


The state has asked for a couple of weeks to consider the town's request for permission to take land around Haggett's Pond.

Let's Have Competition

Last year at this time several candidates had formally To Speak Here announced their intentions for various offices. But so far this year there has been only a single announcement.

We hope the slow start doesn't mean a lack of interest among capable men and women in seeking to serve their townspeople in elective office.

For competition, though it means a strenuous campaign, is important. Through vigorous contests, the issues become more sharply drawn. The abilities or inabilities of the candidates become more obvious.

In no circumstance does an uncontested office serve anyone well except the candidate who happens to be unopposed.

We don't for a minute suggest, by asking that all offices be contested, that present elected officials should or should not be reelected. Rather, we believe that the voters should have a legitimate opportunity to select the person they believe best for the job. And that can only be done by having at least two clearly qualified candidates for each position. Although some office holders traditionally have had no opposition, we don't believe it does them or the town any particular credit for there certainly can be found at least one other qualified candidate whose name should be on the ballot. Voters don't like to be a rubber stamp, asked only to give a complimentary vote to an unopposed candidate.

Thus we hope there will be a lot of interest and a lot of candidates. That way we can get a true expression from all the voters.

Tax Rate Findings

We note with interest that a special commission on tax equalization has listed the equalized tax rates of all Massachusetts communities if they were figured on a full market value basis.

Andover, for instance, would have a tax rate of \$24.33 if property was figured on its full market value. It's present rate is \$60 per thousand.

Taking an average for 80 communities with population between 10 and 50,000, in which Andover falls, the average tax rate is \$58.59 and the average equalized rate would be \$27.23.

The value of listing equalized rates has been stated by the Massachusetts Taxpayers Federation. That Federation's publication points out that comparisons between communities on the basis of tax rates is subject to error because many types of assessment policies are in existence. But the equalized rate, the Federation believes, gives a valid comparison between communities.

The Federation found, for example, that the actual tax burden is greatest in the cities and highly-populated urban areas although tax rates in many smaller communities are higher than those in the populated centers. Thus, the Federation points out, the real problem lies in the larger towns and cities although many persons have been citing for several years the small towns as the problem areas.



The holidays are over, school has started again and in the various classes there are four new faces.

It was a big day yesterday for the Kun family. Not only did Mr. start his first day of work as a local carpenter, but the three boys, Rezsoe, Josef and little Laszlo were entered in the Central Elementary School. The two older boys will be in the third grade and as they learn more of the English language, they will be allowed to move on and upward. Laszlo is in kindergarten and with the very young it seems to matter little that his vocabulary so far is limited to such words as "hello", "good bye", and, of course, "thank you".

Then there is Tibor Toth, a 15 year old Hungarian refugee, who started his first day at Punchard High. Tibor cannot speak any English either, but that did not lessen his eagerness to get started in school. It was not so very long ago that Tibor was on his way to another school far away in his native Hungary. As he boarded the school bus, a gun was thrust in his hand and he was told to start shooting. The fighting and bombing began and Tibor never saw his parents or his younger brother again. He doesn't know what happened to them. Later, much later, he crossed in the darkness of the night over the border, into Austria and towards freedom. Since his arrival in Andover, just two weeks ago today, he has been taken into the home of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Szabo on Shawsheen rd. and is already considered without a question of a doubt a member of their family. Despite the language barrier, Tibor has already made many triends in Andover; has proved himself a whiz at algebra; and shows promise of being a fine athlete
