

#### Bates To Lecture On K-2 Expedition

Robert H. Bates, a member of the faculty of Phillips Exeter academy and one of America's foremost emy and one of America's foremost mountaineers, will lecture with colored movies on the recent dra-matic K-2 expedition at George Washington hall, Phillips Academy, Saturday, Apr. 17. Bates, who was a member of both the 1938 and 1953 American expeditions on the world's highest unclimbed mountained. 1953 American expeditions on the world's highest unclimbed mountain, will describe the 1953 attempt, which ended in failure after 10 days of isolation by blizzard at a height of 25,500 feet. This is the longest sustained period that man has ever lived at this height.

After the storm abated, the expedition started down and survived the descent only after what many mountaineers have called

many mountaineers have called "the most skillful mountaineering ever demonstrated in the higher Himalayans." During the course of this descent one injured member of the party was swept to his death by an avalanche.

Since his return to this country, Bates has lectured widely, and he and other members of the expedi-tion recently appeared on a national telecast. Bates has also re-cently authored two dramatic articles in the Saturday Evening Post

and is currently working on two books covering the expedition. Tickets will go on sale at George Washington hall beginning Monday, Apr. 12.





#### Our Future Growth

The obvious location of the town's future growth is in Precincts 4 and 5, John T. Blackwell, planning consultant pointed out at the recent hearing on the proposed easterly or westerly sites for the relocation of Route 28 through Andover.

Perhaps most townspeople were vaguely aware of the undeveloped area in this section of the town, but Mr. Blackwell's figures and an examination of the town map made his conclusions most convincing.

Retained by the town to study the advantages and disadvantages of the proposed routes Mr. Blackwell came up with some interesting data in his report at the hearing.

Based on a study of the voting lists he said that Precinct 6 had increased about 25% over its population of five years ago; Precincts 1, 2 and 3 about 11% and are virtually built up; Precinct 4 had shown a gain of about 22% and Precinct 5 about 15%, yet Precincts 4 and 5 which comprise about 57% of the town's area offer the greater opportunity for future population growth than other parts of the town.

It was largely on the facts brought out by Mr. Blackwell and the study made by the selectmen and Planning board in favor of the site just westerly of Greenwood and Lovejoy roads that this new western location was favored over the state's western proposal.

These rays are also employed to treat various diseases. A two million-volt machine has shown promise in the treatment of cancer and the ray has helped to reduce the "blue baby" menace, to name two of the newer uses that have been developed. developed

There are many different types of machines and methods that have been devised for special purposes. The dentist uses the machine to spot tooth decay; by using certain dyes, a specialist can see what is happening in the body's vital organs and most doctors have a fluoroscope in their office to view the living body.

Roentgen never made anything out of his discovery and died of cancer when he was 78 years old. But, as hundreds of experts continue to work on his principle and devise more effective aids for the doctor, the rest of the world benefits from his invention.

The X-ray, a comparatively recent invention, is now one of the most widely used medical tools, both for diagnosing illnesses and for treatment. Discovered almost accidentally by a German physicist, Wilhelm Konrad von Roentgen, in 1895, the X-ray became almost immediately accepted as a tremendous aid to the doctor. Photographs, showing the inside of the body, allowed the doctor to see the exact location and cause of the disturbance under consideration. Prior to that, it was a hit-or-missproposition, with the doctor probing and guessing.

An X-ray is the radiation of a certain very short ray of light. When Roentgen discovered these odd rays, he didn't know exactly what they were, so he labelled them "X" rays.
