## Andover Bank & Merrimack Bank Of Haverhill Plan To Consolidate

The Board of Directors of the Merrimack National bank of Haverhill, established in 1814, and the Andover National bank of Andover, established in 1826, have voted to consolidate the two banks, according to a joint announcement by Charles W. Arnold, president of the Merrimack

bank and Abbot Stevens, president of the Andover bank. The proposed consolidation is subject to ratification by the stockholders of both banks and must be approved by the Banking Supervisory Authorities before it can become effective. Meetings of the stockholders of both banks are to be held to act on ratification this coming September when it is contemplated the consolidation

will go into effect.

The consolidated institution will continue to present five offices, including the main office of the Merrimack bank in Haverhill and its branch offices in Merrimack and Georgetown, and the two offices of the Andover bank in Andover and North Andover.

The officers of the consolidated bank are to include Abbot

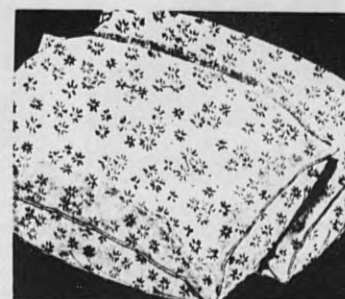

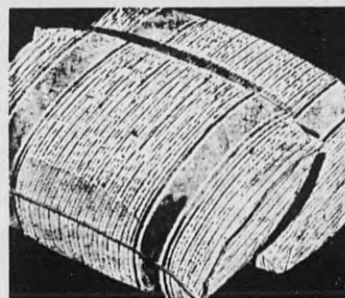

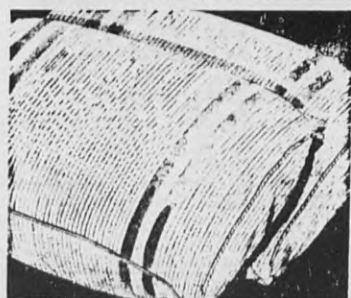

### ANDOVER BANK PLANS CONSOLIDATION

(Continued from Page One)

Stevens as Chairman of the Board; Charles W. Arnold as President; Wallace M. Haselton, now Executive Vice President and Cashier of the Andover bank, as Executive Vice President and Edward A. Ingalls, now Vice President and Cashier of the Merrimack bank, as Vice President and Cashier. It is expected that all of the other officers and employees of the two banks will occupy the same respective positions in the consolidated bank which they now occupy with their present banks.

The Board of Directors, to consist of all of the members of both banks, will include Charles W. Arnold Jr., Andover; Chesley T. Bixby, Haverhill; Wallace E. Brimer, Andover; Anthony Cogswell, Plaistow, N.H.; Louis S. Finger, Andover; Burton S. Flagg, Andover; Wallace M. Haselton, Andover; Chester W. Holland, Andover; John M. Kemper, Andover; W. Clifford McDonald, Haverhill; William T. Moore, Andover; Edward C. Nichols, Andover; James G. Page, Haverhill; James R. Page, Haverhill; H. Nelson Pingree, Georgetown; Lyman B. Pope, Kingston, N.H.; Byron H. Sargent, Merrimack; George F. Sawyer, Andover; Abbot Stevens, North Andover; Horace N. Stevens Jr., North And-

over; Henry L. Taylor, Haverhill; Arthur H. Veasey, Haverhill; Arthur H. Veasey Jr., Haverhill and William Watson, Haverhill.

Messrs. Arnold and Stevens expressed the view that the union of these two outstanding Essex County banks, with total assets of approximately \$22,000,000, will result in benefits to the customers and stockholders of the two banks as well as the general public. Consolidation of the facilities of these banks will give added strength and greater ability to service the financial requirements of their customers.

The new institution will have an initial capital structure including capital, surplus, undivided profits and reserves of over \$2,200,000 and a greatly increased lending limit. Customers will be able to make deposits, cash checks, borrow money and transact other banking business at the same offices which they now use or, if they wish, at any of the four other offices, all of which are conveniently and strategically located in the towns mentioned above.

The capital stock of the consolidated bank is to consist of 35,000 shares of common stock of \$20 par value a share. Of these shares the stockholders of the Andover bank are to receive 17,500 shares and the stockholders of the Merrimack bank are likewise to receive 17,500 shares in exchange for their present stock holdings.

Mr. Arnold and Mr. Stevens state that since both banks are approximately equal in size and have built up their businesses under their individual names and since it is planned that the capital stock of the consolidated bank is to be distributed 50 percent to the stockholders of each bank, it was important to select a name for the consolidated institution that would reflect this equality and continue, so far as feasible, use of the names of the two banks.

The directors and management of both banks therefore unanimously agreed, after careful consideration, that a combination of the two names by alphabetical sequence would be most desirable. Thus the consolidated bank will

be known as The Andover and Merrimack National bank, a name which seemed to best reflect the equal position of both banks.

The program for consolidation recognizes, according to the presidents of both banks, the importance of retaining local resident management and the retention as directors of the consolidated institution of all of the members of the Boards of Directors of both banks. Thus each area that is now served by the two banks will have continued representation on the board of the consolidated bank as assurance that the same high quality of service that has so materially contributed to the growth of both banks will be continued.

in-all quite an assortment of trash through which the women of the Thrift shop pick their way from day to day.

The gift card actually contained a petition asking the selectmen to take appropriate action to see that Post Office ave. is accepted — and refer the matter to any other board if necessary. Many signatures were on the document.

The selectmen promptly referred the whole matter to the Planning board — but didn't say whether the boxes of refuse would be referred also.

**Planning Board**  
Chairman Sidney P. White said the entire problem belongs with the planning board, which can allow variances in the regulations governing road conditions. If that board decides to approve acceptance of Post Office ave., he said, it will then go to the board of public works. If that board also gives approval, then the selectmen can lay it out. Then the town meeting gets a final say, he explained.

The subject has come up several times recently, as property owners and persons using the avenue asked that it be accepted so that big holes can be filled, rubbish and junk cleared away and kept away and the road maintained as others are in the town.

The selectmen have refused to accept the street under the emergency law passed by the legislature last year, pointing out that Post Office ave. does not come under the same heading as streets thought to be accepted but not recorded. They said the avenue has always been a private way.

**Neared Agreement**  
White also said that an agreement was nearly reached several years ago that would have found property owners paying the cost of fixing the avenue and putting in a catch basin — all for the approximate cost of \$2250. But the agreement never became final and the avenue continued without repair.

It was understood that the debris delivered to the selectmen resulted from a recent comment by Mr. White that he didn't believe a shovel full of rubbish could be collected there — following a

promise by one abutter to deliver a shovel-full of material to the town house.

## South School Problem

The need for a South school is very great.

And probably most men and women are sincerely anxious, as are we to have a new school in the southern end of town.

But now we again come close to a time of decision and frankly, the picture looks rather grim. Estimates — based on state averages — places the overall cost at about \$922,000. An estimate by the State Building Assistance Commission was somewhat lower, although that agency had omitted consideration of sewage disposal, an item calculated at \$25,000. In any event, it looks as though the eventual cost will be well over \$900,000 — and that doesn't take rising costs into consideration. There have been warnings, for instance, that steel will go up again as a result of the wage increases granted last week.

Reasoning on the basis of a \$900,000-plus school, however, we must point out that there has been considerable debate in the past about building a school for considerably less money. The Taxpayers association urged the sum of \$850,000 at the March town meeting and since then, construction figures have been cited tending to prove that a building can be built for less than that. On the other hand, there have been figures quoted that would seem to prove we'll be doing well to build a school at the average state-wide cost of \$17 per square foot plus equipment, fees, sewage disposal and site development.

We fear that the element of confusion will so overpower us all, as we try to unravel the complexities of the situation, that the school will be disapproved again — more out of misunderstanding than from unwillingness to spend enough for a modern school.

There is only one way for us to avoid the confusion that results from too many statistics all tending to prove their sponsor's point of view.

We should, first of all, proceed on the assumption that the architects have done what they set out to do — planned a building that can be constructed as inexpensively as possible while maintaining the proper educational standards. We should insist that the architect's estimates, when presented this month, be as close to accurate as possible so that we won't be faced with the prospect of being asked later for more money for the building.

Perhaps most important of all — we should receive a specific recommendation from the five-member committee appointed as consultants. They are men wise in the ways of construction and finance. When that group makes its report, we should accept its judgement — not blindly, but with the feeling that these men are experts in their fields and have spent the time to thoroughly know and understand the situation.

If that group recommends the school, it should be approved at a special town meeting — even if a horde of well-meaning individuals begin to offer counter suggestions. For no man, on the spur of the moment, can come up with an alternate plan of as much value as one which has been thoroughly considered by many men before being offered to the voters.

We say leave it to the experts to make a decision and then accept their opinion.

## Rockingham Traffic

What a blessing it will be when Route 28 is relocated.

Then, perhaps, we will escape the race track traffic that clogs our roads every summer.

While we don't object to anyone going to the track if they want to — it being a matter of personal beliefs — we do object to the traffic problem created, specially on the return trip. This is not entirely an Andover problem, for the traffic snarl runs all the way through Methuen.

If you wonder what we mean by snarl — try driving from Andover to Methuen or Andover to Lawrence any evening when the race track traffic is heavy.

He was first elected to the Legislature in 1946. He has served on the committees on Civil Service, Election Laws, and the powerful Ways and Means committee. In 1953 the then Speaker of the House, Charles Gibbons, appointed Rep. Giles as Majority Whip, Assistant Republican Floor Leader, and a member of the Committee on Rules.

At the present time he is serving as Minority Whip and member of the Committee on Rules. He also serves as liaison officer between the House of Representatives, Governor's office, and all state agencies.

He has served on the recess commission to study the textile industry, the special commission on the overloading of trucks, and the congressional redistricting commission.

For the past 16 years he has been associated in an executive capacity with a nationwide theatre chain.

He was an original Eisenhower delegate, being elected from the sixth Congressional District in 1952. In April of 1956 he was again elected a delegate from the sixth Congressional District to the Republican national convention in San Francisco. He has been elected by the Massachusetts delegates to serve as their representative on the committee on permanent organization for the national convention.

He has been a delegate to the last three Republican state conventions in Worcester and is a member of the Republican State committee and the Methuen Republican Town committee.

Rep. Giles filed the original bill for Route 28 from Boston to the New Hampshire line which is now in the process of construction.

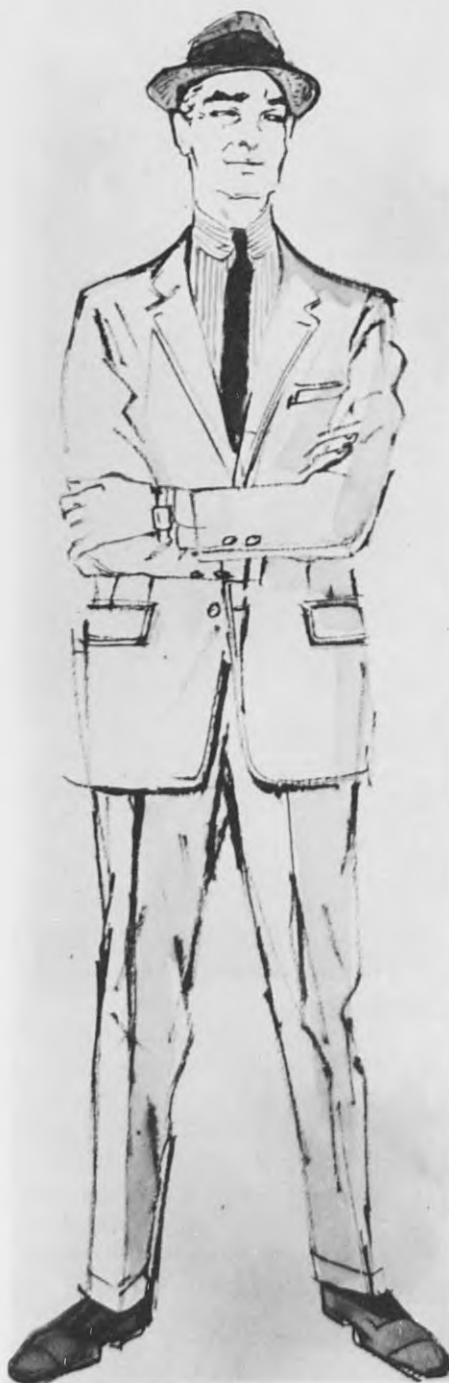

Dr. Reynolds began his pastorate here Sept. 10, 1945 and was installed by the council in December of that year. Prior to his service here, Dr. Reynolds held pastorates in Franconia, Colebrook and East Jaffrey, N.H., starting as a student minister before his ordination in 1934.

While here, Dr. Reynolds continued his education, receiving a doctorate in theology from Harvard university in 1952.

He served as president of the Andover Association of Congregational Churches and Ministers and the Andover Inter-Church Basketball league. He was active in Boy Scout work and in other community affairs.

His letter, which specified Aug. 26 as the effective date of resignation, said:

"Dear Friends:  
"After prayer and careful deliberation, and with a sense of personal loss, I am reluctantly tendering to you my resignation as pastor and teacher of the Free Christian church, to take effect on August 26, 1956, to accept the position of Associate Professor of Religion and Philosophy in Pacific University, at Forest Grove, Oregon.

"The Manse family has been living in your midst for 11 years, and during that time many strong, fast friendships have developed, which will ever be bright spots in our memories. We are grateful for the cooperation which we have

had throughout, and for all the innumerable acts of kindness and helpfulness which have made life so much more pleasant. The people of the Free Christian church, and the whole community of Andover, will always have a special place in our regard and affections.

"The strength of a Church is the strength of the Christian consecration of its members. We rejoice that as we leave we have had such marked evidences that the people of the Church are concerned for all the work of the Gospel, and have grown in devotion and in stewardship. Our increased attendance at worship, our fine choirs, our present interest in sound evangelism and Christian education all speak well for the men and women who are giving so generously of their time, treasure and talent that the Church may grow. Of especial note are the two most important items in our recent history; the purchase of the Manse and the successful completion of the renovations and extensions project. As we remember these things we feel that we can leave without regret, confident that the church will go on under new leadership to greater service for the Kingdom of God.

"May God in His love and mercy bless you in all your ways, and by His Spirit keep you ever faithful to Him who is the Way, the Truth and the Life, our Lord Jesus Christ."

## Italian Librarians Will Visit Memorial Hall Library Soon

The Memorial Hall library will act as host to one or more visiting librarians from Italy this summer and early fall, under the American Library Association's Program of Educational Exchange for librarians.

Miss Margaret E. Munroe, Director of the program, in considering libraries to which the newcomers were to be assigned, selected those which stress a close link between community and library programs.

For one month, members of the group are to work together at Rutgers University in New Brunswick, N.J., where there will be classes to point up the general concepts and problems of American society and American library service. During this time, each will have preview material to acquaint him with the community into which he will go. This has given the visiting librarians time to plan for those points on which they wish to concentrate their attention when they go out for the field work period.

Dr. Alberto Guarino, director of Biblioteca Universitaria, University of Cagliari, Sardinia, will visit the Memorial Hall library early in August for a brief time. Cagliari, with a population of 113,000, is the principal town

and seaport of Sardinia. Dr. Guarino's position there combines duties of university librarian with those of a public librarian, operating a network of many small town or village deposit libraries. His interests center about administration policies, techniques and services in the public library field.

In September, for a longer period, the library will have as its guest Dr. Luigi Cremascoli, director of Biblioteca Comunale Laudense, of Lodi.

It is hoped that the two librarians will attend affairs in the community during their stay here and that there will be opportunity for them to speak to groups on subjects related to Italian culture, librarianship, and their impressions of American society.
