



### Our Tax Rate Goes Up

Announcement of a \$3 increase in the town's tax rate to a new high of \$47 for the present year is not much of a surprise to those who follow municipal affairs.

After the last town meeting when the largest appropriations in the town's history were voted J. Everett Collins, chairman of the board of assessors announced that there would be an increase in the tax rate and foresaw a jump of at least \$2.50.

Several factors enter into the increase in the cost of running the town government. Total requirements for the year are greater than in 1953 and there has been a drop in estimated receipts from the amount received last year.

In arriving at the rate the assessors had an average yearly increase in valuation to help them but this has been offset by a general increase in all de-

For instance, the town's growing school population accounts for an increase of over \$40,000 in the school department budget. Then there was the \$5 weekly pay increase granted to town employees by the 1953 town meeting, only 40 weeks of which were paid last year while provision for a full 52 weeks has to be made for this year.

Other items enter into it with the result that the amount to be raised by taxation this year is more than \$100,000 over 1953.

The town is well served by capable officials who are conscientious in their duties to the town and to the taxpayers. They exercise due care in the manner in which funds are budgeted and are aware of the burden which growing expenses places upon

A pleasant part of the picture is that the town is in good financial condition. Municipal services have not been curtailed and with judicious management of its funds the town is capable of matching strides with the advancing times.

This lung infection is accompanied by headaches, sore throat, childs and fever when the disease strikes. Before the introduction of antibiotics one out of every five recorded parrot fever cases resulted in death. Treatment today usually consists of rest in bed with doses of antibiotics. Doctors at the University of Texas Medical Branch reported that treatment with terramycin led to recovery of two psittacosis patients within three days. Sparrows, pigeons and ducks can also carry the disease, and the birds need not be infected themselves in order to spread the virus that causes the fever. People can catch the illness by close association with these feathered friends or by direct contact with them. A warning was issued recently by the Medical Society of New Jersey against kissing parrots or parakeets or allowing these pets to take food from one's lips. Some kisses, the medical society admitted, are undoubtedly worth running a risk to enjoy. Kissing birds, however, should be left to other birds.



### Several Reasons For Tax Increase

In announcing the tax rate last week the assessors noted several reasons for the \$3 increase which boosted the 1954 rate to \$47.

There was a general increase in all departments. One reason for this was that the full effect of the \$5 increase to all town employees granted by the 1953 town meeting was felt in the 1954 budget which had to provide for 52 weeks of this raise in comparison with last year when it was paid for only 40 weeks, having gone into effect in April.

The large increase in the school department budget accounted for more than \$40,000; the returns from state this year on new se buildings was about \$18,000 less due to the fact that only one payment will be received this year while last year the town received two such payments, one of which was for the year previous.

The increase in valuation was about the same as in past years, \$600,000 on real estate and about
