Easter Egg Hunt To Be Held Saturday

Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock a long blast of the fire whistle will send some 2000 youngsters scampering over a large section of the Center playground in the annual Easter Egg Hunt sponsored by the Andover Recreation committee.

At that time 18,000 or more pieces of wrapped candy will be scattered over the grass and, if past years are a criterion, they will disappear in about 59 seconds flat.

Town Finances In Good Condition

The Town of Andover is in good financial condition, according to a report received from Edward C. Wilson, associate commissioner of corporations and taxation.

Mr. Wilson in his letter referred to a report of the bureau of accounts referring to Andover for the year ending Dec. 21, 1953, which read:

"A trial balance was taken off, and a balance sheet . . . was prepared showing the financial condition of the town on Dec. 21, 1953. An examination of this balance sheet indicates that the town is in good financial condition."

Commissioner Wilson added that the selectmen are to be commended for the good work that is being accomplished and for the healthy financial condition of the town.

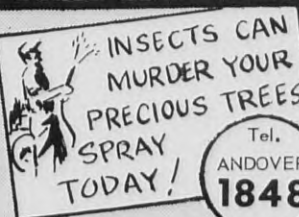

A plan intended to tighten up controls on new building has been put into effect by the selectmen with the appointment at Monday night's meeting of an Advisory Building committee made up of two builders and an architect.

Appointed to this board were: Edward P. Hall of Dascomb rd., Francis E. Steinert of Elm st., and Albert I. Richmond of Orchard st., each for a term of one year.

This board, Chairman J. Everett Collins explained, will act only in an advisory capacity for the building inspector and assist him in his decisions.

From time to time the rulings of the building inspector, Ralph W. Coleman, have been questioned and the problem brought before the selectmen for the board to solve. The latter, in turn, would have to take these matters to the town counsel for rulings and in all cases found that the building inspector was correct in his decisions.

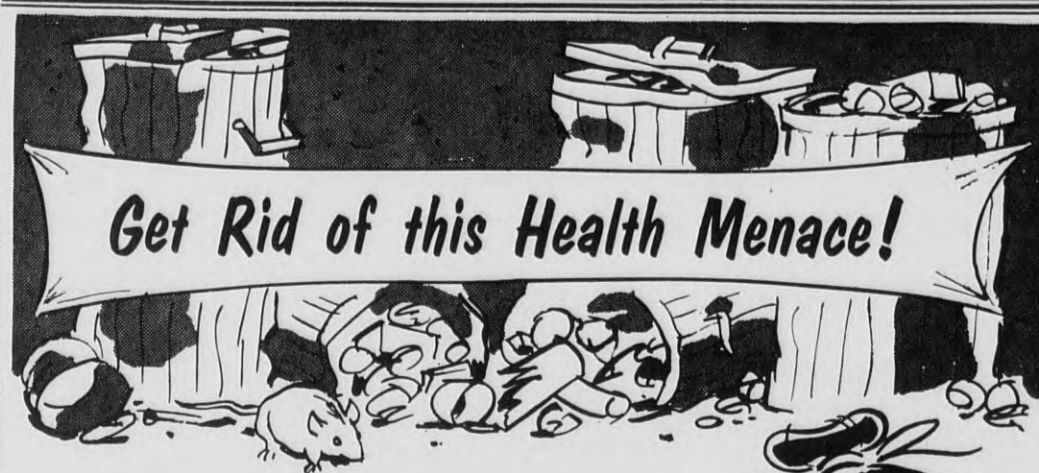

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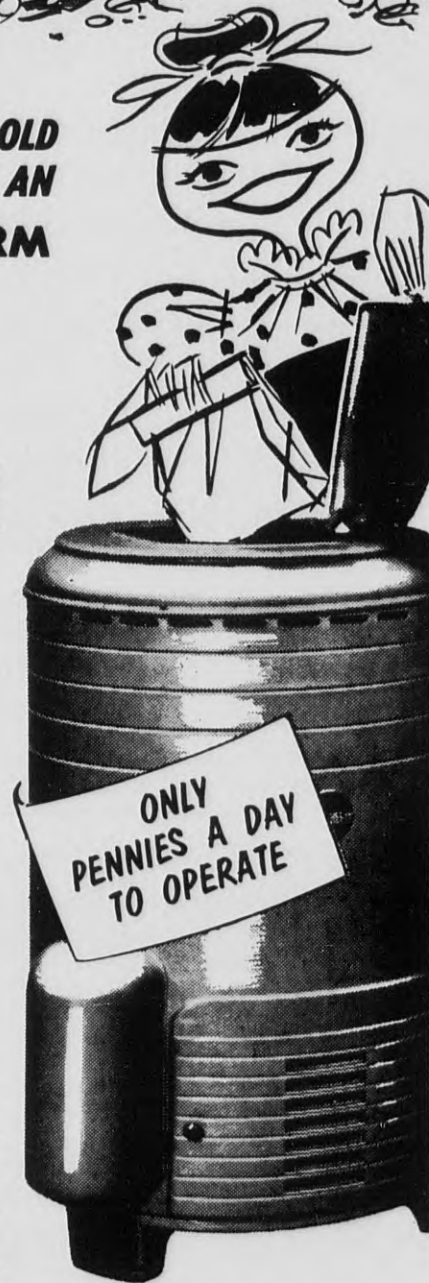

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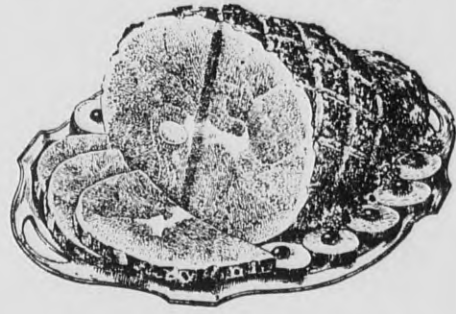

What Our Readers Say—

CONVERSATIONAL FRENCH
 Editor of The Townsman:

We wish to make a few comments about the meeting held at Memorial Hall library on April 1, 1954 about teaching conversational French in the elementary grades of our public schools. We would like to know why the minority still insists that conversational French should be taught in the elementary grades against the wishes of the majority. If the school committee follows the recommendation of the minority, it would cost the town over \$14,000 yearly, for a subject that is useless for the greater majority.

One point which was brought up at the meeting, which we and many other persons did not know, is that French is on an elective basis. The parents could request that their children should not be taught conversational French. Another point is that a foreign language should only be taught to the child with a high I.Q. They do not say what should be done with the child with a lower I.Q. who needs special help.

There are many more important subjects which should be introduced into the school curriculum. A survey conducted by a high school teacher of the commercial course stated these facts as printed in a Boston Sunday paper. "Complaints on the educational training of graduates were very disturbing. Personnel managers said that most boys and girls were "very poor" in arithmetic and had practically no ability to do mental arithmetic and simple fractions. Many do not know how to spell and many cannot use a dictionary because the alphabet is still a puzzle to them. If it wasn't for the fact that business is experiencing a shortage of young, new office workers, many of our high school graduates would be without work for a long, long time." This shows that our public schools are not teaching enough of the basic subjects, and the above reflects mostly on the elementary grades.

A suggestion was made at the end of the meeting that conversational French should be taught after school hours at the parents' own expense. If the minority wants their children to be taught French, that is the right way of doing it, and not against the wishes of the majority. The experiment of teaching French in our public schools is beginning to show that more pupils are beginning to dislike the subject and still others should be dropped. We believe the longer you teach the subject, the more pupils will dislike it.

The school committee acted wisely in revising the study program in our high school by letting the student choose his own subjects, but there should be many more subjects for him to choose from, especially in the last two years of high school.

A survey taken in greater Lawrence showed that 60% of high school graduates in 1953 did seek employment. This does not mention the number of students who drop out before graduation — it would bring the percentage much higher of students who must seek employment at an early age. This shows that we must have more vocational training in our high schools so that they can get higher paid jobs, and not accept low-paid employment because they have no fundamental training to develop their skills.

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Deathless Record

The thousands of country weekly and smaller city daily newspapers in the United States stand in a unique position.

Absolutely nothing takes the place of the hometown paper. It leaves a printed record of community life and activity that can be found nowhere else.

For an example, take the Reese River Reveille of Austin, Nev., published in the geographical center of a state having a population of less than 2 persons to each of its 109,000 square miles of area.

The Reveille has been published continuously since May 16, 1863. The files of the Reveille, preserved in the courthouse vault, are said to be the only complete files of any Nevada newspaper dating back to territorial days.

All of which points up the fact that the local newspapers in every corner of our country furnish a deathless record of the people and the area they serve.

Local history is recorded and preserved by the country press of the nation — hopes, aspirations, facts, drama, marriages, births, deaths, political events, legal records — the whole chain of human activity.

A town without a local newspaper is like a phonograph without a record.

Across The Counters

It would be hard to exaggerate the importance of retailing in the nation's economic life.

In the last year for which figures are available, for instance, distribution of food alone accounted for the employment of over 1,000,000 people, who received close to \$2,200,000,000 in wages. The figured would be substantially higher now. And non-food retailing also makes comparable contributions to our total employment and payrolls.

It has been accurately said that the amount of trade that is done across store counters determines whether times shall be good or bad in this country.

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PNEUMONIA

By Science Features

The effects of pneumonia today aren't what they used to be. The mortality rate from this acute respiratory disease has been reduced by more than 75 per cent from the 200,000 deaths that occurred annually in the United States two generations ago.



The duration of illness has been shortened and in many cases the need for hospitalization has been eliminated. The doctors' best tools for this lifesaving work have been the antibiotics. Two doctors in the Philadelphia General Hospital conducted a series of tests with children who had pneumonia. They found that the antibiotic terramycin was easy to administer and effective in all of the cases. Of the children tested, 14 had lobar pneumonia and 31 were infected with broncho-pneumonia, the two most common types.

These types of pneumonia are caused by a minute organism called the pneumococcus which travels through the respiratory system to the lungs, where it multiplies and infects the air sacs and lobes.

Among the rarer types are strep-pneumonia and staph-pneumonia, which usually come from complications of tonsillitis and influenza. There is also virus pneumonia, which can only be overcome by broad-range antibiotics like terramycin.

The first symptoms of pneumonia are the same as those of a common cold—cough, phlegm, fever and aches. It is best that prompt attention be given to these symptoms as patients treated during the first 3 days are most likely to recover.

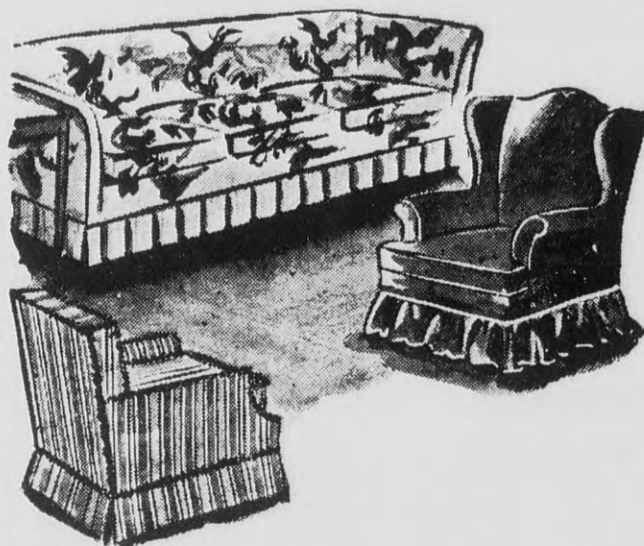

by the combined glee clubs of Abbot academy and Phillips academy.

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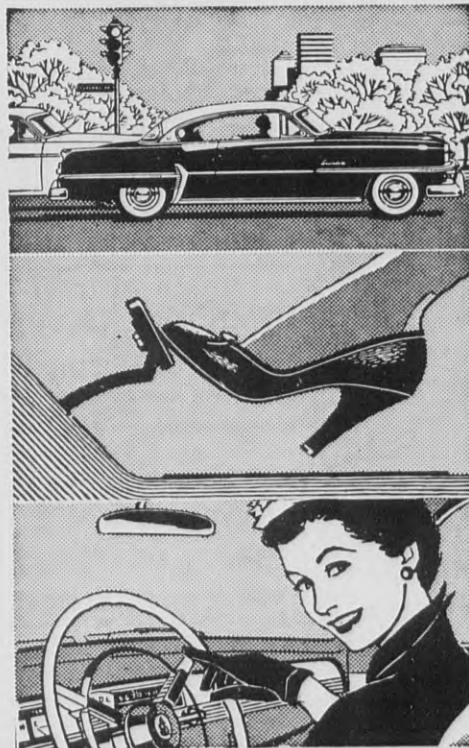
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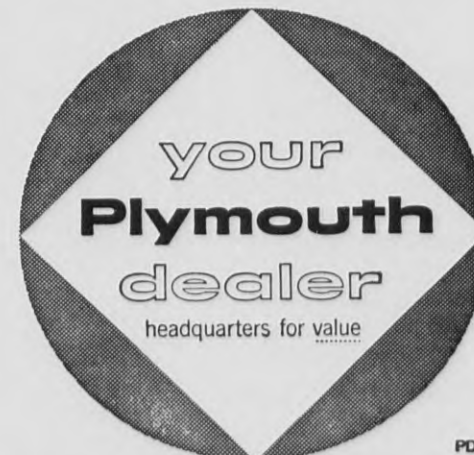

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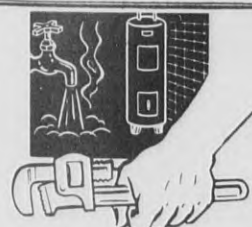

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Explorer To Tell Of Mountain Epic

Robert H. Bates, a member of the 1953 heroic American attempt on K-2 (highest unclimbed mountain in the world), will speak and show colored movies of the expedition at Phillips academy Saturday, Apr. 17. Bates, who is one of America's best known mountaineers, has participated in ten major expeditions throughout the world, including two of the three American attempts on K-2.

The 1953 expedition, which returned to this country a short six months ago, failed to achieve the summit, but set a new record of ten consecutive days of survival at 25,500 feet. During that ten-day period the climbers were confined to tiny tents and literally hung on for their lives while the blizzard raged outside. Their descent was an epic in mountaineering for the storm had not truly lifted. But they

were compelled to fight their way down due to the serious illness of one of the climbers who was swept to his death by an avalanche en route down.

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
