OFF ELM SQUARE

Disaster Struck With Call Of "Fire", But No One Knows Date Of Our Major Fire

As one gazes at this old photograph taken somewhere around the year 1866, the first impression one gets is that of seeing the ba-sic foundation work being done for the erection of a building even down to the ever present "side-walk superintendents" overseeing the construction.

In reality it is the ruins of one f Andover's early catastrophes. This picture, taken the day after the fire, represents the remains of Jacob Abbot's furniture shop, one of the early furniture businesses in Andover as well as being the site of the present Memorial Hall. Library.

Fire! Fire!

Early one warm day, the township was aroused by the cry of "fire" and by the time Thomas Smith, the foreman for the Shaw-sheen Engine Co., could muster the volunteer fire fighters and have the hand pumps in full opera-tion, the fire had become a wall of flames which threatened to

destroy other businesses in the area. Although some 28 to 30 men strained with all their might to keep a steady stream on the blaze, the rampaging fire swept rapidly through the wooden structures. Turpentine and pots of cabinet makers' glue, which erupted over the structure, along with the kindled floor boards nurtured by years of sawdust which had crept into the cracks, gave vigorous energy to the raging blaze. The fire fighters were also greatly hampered by a wind which seemed to have "come from no-where" to fan the fire into an un-believeable hot inferno.

Wet Down Area

The fire fighting equipment, being what it was in the days of horse drawn hand tubs, did little in saving the shop but succeeded in accomplishing the task of wet-ting down the surrounding lots thus preventing other buildings in the business section from ignit-

No Records Mr. Abbo Abbot's establishment, along with the adjacent tailor shop, was a complete loss. Strangly enough, although the fire destroyed much of the business section in the town, very little can be found in regards to the story of the conflagration. Even

the year in which it occured is not too well established other than it took place either in the year 1866 or 1870.

Many Changes

It is easy to see the changes that time has brought about from the peaceful country square to the present active center of town. The horse and wagon in the background is in close proximity to the spot where our new traffic control boots is located. The large white house behind the flagpole was the home of John H. Flint, a leading citizen in the town and a cabine maker by trade. You will probabl recognize it as the Square and Compass club and also the head quarters of the Andover Red Cross.

The lane in the foreground would be the present entrance to Central and Essex streets and the din roads in the background bearing to the left would be the forerunder of the present Main st. as well as High st. The present Elm st. may be recognized as the street leading away from the ruins and other than being much wider today is in the same location as it was some 89 years ago.



To the Editor of the Townsman:
The "status quo" or at best
"lets take care of ourselves
first" philosophy expressed and
reported in the last two editorials of the Townsman is almost fright-ening in its implications. It is a philosophy that represents the antithesis of everything that has made America a great and wonder-ful and expansive country.

When my grandfather arrived in Philadelphia from Ireland in 1850, he reported that the water system and the drainage and other facilities were completely inadequate to take care of the existing citizenry let alone the influx of immigrants. It seems to me that probably the fathers or grandfathers of some of our own leading townspeople who now fear this new influx, landed in Andover at a time when their arrival greatly overtaxed the then existing facilities.

We can well wonder whether or

We can well wonder whether or not the great towns and cities of this nation grew and flourished in spite of the influx of new young immigrants or because of the vigorous young blood that was introduced into their midst.

our fellow townsmen who are one or two generations removed from the "old country" would be if America had put up the Chinese wall that Andover now seems to be considering. Are we already so old and tired and pathetically unproductive that we can't figure out how to solve our drainage and water problems while we grow, nstead of as a prerequisite to

instead of as a prerequisite to further growth.

In my business, I travel throughout the United States and a few foreign countries. It is almost laughable to read of Andover's "problems" when compared to almost any city in this or any other country.

With an exploding population in the United States that has far outstripped all estimates, every city and town is faced with almost insurmountable problems—and problems that are many times more severe than Andover's. Young people are growing up and marrying and raising families. They have to live somewhere They have to live somewhole their children have to go to school somewhere, someone has to provide water and drainage for them. Are we all agreed that we should tell them curtly to look elsewhere to live and to work and to build their bear and to work and to build their homes? Do we have some suggestions as to which cities and towns have excess capacity in their facilities, in their schools or on their high-ways? It's laughable if one believes there are cities or towns worth living in that do not have

Our problems several times over.
Often, what seems to be a problem can also be an opportunity. If there is not enough water available on Elm or Brown streets to fight a fire then we should improve the service for the people who live there and at the same time improve it enough to take care of some additional future

Of all the cities and towns I have visited, I have seen few as attractive from so many points of view as is Andover. One way to keep it attractive and well equipped is to force ourselves to expand and modernize our facilities. Certainly it is going to cost money, but you get what you pay for. I think only those who are selfish or unrealistic




