## 103 Seniors To Receive Pynchard Diplomas

Pynchard high school will award 103 diplomas at its 95th commencement exercises to be held at 3 p.m. Sunday in the Memorial auditorium.

Several seniors are to be graduated with high honors and two of the boys to whom diplomas are to be awarded are already in the navy.

At the exercises the annual prize awards will be made.

This is the second consecutive year that the graduation exercises are to be held on Sunday, a departure from the school's previous procedure of holding them during the week.

The speaker will be E. Francis Bodwitch, dean of students at M.I.T., who will discuss "A quality of life as compared to a standard of living."

Mr. Bodwitch is an experienced educator and administrator. He served as dean of freshmen at Harvard.

## Many P. H. S. '54 Graduates Planning To Enter College

Of an anticipated number of 103 graduates of the class of 1954 of Pynchard high school, information available up to this date shows that 33% have secured admission to four-year, degree-granting colleges or universities. Additional students planning to attend junior colleges, nursing, business, and technical or professional schools bring the total proportion to 45 6/10% of the class planning to enter institutions which set a high school diploma as the minimum requirement for admission. A few of the students — not included in the above figures — are planning to attend preparatory schools.

To date, a total of more than \$3,000 has been awarded to some of the students by the colleges or schools to which they have been admitted. This figure will be increased somewhat when all scholarship announcements have been received and graduation awards are announced.

## Town Participates In Air Raid Test

Traffic halted on Andover streets and pedestrians scurried to shelters at 10 o'clock last Monday morning when air raid sirens signalled the mock attack of enemy planes.

The test in which this town participated was the first embracing the United States and Canada as make-believe bombs were dropped on numerous large population centers. Civil defense authorities of both countries estimated that millions of persons were killed in this first North America air raid test.

In this mock raid civil defense agencies were tested to show what the national defense system has yet to do to meet with a real attack.

The test lasted only 10 minutes. Locally everything went smoothly with fire and police departments and their auxiliaries following prearranged plans and the public giving whole-hearted cooperation.

## Youngster, 13, Killed On Railroad Tracks

John S. Yancy, 13, of 70 N. Main st., was instantly killed last Thursday afternoon when struck by a train just south of the local B & M station.

Police questioned numerous companions and learned that only one boy, Lester Gorrie, 13 of 105 N. Main st., was with him at the time. Police reported that the two boys were crossing the tracks to get Gorrie's bicycle that was near the Dundee warehouse when they saw an express from Boston going to Maine approaching on the northbound track.

Gorrie stepped off the tracks to the east. Yancy stepped west to the southbound tracks right in the path of another train, The Businessman, a Budd Highliner running express from Exeter to Boston. He was killed instantly. Dr. John T. Batal, medical examiner, said the youngster's body was badly fractured.

Police were summoned by Guy B. Howe Jr., whose place of business is near the scene. Patrolmen Calvin Deyermond and Roy Rus-

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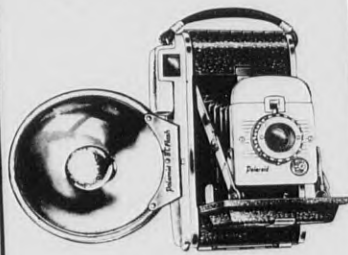

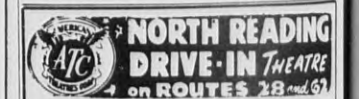

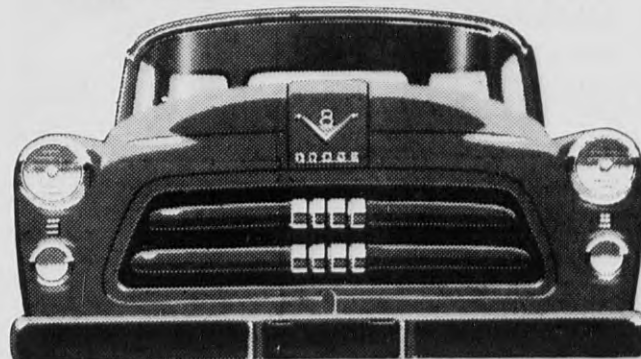

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### KILLING PAIN

By Science Features

A science in its own right, anesthesia has kept up with other medical advances and enables surgeons to perform operations that once were considered impossible. An anesthetic is a substance that makes surgery painless. It must be given properly as incorrect administration can lead to serious complications. Therefore many doctors, called anesthetists, specialize in the study and administration of these pain-killers.

Anesthesia is almost completely an American contribution to medical science. Prior to its application to surgery about a hundred years ago, wine, whiskey and opium were the common but inadequate means of preventing pain.

Now, there are many types of anesthetics: general, spinal, regional block and local. The general ones, such as ether, laughing gas and chloroform are administered in a gaseous form and are breathed in by the patient. They usually result in absence of pain and complete unconsciousness.

Local anesthetics such as procaine are injected into one part of the body, and although the patient remains conscious, that area becomes so numb that the doctor or dentist can work without producing pain. There are also substances that can be injected into the lower spine or into other nerve roots that cause lack of sensation in certain related regions of the body.

Selection of the anesthetic depends upon the type of surgery to be performed and the condition of the patient. All anesthetics, however, have three main objectives: to make the operation painless, to thoroughly relax the patient and to avoid any damage or harm.

### Get Complaints About Solicitors

Police recently have been receiving complaints about certain types of magazine salesmen. Because they do not make actual deliveries at the time of solicitation they do not come under the hawkers and peddlers law which requires a license.

"However," says Police Chief David L. Nicoll, "they ordinarily come to the police station and register. If these householders who are approached will only call the police station we can tell them if the solicitors have registered and warn them about those who have been the cause of complaints."

ranged by the state department of the United States with the assistance of a panel on visual art in education.

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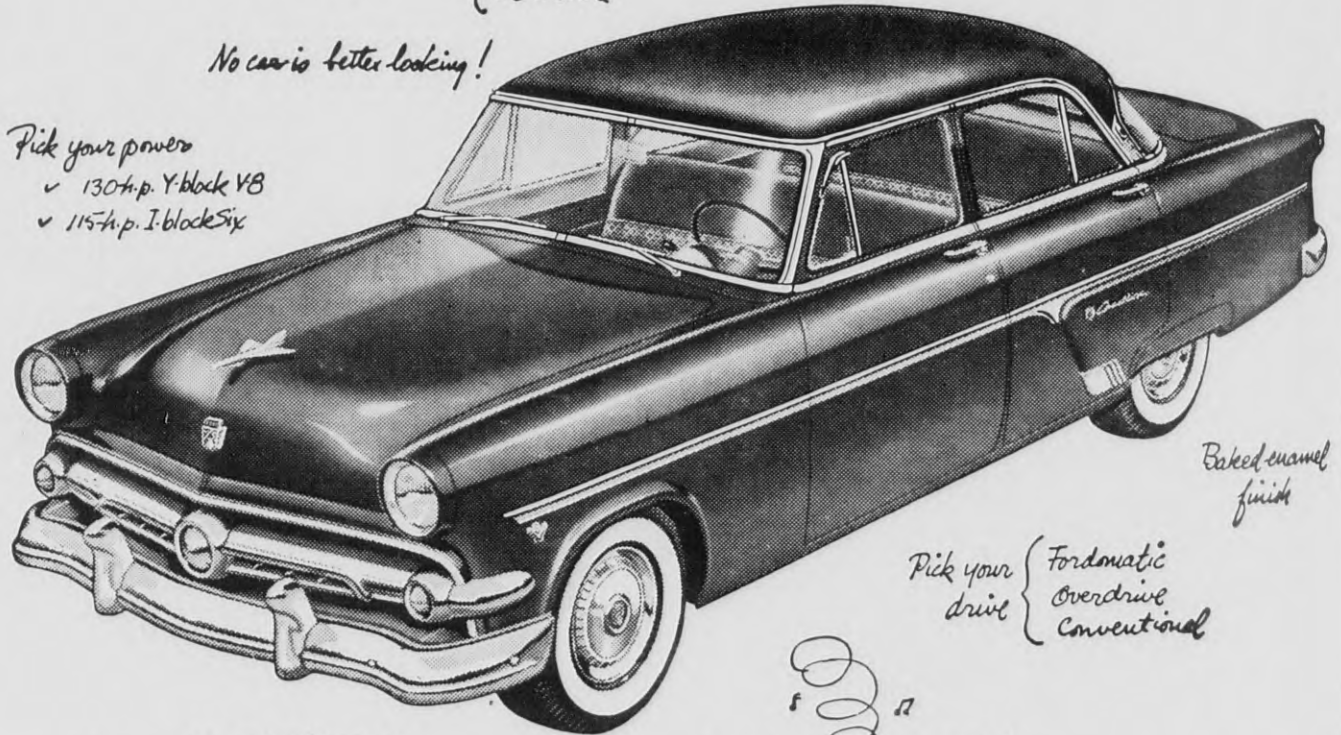
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
