#### South School Problem

The need for a South school is very great.

And probably most men and women are sincerely anxious, as are we to have a new school in the southern

But now we again come close to a time of decision and frankly, the picture looks rather grim. Estimates based on state averages - places the overall cost at about \$922,000. An estimate by the State Building Assistance Commission was somewhat lower, although that agency had omitted consideration of sewage disposal, an item calculated at \$25,000. In any event, it looks as though the eventual cost will be well over \$900,000 and that doesn't take rising costs into consideration. There have been warnings, for instance, that steel will go up again as a result of the wage increases granted last

Reasoning on the basis of a \$900,000-plus school, however, we must point out that there has been considerable debate in the past about building a school for considerably less money. The Taxpayers association urged the sum of \$850,000 at the March town meeting and since then, construction figures have been cited tending to prove that a building can be built for less than that. On the other hand, there have been figures quoted that would seem to prove we'll be doing well to build a school at the average state-wide cost of \$17 per square foot plus equipment, fees, sewage disposal and site development.

We fear that the element of confusion will so overpower us all, as we try to unravel the complexities of the situation, that the school will be disapproved again - more out of misunderstanding than from unwillingness to spend enough for a modern school.

There is only one way for us to avoid the confusion that results from too many statistics all tending to prove their sponsor's point of view.

We should, first of all, proceed on the assumption that the architects have done what they set out to do - planned a building that can be constructed as inexpensively as possible while maintaining the proper educational standards. We should insist that the architect's estimates, when presented this month, be as close to accurate as possible so that we won't be faced with the prospect of being asked later for more money for the building.

Perhaps most important of all - we should receive a specific recommendation from the five-member committee appointed as consultants. They are men wise in the ways of construction and finance. When that group makes its report, we should accept its judgement - not blindly, but with the feeling that these men are experts in their fields and have spent the time to thoroughly know and understand the situation.

If that group recommends the school, it should be approved at a special town meeting - even if a horde of well-meaning individuals begin to offer counter suggestions. For no man, on the spur of the moment, can come up with an alternate plan of as much value as one which has been thoroughly considered by many men before being offered to the voters.

We say leave it to the experts to make a decision and then accept their opinion.

### Rockingham Traffic

What a blessing it will be when Route 28 is relocated. Then, perhaps, we will escape the race track traffic

that clogs our roads every summer.

While we don't object to anyone going to the track if they want to - it being a matter of personal beliefs - we do object to the traffic problem created, specially on the return trip. This is not entirely an Andover problem, for the traffic snarl runs all the way through Methuen.

If you wonder what we mean by snarl - try driving from Andover to Methuen or Andover to Lawrence any evening when the race track traffic is heavy.



While here, Dr. Reynolds continued his education, receiving a student in the law for the la

doctorate in theology from Harvard university in 1952.

He served as president of the Andover Association of Congre-gational Churches and Ministers and the Andover Inter-Church Basketball league. He was active in Boy Scout work and in other community affairs.

His letter, which specified Aug. 26 as the effective date of resignation, said: "Dear Friends:

"After prayer and careful delib-eration, and with a sense of per-

sonal loss, I am reluctantly ten-dering to you my resignation as pastor and teacher of the Free Christian church, to take effect on August 26, 1956, to accept the position of Associate Professor of Religion and Philosophy in Pacific Unive Grove, Oregon. University, at Forest

'The Manse family has been living in your midst for 11 years, and during that time many strong, fast friendships have developed, which will ever be bright spots in our memories. We are grateful for the cooperation which we have

had throughout, and for all the in-numerable acts of kindness and helpfulness which have made life so much more pleasant. The peo-ple of the Free Christian church, and the whole community of Andover, will always have a special place in our regard and affecttions.

"The strength of a Church is the strength of the Christian con-secration of its members. We re-joice that as we leave we have had such marked evidences that the people of the Church are con-cerned for all the work of the Gospel, and have grown in devotion and in stewardship. Our increased attendance at worship, our fine choirs, our present interest in sound evangelism and Christian education all speak well for the men and women who are giving so generously of their time, treasure and talent that the Church may grow. Of especial note are the two most important items in our recent history; the purchase of the Manse and the successful completion of the renovations and extensions project. As we remember these things we feel that we can leave without regret, confident that the church will go on under new leadership to greater ser-vice for the Kingdom of God. "May God in His love and mer-

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cy bless you in all your ways, and by His Spirit keep you ever faithful to Him who is the Way, the Truth and the Life, our Lord Jesus Christ."

### Will Visit Memorial Hall Library Soon

The Memorial Hall library will act as host to one or more visit-ing librarians from Italy this summer and early fall, under the American Library association's Program of Educational Exchange for librarians.

Miss Margaret E. Munroe, Director of the program, in considering libraries to which the newcomers were to be assigned, selected those which stress a close link between community and library programs.

For one month, members of the group are to work together at Rutgers University in New Brunswick, N.J., where there will be classes to point up the general concepts and problems of Amer-ican society and American library service. During this time, each will have preview material to acquaint him with the community into which he will go. This has given the vitising librarians time to plan for those points on which they wish to concentrate their attention when they go out for the field work period. Dr. Alberto Guarino, director of

Biblioteca Universitaria, University of Cagliari, Sardinia, will visit the Memorial Hall library early in August for a brief time. Cagliari, with a population of 113,000, is the principal town

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and seaport of Sardinia. Dr. Guarino's position there com-bines duties of university libra-rian with those of a public librarian, operating a network of many small town or village deposit li-braries. His interests center about administration policies, techniques and services in the public library field.

In September, for a longer per-iod, the library will have as its guest Dr. Luigi Cremascoli, di-rector of Biblioteca Comunale

Laudense, of Lodi.

It is hoped that the two librarians will attend affairs in the community during their stay here and that there will be opportunity for them to speak to groups on subjects related to Italian cul-ture, librarianship, and their impressions of American society.
