

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# W. Parish Church Took Active Stand On Slavery



### By KAY NOYES

Andover, more than 100 years ago, comprised the area which is North Andover as well as South Lawrence. It was at this time that the beautiful stone church in West parish - the oldest church edifice continually in use, in Andover was built.

In this great area there were but two meeting houses plus the chapel at the Theological Seminary. Even though, for more than 50 years, the people who lived west of the Shawsheen river had tried, in vain, to divide the South parish and have a more central church

It was proposed in 1771 to build a larger church in the South parish but this was of little help to the parishoners who lived five or six miles away and thus they refused to be taxed on a new church in the same location. Capt. Holt's Proposal

In 1826, through the efforts of Capt. Solomon Holt, it was voted to build a stone meeting house on the westerly side of the river. The good captain also donated the land on which the new meeting house was to be built, as well as the land for the horse sheds.

Dedicated on Dec. 26

The building of the church was no small task. Even though the golden stone used in the con-struction of the church is native Andover granite, there were still ome 50 casks of lime, lumber, 36,000 shingles, nails and glass to be hauled from Salem, Mass. - some 12 miles away. This evidently did not hinder the progress, for on the 26th of December in 1826 the meeting house was dedicated and the Rev. Samuel C. Jackson became the first minister of the new church.

The architect who designed the building is not known, but the proportions of the church are considered to be almost perfect. Quite often students from M.I.T., who were studying architecture, would be beauty to the church are considered. would be brought out here to in spect the measurements of the

### **Used Foot Stoves**

The exterior of the church was influenced by the Baptist church in Salem, Mass., and the interior by the Dunstable church. In the winter, the church was heated by two stoves but the floors were still cold so the women used to bring their foot-stoves, which were small square tin boxes with a little door on one side and an iron receptacle for the hot coals inside, in an attempt to keep their feet from freezing. If the minister was one who liked to air his oratorical powers, the coals were pretty cold by noon.

**Against Spirits** 

Historically, this little church played an active role in the af-

fairs of the day, as it was one of the first to take an active stand against slavery as well as taking a strong stand against "ardent spirits". The stand being that "No person would be admitted to the church who will not agree to abstain from the use of ardent spirits except as medicine and from all traffic of same".

Tradition has it that the original bell was cast by Paul Revere, but at present, no trace can be found its whereabouts after it was given to Hiram French in exchange for a new bell.

In "America"

The graceful spire of this lovely country church was supposedly the one Samuel Smith referred to in his now famous "America".

The Reverend Hugh B. Penney is the present minister at the old West Parish church, under whose guidance plans are being made for enlarging the vestry although the original building will not be al-

The initials of Reuben Frye, the mason who built the church, and the date of his work may still be seen on the Keystone over the front entrance where he carved them more than 100 years ago.

# Cooperation Needed

A cement company wants to erect a storage bin on Fletcher st., at the site of the coal yards.

They are being hampered in their efforts by the citizens of the area, who object to trucks, dust, noise and traffic hazzards which may arise.

We feel full sympathy for the residents of Fletcher st. The trucks to be used are huge and would move only with difficulty along the street.

But we also feel badly that a new business - one probably destined to pay its share of real estate taxes here is having such difficulty in getting its work underway.

Seems to us that some acceptable compromise could be worked out - such as the company putting its own road through some land in the area so that Fletcher st. need not carry the 30-ton trucks used in the cement business. It is our understanding that such a move can be accompublished if all hands will cooperate rather than fight.

We feel that this type of industrial expansion is as necessary as is the larger project in an area like Lowell Junction. Both serve to keep our industrial-residential balance so that the individual property owner will not be completely overburdened with taxes.

Let's hope that some positive, cooperative efforts will be made to satisfy both the residents of the area and the cement firm.




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

In case of accident, the near-est faculty member will take charge of the victim and the fol-

lowing procedure is suggested by Mr. March:

Render the necessary first aid.

Do not move victim unless you know how to do so properly; except in a case where not moving the victim will cause further se ious injury.

In the event that you need assistance or the problem presented is beyond your knowledge, you may call for the following faculty members: school nurse, members of the physical education department, principals.

If the accident occurs during

the time the principals are on duty at the school, they should be notified as soon as possible, Students or by-standers may be dispatched to bring help and notify the principals.

Secure all the details you can

about the accident - time, place, circumstances, persons involved, and witnesses.

Make out the accident form provided in the triplicate. ( A copy to principal, school nurse, and the athletic or physical education department.)

The parents' permission must be obtained before taking a vic-tim to a hospital or doctor, unless it be an extreme emergency

In the event that a student witnesses an accident, he or she should notify the nearest faculty member; and that faculty member should carry out the provisions of this bulletin.

In case of serious accident on the athletic field or in the gymnasium, the faculty member in charge shall exercise every precaution to see that proper procedure is followed. If it is serious, principal desires to be notified as quickly as possible. The less serious may be reported the following morning by leaving with the principal the form properly filled out and any other informa-

tion pertinent to the accident.

(Continued from Page One) skilled business, he explained, with modern plants; properly landscaped grounds; private, off-street parking and perhaps a 500-

foot frontage on a street.

Surrounding the industrial area within a reasonable distance, he said, should be properly zoned residential areas.

Keep Area Good

Of one thing Mr. Davis was certain. "Why break down that nice area when you don't have to?" he

Thus he discouraged thoughts of small homes in the area, but rather suggested keeping lot sizes large to encourage larger and bet-

Several additional points were by the consultant concerning the area.

He said a large plot of land should be zoned for light industry there, rather than strip-zoning the new Route 28.

Home building should positively not be allowed in the area zoned for industry, he declared. "If you're so concerned to get industry to help you" then you must give them a good place to locate, he told the group.

Lowell Junction
Of the Lowell junction area,
Mr. Davis suggested: its use for heavy, less pleasant industry where odors might exist or vast amounts of coal are required or existing rail lines are needed.

He pointed out that the two possible industrial areas are bisected by the new highway - a good inducement to industry.

He also suggested that the re-location of Route 110 may provide still another interchange in the area proposed for industry in West Andover. That would be of still greater value to the town, he said.

Zoning By March

The combined groups briefly discussed the possibility of zoning for industry in the next town meeting. It was pointed out that hearings must be held and the ar-ticle inserted in the warrant by Jan. 20.

However, Planning board Secretary Virginia Hammond said she believed the zoning could be han-dled by that time and should be introduced at the March town meet-

Informal hearings in December could be held, she said, to be followed by legal hearings early in January.
