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## Postoffice Was In North Room Of Jonathan Swift House Until 1840

The Jonathan Swift house, located at the corner of Central and Brook streets, is an excellent example of a modified American colonial and was built by Jonathan Swift at a prosperous period in his life around 1795. Upon his arrival in Andover in the late 1700's, Mr. Swift first made his home in a small wooden cottage which stood directly across from the present Swift house, on what is now bank property.

### Became Prominent

A tanner by trade, the enterprising gentleman established himself in business and within a short period of time had proved himself to be a forthright and successful businessman whose position in the community gradually gained such prominence that he became a local leader in civic as well as social affairs. It was during this period of prosperity that he built the large colonial house which was much more fitting to his standing in the town. His land holdings at that time were also quite extensive and much of the land from Main st. down Central st. was recorded in the Swift name.

### Postoffice There

After Jonathan's death, his nephew, Dr. Nathaniel Swift, made the lovely old house his home and it was during his occupancy that the north room of the house became a United States Postoffice. Appointed under President John Quincy Adams, he remained as Andover's postmaster from 1820 until 1840.

For the first few years the doctor and his sons were the sole

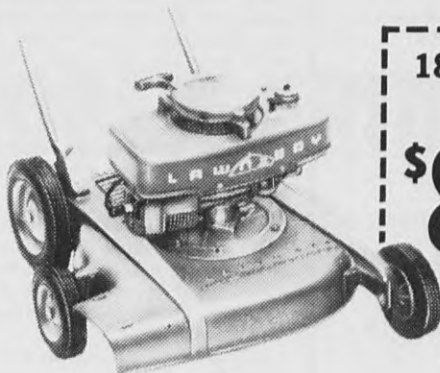
operators of Andover's second Postoffice which existed until the doctor's death in 1840. A greatly-loved physician, the doc-

tor's passing at the age of 62 was sincerely mourned by the community in which he had practiced for so many years.

The Swift house remains as a successful example of the later Colonial type and displays the familiar arched windows which can clearly be seen at the side vestibule as well as in the row of sheds. This touch seems to have been the favorite of some late colonial builder whose individuality has been carried through to so many of Andover's old homes.

The lovely old house with its interesting monitor roof treatment was for many years owned by heirs of Dr. Nathaniel Swift. In later years the house became sadly neglected and, around 1952, it was purchased by Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Hill, the present occupants, who have restored the Swift house so that it may again proudly claim its place among the lovely old showplaces in the town.

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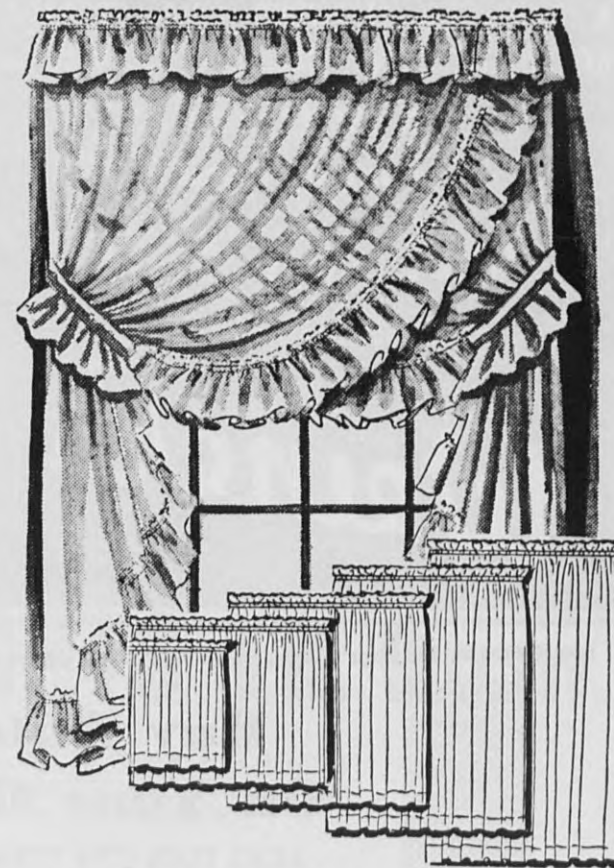

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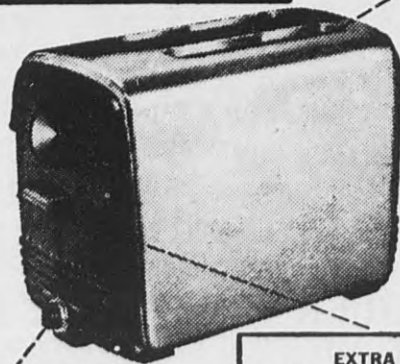

## Planning Board Asks For Plan Approval Ruling

The State Federation of Planning Boards will be consulted about a knotty problem that has come before the planning board several times in past months.

Secretary Mrs. Virginia Hammond has been asked to consult the Federation about the premise that planning boards should approve or disapprove sub-divisions based only on lot layouts and with restrictions based on full-fulfillment of drainage and sewerage and road construction requirements.

One local attorney has several times argued that the board should approve a sub-division when it is satisfied that the lot layout is correct — and impose whatever restrictions it feels necessary regarding utilities and roads.

On the other hand, board members have said in the past that they are required to approve the sub-division based on complete plans for all utilities and roads. They have pointed to a planning board regulation which established responsibility for control over services and have suggested that approval of lot layouts only would leave problems of services up to other town boards.

Arguments for the restricted planning board authority over layouts only include the suggestion that developers get caught in zoning changes while other problems are being taken care of and are then required to spend a great deal of money changing lot sizes in addition to other engineering services.

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## Two Appointed Deans Of Girls; Guidance Department Reorganized

The appointment of Miss Isabelle Phelan as dean of girls at Punchard and Miss Katherine Sweeney as dean of girls in the junior high school was voted at the school committee meeting May 17.

Bernard M. Kellmurray, director of guidance for the school system, said the appointments complete the reorganization of the guidance department personnel for the new school year.

Mrs. G. Arthur Danforth, who has served as counselor for girls in Punchard for the past six years, recently submitted her resignation from the school department, effective at the close of this school year. Miss Phelan will assume Mrs. Danforth's counseling duties in addition to some of an administrative nature, usually associated with the position of dean of girls, a post which has been vacant since the retirement of Mrs. Emma G. Carter in 1948. Filling this position, together with the designation of guidance counselors in both schools, is in accordance with a policy approved in principle by the committee last December and recommended jointly by Lindsay J. March, headmaster, and Mr. Kellmurray.

Miss Phelan has had extensive experience in work of this type, having served as dean and assistant principal at Merrimack High school for 13 years, prior to joining the Punchard faculty as an English teacher last fall. She is a graduate of Jackson college of Tufts university and has done graduate work, including guidance courses, at the University of New Hampshire and Boston university.

Miss Sweeney will be continuing the counseling work for girls which she has been doing in the Andover Junior High school for 10 years and will also assume the general duties of dean of girls — the first to hold that title in the Junior High school. Her work as a counselor is well known to many former students and their parents in that school. She has done extensive graduate work in guidance, securing her Master's degree in that field at Tufts in 1948.

A further change in guidance personnel for next year has been required by the withdrawal from the department of Robert J. Collier, who has given service in the counseling of junior high school boys since 1950. Mr. Collier is to

devote his time beyond his science teaching to his duties as head coach of baseball and assistant coach of basketball. To replace him, the school committee has named William E. Hart as guidance counselor to work with the boys in the Junior High school. Mr. Hart is presently serving his first year in that school as a teacher of science and mathematics. He is a graduate of Merrimack college and a veteran of the United States Army, in which he was engaged in personnel and counseling work. He is, at present, continuing his graduate courses in guidance at Boston Teachers' college.

Continuing their present duties are William J. Igoe, guidance counselor for boys in Punchard High school and Mr. Kellmurray, who is director of guidance for the entire school system.

## Nat. Guard Budget Includes Funds For School Use Here

Use of the Indian Ridge school by the National Guard depends on the annual budget now before the Legislature.

A letter from Col. Ralph T.

Noonan, Quartermaster Corps, told the selectmen that the Guard recommends no town expenditures on the building until the budget is determined.

The town appropriated funds at the annual town meeting for the purpose of fixing the exterior of the building, with the understanding that the Guard would be interested in hiring the structure.

The letter from Col. Noonan said:

"In reference to the use of the Indian Ridge School by the Massachusetts National Guard, the Legislature has been asked to make funds available to pay the Town of Andover a rental of \$1,200 per year for the building.

At the present time, the Military Division does not know what action will be taken on our budget for the 1957 Fiscal Year.

"After the appropriation is made for the 1957 fiscal year, representatives of the State Quartermaster will contact your board relative to some definite agreement regarding the use of the building by the National Guard.

"Until a definite agreement can be reached, it is recommended that no expenditure of town funds be made on the building."

#### ROMAN HOUSE MODEL ON DISPLAY IN LIBRARY

Anyone who feels that our sprawling modern houses are too unconventional to be readily acceptable should take a moment to study the replica of a Roman house which is on display in the main reading room of the Memorial Hall library.

The plaster replica of a house of a well-to-do Roman citizen is about 15 by 40 inches, beautifully constructed and decorated by two students of Andover Junior High school, Anne Berthold and Judith Gilreast, both of ninth grade.

The entire project, done in free time, took about 60 hours the girls figure. Tiny trees, vines, beautiful wall decorations, miniature furnishings have been made as true to life as possible. Miss Ida M. Grover is the teacher under whose influence the young people have made such progress; she loaned books and answered questions as the work progressed.

The typical Roman house was really two houses, with the front half, towards the street, the section in which the man of the house received his "clients"; the second half of the building was for the home and family. The girls have copied the sloping roof style, which poured rain down

into the large basin set in the floor. The patio, or inner portion, was the center from which the smaller rooms for the family radiated, and the girls have used bright color, tiny figures in action scenes as decoration and colored sponge to carry out their ideas.

To study the tiny house is to realize that the world of the Romans was one of beauty and interest. A person wishing to discover a new hobby might well go on from there and read one or more of the books on Roman life and thought which are on display with the model.

Day school in Weston". Two other awards, from Progressive Architecture and the Boston Art Festival, were also based on the Weston structure.

Stubbins himself is a former Harvard professor in the graduate school of design. He served there from 1940 to 1953 and, in that year, became the chairman of the department of architecture at Harvard.

He graduated from the Georgia Institute of Technology and received his master's degree in architecture from Harvard.

The Stubbins firm was selected by the American Institute of Architects to design Congress Hall in Berlin after World War II. It has also been given awards for its design of the Animal Rescue League building in Boston and for an elementary school in Lowell.

**Built Many Schools**

The firm has built many schools. Some of those undertaken in 1955 were two elementary schools in Concord, elementary school in Lowell, high school in Dracut and an elementary school in Maynard. It has also built schools in Weston, Topsfield and Needham.

action on the long-standing issue. He said he has contacted 500 men and women about supporting the repair project, without finding any opposition. Chairman Allen Flye commented "That's what you'll need, 500 people." He referred to the special town meeting called last summer to consider the problem when it was impossible to get a quorum.

### Will Urge Meeting

Surette said he will urge the selectmen to call a meeting before the end of June to consider the brook proposition. Last week the BPW said it was not interested in calling a meeting but would insert an article in any special meeting that is called. Members at that time recalled their efforts to hold a meeting last year and said they didn't want to get involved in a

similar episode again.

Chairman Flye reminded the board that the state may pay half the cost of brook reconstruction but no promises can be made to townspeople on that score. He said the existence of thorough engineering studies and plans may make the state react more favorably to the project.

### Alternate Article

BPW members debated the cost of an alternate article — one that would have the brook cleaned out. It was finally decided to have Engineer Ralph Preble estimate the cost for such a project in case the major reconstruction job is not voted. Members generally felt that a sum of money should be set aside each year for cleaning the brook, no matter what the vote is at a special town meeting. They pointed out that there is no money available now for any cleaning to allow the water to run more freely.

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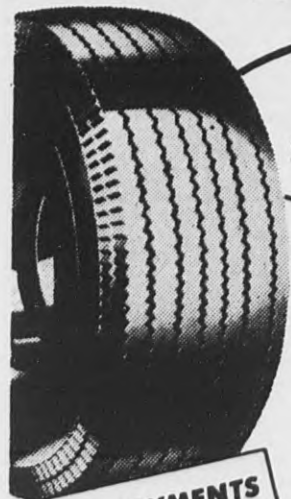
