### Huge Development On Ames Estate; Part In Andover

The A. J. Tambone company of Reading has purchased 646 acres of land, which includes the Butler Ames estate, and plans to build 1800 homes on the acreage.

A. J. Tambone, president of the firm, said 100 acres are situated in Andover while the remainder is in Tewksbury. On the Andover land, he plans to build houses "on 30,000 square-foot lots" that will be "in the \$25,000 to \$30,000 class".

### Lawyers Disagree On Water Extension

"I'm not going to make the town counsel's job a political football". Thus stated Town Counsel Vincent A. Stulgis this week, following charges from another attorney that he had once given a favorable decision on the legality of extend-

ing a water main on Gleason st. Atty. Thomas Sullivan told the board of public works last Friday night that Mr. Stulgis had verbally reported to him that a proposed water extension on Gleason street would be legal, despite that street's status as unaccepted. Mr. Sullivan said another attorney was given the same answer on the same

day, via telephone. Mr. Sullivan said Mr. Stulgis had told him over the telephone, prior to town meeting when the article was to be debated, that only an unwritten agreement between the planning board, board of public works and the Finance committee prevented the work being done. Atty. Sullivan also explained that Mr. Stulgis had said no law appears on the records that would

The areas are primarily those where existing town facilities are not believed to be adequate to handle the number of houses that could be built under smaller lot zoning.

## Australian Visits Flyer's Kin 12 Years Following World War II Invitation

Ray Faunt finally made it. Young Ray was only nine years old when he vowed to come to the United States from his native Australia. And that was 12 years ago - but he made it last week. And his coming brought back vivid memories to a local family of a brother lost during World War II.

For Ray came with the special

purpose of seeing the family of Alex Dubois, an Air Force staff sergeant who was killed while on the way to Leyte from Australia.

He came because Alex asked him to.

Greeting him here were Mr. and Mrs. William Burbine of Brechin ter.; the Misses Madeline and Jeanne Dubois and Mrs. William Zolubos - Alex's four sisters.

His Mother, Mrs. Henry Dubois of Methuen, died just three months ago. She had corresponded regularly with Ray Faunt during the years since the great war, but didn't live to greet him.

### Persistent Lad

Ray's determination to get to Andover has persisted throughout the years since he last saw Alex Dubois - just four days before Japanese aircraft destroyed the transport on which he rode.

Running away from his Sydney, Australia home at age 15, Ray took a merchant ship to Sweden, first hoping it would come to this country. From there he went to England and then paid his own way to Germany, hoping to enlist in the United States Armed forces.

But the answer was no - enlistments have to be started in the States.

So Ray went back to England and enlisted in the Royal Canadian Airborne troops and is now stationed in London, Ontario.

Last week he came to Andover and spent his first Thanksgiving with his friend's family.

Ray was a newsboy in a Sydney hotel in 1942 and Alex Dubois was stationed nearby. The lad took a great liking to the Airforce wings on Alex' shirt and the sergeant let the youngster wear them while they talked.

But the boy walked away, after the conversation, still wearing the Airforce insignia. It wasn't until he was some blocks away that he realized it - and hurried back to find their owner.

It wasn't long before Alex was a regular visitor at the Faunt home, where he was welcomed by Mr. and Mrs. Ted Faunt and two other children, Ralph and Janice.

And because he felt so much at home, while being so far away from home, Alex asked young Ray to come to the United States and visit his folks.

It took 12 years and a lot of travel all over the world, but last week, on leave from his Ontario base, Ray made it.

## Newman House Sheltered Escaped Slaves; Dr. Holmes Lived There

Standing in this interesting doorway with its overhead Palladian window archway carefully grooved with ornamental designs by a carpenter's gouge, generations of Andover boys have gazed reflectively on the many historical inci-

dents that have molded the America of today.

For upon this mall, which later became part of the front lawn of Newman House, General George Washington held an informal reception on horseback for the people of the town and the students at the Academy. About 128 years later, this same spot was to become the drill field for young men about to serve their country in the first World War. Today, looking north from the doorway of Newman House, the Old Training Field in front of the house has become the site of the inspiring Memorial Tower.

The Newman House, as it has been called since its completion in 1811, became the residence of Deacon Newman who served as principal of Phillips Academy from 1795 to 1809.

### Holmes Lived There

It was the home of Prof. Murdock when young Oliver Wendell Holmes arrived in 1824 to occupy "the upper room over the kitchen in the wing at the east end of the main house."

### Cure For Homesickness

The arrival of Oliver at Andover was far from being a happy occasion as he was a thoroughly dejected young man at that time. He was travel worn from the arduous journey from Boston, which was not at all like the 30 minute route of today, and he had brought with him a case of homesickness which was to put to the acid test the matronly advice offered by the lady of the house. Feeling sorry for her young boarder she concocted one of her prize cures which consisted of "a blue and white powder" mixed with water and encouraged him "to drink the results". Although the foaming brew fizzed beautifully, it had little effect in curing his homesickness.

While at the Academy, his ability as a writer of light, witty verse had not been displayed and a few cockney rhymes were the extent of his poetic abilities. His life at Andover was not spectacular and he fell into the category of being just another boy.

### Escape Route

This house, besides being a dormitory for students, was also a link in one of the longest chains of escape in the pre-Civil War days. Prof. Ralph Emerson, one of Andover's mounting list of abolitionists during his occupancy of Newman House, was known to have given sanctuary here to run away slaves as they attempted the underground escape route to Canada. In the dead of night, the escapees were given fresh, cool water from the old fashioned well, with a sweep and a groud for a drinking cup, which was situated in an interesting spot in the back garden.

### Holmes Returns

In 1878, a once homesick boarder at Newman House returned after 53 years for the Centennial Celebration of the founding of Phillips Academy as "the school's most famous living alumnus". As the principal speaker for the occasion, Dr. Oliver Wendell Holmes remarked on his return to Andover that he "could look back and laugh at the gloomy days of 1825" and, no longer homesick, he read as a main feature of the Observance, his poem "The School Boy", which told of his early days on "Andover Hill". His early memories of Newman House may best be described in the following verse taken from "The School Boy":

"The school-boy's chosen home is reached at last, I see it now, the same unchanging spot, The swinging gate, the little garden plot, The narrow yard, the rock that made its floor, The flat pale house,

the knocker-garnished door; The small, trim parlor, neat, decorous, chill; The strange new faces, kind but grave and still."

### Controversial Pink

Just a few years ago, the Newman House again came into focus in the public eye, when it was painted a lovely but a very controversial pink. It is still the

property of Phillips Academy and is presently occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Minard.

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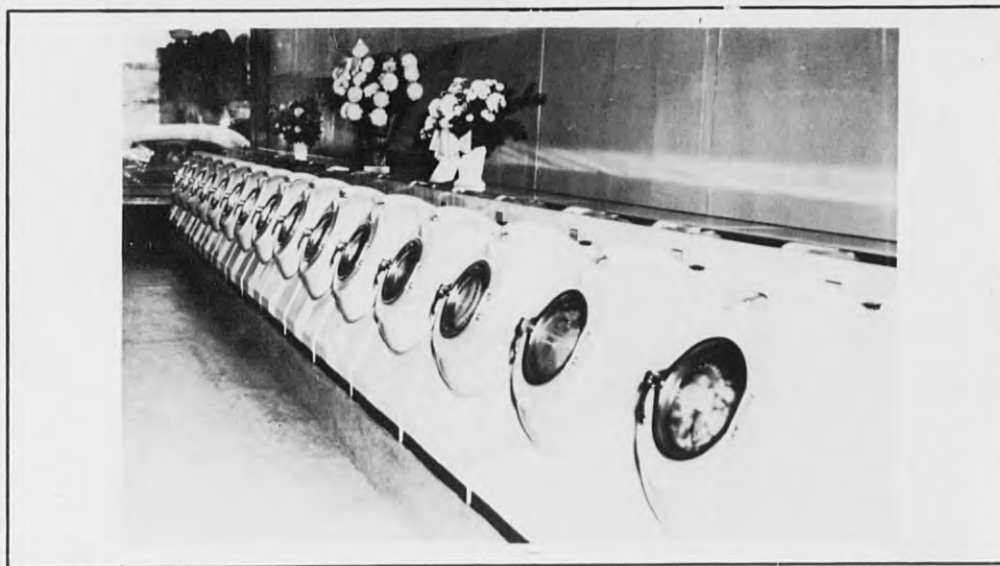

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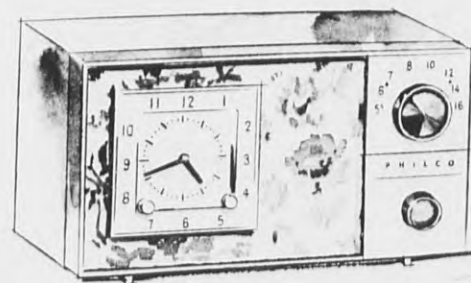

The Blue Devils racked up their sixth win of the year, against one loss, on Thanksgiving morning by trouncing a game No. Andover team, 24-0.

Quarterback Bill Vickers scored twice and passed for a third TD as the Punchard team scored in each quarter, despite a soggy, rain-soaked field.

Early in the opening quarter, the Blue Devils marched 82 yards to score. Passes from Vickers to Co-Captain Bill Fisher and from Fisher to Alex Thompson put the ball on the No. Andover 19. Vickers

carried down to the seven on a right end sweep and Dick Smith carried through left tackle to score.

In the second period, Vickers swept into the No. Andover end zone from the 26, the longest run of the game. Carrying from mid-field to the 26 were Vickers, Thompson and Smith, followed by the spectacular Vickers run.

Later in that period, Bert Damon "scored" but the TD was called back because of a clipping call at the 15.

Again in the third quarter, the

Blue Devils pushed deep into No. Andover territory, with Vickers and Thompson picking up 33 yards to the No. Andover 22. Vickers tossed to Thompson on the 11 and, two plays later, he threw to Damon in the end zone for the third official tally.

In the final quarter, with No. Andover bogged down in their own half of the field, Bill Fisher set up the fourth TD by snagging a shoestring Vickers pass at the six. Vickers scored two plays later from the four.

**Tax Collections  
Better In 1955  
Than In 1954**

All but six percent of the town's real estate taxpayers have already paid their 1955 bills.

And only five percent of those receiving personal property tax bills have failed to pay.

Tax Collector James P. Christie expressed satisfaction this week with the collections, pointing out that fewer people have failed to pay this year, compared with 1954.

Real estate taxes totalling \$1,084,000.69 were mailed earlier this year and only \$70,303.21 remain unpaid, he revealed.

Of some \$143,432.92 in personal property taxes, there is \$7323.90 in the unpaid column.

Mr. Christie pointed out that the deadline for paying the taxes was Nov. 1, with interest beginning on all unpaid bills on that date. The interest, he said, goes back to Oct. 1, the actual closing date for payments, after which the taxpayer is given a 30-day grace period in which to pay.

Of some 4000 poll taxes here, Mr. Christie said he has collected all but four.

**Good Record**

Mr. Christie explained this week that the six percent uncollected real estate tax bills is an unusually good record, considering the increased bills this year when the tax rate jumped six dollars. He also pointed out that there are perhaps 16 or 17 individuals who have not paid their taxes for 1954 but there are no uncollected taxes for years beyond that.

Some town officials recently pointed out, while discussing the town's ability to pay for improvements, that the number of tax delinquents is a good guide, because the number of non-payers will increase when the taxes become too high.

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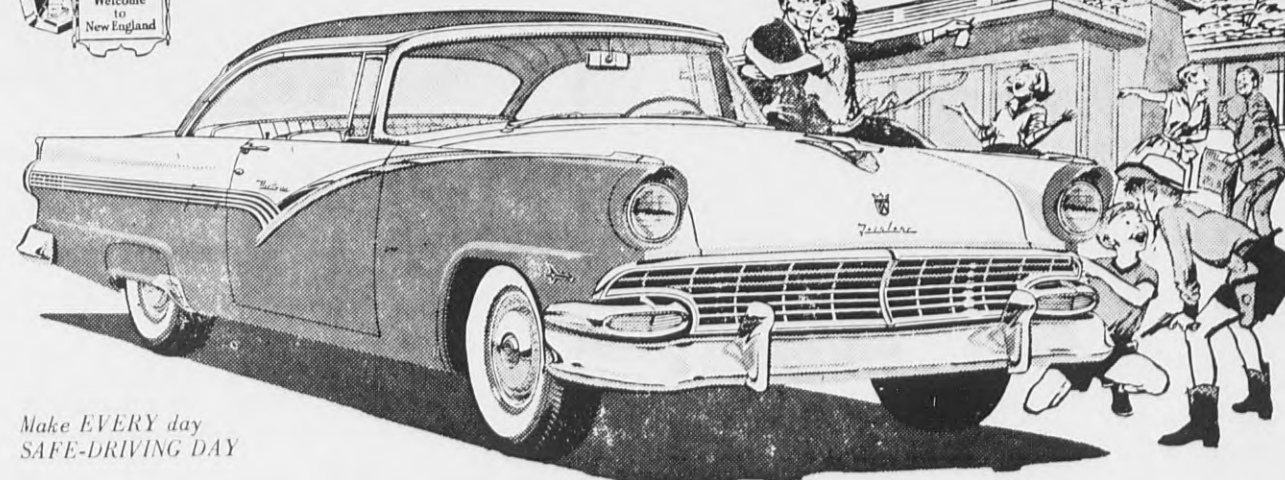

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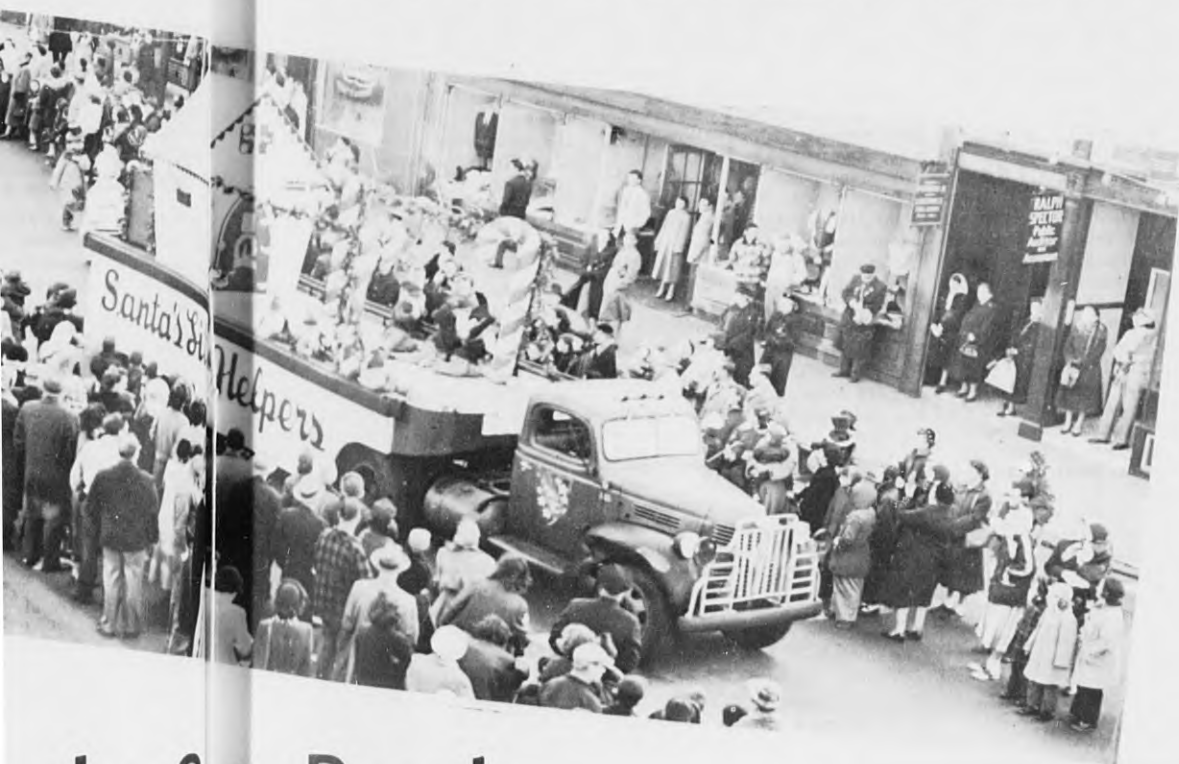

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## Financial Plan A Must

One of the most important boards in town these days is the planning board.

For within its responsibility lie several of the toughest problems facing the town — immediate development, master planning for the future and financial planning. Other things also occupy its attention, such as rezoning for industry.

While each of the town's boards is busily occupied with its individual problems, the planning board is being faced with over-all problems that probably include most of those being considered by the other boards.

It comes down to this — the planning board is trying to plan for the future, so that the town may have an orderly growth.

We rather sympathize with the board, for its duties are so numerous and its responsibility so great that it must sometimes be discouraging. Yet the members look forward to their planning with real interest and enthusiasm, for they know that the results of their work can mean much to the town.

In one field, particularly, their work is going to be of great value. It is financial planning.

Although that project itself is still in its infancy, we feel it to be perhaps one of the most important functions of the board.

How, for instance, can assembled voters appraise the merits of all the requested annual capital expenditures — water, sewers, schools, buildings of other types, streets — and come up with one or two projects that will be of the greatest value to the town in a given year?

We feel that the planning board can perform an extremely useful function by listing the major projects by priority for the use of the finance committee and the voters at town meeting.

How else, we ask, can it be determined whether it is of more value to undertake major water projects and not others as opposed, perhaps, to building schools and not doing any other major work during the year.

We have seen, year after year, a whole list of articles calling for major improvements or additions — each has merit but it is always difficult to determine which one is the most important.

Unless the town puts its major improvements on a priority basis, we may easily continue having a hodge-podge of partial improvements — with water getting a little attention but not enough; schools receiving part but not all of their needs; sewers extended only part of the length they should be; drainage placed on a "fix-it-up-a-little" basis and other major projects undertaken only in part.

That doesn't make sense, for it is wiser, in our opinion, to set our sights on one or two major jobs and get them done — then go on another year with one or two more. That way, when we get through we will at least have completed projects instead of many more unfinished jobs requiring constant attention and money.

That type of planning can and should be done by the planning board. And members want to do it. Every cooperative effort should be made to make their task as easy as possible. And that means that other boards must meet and discuss problems with them fully, with a completely cooperative, friendly spirit.

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## John Adams Will Run For St. Treasurer

State Senator John Adams, 15 Stratford rd., has announced his candidacy for state treasurer.

Sen. Adams will seek the Republican endorsement at the G.O.P. Pre-Primary convention next spring and nomination in September. If successful, he will oppose Democratic state Treasurer John Kennedy, who was elected a year ago.

"In seeking the endorsement", Sen. Adams stated, "I am inspired by the necessity to restore quiet dignity and efficiency in the administration of the state treasurer's department. The constant turmoil which has existed during the present treasurer's regime has attracted wide-spread public concern".

Mr. Adams is serving his second term in the state senate from this district. During that service, he has served as chairman of the committees on civil service, public safety, public service and power and light. He has also served on the committees on highways and motor vehicles, mercantile affairs, insurance and state administration.

A veteran of Naval service during World War II, Mr. Adams is married to the former Eleanor Peterson of Worcester. The couple has three children, Joan, Su-Len and Eleanor Mary.

## Bolton Family Has Bought 500 Acres Of Farm Land

Rumors of a fast-approaching housing development in West Andover were squelched this week by a local real estate broker.

The town had been buzzing recently with talk of a 500-acre development planned soon for West Andover but the broker told the Townsman this week that land in the area is currently being used for farming purposes and will not be sub-divided, at least in the immediate future.

He said the Bolton family has purchased approximately 500 acres, including three farms, but various members of the family are planning to build their own homes on the property.

He said there certainly are no immediate plans for a real estate development there.

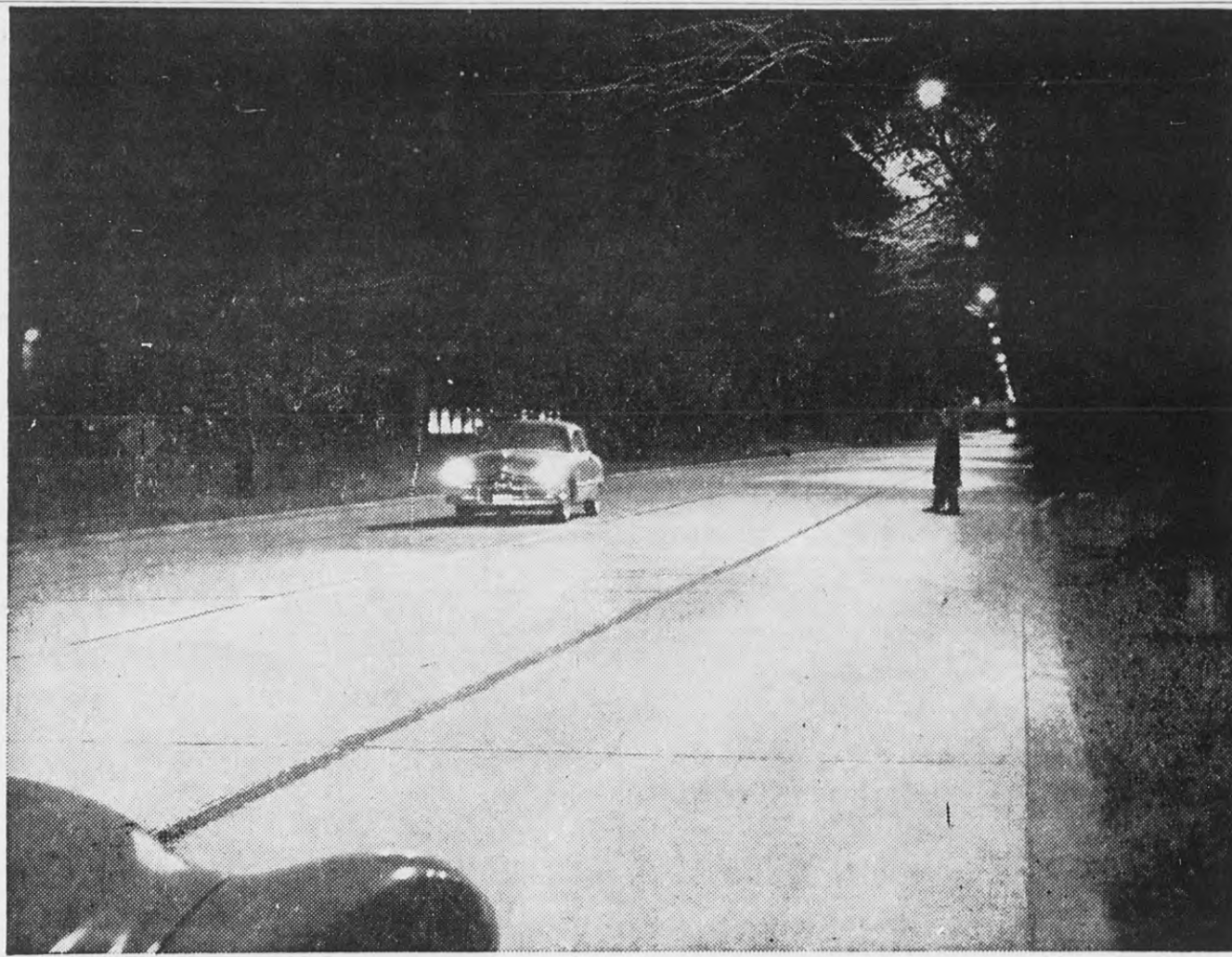

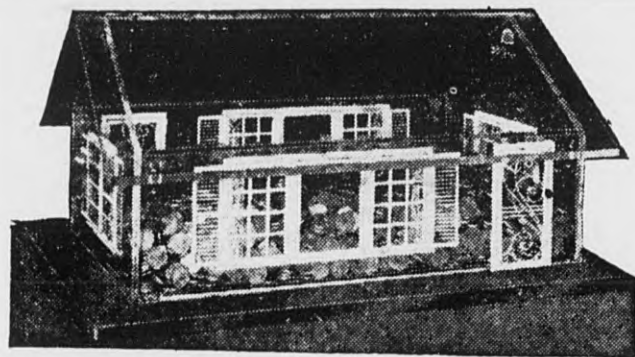

**Can't Ignore Opinion**

Chairman Sidney P. White told Atty. Sullivan that the board certainly couldn't ignore the town counsel's ruling by proceeding in the opposite direction. He said, however, that a written opinion has not yet been received by the board.

Atty. Stulgis told the Townsman this week that he is working on the matter, carefully researching all the law so that there will be no future questions on the matter once his decision is reached.

**Cites 1887 Act**

Atty. Sullivan, in a letter to the board, cited the Acts of 1887, chapter 439, section two, as stating that water mains may be laid in private ways.

The section says, in part, "... and may construct and lay down conduits, pipes and other works under or over any lands, water courses, railroads or public or private ways, and along any such way in such manner as not unnecessarily to obstruct the same; and for the purpose of constructing, maintaining and repairing such conduits, pipes and other works, and for all proper purposes of this act, said town may dig up any such lands . . . ."

Atty. Sullivan explained that the board of public works is authorized under an act of the legislature in 1912 and that the board shall have the powers and duties of the board formerly elected under the acts of 1899. The 1899 act, he said, gave the board of public works the power of water commissioners as set forth in the 1887 acts and subject to any amendments thereto.

According to Mr. Sullivan, the section quoted in relation to the right of the BPW to lay water pipes along private ways had not been amended up to 1912 but he had not checked the acts since 1912 for possible amendments.

**White States Position**

During the discussion, Mr. White made it clear that the BPW should take the opinion of the town coun-

sel, even if he should be wrong. "It would be extremely unwise to defy the town counsel", he said, "and proceed in the opposite direction".

Commenting that he hoped the town counsel's ruling would be available the first of the week, Mr. White also told Atty. Sullivan that "It is regrettable that we haven't received his opinion".

**No Time Estimate**

Mr. Stulgis could give no estimate, this week, on the length of time that will elapse before a ruling is forthcoming. He mentioned the amount of work involved in researching all the laws since 1887 and the necessity of preparing a detailed, correct opinion.

**Political Football Answer**

Atty. Stulgis, asked to comment on the report that he had given Atty. Sullivan a verbal "Okay" on the special town meeting article, referred to his comment that he will not make the town counsel's job a "Political football".

Mr. Tambone said plans call for having some of the homes in Andover ready in 1956.

The whole area covers one square mile, with the Ames pond in its center. The firm said it plans to develop the recreational features of the area, with two swimming beaches, lifeguard and boathouse.

"Ames Lake Estates is a planned, self-contained community; sufficient areas have been reserved for shopping facilities, school, parks and utilities. Bus service will be petitioned for, and residents will commute to Boston in 30 minutes via the new Route 28 expressway which passes one-half mile to the East", the firm's statement read.

The whole building project is planned on a 10-15 year period, the statement explained, for "it

will take that long to complete this \$36,000,000 community".

The 19-room castle which now sits atop Catamount hill in Tewksbury will be used as a community house, rest home or private school, the building firm declared. The land originally was purchased by General Adelbert Ames, who built the castle. His son, General Butler Ames, acquired a large area around the original site, completing the one square mile area now controlled by the Tambone firm.

## Fire Insurance Rates May Go Up; Companies Had Tests Made Here

### B Zone Larger

The B zone into which the board would place the areas is a 150-foot frontage, 30,000 square feet zone as opposed to the 115-foot, 15,000 square feet zone in which they are now included.

Upper Elm st. is included in the recommendation — as are a Salem st. section and two in Shawsheen.

The Realty Construction company has proposed 66 houses for one section of the Elm st. area and has tentative plans for up to 300 homes in that immediate neighborhood. Other developers also have preliminary plans for development in the area.

### Engineer Approves

Three of the four areas were recommended to the board by consultant Nord Davis and Engineer Clinton Goodwin of Haverhill and the fourth was added by the board after discussion with Goodwin.

A description in detail of the four areas is contained in a legal notice on page 23.

day will begin at 2 p.m. at the high school grounds on Bartlet st. It will be led by the All-Girls band and will feature Santa Claus and his reindeer.

The parade will follow Punchard ave. to Main st., along Main to Elm sq. and then proceed up Elm st. to Summer st., along Summer to Whittier st. and then to the Playstead.

Included in the line of march will be several floats, including the Sacred Heart Boys school float with a nativity scene and music. A display of 1956 automobiles will be in the parade and several pieces of fire apparatus will be seen.

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Fire insurance rates apparently are under careful study, following a recent test of water pressure in the upper Elm street section by representatives of the fire underwriters.

It was reported last week that inspectors came to Andover 24 hours after reading a report of water scarcity in the Elm street area. That report was made by Engineer Ralph Preble, who commented that the poor flow of water in West Andover during a fire was more than could be expected from hydrants on upper Elm st.

The tests at hydrants, it was reported, showed less than a pound pressure rather than the 20 pounds sought by the underwriters. That pressure means about 170 gallons of water a minute, compared with a minimum of 1500 gallons listed by the underwriters.

It is believed that the rates may be boosted next year, based on that test and others in sections of town where it is known that water pressure is low. One example was the recent fire which destroyed a chicken barn belonging to Donald Bassett in West Andover. Only one decent fire stream could be obtained, and that only after pressure had been boosted at the pumping station.

One town official pointed out that an increase in fire insurance rates might eventually cost more than steady improvements to the water system which had been urged over the past years but defeated by the voters.

### COMMITTEE ON INDUSTRY SENDS QUESTIONNAIRE

The Industrial Development committee is preparing a questionnaire for property holders in several areas now under consideration for rezoning for industry.

Chairman William Rhoads said this week that several sites are being considered, both in Lowell Junction and West Andover.

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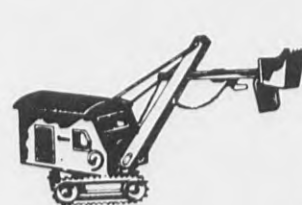
