Hearing Is Scheduled On Town Manager Question

Town Committee Seeks Opinions Of Townsfolk

Should the town change to a "Town Manager" form of government?

While no specific answer to that question is expected soon, residents of the town will have a chance to express their opinions on it at a hearing Jan. 11.

The official committee appointed last spring to study Town Manager form of government has set that date for a hearing at which they wish to hear the opinions of all interested persons. The hearing will begin at 8 p.m. in the Memorial Hall library.

The official town committee was appointed by the moderator last spring after voters decided

Residents Claim Selectmen "Right"

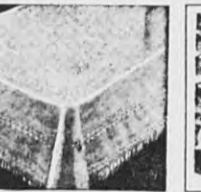

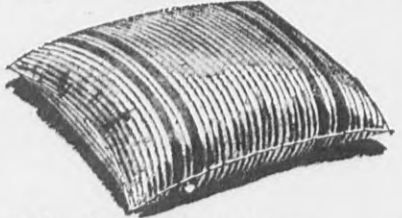

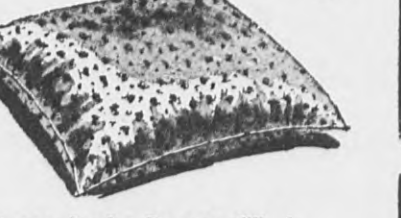

it would be wise to investigate the manager form of government. It has been adopted by some towns and cities as they grew into large-size communities.

Three Types

To be considered at the hearing are the merits of three types of town government — manager with five selectmen, executive secre-

tary with three selectmen and the present arrangement with three selectmen and no manager.

Want Public Opinion

Members of the committee have expressed real interest in the opinions of their townsmen, for it will be necessary for the committee to make up its mind soon on the merits of the plan. It has been generally agreed that the committee could make an outright recommendation for the town manager system or could file an interim report and continue its study. It could also recommend no changes, it has been explained, if it feels that the present system is adequate.

It is felt that the committee will be anxious to see how much interest is shown in the various plans, as it is known that many individuals have expressed strong feelings either for or against it.

They will also offer an explanation, for those seeking information, on just how each of the two charters — manager or executive secretary — works and what changes it would mean in town government.

Howell M. Stillman is chairman of the committee. He is assisted by Secretary Thomas V. Sullivan, Daniel E. Hogan Jr., Wallace E. Brimer and C. Carleton Kimball.

(the board of selectmen). We, the early residents of the Heard development, realize that nothing could be further from the truth. We don't know what legal justifications are involved but we do know that the Andover selectmen are 100% morally right."

Bonds Got Results

The residents pointed out that, for over a year, there were no drainage facilities and thus, landscaping suffered. They also mentioned the muddy condition of the roads. They said a discussion with the selectmen, resulting in the performance bond, helped correct the situation so that, now, the roads have been fixed and drainage is installed.

The statement ended: "It's a mighty good thing the selectmen acted in the interests of the town. After all, that's their job isn't it?"

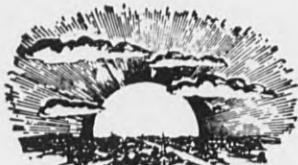

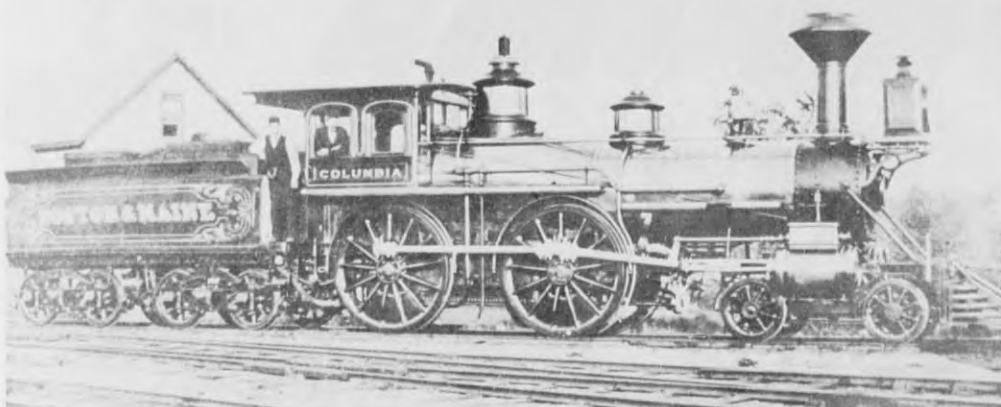

Andover Men Fussed Over Engine Known As The Pride Of The Line



By Kay Noyes

Our sleek silver streamliners of today, with their ultra-modern lines, may be a vast improvement in comfort to the commuter of '55 but the Andover passenger of almost 100 years ago rode in a luxurious style to which he had never before been accustomed.

"Columbia" was A Gem

True, modern railroad travel affords the passenger of today outstanding comfort along with a picturesque view of the countryside, with the new roof dome coaches and foam rubber cushioned reclining seats, but the glory and elegance of the rails goes back to the days when the "Columbia" was the pride of the Boston and Maine. This beauty was indeed a gem and the devotion and glitter that went into making her the sweetheart of the line was displayed in great length by all connected with her.

Engineer Was Mr. Pasho

The honor of being her engineer for many years went to Henry Pasho, an Andover man whose family home on Summer st. still stands and whose name is carried on in the memory of the town by Pasho st. In 1844, Mr. Pasho became an engineer on the Andover and Haverhill railroad, which operated from Wilmington Junction and in those days the first stage of what was eventually to become the Boston and Main as we know it. Around 1872, when the "Columbia", one of ten duplicate passenger engines was built, Engineer Pasho was privileged to take over the controls of the famous iron horse.

Copp Decorated Her

Another Andover man, Charles Copp, who was in charge of the So. Lawrence car shops, was responsible for decorating her tender with scrolling, lettering and striping that was the peak of elegance. Charles Parker, also from Andover, skillfully plied his brush at the So. Lawrence paint shop and turned out eye-catching engine beauties that made the present day engines look drab in contrast.

All-American

For the "Columbia" was all-American from her vermilion wheels to her dark blue tender and cab. Ornate designs in silver leaf were painstakingly painted on the body and her boiler bands were of gleaming silver creating a beautiful red, white and blue effect. The cylinder and steam chests assemblies and most of the metal trimmings were of highly polished brass and she was preened with loving care by the Andover men handling her.

Mostly Gone Now

Although the old time engines could in no way compare in speed or efficiency with the modernistic diesel of today, their color and glitter made them beloved in the romantic days of railroading. Today one line alone in all the country still carries on the sentiment and flamboyant style of the 1800's. Fittingly enough it is the Hannibal and Missouri line situated in the Mississippi river boat country, made famous by the favorite American writer Mark Twain.

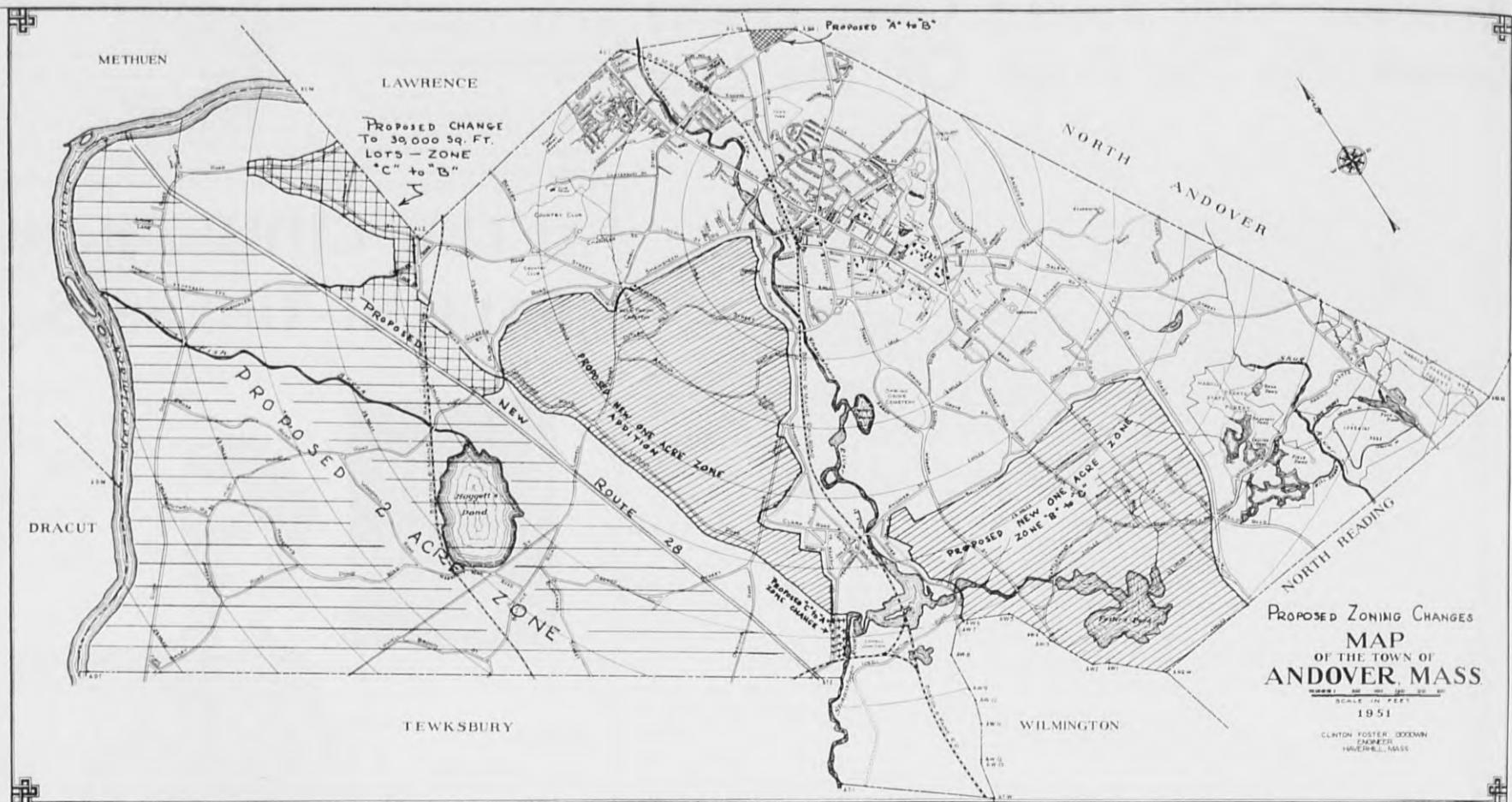

Mr. McIntyre's Request

The school committee has received a letter from Football Coach Robert McIntyre in which he asks for a five-year contract and hints that a raise would be welcome, too.

Ordinarily, we probably wouldn't comment on the matter at all, believing it to be a simple administrative problem of the school committee.

However, Mr. McIntyre saw fit to stir up a forgotten episode — and in so doing, he created a far more difficult problem for himself and the school board.

His letter charges that he was subjected to "a great deal of false, vicious and malicious ridicule and criticism . . .", when he was first appointed three years ago. That same type of criticism and ridicule was levelled at him again last spring, the letter states. Pressure was also heightened, Mr. McIntyre wrote, by newspaper stories of the situation.

His appeal for a five-year contract is based on his desire to avoid a repetition of those alleged "malicious, false and vicious" criticisms. Mr. McIntyre said he wishes to avoid being placed in embarrassing positions again.

In his letter is a paragraph mentioning a present salary of \$800 opposed to \$1200 a year just before the present coach took over. It is inferred that some adjustment of the smaller amount to a larger one would be welcome.

We strongly oppose the philosophy that a football coach should be immune from honest criticism, based on his record, on his attitude toward the youngsters or on his methods of conditioning and coaching. That type of criticism is neither malicious nor vicious — nor need it be false.

We believe a football coach here, as football coaches the nation over, should be judged on merit and performance. Mr. McIntyre should have asked for whatever he wanted purely on the grounds of a good season — not on sympathy for what may have been in the past.

We have been told that, originally, there were harsh stories told about the man without particular reference to football. We do not, of course, condone that type of thing.

But sympathy is not the right reason for the school board to take action. The board members may be sorry that they voted not to rehire the man last spring but that does not mean the members are now forced to give the coach whatever he wants as atonement for their first decision. They did, after all, hire him for 1955, giving him a chance to prove himself.

We believe McIntyre should, at most, get a two-year contract. He should, in fairness, receive a raise. But those are based on a good season and, apparently, the success of training and coaching methods adopted during the three-year period. We recall it being said that a new coach needs three years to put his program into full swing — and we apparently are seeing the results of McIntyre's program now. And on that basis we agree that he should be rewarded.

But again, we do strongly protest the idea that any man should be given a five-year contract, perhaps a raise and other concessions just because someone feels sorry for him. Mr. McIntyre's appeal was made, in large part, on that basis and we think it to be extremely poor judgement on his part.

could remain with his crew permanently.

Mr. Lawson said he had no objection to it, providing he could get another two or three men for his regular force.

It was agreed among the board members that men would be hired, with the files to be searched for applicants prior to advertising for help.

Suggests Separate Board

During the discussion, Member Allan Flye suggested that the water department might well be a separate department, financially and in manpower. He explained that there might be benefits from a full crew that was not interchangeable with the other BPW-controlled departments. He also discussed the matter of setting up the water department in such a way that its revenue could be retained and used for water purposes rather than having it go into general town funds.

Chairman Sidney P. White pointed out that the town fairly

recently voted to merge the tree department with other town departments. He suggested that establishment of the water department as a separate unit might go completely contrary to the policy expressed by the voters in merging the other departments. It was also pointed out that the services of every man are needed during a snow storm, while emergencies in the water department might well call for more manpower than the department would ordinarily carry on its payroll.

Praised Goodwin Service

During the discussion of manpower problems, the board talked about the service now given by James Goodwin, who is one of two men on call at all times.

His work came up for debate when board members asked about almost-weekly overtime payments. It was explained that Mr. Goodwin has worked for the town for years and for some time has taken the water department truck home every night. He is called in case of a water break anywhere, at any hour.

"I can't remember a time when I couldn't reach him", Supt. Lawson pointed out. Mr. Preble,

for whom Mr. Goodwin works, also commended him for being available for the emergency work.

Mr. White also explained that he has, on occasion, called Mr. Goodwin directly when someone has reported a water break or trouble to him.

Open Meeting

Other BPW business last week found the board deciding to call an open meeting of all property owners around Haggett's pond when plans are completed for the enlarged water storage area. Their decision came after receipt of a letter from Daniel Hogan, owner of some property there, objecting to plans to take the land. The board felt that all property owners in the area might like to discuss the matter when the board has its plans complete and prior to a required state hearing.

The board has said it plans to ask for property in order to increase the storage area. Last year, on a sanitation basis, the state ruled that the town could only take a 50-foot strip around the pond. Several property owners recently protested when the BPW sent out letters offering to buy

more land at three times and assessed valuation.

ALL REAL ESTATE TAXATION in the TOWN OF ANDOVER on January 1, 1956. Sworn statements were made by mortgagees or owners of real estate under General Laws Chapter 80A, must be filed on or before March 31, 1956.

to the growing demands of the board of public works and the selectman's office he also holds. He will retain the selectman's post.

The statement follows:

"For almost a year, I have thought carefully as to whether I should, in fairness, stand for re-election to another three year term on the board of public works.

"My decision is: I wish to retire.

"I have used the work 'fairness' advisedly. I have made this move, I believe, in the best interests of the town. Eighteen years ago, when I first became a member of the board, Andover was much smaller than it is now in terms of population, homes, roads and services. Six years ago when I became a member of the board of selectmen, it was then still possible to handle the two positions and my personal business as well. However, in the past two years it has become increasingly evident that to be a member of the board of public works requires double the time and conscientious thought that it used to. The problems and decisions facing a selectman in this \$23 million corporation have multiplied equally, and I should add, albeit selfishly, that my own business has expanded to such proportions that I must give it, too, more and more time and attention.

"I should like to express my thanks, not only to those who have supported me for this public office, but to those who have worked with me on the board through the years and who have made our accomplishments possible.

"I should like also to commend this office to those who are interested in Andover and its future, for although there are many problems and headaches involved, it remains most challenging and most rewarding."
