## Realty Construction, Planning Board Confer Over 66-Lot Elm St. Plan

The Realty Trust company, whose 66-lot plan for the Burton property off Elm st. has been before the planning board several times, has agreed to confer with the BPW over water availability and road grades in the area.

Judge Alfred Sartorelli, representing the firm, sat down with the Planning board last week in an effort to iron out the many problems of development in the section. He stressed that he talked only of the Burton property — not the Flying Feather farm on the other side of Elm st., which the firm also owns. It has been said that the firm will not devel-

op the latter area.

### Legal Points


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

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### REALTY AND PLANNING BOARD CONFERS

(Continued from Page One)

The firm filed the plan March 5 - five days before town meeting when lot sizes were increased to 30,000 square feet in that area. Formal notice and legal forms were filed March 6 with the town clerk. He specified May 3 - "over 45 days later" - as the date of a letter disapproving the plan.

Sartorelli then cited several legal cases tending to show that a zoning change is effective only when it has received the approval of the attorney general and not on the date of the town meeting action.

Then he pointed out that planning board is allowed 45 days in which to act on a definitive plan and, if it does not, a certificate of approval must be issued by the town clerk.

Sartorelli said Town Clerk George Winslow had been asked June 19, in an exchange of correspondence, to issue the certificate because the planning board had not acted within the 45 days. Winslow, the judge said, replied that disapproval had been denied April 16. But, continued the realty's legal representative, when he personally looked at a list of approvals and disapprovals of the town clerk's office, he found the Realty plan listed under disapprovals - but under a time stamp date of June 26.

Once again, the attorney said, he wrote Winslow asking for the certificate and this time, he continued, the town clerk wrote that town counsel advised against re-issuing it at this time.

He reminded the board that a certificate is issued there no longer any planning board control of the project. "Penalties are heavy for planning boards that do not act in 45 days - and stiffly so," he stated. However, he repeated his intention of reaching a satisfactory compromise without standing on the legal position.

Atty. Vincent A. Stulgis, Attorney's town counsel, asked Sartorelli "How can the building inspector give you a permit to build lots that are smaller than the law now requires?" After some discussion on that point, Atty. Fredric O'Brien, a planning board member, suggested that an impasse had been reached over points of law - and asked "Would not be more satisfactory for you and for the town of Andover to have those plans drawn to conform to the present zoning by-law? Would it not turn out in the long run to be easier for everyone?"

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Brien also pointed out implications, school-wise, of 66 new families in that section. Sartorelli replied that nothing could be done about it except to add on a sum to each home and contribute it to the town for a school - but that, he said, is illegal in Massachusetts.

The matter of a road grade, marked at 10 percent on the plan, next came up. Rules here call for a maximum of six percent grade.

### BPW Conference

The planning board suggested that Sartorelli confer with the board of public works on the grade and also on the water problem - known to be severe in that section. Chairman Allan Flye told the Realty representatives that they should write for an appointment for the first meeting of the month, Sept. 10. Sartorelli told him that more than 30 days delay now will mean putting off the whole project until next year at considerable expense, but finally agreed to confer with the BPW before again talking to the planning group. It was made clear that the board would be governed by a BPW opinion on water availability and the road grade.



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## Post Office Ave. Acceptance Is Referred Again

A joint meeting of town officials, scheduled for September, will be asked to consider the plight of Post Office ave.

The Planning board referred the problem to that joint meeting, after receiving a petition asking that the avenue be accepted by the town. The selectmen first received the petition but said it properly belonged with the planning board.

The board said a recent selectmen's statement to the effect that the planning agency could waive rules on street widths and conditions was technically in error — that the board can indicate that it will not insist that conditions and widths be adhered to minutely.

Also discussed was the possibility that the area might become an off-street parking area so that the town could control the section without the red tape involved in street acceptance. Members of the planning board pointed out that any problems of filth and rubbish in the street could be taken care of by the board of health at any time.

## Will Discuss Betterment Act

Betterment assessments will be considered at the board of public works meeting next Monday night.

The board will ask Town Counsel Vincent F. Stulgis to sit in with the board to discuss which water connections should be placed under the betterment act. For some weeks there has been some discussion about placing water extensions on betterment when they are done for the benefit of the water system primarily, rather than for the benefit of persons who may use the water.

is the item of greatest prominence to come up at the meeting, there are perhaps 30 articles to go in the warrant. The board of public works Monday night listed six articles, including Rogers brook improvements and Mr. White said the selectmen have about 20 articles already in hand from various sources.

It will be recalled that a request for a pay raise was contained in a petition presented by firefighters and policemen many weeks ago, to be taken up at the special meeting. The Planning board also had seriously considered one or two zoning articles for the special session.

The Taxpayers association some time ago filed a special article, with sufficient signatures, relating to the appointment of a building committee for the new South school.

It was the board of public works that requested a brief delay in the call for a special meeting. Board Chairman Allan Flye told the selectmen that a week or so would be needed to get sufficient information for all the articles considered necessary by the board. Included on the list will be an article to extend the sewer past the site of the new building, a project that must be estimated and measured by the town engineer.

Also on the list of BPW articles is \$5000 for snow and ice removal — although the sum also covers some needed equipment such as spreaders and a plow.

Rogers brook will be up again as will a \$5000 article to clean the brook of assorted rubbish, but without dredging of any description.

Other BPW articles discussed Monday night were the South school sewer project, parking area between Whittier ct. and Chestnut st., seizing land on Prospect hill for the new reservoir and accepting land from Fred Cheever on Spring Grove rd. to straighten the curve.

The Rogers brook article, defeated at the annual town meeting last March, then called for the expenditure of \$317,922 and will be raised by seven percent in the special article to meet increased costs since March. It will still ask for the money to be the town's half of anticipated state help.
