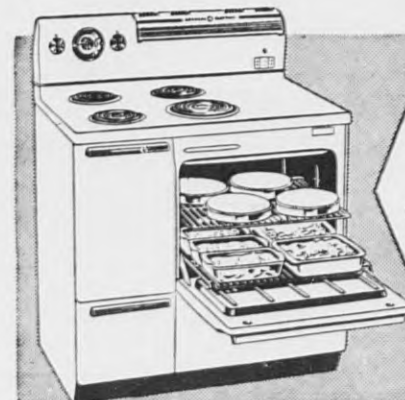
