Proponents of the plan were in favor of having the question on the ballot in November when the presidential election is held. However, the committee ruled that it would be a matter for the town election in March and so rec-ommended to the General Court.





A Rosy Future

About everyone, including top level scientists cannot help but be amazed at the advance in technological achievement during the past decade or more. Indications are that only the surface has been scratched. More and more research centers are being opened across the land. Personnel to staff them are in demand.

This is good news to the college graduates who completed their education in June. Unlike their predecessors of a generation ago, they don't have to go out hunting for a job; positions are waiting for them.

According to one survey, an estimated 12 to 15 positions are available this year for every graduate of an engineering school. This is the profession in which there is the greatest need for brains to probe the amazing technological future. However, everyone isn't an engineer and there are other fields in which the demand for skilled professional help is great.

For every teacher turned out this year there are eight to ten jobs available, according to the survey. Business trainees are needed in the ratio of five to six jobs each. Liberal arts degree holders can select from three or four available openings.

Salaries are higher, too. Starting pay is up \$20 to \$25 a month above last year which up to that time had been considered a record maker. Engineers are drawing the fattest offers, ranging from \$350 to \$550 a month to start. Of course men are getting the best offers, the tops for women is shown to be about \$300 a month.

Cap and gowned college graduates of only a few years ago were pictured as about to face a harsh world in which many of their dreams would fade. Competition was tough; employers demanding.

The wonders of the electronic age have changed all that. The 1956 college trained individual can look ahead to fantastic developments, high standards of living and with much more leisure time. Never was the future more rosy for the June graduate who is being welcomed with open arms.

Play It Safe

The swimming season is just beginning, but already tragedy has struck in the immediate area. The loss of a boy's life is mourned by his family, his classmates and the entire community.

Every parent should take the time to instruct youngsters of the need for caution when enjoying aquatic recreation. Lifeguards are stationed at public bathing beaches to safeguard human life. They are trained in their work and their instructions should be obeyed to the letter.

Like police officers, they are quardians of public safety. They are there to help, not to hamper. Look up to them. Obey them. Play it safe!



New Regulations On Blood Donors

In order to clarify a change in the Massachusetts Department of Public Health regulations concerning blood donors listed as "F.F.O." or for fraction only, Andover chapter, Red Cross reviewed the specifications this week. The next visit of the Red Cross Bloodmobile to Andover is July 20, from 1 to 7 p.m., at the South church.

Persons with histories of either jaundice or malaria will continue to be rejected. Persons who "resided in an area where malaria was common, either by chance or due to taking suppressive drugs, may be accepted following two years' freedom from exposure" provided no manifestations of the disease have been evident during the time.

Red Cross officials explain that "for fraction only" means that such blood cannot be given in whole blood transfusions. It is broken down into its component parts in the laboratory and the useful parts are used for purposes other than whole blood transfusions.

School officials desired to do away with the antiquated structures as soon as quarters for their occupants could be secured. This was done through the cooperation of the eminary authorities.

District Attorney Joseph A. Dennison of Suffolk County, a former Andover boy, visited here and was greeted by many of his old friends and acquaintances.

James Perkins of Andover has purchased a Berkshire boar from the Hood Farm, Lowell. The animal is a blue ribbon winner.

Seventeen Ballardvale residents enjoyed a deep sea fishtrip and landed some 400 pounds of fish. The largest catch was a 14 pound pollock brought in by Gardner Shattuck.

25 Years Ago - July 1931

Andover's property owners are to be assessed for the first time this year on the basis of a scientific revaluation of the town which has been in progress for the past five years. It was carried out at an expenditure of \$15,000 and covers the more densely populated areas of the town. The system involves the keeping of a card file on which details of all property are recorded. Taxpayers may inspect the files to find out the basis of their tax charge, and may also observe several large maps which have been produced.

Work on the new Route 28 by-

Work on the new Route 28 bypass from South Main street to the Salem Turnpike in North Andover is nearing completion. Wet weather for the past few days held up the laying of asphalt. State engineers say the work will be completed in about two weeks and the road will be opened to traffic which will by-pass the center of Andover.

John A. Robertson, chief lifeguard at Pomp's pond reports that swimming classes have been held up because of the wet and cold weather. Classes are held Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 2:30 p.m.

When the weathervane on the 165 foot steeple of the South church was taken down for the first time in eleven years for painting, it was found that some expert marksman had put a rifle bullet through the thin arm supporting the vane. The accuracy amazed police and workmen.

Police Chief Frank M. Smith announced that the traffic lights at Main and Chestnut streets had been readjusted because of complaints from motorists. Many travelling on Chestnut street said they had the red light for only ten seconds, while those on Main street were allowed a full minute.

Andover's selectmen joined in a protest over the delay of reconstruction of Route 28 from Andover Academy to Reading. The town expended \$8000 for new hydrant installations in anticipation the road would be constructed as planned. State house hearing is scheduled to air reasons for the delay.

10 Years Ago - July 1946

A \$35,000 sewer extension project, voted at the annual town meeting, has been held up by the state department of corporations and taxation. The state bureau pointed out to the selectmen that the town voted to borrow the money on a five year note. Towns in the Commonwealth are required to do such work on a 'pay as you go' basis. The decision did not work much hardship, however, as materials for the sewer extensions are hard to obtain because of wartime shortages. Progressing according to schedule is an extensive \$135,000 program of water extensions, in cluding installation and 16 inch mains. This project is being aided by the post-war rehabilitation fund and will insure greater pressure in several areas of the town.

A fifth playground, West Center, was added to the town's recreational areas as the outdoor season opened. Residents of West Parish raised more than \$100 with which they hope to purchase hard-to-get playground equipment. A five team baseball loop will be one of the features of the recreational calendar dur-

ing the summer months.

The annual outing of the Women's Union of the West Parish church will be held at Salem Willows. Mrs. Arthur Lewis is chairman of the committee.

Pigeons owned by Arthur K. Jenkins of Ballardvale road were among those used in a unique industrial survey. Members of the Wakefield Racing Pigeon club took birds to various sections of New England. Information petaining to employment, production, etc. of various plants was obtained, attached to the pigeons and the birds took off to their home lofts. The information was telephoned to a center in Stoneham where it was correlated.

Final Report On Water System Survey Is Due

A final report on the survey of the high service water system being conducted by the firm of Camp Dresser and McKee as a preliminary to the construction of two additional reservoirs in the lown is expected in about a week, according to advices received by the Board of Public Works.

The request for additional time in which to complete the survey accompanied a progress report delivered to the BPW at the last meeting. The communication was as follows:

"We had planned to submit to you by this date our completed report on the engineering investigation of the existing highservice system and the proposed new high service system to serve the area west of Lowell street.

"Our studies have been completed insofar as new mains are concerned, and the proposed longrange program of reinforcements and extensions is shown on the attached map.

"We have not yet completed our study of pumping equipment because detailed studies indicated he desirability of studying the main pumping station at Haggetts and as a whole rather than merey the new equipment for the proceed high service area. As you know we plan to recommend replacements of the two existing steam-turbine driven pumps at the Haggetts Pond station with new electric motor-driven pumps which will be capable of pumping either to the new high service system or into the present low service system of uring emergency periods. A diesel engine generator will provide power during periods of power outage.




