

"Twenty-one bids on the trunk sewer and special crossings were from a low of \$15,254,30 to a high of \$44,304. Twenty-six bids on the street laterals ranged from \$51,500 street laterals ranged from \$51,588. 50 to \$130,779.50.

The combination of low bids results in the amount of \$118,173.-80 which is much greater than the amount appropriated at the town meeting of March 1953.

"On Nov. 19 a joint meeting of representatives of the Board of representatives of the Board of selectmen, board of health, finance committee, special committee on water and sewerage, and the Andover Taxpayers' association was held. The board of public works presented a complete summary of bids to this group for their use in discussing and determining the advisability of proceeding with only a portion of the work, On the basis a portion of the work. On the basis of the proposals received, only the work under contracts 1 and 2 could be done with the money available.

"The consensus of this representative group was that it would be contrary to the intent of the town

meeting vote to proceed with only a part of the work and to hope that the remainder of the necessary funds would be forthcoming at the

next town meeting.

"Accordingly, the group passed a unanimous resolution that all bids should be rejected at this time, and that a request for the necessary additional funds be placed on the warrant of the 1954 annual town

meeting.
"In the meantime the consulting engineer will be instructed to re-vise his plans with the object of eliminating any non-essential cost items which may effect a reduction in price at the next bidding. "It is the intent of the board of

public works to have the plans and specifications in complete readi-ness for an early advertising and letting soon after town meeting action is known."

#### The History Of Liberty

"Liberty has never come from the government . . . The history of liberty is the history of the limitations of governmental power, not the increase of it."

That was said more than 40 years ago by one of the greatest students of government who ever sat in the White House - Woodrow Wilson. And the warning he issued is a hundred times more important and timely now than it was then.

The overriding lesson that modern history teaches is that when we give government virtually unlimited power, freedom dies - and oppression and tyranny take its place.

One indication of how successful such efforts have been was shown in a recent report by two Army physicians who treated 70 tuberculosis patients with massive doses of terramycin for four months. The patients were given five grams of the antibiotic daily, instead of the usual one gram dose.

Reporting on the patients' response to the treatment, the physicians said that none of the patients had to have the drug discontinued during the four months and noted that such heavy doses of terramycin had scarcely ever before been given for so long a neriod.

The proposed improvement, which will remove a grass plot from the area and thus eliminate a traffic hazard at Chapel avenue, will consist of a two-lane highway, each 24 feet wide from the end of the present state highway to Wheepthe present state highway to Wheeler street.

According to present plans work on the project will be started next March and will cost about \$80,000. The local board of public works will raise the sewer manholes and water gates in the area.
