## Memorial Day Tribute Paid Town's War Dead

### School Bd. Elects Three Teachers

In a lengthy session Tuesday night the school committee heard a delegation representing the West elementary school relative to the proposed transfer of the fifth and sixth grades to the Central schools; received the resignation of two teachers, appointed three new ones, approved the transfer of another to the Bradlee school as principal and awarded fuel and typewriter contracts.

Joseph Sullivan was spokesman for the West elementary group which also included Mrs. John Guild, Mr. and Mrs. Ray Austin, Mrs. Douglas Stevens, Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Newton and Howard Leonard. They advocated the building of additional rooms at the West school to take care of the increased attendance due next September.

After a lengthy discussion the committee took no formal vote but considered the possibility of transferring only the sixth grade and leaving the fifth there.

All members were present. The warrant of bills and accounts in the amount of \$4565.93 was approved as was also the athletic warrant in the amount of \$868.80.

## W. Andover Fire Makes 7 Homeless

Fire early Wednesday morning drove seven persons from their home on Wood Hill road and burned the structure to the ground.

Mr. and Mrs. John E. Whitson, their four children, Rosemary, 7, Sandra, 6, Ida, 4, and John E. Jr., 28 months, and Paul Gemmell, a cousin of Mrs. Whitson were left homeless by the blaze. They were put up in the town infirmary for the night.

Firemen responded to an alarm from Box 73 at 12:21 a.m. and found the small dwelling in flames. The relief was sounded at 2:30 a.m. Fire Chief C. Edward Buchan said the cause was the explosion of an oil lamp.

Police reported that the family moved here from Oklahoma about a week ago. The place is owned by Antonio DiSpirito of Dorchester.

Andover joined in the nationwide observance of Memorial day with a fitting remembrance of loved ones who have passed to their eternal reward.

Favored by clear skies many made special pilgrimages to local cemeteries to perpetuate the memories of departed relatives and friends while veteran organizations of the town paid their annual Decoration day tribute to the soldier and sailor dead of all wars.

Taps were sounded in solemn services dedicated to the nation's departed heroes and the sharp crack of rifle volleys split the quietness of the occasion as living veterans gathered at war memorial and cemeteries to give a military salute to departed comrades-in-arms.

In paying reverent tribute to the nation's war dead orators called upon the living to rededicate selves to the cause for which so many made the supreme sacrifice so that we may enjoy the fruits of their precious heritage and resolve that the freedom so dearly purchased shall ever be kept alive in the minds and hearts of patriotic Americans.

The observance here was highlighted by the biggest and most colorful Memorial day parade in the memory of local veterans.

Five musical organizations joined with the veterans and other marching units to present an attractive pageant as they moved through various streets of the center of the town to the Memorial Hall library, the Memorial auditorium and the Memorial tower at Phillips academy where services were held.

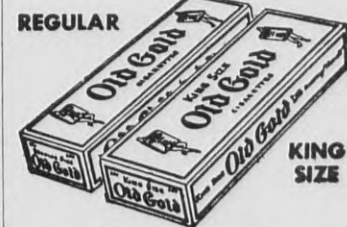

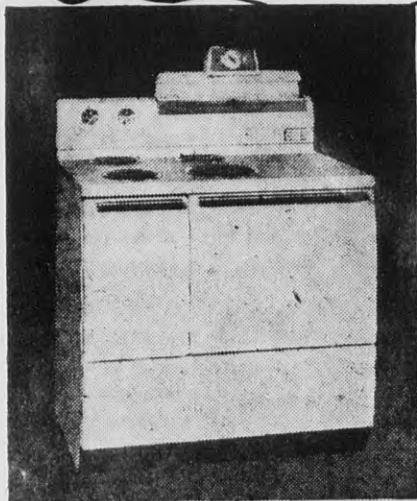

When the noon whistle blew a great majority of the workmen continued to finish some operation they were on rather than lay down their tools on the instant. In fact several minutes after the whistle quite a number here and there were still putting on finishing touches. Inquiry disclosed that the men were working on a pay schedule plus production bonus. An air of interest and efficiency was apparent.

In our country the production workers of a major Toledo, Ohio automobile manufacturer and their UAW-CIO union deserve commendation on the announcement that they have voted themselves a pay cut in order to bring their company's labor costs into a better competitive position with other automobile manufacturers. It is stated that the almost-unanimous vote may cost the workers as much as 10% of their present pay, part of which they may recover later if a new bonus pay plan can be worked out.

What was observed in England could well result at this plant. It's a healthy sign when labor takes this kind of an interest in management and it is to be hoped that in this case and others like it that all concerned will win.

## SCIENCE and your Health

### THE THREE-PART EAR By Science Features

Most people think the ear is simply that shell-like thing seen on both sides of the head. But actually it's a complicated mechanism that, like an iceberg, has more to it than meets the eye. Behind what you see are two internal parts essential to hearing: the middle ear and the inner ear.

The external or visible ear collects sound waves and directs them through a canal to the ear drum. These waves vibrate against the drum and the impulses are picked up on the other side by the middle ear. The vibrations are then transmitted through the inner ear to the brain.

In addition to its role in hearing, the inner ear also acts as the organ of balance that is responsible for any feeling of dizziness or nausea when the body undergoes rapid, unusual movements.

The delicate mechanisms of the three-part ear are very sensitive to infection and, since the ear is open from the outside, many diseases can enter. For example, one common ear ailment is caused by an infection of the mastoids. These cells in the middle ear become inflamed and fill up with a fluid that turns into pus, producing pain and fever and hampering hearing.

Remarkable control of this infection has been obtained through the use of antibiotics. Three British physicians found terramycin highly effective when applied to 41 cases of mastoiditis. The drug dried up the fluid and cleared the infection in 83% of the patients. Prior to the use of antibiotics, operations were necessary to remove the infected mastoid cells and to drain the pus.

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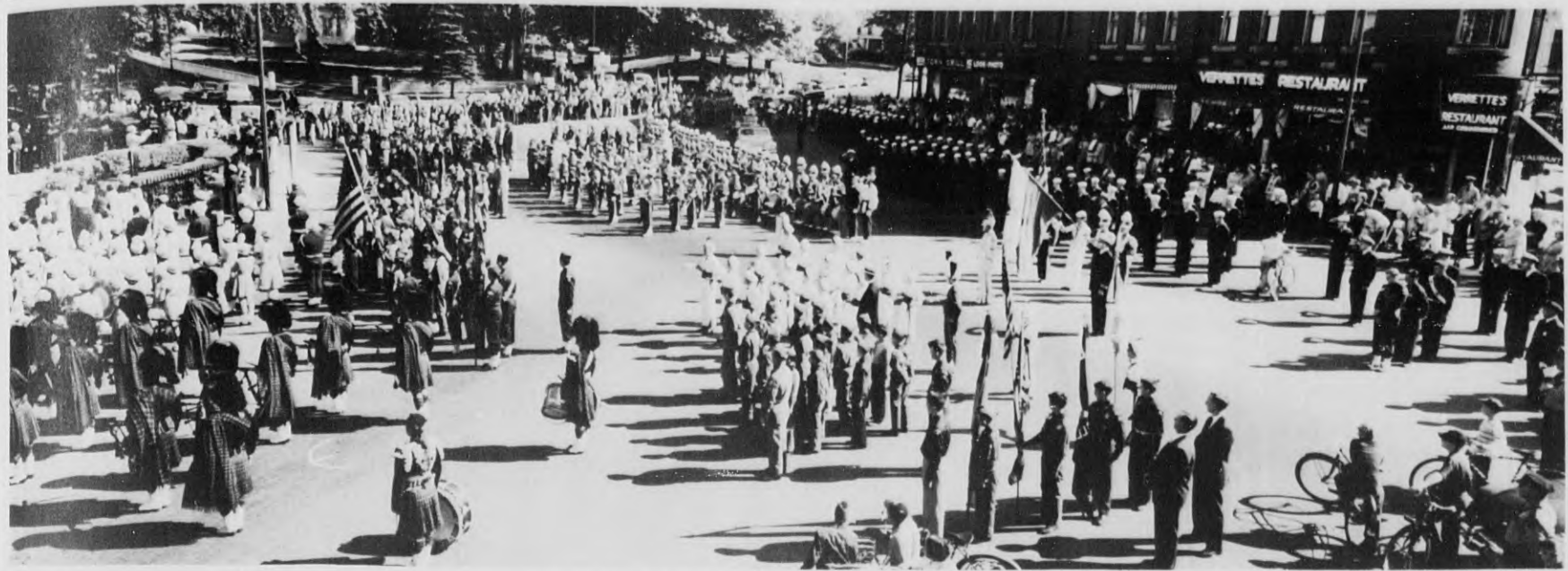
