


The line of march will start from the parking space in the rear of the high school and will be to Bartlet, Morton, Main, Elm, Summer and Whittier streets and back to the

be posted by Dec. 12 for out-oftown delivery, and at least a week before Christmas for local addres-

Postmaster Boland points out that unless these mailing dates are observed, there's a danger of in-coming mail slowing up the out-going operation. Commercial ship-ments are another hazard that may prevent delivery before Dec. 25. Canceling machines are now registering about 10,000 pieces of mail per day. Once the big rush begins, they will average 50,000 daily clicks. So the postmaster urges everyone to:

urges everyone to: "Finish mailing those Christ-

mas gifts right away. The sooner the better. And remember, at this time of year, every package should be wrapped as securely as if it

were going overseas. Size and weight limitations now in effect vary according to desti-nation. Ask about them when you visit the post office to buy stamps."

stamps." In some zones, for example, par-cel post may not exceed 72 in-ches in length and girth combined and 40 pounds in weight. While in others the combined length and girth may be 100 inches and the weight up to 70 pounds. "The important thing to remem-ber about Christmas cards," says the postmaster, "is to send them by first-class mail, and place your re-turn address on the envelope." With a three-cent stamp, your Christmas cards will be forwarded if the addresse has moved, and a new address is on file, or returned


