A public legislative hearing on Andover's town manager bill will be held here next Tuesday night.

The Committee on Towns announced late Wednesday morning that the hearing would be held at 8 p.m. but had not yet decided on the exact location.

Andover's bill was admitted for consideration at this session earlier in the week. House Speaker Michael Skerry announced the Rules committee's decision to allow the bill to be admitted.

Senator Philip Graham and Representative Philip Quinn are chairmen of the Committee on Towns. The bill was referred automatically to that committee when a decision was reached to admit it.

It is expected that the committee, after hearing the pros and cons here Tuesday night, will soon report the bill out of committee for action by the House and Senate.

Acme Yard Use Goes To Court

Further use of the Acme Concrete company's yard at Fletcher st. will be determined by the courts.

The selectmen, meeting Monday morning, decided to ask a declaratory judgement from the court as to the extent of Acme firm's right to operate there. Town counsel Vincent Stulgis will file necessary papers, the selectmen explained.

Selectman Stafford Lindsay said the action came after repeated complaints from residents of the area. There have been several public hearings when residents have complained about the use of the yard — citing noise, vibration, traffic hazards, dust and devaluation of the property as reasons why use of the yard should not be allowed.

Army Now Has 6-Month Active Duty Program

High school graduates now have an opportunity to serve only six months active duty in the Army before returning to civilian life.

Young men between 17 and 18½ years old may enlist for the six-month active duty period and then serve 7½ years in the active reserve unit nearest home.

The program also gives the graduate an option of enlisting for two years active duty followed by three years in the active reserve and a year in the standby reserve.

Men over 18½, enlisting under the two-year duty plan, may serve the time when they choose as long as they have not been called under the Selective Service system. That also is true of young men under 18½ who prefer that plan to the six-month active duty program.

The Army recruiting office in Lawrence, 44 Essex st., has also announced a plan under which a recruit may select and be guaranteed an assignment in one of the following outfits in Lawrence: 324th Machine Records unit, 996th Engineer company, 331st General Hospital, 453rd Military Police company, 324th Ordnance company, HQ and HQ company, 438 TC, BN; 398th Finance Disbursing section and Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 301st Infantry.

Selection of one of these units is open to the recruit who selects either the six-month or two-year active duty plan, the Army recruiter explained.

A high school senior may enlist now but not be called until after graduation.

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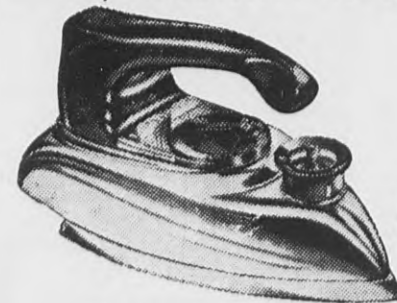

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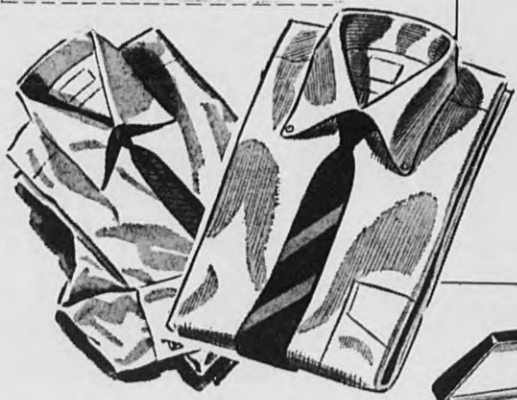

Manning House, Built In 1758, Was Built By Joseph Ballard

Unlike many of the older homes in Andover whose historical background has centered around the Revolutionary War or the trying years of abolition, the Manning House on Porter rd. has few legends connected with it. It was built by plain people whose sole contribution was a fine sense of business judgement and a great feeling of pride in their community.

198 Years Old

This lovely gambrel-roofed house was erected by Joseph Ballard, brother of Timothy Ballard, who was a principle mill owner in this area and the man from whom Ballardvale derived its name. Joseph built the house as a home for he and his widowed mother on a tract of 48 acres of land. The colonial frame house is now 198 years old but has been home to only two families, all of which have taken a great pride in the property but none more so than Joseph Ballard, who carried on his shoulders for many miles a vigorously-growing young elm tree which he very ceremoniously planted on his 21st birthday. In later years the elm grew to a massive size and was said to contain more than five cord of wood. In 1833, he also set out, in front of the house, Balm of Gilead trees which were a rare variety in

this section of the country.

New Owner

Thomas Manning, a shoemaker from Billerica, bought the house from the Ballards as the home for his new bride. Once established in his new home he began to ply his trade in the old blacksmith shop which stood about 40 rods to the west of the large white farm house. The shop has long since been torn down as has the barn which was razed around 1850.

The main part of the house stands as it was originally. And in 1913, the Mannings restored the interior to its early lustre. The lovely old fireplaces, wide floor boards and beautiful panelling have been brought back to the natural beauty and charm built into this old farm house some 20 years before our war for independence.

The lines of the house are simple early American and the grace that it radiates is typical of the ageless quality obtained by the early builder whose workmanship, still lovely today, bears out the age of the house by the plaque over the front door-way dated 1758.

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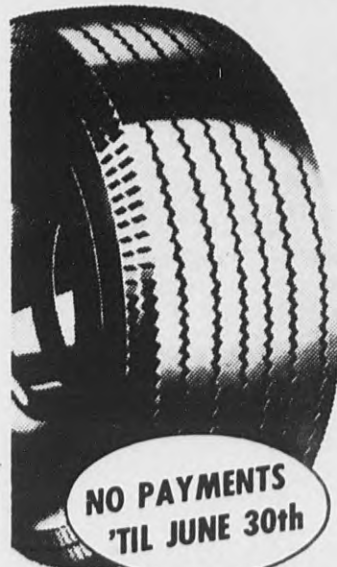

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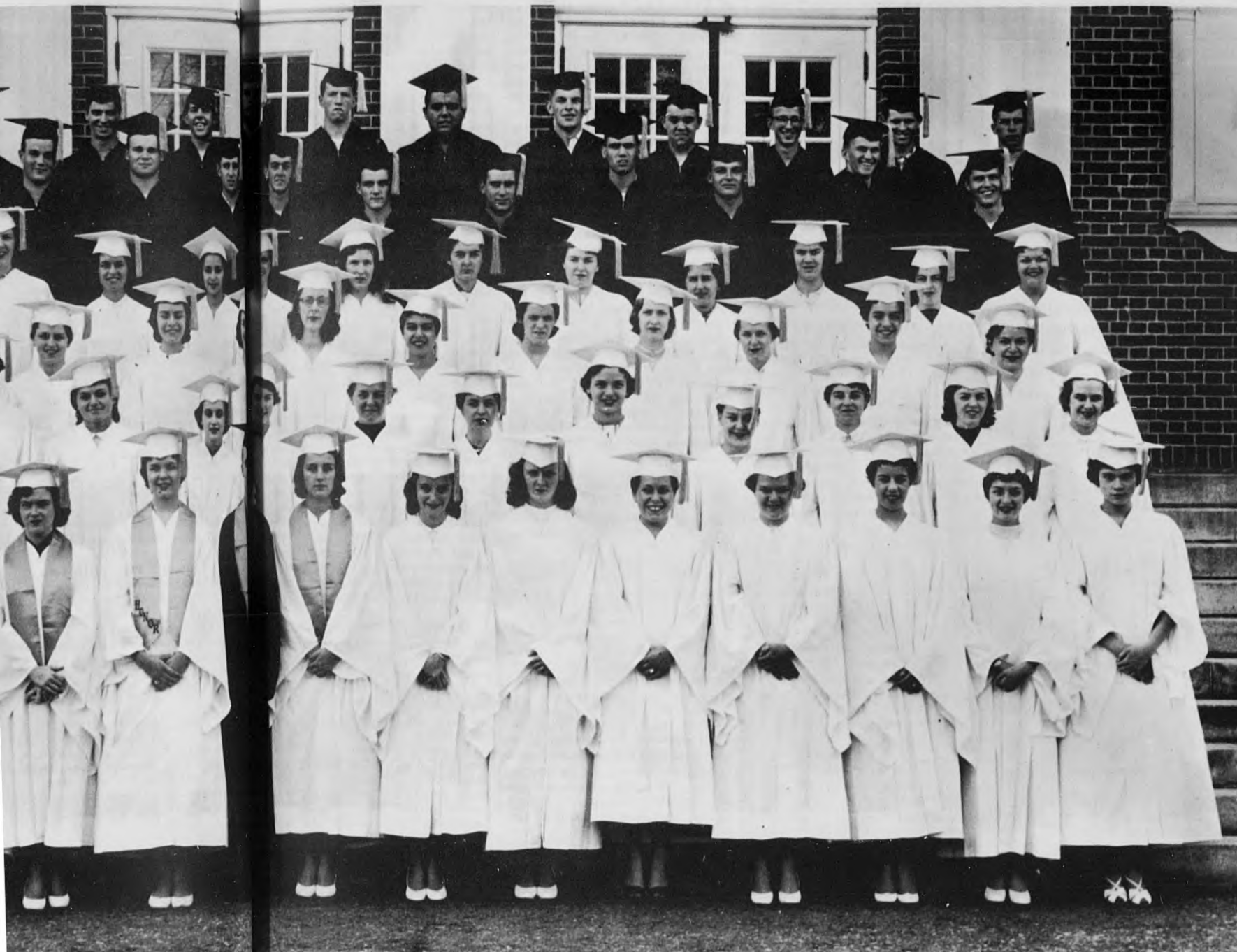

Planning Board Denies Zoning Change Request

A petition to rezone some 30 acres of land between Shawsheen rd. and No. Main st. to residential Zone A has been denied by the planning board.

Herbert Rines petitioned for the change and has already obtained signatures on a petition that could bring the question before a special town meeting. He has claimed that the annual town meeting's rezoning in the area - from A to B - works a hardship because surrounding land is in Zone A and because some lots would be up to 300 feet long in order to meet the area requirements of Zone B.

A public hearing June 7 in the planning board office was followed by the negative vote of the board. The main reason for disapproving the petition was that it constitutes spot zoning. The law says spot zoning occurs when land is indistinguishable from the area but is re-zoned for the economic benefit of one person.

The possibility of changing the road location in the area so as to meet Zone B requirements without hardship was also raised by the board.

Many PUNCHARD Grads Plan To Continue School

One-quarter of this year's PUNCHARD graduating class of 105 is expected to attend a four-year, degree granting college or university.

Guidance Director Bernard Kellmurray announced this week that 22 graduates have been accepted by colleges and universities; two are accepted by junior colleges; six will attend business, professional and technical schools; and eight will enter schools of nursing.

He also has announced scholarships of over \$6000 to members of the class from all sources. "A very large majority of members of the class who wish to go on to further study are doing so," he declared.

Stubbins, School Board Discuss So. School Plan

Hugh Stubbins of the Stubbins associates told the school board last Tuesday night that six to eight weeks will be needed to prepare plans for the South school for presentation to the town.

That work will be done for \$3500, under terms of an agreement approved by the committee and by Town Counsel Vincent Stulgis.

The architects specify in the agreement that they will be recommended, by the present school committee, to any subsequent building committee appointed through town meeting action. The fee for preliminary work will be deducted from the eventual overall fee if the firm is retained for the whole project, if approved by town meeting.

During a lengthy discussion with the school committee, the board's consultants and members of the Taxpayers' association, Mr. Stubbins agreed that his firm will do its best to get the best school for as little money as possible. Considerable time was devoted to discussion of problems such as room sizes, what could be cut from a building if it needs to be reduced in order to save money and allied subjects. The merits of two-story and one-story construction were also discussed.

Mr. Stubbins, although hesitant to name prices, told the committee that a building such as might be built from the present educational specifications could run to \$900,000 for construction alone. Following that estimate, the committee earnestly debated cutting room sizes and any other possible reductions that might bring the cost down.

Accident Took Two Lives Friday P.M.

Lannan, police said, was driving the car. He had been out of school for a year and was employed at the Mariner Combining co. in Lawrence.

Taylor was a junior at Central Catholic high school.

Lights Go Out

Police said the double-fatality occurred about 9:44 p.m., as the car apparently tried to make the curve. Lights in the neighborhood were extinguished, as several wires from the pole fell atop the car. Fire apparatus was called to the scene and emergency lighting was supplied for emergency workers. The fire alarm system was sounded by the impact.

The Rev. Henry B. Syvinski, O.S.A., assistant at St. Augustine's church, gave the last rites of the Roman Catholic church.

Police Chief David Nicoll led police investigators and was joined by Inspector Maurice Martino of the Registry of Motor Vehicles.

Hundreds were attracted to the accident scene and had to be kept clear of the car on which the electric wires were resting.

Lannan, a Central Catholic High school graduate of a year ago, was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph A. Lannan. Funeral ser-

Taylor, who was a graduate of St. Patrick's grammar school, was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Taylor. Funeral services were held Tuesday morning from the John J. Hart Jr. funeral home in Lawrence with a high Mass of requiem at 9 a.m. in St. Patrick's church. Burial was in Holy Sepulchre cemetery.

Cause of Death

Dr. John T. Batal said death in both cases was due to skull fracture and multiple injuries.

It was Andover's second fatal accident this year. The other happened March 29 when Elroy D. Wade of Walnut ave. was killed when his car hit a tree on Lowell st.
