Promises Two Crews On Job

The C. DiMartino Co. will begin work on some 8000 feet of water main installation Oct. 21.

His contract was awarded Monday night by the BPW, following written assurances that the work will be finished within 35-40 working days "unless excessive ledge" is encountered.

The firm was the lowest of 22 bidders, coming in with a price of \$24,281.25.

Engineer Joseph Lawlor, representing Camp, Dresser and McKee, wrote the Board that the firm had been investigated as is customary and enjoys a good reputation and financial standing.

Quarterback Jim Bennett pitched Andover to its first victory in three games Saturday, when he hit Frank Carelli with a game-winning pass, with only 10 seconds left. The final was Andover 19, Billerica 14.

In touchdowns, the teams were even-up late in the fourth period, but Andover's failure to score two after-TD points looked like the margin between victory and defeat.

Bennett tossed three passes in the Blue Devils' march for the final and game-winning score. He hit Dave Simpson at the Billerica 45, then George Reed at the 25. When Billerica's defense tightened at the 20, Bennett hurled the game-winner to Carelli, who carried from the 10. Simpson added the point.

Billerica scored first in the game, going 65 yards early in the

Sputnik excited little interest here Tuesday morning - the first time local residents had a real opportunity to see the Russian-made satellite.

Actually most men and women, if they got up in time, saw the rocket used to put the satellite in position. Most, though, preferred the warm comfort of their beds instead of rising before 6.

Commented Town Tax Collector Jim Christie, whose curiosity was great enough to get him up: "It looked just like a jet passing by at night. Just a light, moving along".

The news Monday predicted the satellite would be visible in the northwest at 6:08 a.m. and move to the southeast.

"My clock said just 6:08 when I saw it", Jim recalled.

Most comments on sputnik centered around what it's doing up there, rather than its appearance. As one man put it:

"I don't like the idea of that thing looking over our shoulder."

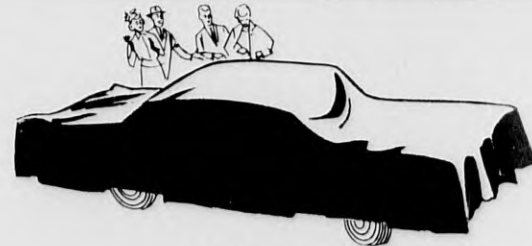

The contract for well installations has been awarded to the R.E. Chapman Co. for \$10,611.

The BPW has allowed some \$20,000 of the over-all job for engineering fees and contingencies. At this time, with bids yet to be requested for the pumping stations and electrical equipment involved in the operation, somewhat over \$110,000 has been allocated out of the \$280,000 voted at town meeting. Also yet to be discussed are land damages involved in taking considerable property around the wells.

The Finance Committee approved the water main installation price Monday night.

Seeks Over \$100,000 Under Chapter 90

Major highway construction under Chapter 90 funds has been planned by the Board of Public Works.

recently placed the town's bid for more than \$100,000 worth of street work in 1958 before the Essex County commissioners.

The Board requested approval for a new Ballardvale bridge, at \$60,000; Andover st. reconstruction from the bridge to Woburn st., \$27,000; Elm st., from the square to near Washington ave., where the state highway begins, \$20,000; and some \$7000 worth of maintenance work on Chapter 90 roads in town.

Normal Chapter 90 construction financing calls for a one-fourth payment by the town, one-fourth from the county and half from the state. Maintenance funds are furnished differently, one-third coming from the state and the remainder from the town.

Bridge Needed

The Ballardvale bridge construction project was voted some weeks ago, following this summer's emergency when the bridge began to give way. A major repair effort has succeeded in keeping the bridge from becoming impassable, but the Board has felt that a steel and concrete structure should be erected. At present the bridge has been narrowed so that only one truck can use it at a time. Engineers had expressed some doubt that continued two-way use could be allowed without setting up vibrations from passing trucks that would be dangerous to the bridge.

An effort will be made to have this project placed under a separate financing category, so that the town will be asked to dig up only one-fifth of the funds, while the county would pay one-fifth and the state three-fifths.

Andover st., where the sewer was put in this summer, will be used more extensively when the new South School is completed. And the Board felt that, instead of repairing the surface after the sewer construction, it should be re-built to stand the increased use. If any funds are left from the current Shawsheen rd. reconstruction, the Selectmen have been asked to request they be used on Andover st.

The Shawsheen rd. project, underway on a bid of \$54,000, took precedence over a contemplated Ballardvale rd. widening and some \$10,000 originally set aside for Ballardvale rd. had been encumbered for the Shawsheen rd. project. Another \$10,000, from Chapter 718 (road bonding money) plus county and state funds add up to about \$80,000 now available for Shawsheen rd., which means, officials believe, that a sizeable amount will be left over.

Down the Years with The Townsman

50 Years Ago - October, 1907

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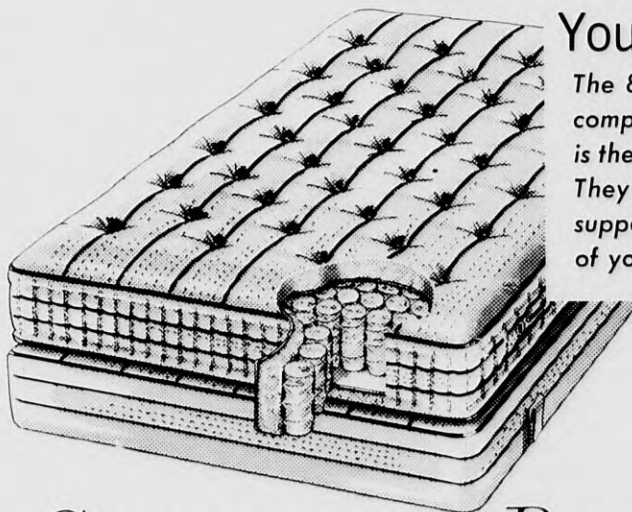
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Independence Of Mind

Andover — and particularly Ballardvale — lost one of its most remarkable citizens last weekend.

Steven T. Byington, well known to hundreds of 'Vale residents, died in Lawrence General Hospital at the age of 88.

He was a man who had accomplished much in his life time. Dedicated to a task that most individuals would shun, Mr. Byington translated the Bible from its ancient language. Along the way, he had to teach himself the languages and did so without hesitation. Other languages also came his way, until finally he spoke or read many.

While Steve Byington was known best here as an inveterate writer of letters to the editor — and as that medium-height man who walked from Ballardvale to town at least once a week, without hat and always in sneakers — he also had friends across the country with whom he corresponded about many serious subjects. Many were men like himself, serious, thoughtful and intelligent and they wrote about scholarly matters.

Mr. Byington was an active man, mentally and physically — quite a mountain climber until he was 82. Although he was studious and spent much of his time with his Biblical translation, he always kept abreast of current events and sometimes corresponded with newspapers and periodicals across the ocean.

Andover lost a truly remarkable man when he died.

For in the face of odds so tremendous that most trained scholars would have turned to other fields, Steven Byington held steadily to his conviction that the Bible must be translated into modern language. Even when a committee of learned men prepared and published a Biblical translation, Mr. Byington held to his convictions and continued his work.

Such determination to do a job well, whatever the cost in time and effort, deserves our praise.

Andover will certainly miss Steven Byington and his rugged independence of mind and habit.

Let's Do The Whole Job

Now that the voters have given their OK to the test well hook-ups, we hope they don't become complacent about the water supply.

It's obvious that the town will be needing much more water in the next few years — sooner, perhaps than we would wish. For whatever the solution to that program, it is bound to be expensive.

But we must not, regardless of the expense, put it off to next year, the year after that and on into the future. It's foolishness to believe that the supply situation will be anything more than partially improved when two — or perhaps three — wells are tied in.

And it is equally foolish for any of us to put off taking the next big step in providing the town with water enough to meet its future demands. We think this can only be done by using Merrimack River water — and this project will take two years to complete, once it is authorized. The engineers have said it will cost about two million dollars — for filter beds, pumping, pipe and accessories. Expensive or not, we mustn't wait until we are faced with a severe crisis before moving forward. If we delay unreasonably, we may find we don't have two years to wait in terms of need.

We hope the BPW has a constructive program ready for the annual town meeting and that the voters give it serious consideration.

GOURMET "STEALS"

In a few days — this coming Sunday to be exact — our native game birds will hear the first shots of the open season — and the hunters with the best dogs and the sharpest sight will bring home delectable, prized loot to eventually grace the family dinner table. If your hunter-husband is one to butcher his own kill and goes on to preparing it for eating, too — wonderful! — I can see no problem arising out of the deal.

But, let us say, you are confronted with a fine-looking, feather-bedecked pheasant — very dead, lying close by the sink in your neat little kitchen, bearing a note from a loving friend which reads, "thought you might like this for Sunday dinner!" — well, it's a challenge. Total recall brings up such a vision!

Ground game is truly delicious and not a great culinary chore at that. Alva Wright of Salem st., who owns a nice pair of Beagle hounds, does a deal of shooting with his son, "Joe" and our Town Clerk George Winslow. Jack-rabbitting in New Hampshire has been taking up some of their pleasant early fall weekends and, according to the senior Wright, the preparation and eating of "the spoils" are pleasures for indulgence also.

Regarding birds, specifically pheasants, Mr. Wright knows — (something I had to learn) that they should be hung for a few days before being plucked. This is absolutely essential if you are to have a tender, wonderfully flavored bird. After drawing the pheasant and boning its breast, it can be marinated in port wine, well covered, for one to three days longer, and then set in a deep iron frying pan or dutch oven on top of the stove and gently fried in butter. Don't dispose of the marinade — you've gone to some expense to immerse the critter. You can reduce the wine over low heat, and after adding a few garnishings of cooked mushroom caps and fried, sliced apples, or whatever you wish, to the bird, pour it over your offering just before serving.

Some people in this world can afford truffles and if you are one, the first fall pheasant or partridge seems a happy occasion to use them. The tins of truffles I have found in Andover are imported from Italy and are the black variety which, I understand, is not in-

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ferior. They can be added to the reduced wine, allowed to cook for about 10 minutes and then poured over or placed under the bird.

Steve Brennan truffles Rock Cornish hens, I hear — not every day or for his own delectation primarily, but having a definite flair for gourmet offerings, it is nice to hear of a brave soul who will try trussing with truffles.

Frankly, if I am to do a pheasant or partridge this season, and I think it's quite possible (they are practically underfoot when I stalk across my burned-out lawn), I shall brown it first in butter and then wrap it all up in bacon slices and roast it slowly for about 30 minutes or so. In this way there is no chance of its drying out.

CRAB EN RAMEKIN (Mrs. Vincent Stulgis)

A very tasty offering for a guest luncheon; can all be prepared well ahead of time, put under refrigeration and just 15 minutes before serving time placed in a 400 degree oven. For this "Bea" uses fresh crabmeat, incorporates three tablespoons of dry sherry for a most piquant flavor.

2 cups fresh crabmeat, boned
2 hard-cooked eggs, chopped
1 cup mayonnaise
1 tsp. grated onion
1 tsp. chopped parsley
2 tsp. fresh lemon juice
½ tsp. Worcestershire sauce
½ tsp. prepared mustard
3 Tbl. dry sherry
1 cup buttered bread crumbs
Mix all together, saving ½ cup of buttered bread crumbs for topping. Put in ramekins or scallop shells, top and bake in 400 oven for 15 min. Makes four large ramekins or six small ones.

MARLBOROUGH PUDDING (Mrs. Frances P. McClellan)

This was graciously mailed in to me by Mrs. McClellan and is one of her favorite family recipes coming from her grandmother. It will use a quart of good cooking apples and now that the Baldwin is being picked, you couldn't have a better choice.

1 qt. apples
1½ cups sugar
2 eggs
½ tsp. nutmeg
pinch of salt
1 cup milk
1 Tbl. butter
1 tsp. fresh lemon juice.
Place raw apples in a buttered baking dish. Mix the eggs with sugar and seasonings; bring milk to boiling point and allow butter to melt in it, and add gradually to mixture. Pour over the apples and bake ¾ of an hour in a 350 degree oven.

PINEAPPLE DATE PUDDING

This recipe comes from a hostess-friend of my mother-in-laws' in Winchester which was so fancied by all the women guests at a luncheon party recently that all walked home with the written recipe in their handbags. In fact, each paid the sum of one dollar for the recipe which was expressly placed toward the building fund of the new Christian Science Church in that town. It has calories!

1 cup drained pineapple chunks, cut up several times.
1 cup chopped nutmeats
1 cup chopped dates
½ cup flour
1 tsp. baking powder
¼ tsp. salt
3 eggs yolks
¾ cup sugar
3 egg whites
Mix together the fruit and nutmeats; sift together the flour, baking powder and salt and add to first mixture. Beat the egg yolks with one half cup of the sugar and in a separate bowl, beat the whites stiffly with the remaining quarter cup of sugar. Now add the egg yolk mixture to the first combined mixtures and lastly fold in the egg whites. Bake 35 minutes in a 325 degree oven. Serve with whipped cream or ice-cream.

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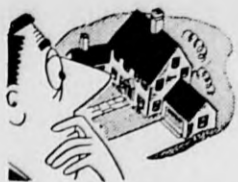

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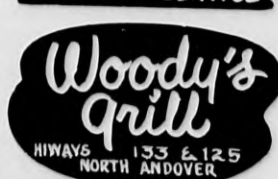

STEVEN T. BYINGTON
Memorial services for Steven T. Byington, 88, 15 High st., Ballardvale, who died Saturday in Lawrence General Hospital, will be held tomorrow at 2 p.m. at the Ballardvale United Church. Cremation

will take place at Harmony Grove, Salem and his ashes will be taken to Hardwick, Vt. Cemetery for burial.
Mr. Byington had been hospitalized for a month. But until shortly before that time, he was a familiar figure — walking to Andover square to do his shopping and

nearly always refusing proffered rides in favor of his favorite exercise. And he had taken his annual vacation trip to Vermont, to see relatives, before entering the hospital.

Mr. Byington was known throughout much of New England and the nation as the "Bard of Ballard Vale", mostly due to scholarly and interesting letters he often wrote to the editor of the Boston Globe and other publications throughout the country.

Of most compelling interest to Mr. Byington, however, was publication of his translation of the Bible. For more than 40 years,

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until 1943, he had spent every available moment translating the Bible from its original into modern words — a project he determined to undertake when he was only 13. In later years he had been checking his work, making minute changes where clarity demanded.

Although his translation had been actually completed for 14 years, it has never been published as a complete work.

Just a year ago, THE TOWNSMAN wrote about his problem of finding a publisher for the translation.

Mr. Byington had taught himself many languages, including ancient Hebrew and Greek. He graduated from the University of Vermont in 1891, studied at New York Union Seminary and at Oberlin, Ohio. He also attended Castleton Normal School, where students were encouraged to correct each other's mistakes.

That, Mr. Byington once ex-

plained, was enjoyable and it led to his employment at Ginn and Co., book publishers, as a proof reader. "After all, proof reading is only professional fault finding," he once explained. At that time, he spent most of his time working on advanced texts, not only correcting them but making suggestions to authors.

Sundays, on the train to and from Boston every day and in other spare minutes he worked on the Bible. He regularly attended the Ballard Vale Congregational Church, served as clerk and assistant treasurer for over 30 years and taught Sunday School for many years. Although not a minister, he often preached and drew on his knowledge of the Bible for religious instruction.

Mr. Byington was an active man physically, enjoying mountain climbing. He climbed Mount Mansfield in Vermont when he was 82 and formerly had tackled the most difficult mountain trails.

Mr. Byington leaves five cousins, Misses Emily and Mary Tracy of New York City, John E. Tracy of Ann Arbor, Mich., Albert Byington of Jericho, Vt. and H. Bradford Arnold of Skaneateles, N. Y.

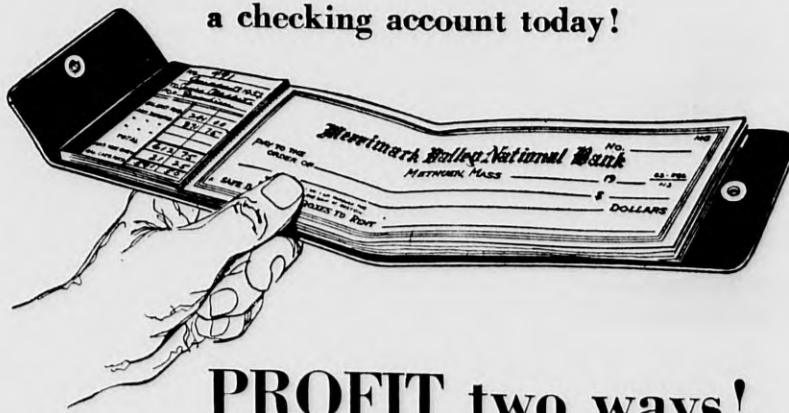
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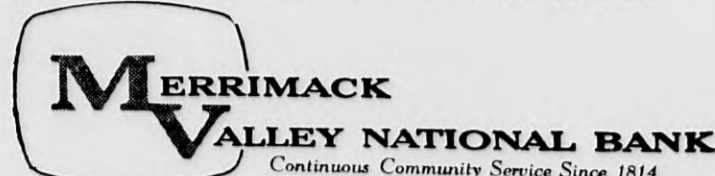
