

Firm Sets Peak Employment At 6000; To Produce Material For Army Ordnance Corps

Raytheon Manufacturing company has taken its option on the Shawsheen Mills.

The firm will move in, to begin rehabilitating the mills for electronics work, as soon after June 1 as possible.

Employment is seen at 1000 within a year from the conversion date. Another 5000 may be working there within a five year period, depending on government contracts.

Thus, 6000 persons may be working in Shawsheen within five years.

Raytheon announced its decision to take up its option to lease, with a further option to buy the plant, Tuesday evening. Its option had been extended from May 15, with the announcement that further federal study was needed before a decision could be reached.

The plant in Shawsheen will produce military equipment now under development for the Army Ordnance Corps. Raytheon President C. F. Adams Jr. said Textron, Inc., owners of the building, had agreed to vacate the property by June 1 so that conversion could begin.

The ell in back was added at a later date, possibly by the original occupant's son, Isaac, who after his colorful career as a captain in the French-Indian War, returned to his birthplace to retire to the leisurely role of country gentleman. It is said that he always wore a heavily-powdered white wig to em-phasize his position in the "simple farming community". In later years, Jacob Osgood, Isaac's fourth son, a wealthy and highlyrespected farmer, inherited the property and made it his home.

Otis Killed There
It was also the early home of
the Rev. David Osgood, who volunteered as chaplain at the Battle of Bunker Hill. It was during his occupancy of the house that James Otis, the famous Massachusetts-born patriot, visited here and met his startling death.

As a life-long friend of the Osgood family, James Otis had visited the lovely country place many times and in 1769, he returned to the home of his friend to recuperate from a mental illness brought about from injuries he received when he was severly at-tacked by a customs collector who opposed his public statements against the British revenue meas-

One Lightning Flash

Otis, one of the ablest pleaders of the cause of freedom for the colonists, had often expressed a wish that his death might be as swift as if by a stroke of lightning. On May 23, 1783, the great leader's unusual wish came true, when in the midst of telling a story to the family, a great dark

cloud suddenly appeared followed by a shattering explosion which seemed to rock the earth and si-multaneously the distinguished patriot fell without a struggle into the arms of Mr. Osgood, Not a mark of any kind could be found on the victim nor did harm come to any one of the eight members of the household who were present in the room when the incident occurred.

The storm itself was of little consequence and the only bolt of lightning to issue from it was the flash that mercifully put the bril-liant man's disturbed mind once more at ease.

Restore Natural Beauty

Unfortunately, the doorway in which James Otis stood at the time of his death was destroyed in the early 1920's, by a fire that got its start when a spark from the massive chimney ignited a beam and destroyed the lovely and historic doorway. Other than the loss of the doorway, the exterior remains much the same as it was several hundred years ago. The interior shows much of the early construction and interesting paneling and the present owners of the Osgood House, Mr. and Mrs. John Forbes, have done much towards restoring the lovely old farm house to its natural beauty.
