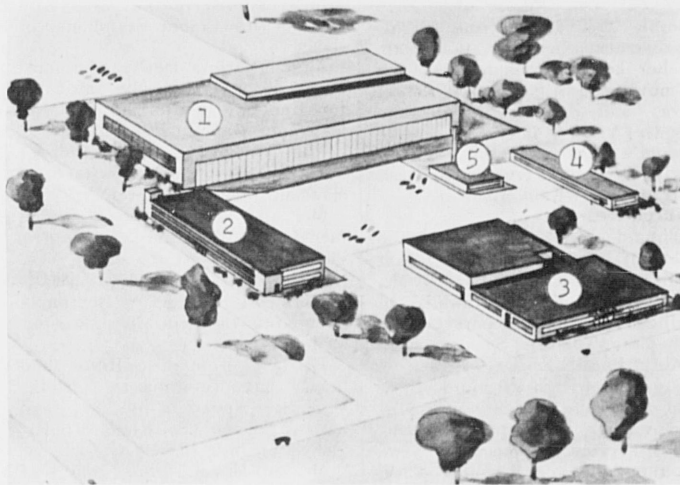
BPW Starts Its Land Taking At Haggett's Pond

Registered voters of the town can take a giant stride towards securing the proposed nuclear fuel research and production plant for West Andover tomorrow at 2 p.m. by attending the special town meeting.

Or, if laziness and apathy prevail, voters may find themselves defeating the plant.

The meeting, as most men and women now know, had to be summoned quickly to make one simple zoning change. It merely transfers the responsibility for the West Andover industrial area to the Board of Appeals from the Board of Selectmen or its appointees. There is no argument over the proposal for there is no lessening of supervision and control, merely a shifting of it from one board to another.

And because there is no controversy, there is danger that too few voters will attend the meeting.

The magic number is 350. Without that many voters, no business can be transacted.

Please, make an effort to attend the meeting. Don't depend on others going - go yourself, to make a quorum certain.

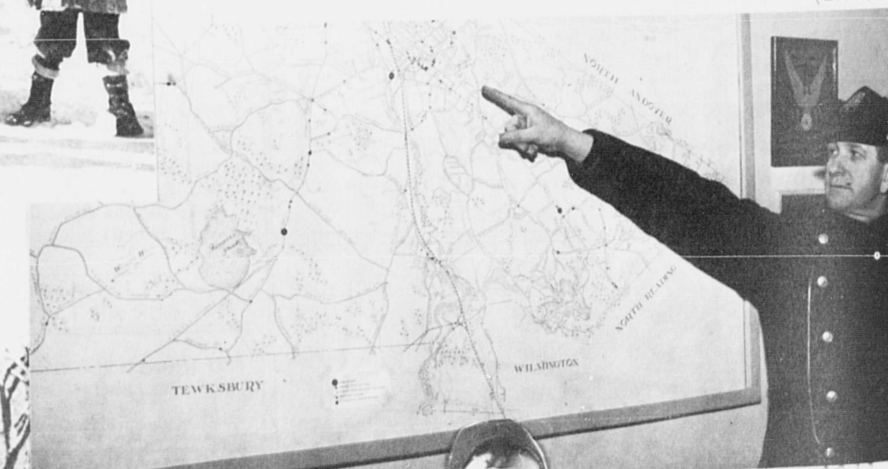

appointees are now designated to hold that responsibility as a result of town meeting action March, 1956.

Walter Kingston, general manager of Sylvania Electric Company atomic energy division will be here for the afternoon session to answer any questions that arise.

Joining town officials this week asking all voters to attend a session was the Taxpayers Association. That body pointed out the advantages of having the town locate here in a statement issued by President Henry Wolfson. A copy was sent to every voter.

The Planning Board, too, was on record as favoring the change. By a unanimous vote, the Board approved altering the existing law. The Board held a hearing last week as required by law and will have its opinion ready for town meeting if requested to give it.

Taxpayers Letter

"What will your tax rate be in 1957? What will it be in 1958? 1959? In 1960? You the voters Andover can determine what it will be.

"As you know, the Andover Board of Selectmen has called a special town meeting for Saturday, Jan. 5, 1957, at 2 p.m. The warrant for this meeting contains one specific article, to amend Zoning By-Laws to bring them into conformance with state changes that have been made in the Laws of the Commonwealth. This is required in order to make fully effective the decision of voters at the last annual town meeting when the Andover industrial zones were set up.

"You have probably read of large expenditures of various kinds which face Andover in the few years and the drastic increases in revenue which will be required to finance them. soundly developed and adequately controlled industrial area provide a substantial portion of this revenue. The Sylvania-Corning proposed Nuclear Fuel Facility gives Andover an auspicious opportunity in this endeavor. However, in order to speed the development changes in the By-Laws are necessary.

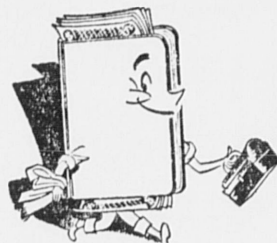

The holidays are over, school has started again and in the various classes there are four new faces.

It was a big day yesterday for the Kun family. Not only did Mr. Kun start his first day of work as a local carpenter, but the three boys, Rezsoe, Josef and little Laszlo were entered in the Central Elementary School. The two older boys will be in the third grade and as they learn more of the English language, they will be allowed to move on and upward. Laszlo is in kindergarten and with the very young it seems to matter little that his vocabulary so far is limited to such words as "hello", "good bye", and, of course, "thank you".

Then there is Tibor Toth, a 15 year old Hungarian refugee, who started his first day at Punchard High. Tibor cannot speak any English either, but that did not lessen his eagerness to get started in school. It was not so very long ago that Tibor was on his way to another school far away in his native Hungary. As he boarded the school bus, a gun was thrust in his hand and he was told to start shooting. The fighting and bombing began and Tibor never saw his parents or his younger brother again. He doesn't know what happened to them. Later, much later, he crossed in the darkness of the night over the border, into Austria and towards freedom. Since his arrival in Andover, just two weeks ago today, he has been taken into the home of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Szabo on Shawsheen rd. and is already considered without a question of a doubt a member of their family. Despite the language barrier, Tibor has already made many friends in Andover; has proved himself a whiz at algebra; and shows promise of being a fine athlete.
