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## Vale To Dedicate New Ball Grounds

Ballardvale residents are planning a gala program for the dedication of the so-called Little League diamond on the Andover-Woburn street playground at 4 p.m. Saturday, which will include a flag raising and an exhibition ball game between teams in the Ballardvale Baseball association.

Representatives of Dens 8 and 10 of Cub Pack 73 together with scouts of Troop 76 will participate in the ceremonies. At the flag raising Bugler Carl Buschmann will sound "To The Colors" after which the National Anthem will be played by a group of trumpeters from the P.H.S. Girls' band.

The speakers will be Sidney P. White, chairman of the board of public works, which has just installed the diamond; Anthony Perrino; the Rev. Henry B. Smith, O.S.A., and Henry L. Meyers, chairman of the Ballardvale Baseball Assn.

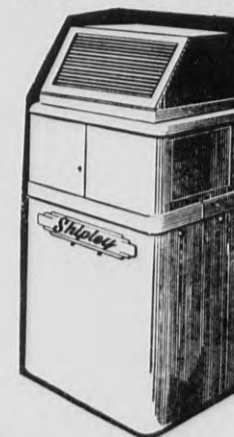

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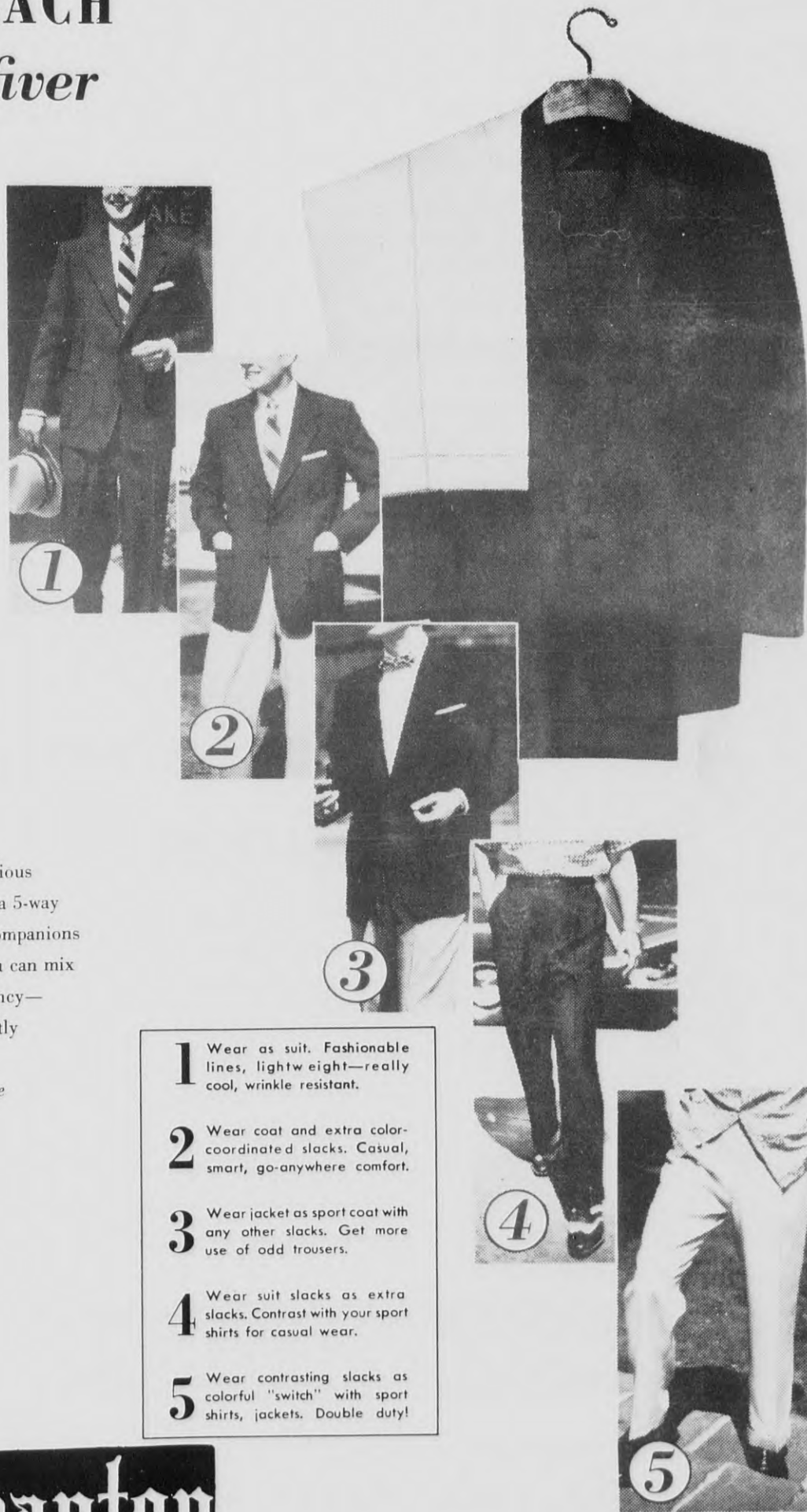

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## Memorial Day

Members of the town's veteran organizations will join this weekend in ceremonies honoring the memories of those veterans who have answered their last roll call.

Many of the departed ones gave their lives for the preservation of our nation and the ideals for which it stands. Others served in the armed forces in times of stress and since have answered the summons of the Great Commander-in-Chief.

The honored dead of our nation served in many wars. Their graves are everywhere: — in every city, town and village of these United States, in the great oceans of the world, and in many foreign lands.

On this day set aside "for the purpose of strewing flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades" the living pause to honor their memory and recall the high principles for which they fought.

Their comrades-in-arms, their relatives and friends, in paying annual tribute to these departed ones look upon Memorial day not as one of glory, but as a prayer for peace. Our nation's wars were not fought for glory or conquest, but that we might live in peace.

And this is the thought uppermost in the minds of all who set aside part of this day to show their respect for our soldier and sailor dead.

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### A NUTRITIONAL DISEASE By Science Features

Sprue, a nutritional disease very similar to a type of anemia, develops slowly and inconspicuously and remains unrecognized until it reaches an advanced stage.

The loss of energy and general weakness begin to prevent sprue sufferers from doing their usual daily work. Diarrhea, indigestion, loss of weight and some nervous symptoms also often develop.

The disease results from a lack of essential vitamins and proteins in the body, because the person doesn't receive the proper nourishment or the digestive system is unable to utilize the food it takes in. As in anemia, this condition produces a deficiency of red corpuscles and there is difficulty in building new blood.

Sprue can often be controlled by prescribing a special diet and by treating the body to bring about proper absorption of vitamins. Folic acid and B-12, two vitamins which play a role in the production of red blood cells, are usually given. In stubborn cases, however, the body still can't utilize these essential nutrients.

Now, an aid to this absorption process has been found—a form of hydrocortisone or Compound F, a hormone produced in the body by the adrenal glands. The laboratories have now developed a new process using fermentation to make hydrocortisone drugs like Cortril. This hormone was administered to 17 cases with sprue during a study conducted in a Chicago hospital. A small dose of the drug produced an excellent response in every case.

Once the body is treated and is able to use the vitamins it receives, the symptoms begin to disappear and the patient is on the way to complete recovery.

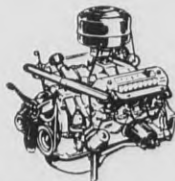
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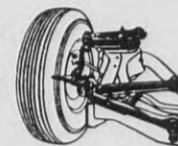

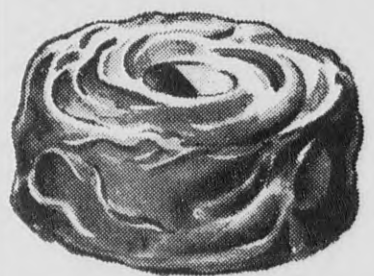
