School Enrollment At 2752; Has Doubled In 12 Years

Abbot Academy Enrollment Up

Abbot Academy opened its 128th year with its largest enrollment, 223 students, which includes 180 boarding students and 43 day students. Among the boarding students are girls from Japan, the Philippines, Columbia, Venezuela, the Bahama Islands, Aruba (Netherlands West Indies) Panama, Trinidad and Jamaica (British West Indies).

A number of the new students, as well as some of the returning girls, are housed in two dormitories opened this year for the first time. Sunset Lodge, originally

REGISTRATION OF VOTERS SCHEDULE ANNOUNCED

The enrollment breaks down this way: Kindergarten, 217; first grade, 259; second, 252; third, 265; fourth, 292; fifth, 229; sixth, 218; seventh, 204;

department vehicles generally go too fast.

The accident happened on Shawsheen rd. as the jeep passed a car which had for some distance refused to pull over when Cole sounded the siren. Ritchie said Cole passed the car on the crest of a hill, pulling out into the left hand lane and thus into the path of his daughter's car coming in the opposite direction.

Cole's Report

Cole's statement read from the accident report he said was made out the day after the accident, and before Ritchie's charges were aired, differed sharply from the original complaint.

At that point, Cole related, he saw the Ritchie car coming and stopped the jeep. It was then hit by the Ritchie car, going at a speed he estimated at 30 m.p.h. Cole said tire marks showed the distance in which the jeep was stopped but he could find no tire marks indicating that brakes had been applied in the Ritchie car with any great force.

Selectman Stafford Lindsay said Cole had called him and told him the same set of facts very shortly after the accident. Chairman Sidney P. White emphasized that Cole was not answering to any charges but was merely being given the opportunity to tell his story to the board.

Hilton's Report

Meanwhile, a report from Chief Henry Hilton told selectmen that two occupants of the Ritchie car told him they were blinded by

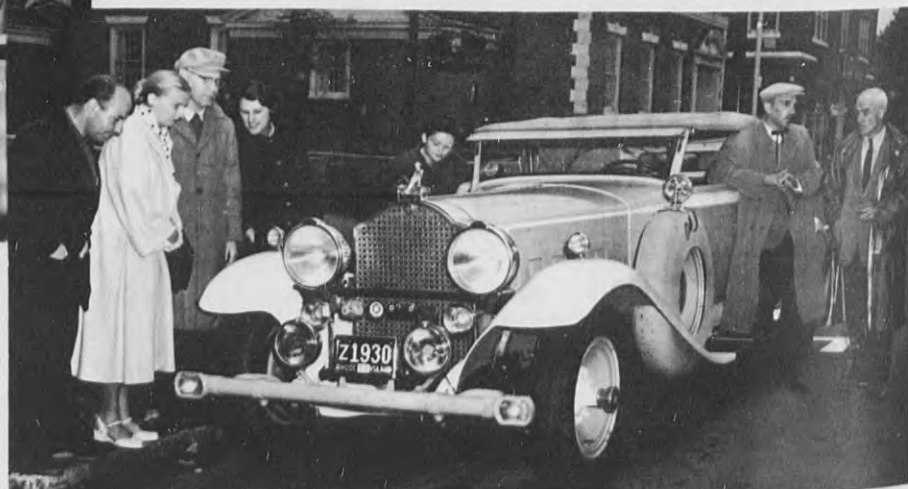

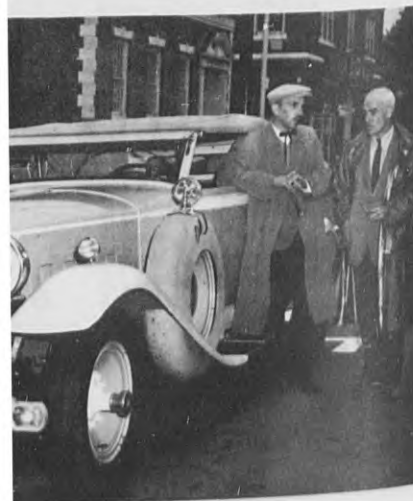

CONTINUE TO DEBATE MILK BID PROBLEM

peared before the board to find out what the specifications would be and why the previous plan for supplying milk is to be abandoned.

Mr. White stressed the necessity of providing good milk for the children and asked many questions about the specifications regarding Grade A herds, location of the dairy from which the milk would come and whether it must be disease free. He also asked the committee whether it would consider skimmed milk from the north mixed with Ohio cream or whether the milk must be pure.

He pointed out that the Walnuthurst dairy and his Wild Rose farm have shared the milk business for many years, with Wild Rose supplying the elementary schools and Walnuthurst the high and junior high schools. They charged 5 1/4 cents a half-pint last year.

Expressing confusion over what brought the matter up, Mr. White then charged that someone asked the Glennie milk company to ask for some of the business. In response to a question from Frederick Allis Jr., White said he had proof. He pointed out that the local dealers have given great service over the years, picking up extra milk and giving full credit to the schools, absorbing the loss when school is suddenly called off for a day and

making deliveries two or three times a day when needed. He also said bottles are purchased in the spring but are in demand only for this type of business — thus the dairies would have quite a loss through having the bottles already on hand for the school year.

No Cross Exam

At one point, as Mr. White asked several questions of the board, Chairman Roy Russell said it was his understanding Mr. White wanted to suggest proper items to be included in the specifications — and that the board wasn't to be "cross-examined".

The board did decide that the matter should be discussed again next week, with the possibility that a change in procedure might be delayed for some time based on the loss each dairy might suffer through any sudden cancellation.

It was during the discussion with Mr. White that member Allis pointed out that old, informal ways of doing things have to change as the school system grows larger. He was answering White's question as to why bids should be called for now after so many years of operation the other way.

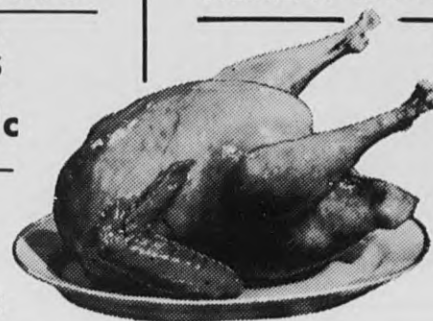

Another School Problem

Just when everyone thought the South school issues were nearly solved—with all parties in substantial agreement on price and design—there comes a possible road block.

It appeared last week in the form of a debate over the makeup of the building committee and what part the school committee should play in construction supervision.

The Taxpayers association suggested a building committee of nine, to be reduced to five after the contract is let for the school. Four of the eventual five would be the present consultants—John Erwin, John Sullivan, Edward P. Hall and Charles Hatch. The fifth would be a member of the school committee, designated by that committee to serve as its representative. Up to construction time, the committee would include all school board members and the four consultants.

Earlier, the school committee had asked for a building committee composed of all its members, plus the consultants which would follow through with all details until the building is completed.

While this may seem a small problem—it is not. For members of the school committee seemed adamant in their position while the Taxpayers association said its proposal will be offered on the floor of town meeting if the school board doesn't agree ahead of time.

We don't like the prospects of a floor fight over the building committee. It could easily become such a heated debate that the actual school article might be endangered for it is, we believe, the taxpayers' plan to amend the school article itself. It is difficult enough to get a two-thirds vote on a substantial project such as this without a vigorous fight that might create animosities which would carry over into the vote on the school.

Wouldn't it be far easier to reach a compromise solution?

Perhaps there is a middle ground on which the school committee and Taxpayers association could agree. If there is, we can only hope that thinking men on either side of the question will not hesitate to reach that agreement rather than insist, perhaps to the detriment of the South school, that they are entirely right.

Both groups should seriously consider a compromise that would avoid a serious, all-out floor fight. And sober-thinking individuals in town who are in favor of a new school in the Vale should lend whatever weight they have with either group towards a solution that will save the school.

ject for the New England Olympic committee. The more they thought about it, though, the more it seemed that everyone should have a chance to get into the act, to take part in the activities.

So the two men called a meeting of many Andover citizens and put the idea up for discussion.
Week-Long Event

And what resulted will make headlines across the country. For the men decided to stage a whole week of events, including every possible organization in the town, the churches and the townspeople.

"We're trying to give the Olympics back to the people. It's their game", DiClemente explained.

"How many people know or care about the Olympics?", he asked, while pointing out that the Andover Olympic week, if copied across the country, would give everyone a chance to learn about the Olympics and take part in supporting them.

After that first organizational meeting, committees were set up to plan events for every day in the week. Nationally-known athletes were asked to take part and responded willingly. Even the internationally-famous Helsinki Girls gym team promised to come.

Wednesday - Swimming and water ballet under direction of Gertrude Goss, at Phillips pool; outstanding swimmers and divers from Harvard and Yale and an exhibition by the Red Cross;

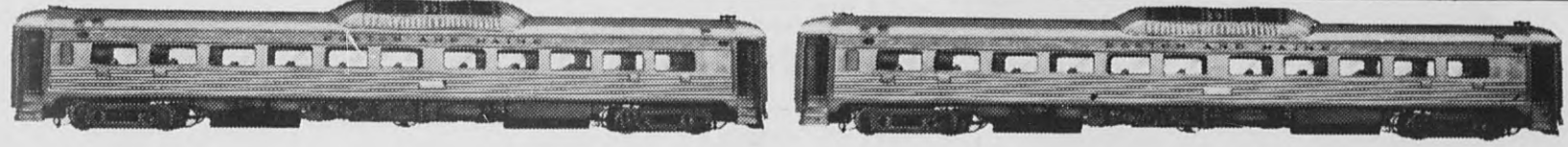

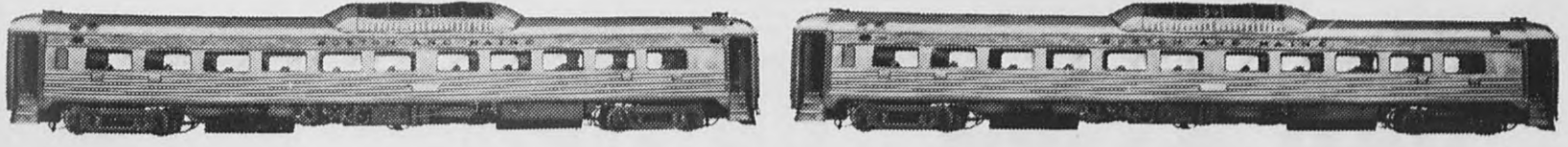

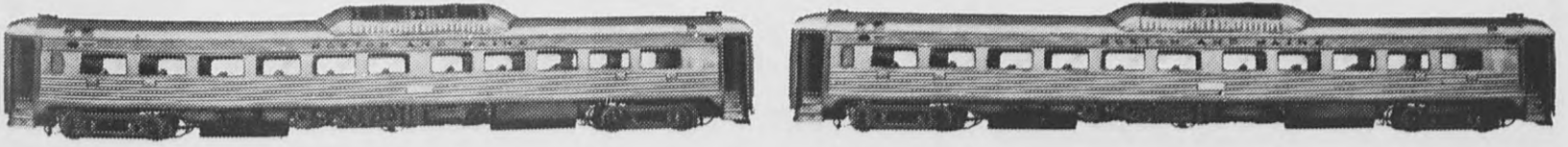

zoning at the annual town meeting but the planning board-sponsored article was defeated then. It would create acre lots with 200-foot frontage instead of the present 30,000 square foot lots with 150-foot frontage.

Dr. Ray Youmans told the board "I'm against it very definitely. I think the zoning is changing so fast no one can keep up with it. It was defeated on a fair vote at town meeting".

Many Favor Change

Many of those attending the hearing called for the change because of drainage, sewage, water and school problems that might arise through general development in the area.

George Laaff told the board the proposal "was defeated because people were not aware of its vital importance to the town". The months have proven its value, he stressed, because of examples of the striking acceleration of building here.

Mr. and Mrs. John Forbes called for larger lots, based on immediate problems of water supply, drainage and sewage plus the school situation if 500 new homes should be built in a short period in that section.

Engineer Ralph Preble, responding to a question, said the difference in lot sizes from Zone B to C would have very little effect on the water distribution system but the problem of supply would be more serious. However, he added that the BPW is now studying water supply sources, with the hope that another year should find the town in a position where it could get more water from some other sources if it is needed.

Added Expense

Alex Henderson, a BPW member, told the planning board added street frontages - from 150 to 200 - would be added expense to the town in maintenance, added expense per lot in water extensions and that homeowners would find themselves paying more on betterment assessments because of added frontage requirements.

Others at the session insisted that acute problems facing the town already would be magnified greatly if the West Andover section should be developed rapidly.

Planning Board Member Fredric O'Brien pointed out that he can think of no development in the town on acre lots, except occasional building along accepted ways, but developers do create sub-divisions where Zone B requirements prevail.

Doyle Plan

Shortly after the hearing ended, the planning board was confronted with a plan for some 44 house lots off Argilla rd. and the almost-non-existent Old County rd. Fred Doyle presented the preliminary drawing, prepared by the Andover Engineers Inc. The firm is a new one composed of BPW Chairman Allan Flye, Town Engineer Ralph Preble and assistant Town Engineer Donald Bassett. The plan is adjacent to another which also included some 44

house lots and planning board members pointed out that the two plans indicated the beginning of development in the area up for rezoning.

the school committee.

Wolfson said the committee makeup would allow the school committee to have ample opportunity to make decisions on the school but would then turn over supervision to persons with experience in that field.

The school committee's article on the South school lists a building committee including all members of that board plus John Erwin, supervisor of new construction for Western Electric; John Sullivan, a banking official; Charles Hatch, attorney and member of the Finance committee and Edward P. Hall, town official and builder with some 40 years' experience in the field. The four consultants would remain under the taxpayers version, but only a single school committee member would serve as sort of a liaison man during the construction period.

Against Plan

Members of the school committee presented arguments against the plan - pointing out that their interest is high and they wish to finish the job they started. The board was authorized by town meeting to investigate the needs and draw preliminary plans for the school. At various times there have been efforts, including one special article by the Taxpayers association, to have

a special committee appointed.

Members of the board of consultants declined to express opinions on serving nearly alone on the building committee but several times mentioned the necessity, under any conditions, of maintaining close contact with the school board.

Women Voters Plan Fall Program

The fall program of the Andover League of Women Voters starts this week with a buffet luncheon today. A finance drive begins on Oct. 1. Mrs. John Pickering and Mrs. Gerard Bradford have arranged for the luncheon meeting at the Boston University Conference center and Mrs. Sherman Drake has obtained as a speaker, William F. Clark, who is director of Business Services and Secretary of the School Committee in Newton. His subject will be school construction.

The finance drive is headed by Mrs. Adair Miller, assisted by Mrs. Richard Peters and their committees. The League is financed about 33 percent by members' dues and the remainder of funds comes chiefly from contributions by members and public-

spirited citizens outside the League. No salaries are paid to any workers, directors, or officers at any level in the League and all funds go for League works. The total planned budget this year for the Andover League is \$1730, with \$650 of that sum to be raised from outside contributions.

Call For Bids On Route 28 Bridge

A giant step forward in the construction of Route 28 has been taken by the state department of public works.

The department called for bids, returnable Oct. 16, on the bridge superstructure. That project is estimated at \$1,260,000 and will not begin until the legislature takes final action on the highway bond issue now before it.

Commissioner John A. Volpe said work will be completed within 600 calendar days of the time work starts — but warned that steel deliveries are about 15 months from the date of order. It is expected that the bridge itself will be finished late in 1958. Work has progressed all summer on the sub-structure.

The first step in building the

road itself will be a section from the bridge to River rd., Volpe has announced. He said plans are being drawn in the hope that a call for bids may go out before the end of this year.

The bridge will be a four-lane divided road, with a four-foot center strip. It will include a 13-foot passing strip and a 12-foot travel lane on each side plus a two-and-a-half foot catwalk for workmen. There will be no pedestrian traffic allowed. The bridge will measure 1164 feet, supported by 10 spans. The largest will be 175 feet long over the river channel. The shore-to-shore distance is 750 feet and there will be 30 feet clearance at the channel at high water. The department estimates a total of \$2,500,000 for the bridge when landtaking is included.
