Government Reviewing Plans For Shawsheen Mills; Board OK's Use - No One Opposed

A clear decision has not yet been reached on Raytheon Manufacturing company's occupancy of the Shawsheen mills - but the way was substantially cleared Monday night when the board of appeals gave its approval to the move.

Raytheon, meanwhile, announced a short extension of its option to buy the mills. The statement cited continuing study by the Defense Department of the program under which Raytheon would operate here.

All In Favor

Monday night's session was highlighted by the unanimous support of citizens and town officials of the giant electronics firm's plans for the mill. Several residents of York st. asked that consideration be given to having truck traffic use the entrance near the Railroad station rather

than York st. but stipulated that it was a request only, not a complaint.

Selectmen Sidney P. White, as chairman of the board, gave the town's blessing to the firm.

Appeals Board Chairman James Eastham and Members Hugh Bullock and Edward P. Hall gave quick consent to the request for permission to conduct light manufacturing at the mills.

Assembly Work

Atty. Charles Reznick, principal spokesman for Raytheon, told the appeals board that nothing would take place at the mills that would be in any way offensive to the community - that it would be primarily concerned with the assembling of equipment to be used by the Armed Forces. Work of that type, he explained, is substantially similar to assembling

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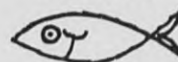

Regular "Special" Town Meeting?

There are many items of town business waiting for the special town meeting, which presumably is to be called at the request of the school committee when it has plans for a new school.

It seems that there have been an increasing number of items to be considered by special meetings during the past couple of years. That trend probably will continue, as pressing problems will continue to confront us without regard to the timing of our annual meeting.

Would it be possible for the town to establish a second meeting in the fall as a regular event — one that could consider all the issues and requests that come up between early March and, say, Oct. 1?

We don't know about the legality of the idea, but it seems sensible. The town meeting in March could establish a date for the special meeting — and all special articles could be held over for its consideration. Thus, all voters would know far in advance that a meeting was to be held; there would be less need for special meetings with only a bare quorum present and all serious problems would get a hearing without the necessity of waiting a full year until the next annual meeting.

Perhaps someone will give this idea some thought between now and next March, with the possibility of putting the question up to the voters then if it appears practical.

Select One Candidate

The time has come to give some thought to the September primaries, in which the three representatives from this district will be nominated.

Three Methuen residents are now holding the seats. It had formerly been true that one seat went to Andover, with the remaining ones in Methuen. The primary in 1954 found three Methuenites receiving endorsement, one by the narrowest of margins.

Many persons felt that the presence of several Andover men in the contest spelled defeat for all — that one candidate should be offered to the voters and given full support by the political workers and leaders.

We hope considerable attention will be given this problem in the near future, so that Andover can reasonably expect to regain its lost seat.

Nomination is the problem, for it is unlikely that a Democrat will be named from this strong G.O.P. district. Thus, Republican workers in Andover should give a lot of thought to selecting one candidate who could be expected to win one of the three nominations.

It is good to have a resident of this town as one of the three legislators and we urge those of like mind to work out some plan whereby a single qualified candidate will be presented to the Republicans at the primary. If there are several Andover men running, we can expect only the same results as two years ago, when the vote was badly split and none of the local men won.

Improvements, Not Extensions, Voted By BPW

Water extensions will give way to improvements in the present system this year.

All five members of the board of public works agreed on that decision Monday night, after hearing two applicants for extensions.

Fred Cheever asked the board to put water along Spring Grove rd. to service several homes contemplated for the section. He said men are waiting to buy the land but he has refused in all but two cases to give a deed for it until receiving assurances that water would be installed.

Clinton Shaw also requested a water extension on Wildwood rd. and said he had several persons waiting for an answer.

The board has agreed to improve the system by installing water mains on Wildwood rd., Porter rd. and Vine st. Each of the installations would connect present dead-ends in the system. After doing these jobs, the board said it would have only about \$6000 of the original \$20,000 appropriation and could undertake, at best, perhaps one other extension. Members said it would not be right to pick only one of the several requests.

Glason st. water extension was voted under a special article in last fall's special town meeting and will be done under that appropriation.

Both Mr. Cheever and Mr. Shaw spoke of helping to pay for the cost of the water installation and both men said they were willing to give the town some land to straighten out bad curves in the roads.

David D. Coffin, assistant vice president of the missiles system, told the board that some machine work with lathes and millers; inspecting electrical assemblies; developing and making electrical test equipment and a "fair amount" of wiring would be undertaken at the mills.

The anticipated operation would become "more purely assembly and testing later, as employment grows", Coffin stated. He said machine work may be sub-contracted locally as the plant increases its work.

Maximum Security

The type of work contemplated for the mills would be "pretty much supported by the laboratory at Bedford", Mr. Reznick stated.

Maximum security work will be involved at times, the firm spokesman asserted. Thus, the company plans include building a small guard house and completing the fence around the property — a requirement of the Defense Department.

1000 In 18 Months

Mr. Coffin told Selectman White that tentative plans call for perhaps 1000 employees by a year from November, with rehabilitation of the structure beginning as soon as a final decision on buying the plant is taken. White then recorded the selectmen-assessors as favoring the firm's plans.

No Restrictions

Chairman Eastham commented "I gather it is being welcomed with no desire for restrictive conditions to be attached". He then consulted the two board members and announced a favorable decision on the appeal. A written decision will be ready within a few days, he said.

Safety Factor

The neighbors present asked

"The extension became necessary in order that the Department of Defense officials could study further the details of the program under which Raytheon would produce military electronic equipment at Shawsheen".

38 Acres Included

At the hearing Monday night in the library, the firm's representatives said the property covers some 38½ acres and includes land running back to the junction of the river and railroad tracks. All main buildings are to be used, it was explained. With the exception of the guard house, there is no new building planned for Shawsheen, they said.

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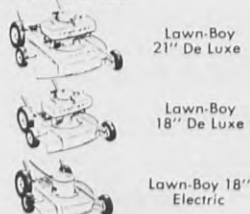

LIBRARY CLOSES TRAVEL TALKS FOR THE SEASON

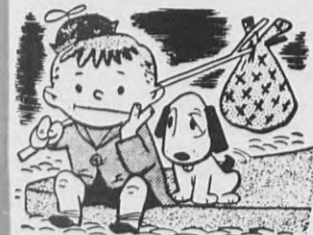

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Phelps House, Lavishly Built And Decorated, Given As Faculty Home

One of the finest remaining houses and one of the show places on Andover Hill is the stately President's House, more commonly known as the Phelps House, which from its location at 189 Main st.

majestically overlooks the picturesque campus of Phillips academy.

First Faculty Home

The Phelps House was the first residence to be constructed for the Theological Seminary faculty and was originally built to be the home of Dr. Edward Griffin, who was at that time the president of the Seminary.

William Bartlet, a wealthy merchant from Newburyport, who owned a large fleet of sailing vessels and had through his trading ventures in the East Indies amassed a tremendous fortune, donated the lovely home to the Seminary.

Expensive Taste

As one of the associate founders of the Theological Seminary, Mr. Bartlet generously allowed Dr. Griffin to construct and furnish the house to his own taste. It is doubtful however that even Mr. Bartlet with his great wealth rea-

lized how expensive Dr. Griffin's taste could be. An amusing story told about Dr. Griffin's decorating is that when given a free reign with Mr. Bartlet's money, he had a very beautiful wall paper put on the parlor wall at the exorbitant price of a dollar a roll. When viewed by the lavish donor, he mildly protested Dr. Griffin's extravagance so the good doctor promptly papered over the expensive wall covering with a cheaper grade and presented the amazed Mr. Bartlet with the bill for both.

Even though the Phelps House was made far more luxurious than its donor had intended, it can not be said that Mr. Bartlet was not extremely generous with his fortune, for he also donated the funds for Bartlet Chapel, Bartlet Hall and Stuart House, along with large sums of money to be used for other purposes.

Never Lived There

Construction on the first faculty residence for the Seminary, which architecturally has been attributed to Charles Bulfinch, the famous Boston-born American architect, was begun in 1809, but was not completed until 1812. The house which bore evidence of the lavish taste of Dr. Griffin was never occupied by him for by the time the last carpenters had completed their labors the good doctor had resigned his position at the Seminary to take over the pulpit of the Park Street church in Boston.

Dr. Ebenezer Porter, a professor at the Seminary, was actually the first faculty member to occupy the lovely house. It was his large study in the south wing which became the conference room for such important men of the day as Dr. Woods, Squire Farrar, Professor Moses Stuart, Dr. Justin Edwards, Principal John Adams and Deacon Mark Newman, who met here regularly and were responsible for organizing the American Board of Foreign Missions and for originating the American Educational Society. From the meeting held at Phelps House, these seven men were also responsible for starting the Boston Recorder, the first religious newspaper in the world as well as for founding the American Temperance Society.

Madam Porter also left her im-

pression in the house as she was "not a believer in fresh air, and her home was usually almost hermetically sealed, so that it seemed like a great wooden tomb". She was well-known for conducting ghostly prayer-meetings in the airless rooms for the conversion of non-christians.

Phelps Moved There

In 1848, Professor Austin Phelps, one of the most eloquent of Andover's many brilliant preachers, took over the occupancy of the house which today bears his name. In the little white garden house which may still be seen today, the professors daughter, Elizabeth Stuart Phelps, sought seclusion as she wrote her novels and stories so widely read at that time.

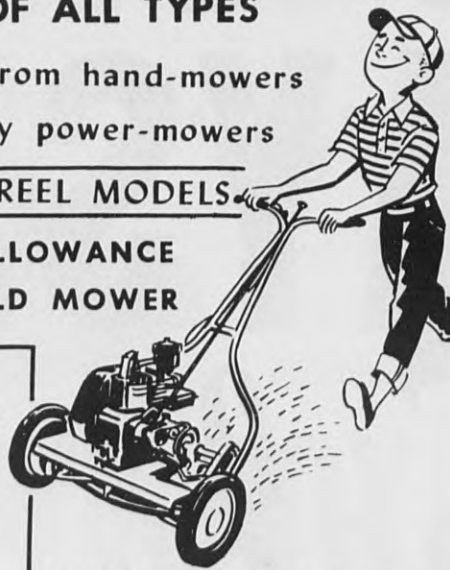

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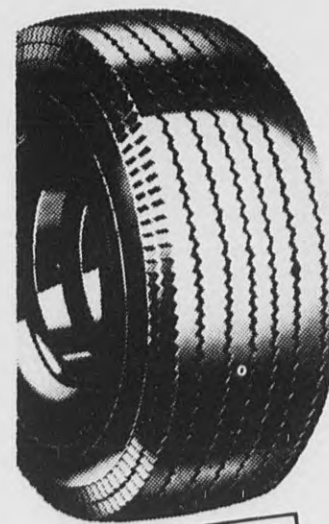
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
