## Believe New High School Necessary In Near Future

### Would Prohibit Hunting Here

A special article designed to prohibit hunting in Andover was discussed at length at Monday night's meeting of the selectmen.

Filed by Robert D. Mayo and others the article will be inserted in the town warrant for action at the March town meeting.

The article was to the effect that the selectmen take the necessary steps, including possible legislation, so that hunting will be prohibited in the town of Andover except with permission of the chief of police and land owners.

The town counsel, Walter C. Tomlinson, advised that legislation was necessary before the town could take steps to stop hunting here and that state action should first be taken before the town voted on the matter.

A new high school building appears to be necessary in the near future to meet the needs of the expected increase in the junior and senior high school enrollment.

Following a conference with the school board last week the school housing planning committee filed an article for the coming town warrant asking for "the sum of \$15,000 for the further study of the needs and the preparation of preliminary plans to meet the requirements of the expanding junior and senior high school populations, and to authorize the moderator to appoint a school building committee."

This request is based on an estimate of the future public school enrollment which showed the present number of 750 pupils in the junior and senior high schools increasing by the year 1962 to a minimum of 1400 pupils.

Last September the public schools opened with a total enrollment of 2183 which has constantly grown to today's total of 2224, a gain of 41. In late years the schools have gained about 100 pupils a year from September to June.

During the conference of the two boards the need for more classrooms at the West elementary school was discussed. Howard Rich, architect for the two new elementary school buildings was present with a preliminary sketch showing the future

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## Selectmen Make Initial Move For New Town Office Building

### Will Ask Town Meeting For Building Com.

A building committee to prepare plans and estimates for a new town office building will be sought at the annual town meeting in March.

This first step toward replacing the present inadequate structure with one that will provide modern quarters for town offices and room for future expansion is being taken by the selectmen who are sponsoring an article in the town warrant for the preliminary study.

This is but one of the major items which the voters will be asked to pass upon when considering appropriations for the current year.

The school housing planning committee will also ask for a building committee to prepare plans to meet the requirements of the expanding junior and senior high schools.

Other major items in the town warrant include a request for \$80,000 to be added to the funds set up last year for the purpose of constructing a sewerage system in Ballardvale. Bids on the state-approved plans last year were rejected as they were almost double the \$80,000 voted for the project at the 1953 town meeting.

The fire department is asking for a new ambulance. This will replace the Henney bought in 1937, which

### Rent Controls To End Feb. 1

The local rent control board met Monday evening and voted four to one to decontrol maximum rents for the entire town effective Feb. 1. This action was taken in accordance with Chap. 434, Sec. 5 (B) of the state law (An Act relative to rent control.)

The board will remain in existence and will still retain its authority to re-establish maximum rent ceilings at a later date if in the judgment of the board such action becomes necessary.

The board held a public hearing Jan. 14 to attempt to learn if a substantial housing shortage existed here. About 100 people were in attendance but very few spoke.

The board will continue its regular office hours from 2 to 5 p.m., Tuesdays at the town house.

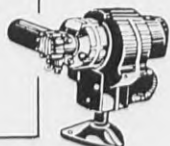

It was the first offense for both. One of the conditions of the probation was that Hill return to live with his father in Dracut.

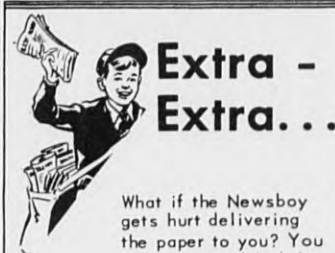

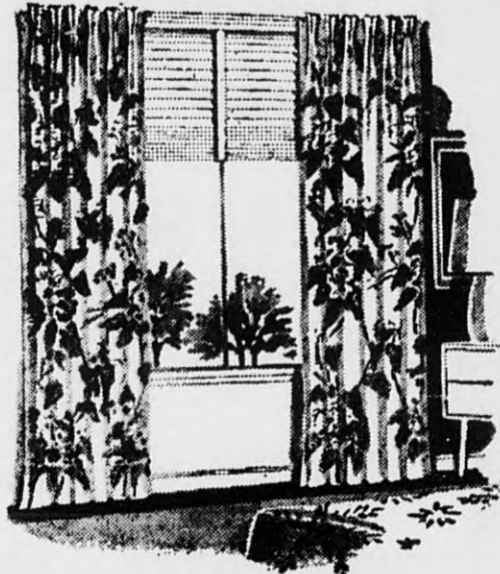

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## Important Contests To Decide

When the time for filing nomination papers expired last Friday the number who had signified their intention of running for town office showed that the voters of Andover are going to have several contests to decide at the next election.

Chief interest at the moment centers on the contest for the offices of selectman and assessor from which Roy E. Hardy is retiring after 18 years of outstanding service.

Other places to be filled are also of major importance to the people of the town as those elected to the board of public works, the school committee, and to the planning board will have much to do with the future development of Andover, the direction of its progress, and the spending annually of more than a million dollars that comes from the pockets of our taxpayers.

For these reasons it is appropriate right now to call attention to the importance of getting a large number of voters to the polls next March 1 so that the will of the majority may be expressed in the results of the election.

To be qualified to vote, one first must register. This may be done at the office of the town clerk in the town house any day during office hours from now until February 10, or at the evening sessions of the registrars of voters being held in the different precincts.

Any United States citizen is qualified to register if he is 21 years of age or over, has been a resident of this state for one year immediately preceding the election, and of the town for six months, and can read and write English.

You must register if your name has been dropped from the voting list, if you have not registered before, if you have changed your name through court action or marriage, or if you have moved to a new city or town. There is no fee.

The voters' service committee of the League of Women Voters of Andover is arranging that each newly registered voter shall receive at the time of registration a "Voters' Primer" containing non-partisan information on voting and elections and a diagram of the town government of Andover.

Qualify now and be prepared to exercise your franchise in the town election next March.

## Tips

### for Women Drivers

The dash-board of the woman's car may not be as imposing as that on a plane, but it has news for her. She should form the habit of running her eye over the dials every now and then. Here's what they are and what they say:

**The Gasoline Gauge** tells how much is in the tank. It's good practice to fill up as soon as convenient after the needle drops below the half-way mark.

**The Oil Gauge** indicates how your oil pump is working, not how much oil you have. If it jumps erratically or drops far below the half way mark, something is wrong. Go at once for service to a dealer who knows your make of car, preferably the new car dealer who sold it to you.

**The Battery Gauge** or Ammeter shows whether you are adding to or taking from battery current. In normal daytime driving it should hold steady, slightly on the "charge" side.

**The Temperature Gauge** shows if your cooling system is working properly. After you are under way, so the car has warmed up, the arrow should stay about the middle (between 160 and 180 degrees) the year around.

If any of these dials don't say what they should, it's a warning that you should heed promptly. After all, even the most mechanically-minded male will admit that a car is a package of complex machinery, different in almost every case. To the average female it's more than complex, it's plain incomprehensible! That's why it's important that the men who work on your car know what they are doing. Your new car dealer's service men have the benefit of factory training and their extra knowledge can mean extra assurance for you.

will be sold. The second ambulance, a Cadillac bought in 1947 and which has gone about 55,000 miles will be held in reserve for emergency service. The emergency ambulance last year made between 50 and 60 trips.

The police department is asking for two men, - a sergeant and a patrolman. Police Chief David L. Nicoll feels that this is the minimum requirement at this time.

The police department will also ask for two new cruisers, also a 3-wheel motor cycle for parking meter work, the sum to be taken from the parking meter fund.

The assessors are asking for a full time clerk with knowledge of engineering and building and are including \$4000 in their budget for his salary.

An increase of about \$10,000 is requested for the pension system bringing the appropriation up to \$32,000. Several new names have been added to the list during the past year.

The board of public works among other requests is asking \$20,000 to extend the town water system; \$15,000 for constructing relief sewers in Chestnut, Elm, Essex streets and other necessary locations; \$10,000 for grading, drainage and other work necessary for the development of the recently enlarged playground; and \$9,450 for enclosing another section of Rogers brook for a distance of about 315 feet.

The article submitted by the selectmen for the town office building committee is as follows:

To see if the town will instruct the moderator to appoint a committee of five, known as the town office building committee, make available to this committee the \$2500 appropriated under Art. 22 of the town meeting in 1944 for the purpose of preparing plans for the Shaw property at 85 Main street, and instruct the committee to prepare preliminary plans and estimates for a new town office building, and request the committee to make a report at the annual town meeting in 1955.

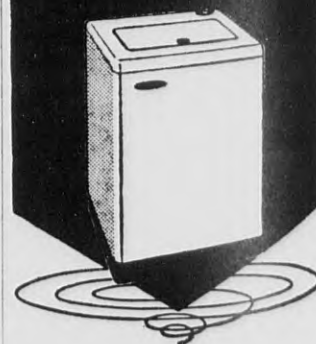
Legislature Passes

**SEEK LARGER AREA FOR HOUSE LOTS**

(Continued from Page One)

A public hearing on this proposal was held at the Memorial Hall library last Thursday by the town planning board.

The article proposes to amend the by-laws to provide for lot frontages of not less than 125 feet and

for lot areas of not less than 15,000 square feet within a one-mile radius of the town house, a half-mile radius of Shawsheen square, and a half-mile radius of the Ballardvale fire station; and for lot frontages of not less than 150 feet and lot areas of not less than 25,000 square feet beyond a one-mile radius of the town house.

The present by-laws provide for frontages of not less than 75 feet and for lot areas of not less than 8500 square feet.

The special article has been prepared as the result of the work of a lay committee headed by J. Radford Abbot which has been formed to assist the town planning board.
