Equipment Failure Drops Water Level

The routine daily check by Board of Public Works reservoir attendants on Monday morning revealed that the level of the high pressure reservoir on Prospect hill had dropped some 300,000 gallons during the previous 24 hours, according to information provided members of the Board of Public Works at Monday evening's meeting.

Ralph E. Preble, BPW engineer explained that on Sunday morning the low level reservoir on Bancroft rd. was checked. The gauges which govern the flow of water from the low to the high level system were in order. On Monday morning, the regular check was made and while the gauges were normal, it was found that the pumps had not been running.

Checking of the high level reservoir showed that the water level had dropped almost to the half way mark.

Mr. Preble ordered a pump taken to the corner of Bancroft rd. and Main st. and put into operation to replenish the high level

Girl Winning Polio Battle

An heroic story of the partial recovery from a crippling attack of polio suffered by Mrs. Elizabeth (Cooper) Brown, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Raymond W. Cooper of River rd. comes all the way from Granger, Iowa, where the former local resident now resides with her husband and four children on a farm home.

She was stricken in Aug., 1954 and was hospitalized from Oct. 24, 1954 to April of this year. In order that she could be treated at a respiratory center at Omaha, Neb., Mrs. Brown made a six and one-half hour trip in a 600 pound iron lung inside a moving van last July 6. When she returned from Omaha to her home this Spring she made the trip in three hours in a station wagon with a chest respirator.

Many of her relatives, friends and neighbors were present at the

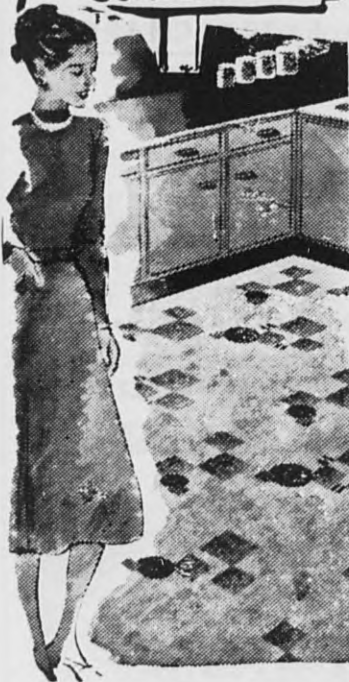
PUPPET MAKING GROUPS PLAN FOR SUMMER FUN

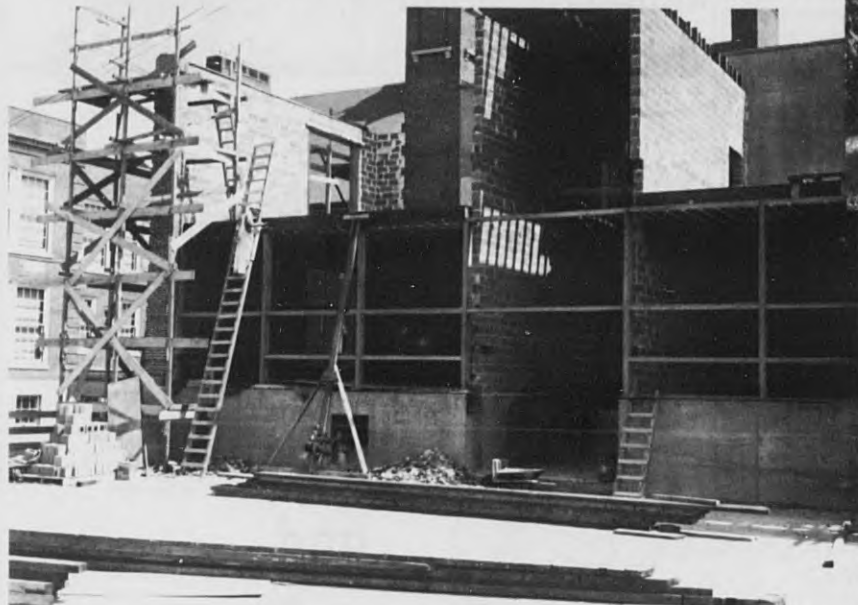

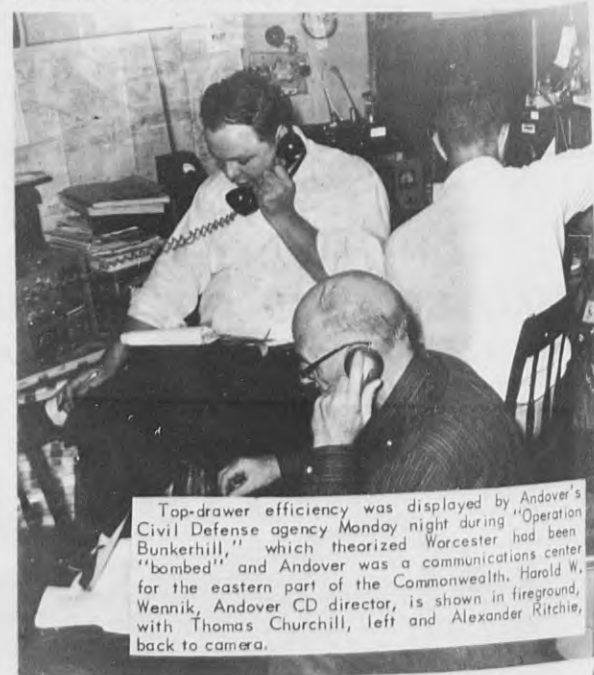

Route 110 Plans Would Dead-end No. Main Street; Cause Many W. Andover Changes

Andoverites driving to Lawrence sometime in the next 20 years may be taking a major route completely different from that of today.

Plans for the proposed Route 110 — published for the state department of public works — show such major changes as dead-ending North Main st. and wiping out a lot of McKenney cir.

Folks would drive to Lawrence via a widened Union st. or by using an improved South st. to So. Broadway.

West Andover Changes

West Andover folks would see drastic changes, if the present map is followed.

It shows the road, starting at the west boundary of the town, causing the relocation of Bailey rd. so as to travel parallel with the highway but with no access. There would be an overpass just to the north of the junction of Bailey rd. and Haggett's pond rd.

High Plain rd. would be a dead end — at a point north of its intersection with Wood Hill rd.

Route 110 would intersect the planned Route 28 slightly west of the town dump, where there would be a bridge over Ledge rd. and that road would be re-routed to Chandler rd.

Most of Greenwood rd. from Ledge to Chandler would disappear.

Some of Chandler rd. would be relocated and an overpass would go in south of Chandler rd. where it intersects with North st.

Interchange

At the Lawrence line would be an interchange, at the intersection

of Beacon st., with an overpass for travel to the cemeteries.

The proposed use of Union st. as the main road to Lawrence would involve dead-ending North Main st. slightly beyond the present intersection of Union and So. Broadway — with a widened Union st. then taking traffic into Lawrence.

It appears that Binney and Shepley streets would disappear, but perhaps Fletcher st. would remain nearly if not entirely intact.

Land-taking would appear to be tremendous for the new road — a highway with 111 feet width plus

sloping rights on either side. The map indicates that homes and land would be taken from the Boston and Maine railroad through the southern half of McKenney cir. to the Lawrence line.

May Be 20 years

While these plans, set forth in detail in a volume called "Master plan of Highways for the Lowell-Lawrence-Haverhill Areas", may cause some homeowners alarm — Commissioner John A. Volpe has stated that it may be all of 20 years before the plan is finished. At a meeting in Lawrence some months ago, he listed the Andover

section as being at least half way down on the priority list of sections to be constructed.

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It's A Tough Life

A politician's life is a tough one.

When his actions coincide with a citizen's own belief, he's a good fellow. To others, who don't agree, he's no good at all. Either way, he takes it on the chin from someone. Obviously, he can't be all things to all men, so the politician expects to incur the displeasure of some voters during his term of office — and just hopes that the majority are fairly well pleased with his actions.

That's a normal situation in politics. But when a politician finds himself in the middle for something he didn't do — that's really tough, for he is blamed by all sides, depending on their outlook. Either way, he can't win.

Such a situation confronts the three representatives from this district — Frank S. Giles Jr., William Longworth and Thomas Slack.

They are being blamed by both the proponents and opponents of town manager. Either way, they stand to suffer at the polls unless the voters stop to realize that the three men are in the middle of a situation over which they have no control.

It's no secret that opponents of the manager plan are angry because the representatives didn't block the bill in the Legislature. Proponents, on the other hand, have been displeased because they thought action was slow in forthcoming. Some even thought the representatives were actually blocking the measure, although that argument now is invalid because the bill is admitted for consideration.

Rep. Giles told the Legislative committee and some 300 townspeople, at the manager hearing last week, that he and his colleagues have no desire to mix into internal town problems. They want no part of the struggle between manager forces and those opposed.

We can't blame them for wanting to keep out of the middle — we probably would be the first to complain if they did start to meddle with what is a town problem.

Actually, the three men filed the bill at the request of the town meeting, through its official committee. Now the bill is in committee and a decision can be expected very shortly. All three men want to keep hands off that decision and that is as it should be.

All this leads up to the belief that no one here should base their vote for representative on the town manager controversy. For in this case, all three were the victims of a situation well beyond their control.

Having made that point clear, we want to state our position as lucidly as possible regarding the primaries this fall.

We believe that one Andover representative should be sitting in the House. The old balance — one from Andover, two from Methuen — should be recaptured. The only way to do that is to have one Andover candidate in the primary, not two or three as now appears probable. We are not advocating the defeat of anyone, but merely stating our belief that the district should have an Andover Representative.

Also attending is James Winters, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald J. Winters, 9 Fletcher st., another Pynchard junior. In a letter to the TOWNSMAN editor, Raymond writes as follows:

"Dear Sir:

"I am one of the boys picked to represent Andover's Legion post at Boys' State. Boys' State has an excellent program. The main purpose is to acquaint the citizen, as all the boys are called, with his local, county and state governments. This is done by his actual participation. There are eight towns and four cities in Boys' State. Since I come from a town, I was put in the town of Anzio.

"Boys' State is also separated into two parties, the Nationalists and the Federalists. I am a Federalist, my roommate a Nationalist. We have held the first sessions of our party conventions, the purpose of which is to nominate candidates for state office. We have just elected our town officials. The second project is being developed at the Indian Ridge Reservation. This is designed as a camping site for the Boy Scouts of the town. The Indian Ridge Reservation is located only a few minutes from the Center of Andover, between Reservation rd. and Red Spring rd. The tract of land covers about 25 acres of attractive woodland, with paths or trails to follow over the rolling landscape.

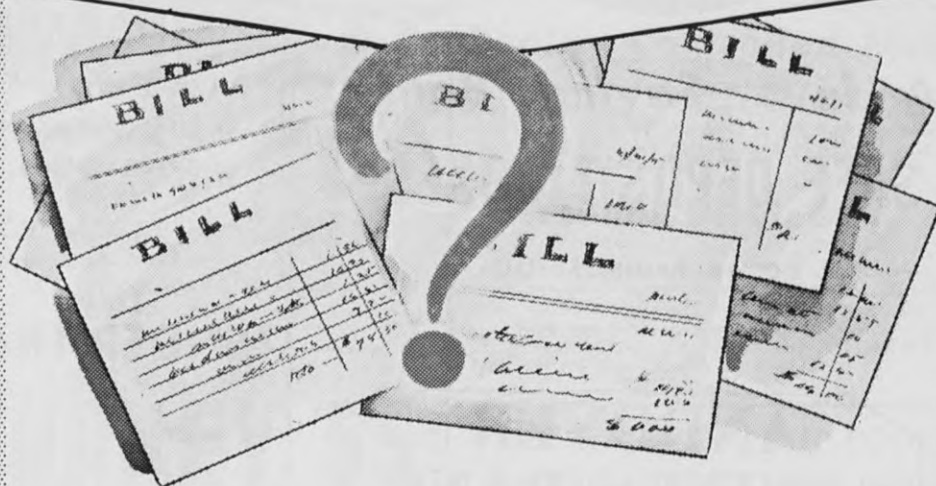

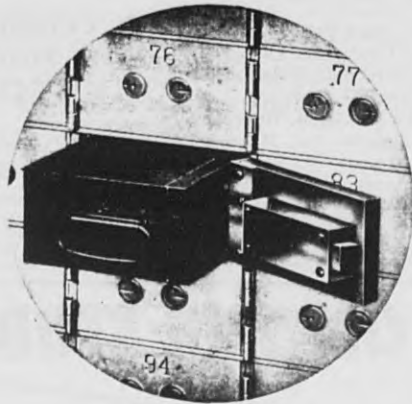

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Upton Family Lost Scalps To Indians Despite Fortress Home

The legends and lore centered around this fine old salt box type house are ones of fiery and violent havoc wrought by the Indian warriors of many years ago. The tranquil setting of today greatly belies the fact that one of Andover's most bloody attacks occurred at the Abiel Upton House on Osgood st. in the late 1600's or early 1700's.

Home And Fort

This sturdy farmhouse was built in 1699 by Thomas Blanchard, son of Samuel Blanchard who owned extensive property in the West Parish known as "Blanchard Plains". In the process of building his home, Thomas was compelled to erect it to serve a two-fold purpose - that of comfort for his growing family and as a fortress for his family against marauding Indians.

Brick Barrier

It was originally built in three sections. The first to be constructed was the west side which was heavily barricaded to provide a place of safety, followed by the east side which was needed by the growing family and the last section to be erected was the salt box and wood shed. As a defense against Indian bowmen and their arrows, the front portion of the house had a brick barrier encased between the inner and outer wall. The comfortable inside was heated by two massive open-hearth fireplaces 10 feet wide which, when stocked with dry logs, provided great warmth in the severe winters. The original upstairs bedroom is unique in that it is probably the only completely pine-sheathed room in existence in this area.

The original builder was a

cordwainer and the property remained in the Blanchard family for three generations until finally it was sold to Abiel Upton in 1792. Both Blanchard and Upton were shoemakers and traces of their trade utensils were uncovered at the property years ago during minor alterations.

Uptons Lost Scalps

It was during the occupancy of Abiel Upton that the tranquil farmhouse became the scene of a bloody attack by a band of marauding savages. These fiercely painted Indian braves with their gaudy headdresses flying in the wind swept down on the Upton house and circled it giving off hideous and blood chilling war-whoops before dragging the terrified Upton family into the field where they were unmercifully set upon and scalped - so goes the legend of the early Abiel Upton House.

The narrow dirt path in front of the house was at one time a heavily traveled thoroughfare leading from Andover to Tewksbury and was known as the "Old County Road".

This classic example of salt box type house has been altered only slightly in the past years and its lines and architectural quality have been preserved through careful maintenance while the restoration that has been done has closely followed the original design of this early American home.

This house is now owned and occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Glen Grant, whose love of early homes has done much towards keeping the authenticity of the Upton House as it was some two and one half centuries ago.

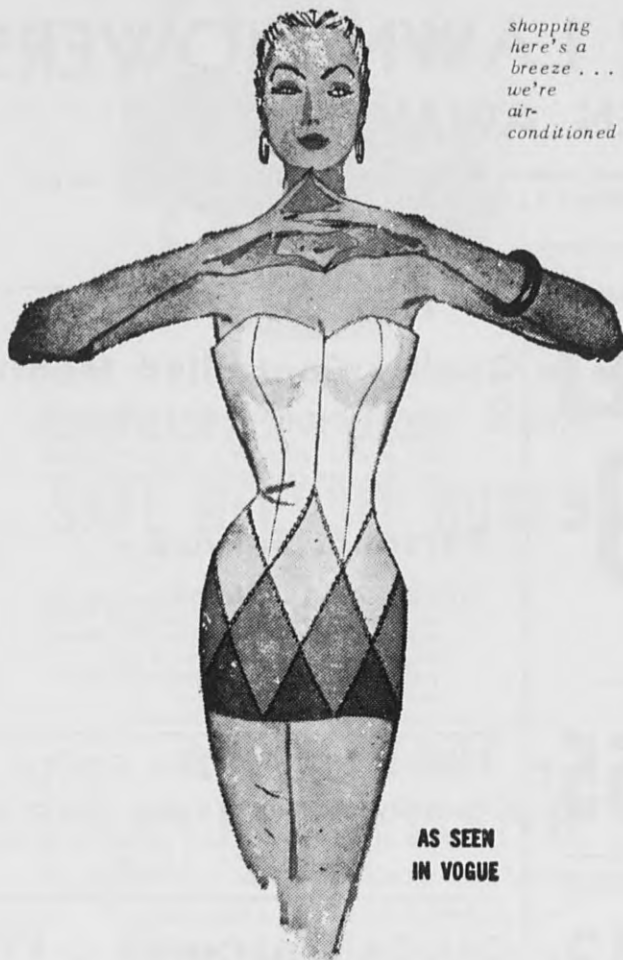

The pump was in operation for 25 hours and brought the reservoir back to normal.

Examination of the equipment showed that a check float valve which activates the flow of water into the high level system had become stuck. This was repaired and everything was back to normal.

Although the level of the high pressure system had fallen, residents were unaware of the fact and no complaints were received by the BPW office.

Engineer Preble explained that a restaurant which uses considerable water in automatic dish washing machines was closed on Monday. This establishment would have been the first affected by the lowering of pressure. Conditions were back to normal when the restaurant opened on Tuesday.

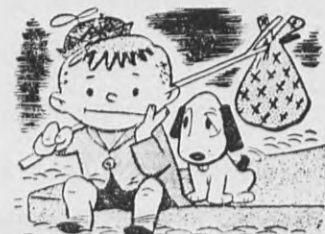

Recreational Areas Attract Thousands

Andover's recreational facilities, playgrounds and bathing beach opened officially this week and were thronged from the outset as ideal summer weather prevailed. Pump's pond waterfront and picnic areas opened on Monday, while registrations took place at the several playgrounds on Monday.

A total of 530 signed up at the playgrounds on the first day. This figure is expected to be much larger as additional names are added during the week. The playground leaders lost no time in making arrangements for special features to be held during the opening week.

George Snyder, supervisor of the playgrounds, reported the following figures for the first day, together with the week's special event: Central, 219; parade on wheels Friday at 10:30 a.m., Ballardvale, 110, hat show Friday at 10:30 a.m., Shawsheen, 86, doll and hobby show Thursday at 10:30 a.m., Indian Ridge, 79, hobby show Thursday at 11 a.m., North District, 36, costume show Friday at 3:30 p.m.

There are no age limits at the playgrounds, but there is a regulation that children of preschool age must be accompanied by an adult or a responsible older person.

The opening day crowd on Sunday at Pump's pond numbered more than 1000 children and adults. The average daily attendance has been about 800. Up to mid-week, a total of 694 had registered at the town's bathing beach. Swimming lessons will get underway next week according to a schedule now being arranged.

program. The celebration will get underway at 7 p.m. Monday, July 2, with a colorful parade of fire trucks, many of them from other communities.

The parade will form around the Sacred Heart school in Shawsheen Village. As many as 30 departments, including all of Greater Lawrence, Essex County and parts of Middlesex county, have been invited to participate. To stimulate interest, prizes will be awarded in a number of classes. There will be a prize of \$30 for the truck carrying the most uniformed fire fighters; \$10 for the newest piece of apparatus; \$10 for the oldest piece; and \$10 for the truck coming the longest distance.

Leaving Shawsheen square, the parade will proceed up Main st. to Central st., to School to Main to Elm to Summer to Whittier and to the playstead where the firemen's carnival will be officially opened.

The carnival, with a variety of rides, a midway, refreshment stands and everything else which will contribute to the enjoyment of all will be in progress until about midnight on Monday. The entire high school athletic field will be turned into a play area for the occasion.

Continuing on Tuesday, the day will be climaxed by the traditional Fourth of July bonfire which will be torched off at midnight and will glow into the early morning hours of Wednesday to welcome the great national holiday.

As the three day celebration nears an end on Wednesday, it will be marked by a fine display of fireworks which will open about 11:30 p.m.

To stress the safety feature of the stay-at-home observance of Fourth of July, a grim automobile wreck is to be set up in front of the Town House on Main street

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by police and fire officials. It will bear a warning "Don't Let This Happen to You," and will serve to remind all of the hazards of holiday travel.
