Coming into the busiest part of the Christmas season we find safety officials issuing warnings against the usual type of seasonal hazards which each year result in a heavy loss of life: - traffic accidents and fires.

Christmas trees that become dried out, the improper disposal of wrappings from Christmas packages, and electric circuits overloaded with Christmas lights are the chief causes of fires at this time.

Each year at the height of this joyous season newspapers carry reports of numerous fires due to these causes yet in the excitement and hurry of lastminute preparations many people overlook ordinary precautions and end up with a fire tragedy.

Auto fatalities climb to record heights during the December 24-January 3 period. Chief factors for this seasonal increase are bad weather conditions, increased holiday travel, increased social activity and generally poor visibility. The two long holiday weekends this season will add to the danger.

Many "Don'ts" have been dinned into the minds of motorists to help them keep the highways free from accidents, yet driving after drinking, driving without chains when roads are slippery, driving long distances when tired, and excessive speed are expected to account for more than 1100 deaths in this coming eight-day period.

Be over-precautious this season. Don't let your holiday be marred by a tragedy.

Protected For Illness

Last year, the Health Insurance Council reports, 92,000,000 Americans were insured against hospital expenses, and 73,000,000 against the cost of surgical operations. In addition, 36,000,000 had general medical expense insurance and 38,000,000 disability income insurance.

There is much duplication in these figures, of course, as many people possess two or more of the type of insurance available. But the fact that close to 100,000,000 of us are protected to some degree against the financial shock of illness, and have bought this protection voluntarily, is good news in anybody's book. They were not waiting for the govvernment to do it for them.

The two-dollar bill used to have a bad reputation, but today it is the only one that will pay for a dollar's worth of anything.

of Christmas, the first carol was sung by a chorus of angels from Heaven — the "Gloria in Excel-sis" — "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men".

There is no fact as to why the Christmas songs are called "car-ols". The Latin origin of the word means "to dance in a ring," and the earliest songs were usually accompanied by some sort dance movements. Others of seem to think the word stems from the same derivation as "chorus".

St. Francis of Assisi is reputed to have conducted a Christmas service singing the Gospel and giving the sermon, and is credited for the first significant carol.

The ballad type of carol, now considered by musical writers as the true carol, is the folk song type, handed down from genera-tion to generation, as the authentic creation of the people.

The more elaborate type of Christmas song, by known composers and of musical complex-ities, are generally referred to as Christmas hymns, by these same musical authorities.

From the days of Richard the Lion-Hearted, when folk songs and minstrelsy swept the land, carols were kept alive and fos-tered from community to community, and reached their peak of magnificence in the fifteenth century when they at long last broke away from the somber chants of the church.

In the 17th Century, the Puritanism of the day severely re-pressed the joyous celebrations attendant to Christmas, and expressly forbade the public sing-

The texts and music of the carols were kept alive during this somber period until the Nineteenth Century through the illicit singing and printing of



these carols by the common folk, who sang them in the hidden privacy of their own homes.

For many years, "Silent Night" was considered a folk song, and it did not appear in print until 1840. Today, it's stir ring beauty resounds the world over at Christmas time.

"Hark, the Herald Angels Sing", was written by Charles Wesley, younger brother of John Wesley, who founded the Metho dist denomination. He was the author of 6,000 poems and wrote "Hark, the Herald Angels Sing" in 1730 when inspired by the musical tolling of bells one Christmas morning,

"Oh, Come All Ye Faithful", translated from the Latin "Adeste Fideles" has long been con-troversial as to its origin. Some sav it was written as early as 1221, and changed through the years by many musical writers.


The first Christmas carols that play such an important part in enriching our holiday season were brought to America from many countries of Europe.

The early settlers brought with them such favorites as "Awayir a Manger" from Germany, "God Rest Ye, Merry Gentlemen" from England, and the lovely "Can-tique de Noel" or "O, Hoh Night" from France.







(Continued from Page One) By schools they were as follows: Bradlee 4; Central 10; Shawsheen 7; West Central 5; high and junior high 4. In September 1952 the enroll-

ment was 2042. The budget figures for this year were \$498,690. The \$15,000 required to finish the year will bring the total cost of schools up to \$513,690, and the budget for 1954 is \$37,489 over that amount.

Based upon the expected enrollment for the coming year the cost

per pupil is \$236. When the meeting opened Sec. William A. Doherty read the minutes of the Dec. 2 meeting which were approved.

A committee of three teachers, Kenneth McKiniry, Robert Collier and Benjamin F. Dimlich, appeared before the board in favor of a proposal for dependency allowances for the teachers. The budget was adopted without making provision for the proposal.

On motion of Charles C. Kimball seconded by Mrs. Dorothy T. Partridge the board approved a warrant of \$355.50 for the Evening Practical Arts school, and on motion of Mrs. Partridge seconded by Mr. Kimball approved another warrant of \$1.15 for the same school. Bids for the printing of the an-

Bids for the printing of the annual school department report, this year to be limited to 40 pages, were opened. They were as follows: Andover Press, Ltd., \$8.80 a page; Town Printing Co., \$6.25 a page; Eagle-Tribune Publishing Co., \$8.50 a page. It was voted to award the contract to the Town Printing Co.

Supt. Erickson read the resignation of Michael Mullane as part time janitor of the Bradlee school. He was appointed to the position only a few weeks ago.

The secretary, Mr. Doherty read a letter from S. Perry Congdon, chairman of the salary committee of the Andover Teachers' association, thanking the committee for the attention it had given to the association's request for salary increases.

The request was turned down at the time and the letter asked for reconsideration.



On motion of Mr. Doherty seconded by Mrs. Partridge the board adopted the new budget and will meet Monday evening with the finance committee to go over the figures.


