These are explained in the recommendations adopted by the school committee last week as follows: Mathematics

At the present time, we are offering the regular college preparatory subjects as well as Business Arithmetic, Shop Mathematics, Basic Mathematics, and Advanced Arithmetic. The last three titles are not entirely descriptive of the subject matter offered because of widely varying ability in the groups assigned to them. In their place, we are proposing a ninth grade course in Applied Mathematics I, which will combine the elements of Business Arithmetic and noncollege Preparatory Mathematics
suitable to that level. A sequence
to this course is Applied Mathematics II, carrying the same planning
to a more advanced level. In the junior year, a course in Consumer Mathematics is proposed in con-junction with the consumer educajunction with the consumer education program designed for practical application. In the college preparatory field, the intent is to make it possible for a student to complete two years of Algebra before taking either Plane Geometry or the Advanced Sciences. Plane Geometry is constantly a major stumbling block for a number of students otherwise able to handle college preparatory mathematics. 

## For Better Achievement

The revised program of studies at Punchard which the school committee adopted last week is intended to be of definite advantage to students of the upper grades.

Elimination of the former conventional courses, - classical, technical, general and commercial - puts an end to rigid study program which had been in effect and replaces it with one of more flexibility which is expected to better suit the ability of the individual student.

Recommendation for the change came after an extensive study by Bernard L. Kellmurray, director of guidance, and with the approval of Headmaster Lindsay J. March. In the survey consideration was given to the curriculumbuilding practices among other high schools in regard to collage entrance standards and commercial and industrial

Under the general scheme of the new program a student will be required to do certain basic work each year and to fill out his schedule by adding subjects of his own choice, under proper guidance, which satisfy his ability and needs.

In this way some of the studies not open to him under the former system may become available to him under the

The changes are not a great departure from the former system but offer a plan designed to give each student a schedule better fitted for his talents.

The revised program, the committee and its sponsors expect, will result in higher achievement on the part of a great number of pupils.

## Education And Good Fun

It is reported that many hundreds of "investment clubs" are now in operation throughout the country. The usual method of operation is for the members to contribute a certain sum of money each month to a fund, which is then used to buy stocks. Some have been most successful. One club, which began in 1940, has had a total of \$17,000 in contributions. Ten thousand has been withdrawn from the fund - and \$44,000 remains.

Not all will do so well, of course. But the clubs provide an excellent means of broadening the base of business - ownership in this country. And, as one writer has pointed out, they also "offer the possibility of profit and the certainty of education and good fun".
