New bids for the proposed Ballardvale sewerage system will be called for shortly so that a definite figure for the work may be presented at the town meeting Mar. 8.

This was decided after a conference which Sidney P. White and the members of the board of public works held with Louis E. Gleason and William S. Titcomb of the finance committee; Joseph A. McCarthy of the special water and sewerage committee; Warren O. Petersen, town engineer, and George Simpson, consulting engineering of the firm of Weston & Sampson of Boston.

At the last town meeting \$80,000 was appropriated for the work but bids received last fall were far in excess of that figure and were rejected. Another article has been inserted in the 1954 town warrant for another appropriation of \$80,000 to complete the work. However, it was felt that by calling for new bids now a definite figure will be obtained so that the town meeting will know just what the entire cost will be when it votes on the question.

With this end in view it was decided to have Mr. Sampson send out a call Feb. 18 for bids returnable in two weeks, which would be Mar. 8. (Continued on Page 18)

Several Relief Sewers Needed

The coming town meeting will be asked to appropriate the sum of \$15,000 for the purpose of constructing relief sewers in Chestnut, Elm, Essex and other necessary locations to relieve certain overflows in the town sewerage system.

The old sewers on these and other streets are not large enough to take care of the present sewerage and it is proposed to run relief lines parallel to the existing mains to take care of this situation.

The money would be spent under the supervision of the public works but not until approved by the selectmen and the finance committee.

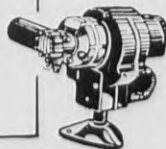

Moth Supt. Makes
Annual Report

In his annual report as moth su-
perintendent, G. Richard Abbott
says:

The moth superintendent's du-
ties are statutory, that is they are
prescribed by law passed by the
legislature under Chapter 132 of
the General Laws of Massachusetts
as amended by Chapter 660 of
1948 and Chapter 761 of 1949.

The moth superintendent carries
out his duties under the general
direction of the state moth superin-
tendent through a state division
moth superintendent who advises
on the work to be done, visits in-
fested areas and receives reports
from the local moth superintendent
as to sums paid out for salary, la-
bor, insecticides, equipment, main-
tenance etc.

The state department supplies
metal tags, cloth strips and du-
plicate book forms, all numbered to
identify elm trees from which sam-
ples are taken and sent to the la-
boratory at Amherst.

The main work of the men in the
moth department is the control of
insects designated by the Legisla-
ture to be public nuisances under
Chapter 660 of the General Laws
and control of the dutch elm dis-
ease as prescribed under Chap-
ter 761 of the General Laws.

Scouting for egg clusters of the
gypsy moth was carried out in all
parts of the town last winter at the
request of the state moth depart-
ment. Egg clusters were found in
small numbers in several woodland
areas that might in time build up
into a heavy infestation. They were
also found in small numbers near
the roadsides, scattered in var-
ious parts of the town. These eggs
were destroyed by an application
of creosote and the insects by our
spray program in the spring.

The report also states that the
dutch elm disease has been held to
to about the same number of dis-
eased trees as during the past
three years when 95, 96 and 98
elms were destroyed. Spraying was
done from the ground and twice from
overhead by a helicopter. Andover,
North Andover and Tewksbury are
fighting to hold this disease in
check while cities and towns to
the north have neglected to do so.

The electric company is men-
tioned in the report as giving val-
uable assistance in the past three
years in removing dangerous trees
along its lines and the removal of
branches of diseased trees from
among high voltage wires.

"The moth department men," the
report continues, "are proud of their
record in removing diseased elm
trees at a cost as low as any de-
partment in the Commonwealth."

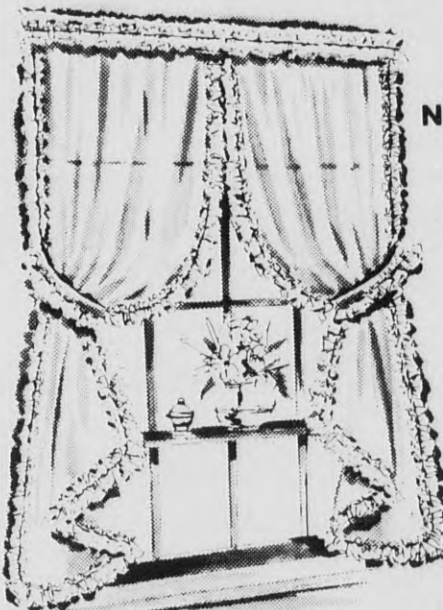

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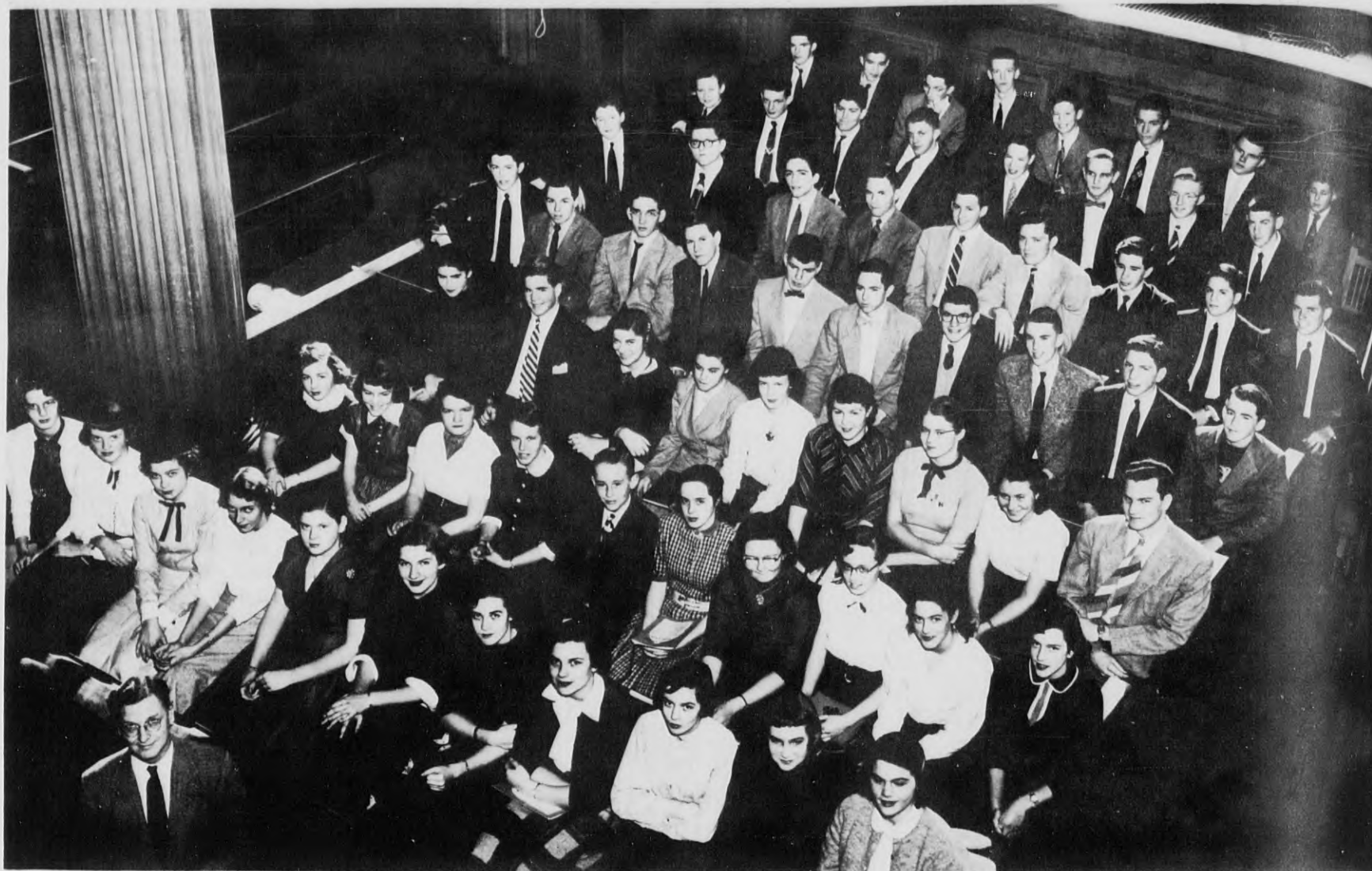

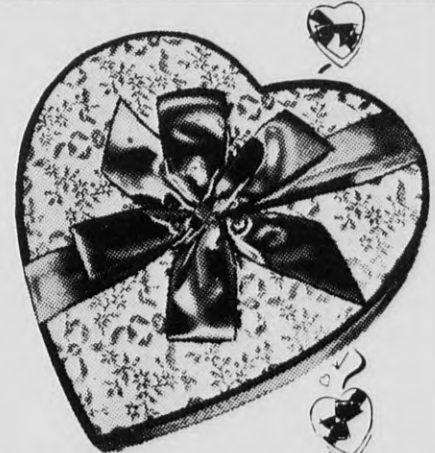

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Our Zoning Problems

The article which the lay committee on town planning has inserted in the town warrant to increase the size of future house lots and lot frontages is, as the committee itself terms it, a temporary stop-gap measure.

The town's zoning problems are so complex, the committee adds, that intensive study will be required to deal with them adequately.

It is to be regretted that more study could not have been given the subject before the committee inserted the discriminatory provision regarding the difference in sizes within and without the arbitrary lines drawn at certain distances from various centers. This could easily result in one land owner having to divide his acreage into larger lots than those of his next door neighbor.

The committee realizes the shortcoming of its article as it states it hopes, eventually, that the boundaries of the different districts will be determined by street lines.

As laudable as the committee's purpose may be, its approach to a solution of the problem might cause less confusion and much less controversy at the town meeting if it abolished its mile and half-mile circles in its "stop-gap" measure and treated all sections of the town alike until adequate study determines what lot sizes and zoning districts are best for the future development of the town.

Such a provision would eliminate most of the opposition that has come to our attention about the plan.

Punished For Success

A federal judge recently dismissed a Justice department suit against a big chemical company which was filed six years ago under the anti-trust laws. He said that "the facts destroy the charges", and that there was no proof of monopoly. Then he made the extremely significant point that the company should not "be punished for its success".

There can be no question that, for many years, powerful groups in the government as well as out of it have regarded "bigness" as an evil, even when it is obvious that growth has come about as a result of giving good service to the public — not from any lack of competition. It is hard to think of a philosophy which could do more to weaken America's economic strength. There is room and need here for both the colossal business and the tiny one. And there is opportunity for all.

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What Our Readers Say —

THE BRICKER AMENDMENT

Editor of The Townsman:

Advantageously for us, all of the important arguments put forth by the people who wish to change the substance of our national charter by making the Bricker amendment a part of it were precisely answered no less than 166 years ago this spring. A Hamilton did it in the Federalist Papers. His contributions, No.'s 67 to 77 inclusive with special attention given in Paper No. 69, and all of No. 75, give the reasons why the exact wording of the treaty making clause was chosen.

Suffice it to repeat that the treaty making power is neither of the Executive nor Legislative; its a combination of the two in one of the few instances that such is resorted to in the Constitution. It is, therefore, self-evident that should the President propose any treaty which vitally affects the rights and privileges of the country's citizens or states, we should have to imagine the senators, 96 of them now, lax indeed, to permit such to become the supreme law of the land. "Executive agreements" that do likewise can be nullified by any citizen asking the supreme court to declare them beyond the scope of the President's power, he being no more than an agent, in such cases, of the country's sovereignty which resides within each individual citizen.

Consequently, the cure for the problems which Senator Bricker and his followers imagine is merely to be dutiful on the part of senators. A. Hamilton implies as much. After all, ours is a Republic, not a Democracy hence our chosen leaders are expected to exercise acumen.

At a special meeting of the United Congregational church in Ballardvale it was voted to extend a call to the Rev. A. H. Fuller of Everett to become pastor.

There promises to be a warm fight for the office of superintendent of streets at the coming caucus. Joseph T. Lovejoy, the present superintendent seeks reelection. He will be opposed by ex-Selectman Stack.

E. E. Trefry announces his candidacy for town clerk and tax collector. He will run against Mr. Marland for the Citizens nomination.

CHERRY SHEET FIGURES RECEIVED FROM STATE

The cherry sheet figures which the selectmen have received from the state department of corporations and taxation vary only slightly from those of a year ago but leaves the town about \$1000 better off. This slight gain will have a negligible effect upon the 1954 tax rate.

The sums which the town will have to pay for the county tax, tuberculosis hospital, parks and recreations, etc., is estimated as \$92,907.36. It will get back, as far as the tax rate is concerned, the sum of \$247,950.13, according to the estimate.
