## Democrats Did Us Harm

There is no doubt that we need the relocated Route 28. On its eventual construction have been pinned the creased prosperity based on economic growth throughout the immediate area.
But last week, a politically-dominated group of 74 Democrats killed the measure which would have given us that highway
The only hopeful sign is that Governor Herter immediately sent a special message to the House requesting passage of another bill - identical with the highway bond issue of $\$ 150,000,000$ killed by the Democrats.
Perhaps it will pass - although there is grave fear that it will not. For the Democratic leadership has chosen to play politics with the measure - when the actual ecomonic future of an entire area may rest on its passage.

They are to be condemned for their callous disregard of this area.

As the relocation of Route 28 now stands, we have assurances that part of it will be built. But that section will be in Methuen, from the New Hampshire line to the river. A bridge is also planned across the Merrimack, using funds already available.
But what good is the short piece of road in Methuen and a bridge across the river without the connecting links to Boston?
It is on those portions of the road that we will depend and those are the sections to be paid for from the current bond issue

We take pains to point out that all three representatives from this district supported the bond issue. Reps. Giles, Longworth and Slack recorded their votes for the area they represent and should be commended for it.
It is the willful minority - the 74 Democrats - who have so seriously threatened our future. We can only hope that their constituents take appropriate action when voting time comes around.

## Water Problem Well Handled

Water Superintendent Ralph Preble handled the serious water-pressure problems in a competent manner during the past few weeks.
The board of public works, too, should be commended for taking immediate steps to install some 2000 feet of eight-inch pipe in the most seriously affected area.
While that installation and irrigation control may have solved the problem temporarily, we expect that even further modernization and extension will be required throughout the town during the next few years, We are certain that the board of public works will come up with a solution to the water problems at the next town meeting - and all voters should give those solutions very careful consideration. For the extension of water service and the modernization of existing lines will certainly be a necessity if the town is to keep pace with its residential building boom.

| 50 Years Ago - August 1905 <br> Work is rapidly progressing on Fred Smith's house, near Wilson's corner. <br> Miss Sarah Wright of Lynn has purchased the Pearson farm on Salem rd. <br> Members of the Salvation Army of Lawrence have erected a tent on the Locke estate, corner of Elm st. and Walnut ave., and will give services there two nights a week until early fall. Last Sunday's service was well-attended but the Thursday service was nearly broken up by a gang of men. Their vile and profane language made it extremely difficult to proceed with the service. <br> The new census lists 6630 persons living here. It is a gain of less than two percent despite gains in business through the town. The report does not include Ballardvale, however. In 1895 the census listed 6145 persons here compared with the present total, which includes 3130 men and 3500 women. <br> Misses Gladys and Helen Higgins are spending a week with their aunt and uncle, Mr. and Mrs. William Morrison, in Merrimac. <br> Miss Cecilia Kydd of Cuba st. is visiting in Worcester. <br> 25 Years Ago - August 1930 <br> The finance committee has approved one of three articles in the warrant for the special town meeting. Approval was given to the article asking for $\$ 5000$ for repairs to Union st., as a supplement to the appropriation at the annual town meeting. The committee did not approve an article asking for money to spend, via the public works department, for unemployment reasons nor an article for money for brush cutting, also designed to relieve unemployment. <br> The registrars of voters will be in session next Wednesday from 12 noon to $10 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. for those wishing to register to vote in the state primaries Sept. 16. <br> New officers of Garfield lodge 172, Knights of Pythias, were installed Tuesday evening in Fraternal hall. The chancellorcommander is Thomas Thin. <br> Many members of American Legion post 8 are serving on committees preparing for the national legion convention in Boston in the fall. <br> A New Jersey woman required four stitches to close a head wound after a car she was driving hit a tree on Lowell st., at Haggett's pond. Wet roads were blamed for the accident. <br> Bids on a postoffice site were | opened Wednesday evening, with a representative of the treasury department present. Six bids were opened and taken under advisement by the treasury official. <br> There will be a benefit entertainment Sept. 3 in Punchard hall for the playgrounds. The Sock and Buskin club of Andover will present a one-act comedy and there will be other entertainment. <br> The recently-appointed bowling committee of the Knights of Columbus met last week and formed plans for the year. It was also announced that the baseball game between married and single men will be played Monday night, following postponement from last Friday. <br> 10 Years Ago - August 1945 <br> The three-day carnival at the playstead, sponsored by the Service Men's Fund association, will close Saturday. Sherman, now on military leave of absence, will return to his duties as superintendent. Edward I. Erickson, serving in that capacity during Mr. Sherman's absence, will take up new duties in Longmeadow Sept. l. <br> The annual playground field day activities were held Friday evening. <br> Mrs. Harriet A. Pearson Foster, oldest living graduate of Punduate high school, celebrated her 99th birthday last Saturday at her daughter's home in Reading. She graduated in 1864, with the fifth class. She attended reunions regularly up until a few years ago. <br> The West church fair is scheduled for Sept. 12.
