Officeholders Re-Appointed

A complete list of appointments to many town jobs has been compiled by the Selectmen.

Heading the list is the appointment of Wilson J. Crawford as janitor of the town hall, public weigher in charge of town scales and deputy sealer of weights and measures.

Atty. Vincent F. Stulgis was re-appointed town counsel and Ralph W. Coleman was re-named building inspector.

Joseph Horan was appointed a registrar of voters, as a Democrat. The term is for three years.

Re-appointed as veteran's agent was Francis P. Markey. Arthur W. Cole was re-appointed welfare agent.

Atty. Joseph F. Bacigalupo was named to the zoning board of appeals. He replaced Atty. James S. Eastham, for a three-year term. Edmond E. Hammond and Robert S. Zollner were named associate members, replacing Hugh Bullock and Leon A. Field; while Atty. Walter C. Tomlinson was re-appointed an associate member.

The Industrial Development Committee membership underwent some changes.

Close Call At R.R. Crossing

A sharp-eyed Lowell Junction teen-ager probably saved her own and her father's lives last Sunday morning at a Lowell Junction railroad crossing.

Elaine Glorioso spotted a freight train bearing down on the family car, as it crossed the tracks. Her father, Joseph A. Glorioso, was able to speed up just enough to avoid a broadside collision. The train struck the car on the right rear fender and pushed it 36 feet along the railroad right of way. The car came to rest against a shack and both father and daughter were able to leave the vehicle unaided.

The private crossing where the accident took place has no warning devices. The roadway leads to a sparsely-settled section. A similar accident there claimed the life of a motorist some years ago.

Both Elaine and her father were taken to the Lawrence General Hospital in the Fire Department ambulance. Elaine, with possible neck injuries and an elbow contusion, was discharged after treatment. Her father was admitted for observation. Authorities said his injuries included a right cheek fracture, lacerations about the mouth and right cheek and a separation of the right shoulder.

Health Board Plans Pest Control Week

The Andover Board of Health will sponsor a pest control program during the week of May 5.

This program, which will be aimed at the control of plant, insect and rodent pests, will be educational in nature with the intent of teaching interested individuals how to deal with pests that represent nuisances and possible health menaces.

Such common plant pests as poison ivy, poison oak, ragweed, crabgrass and dandelions can be properly controlled by agents that are readily available. Insect pests such as flies, mosquitoes, ticks, ants and plant pests can be eradicated.

Preliminary studies were beginning this week to find out whether Andover is qualified to receive federal Urban Renewal funds.

Professional consultants have been retained by the Merrimack Valley National Bank, whose offer to donate these services to the town was accepted by the voters at town meeting in March.

Frank Maloney, representing the firm of Candeb and Fleissig of New Jersey, described his firm's operation and details of the federal program during a meeting April 10. On hand were members of a Citizens' Committee appointed by the Housing Authority, members of that Authority, Selectmen and Planning Board members.

The Housing Authority has prime responsibility for the project and appointed the larger group as an advisory body, representative of the entire town.

Although the first steps began this week, Committee members were told that it might be 1960 before final federal approval is (Continued on Page Six)

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Igoe Appointed Guidance Director

The Andover School Committee, at its meeting April 8, unanimously elected William J. Igoe to the position of director of guidance for the Andover Public Schools to succeed Bernard M. Kellmurray, who has resigned the post in order to assume a full-time teaching schedule in the Andover High School English Department.

Mr. Igoe has been serving as Guidance Counselor for boys in the senior high school since shortly after he joined the Andover system in the fall of 1953.

Prior to that time, he had taught Social Studies and done guidance work at Lisbon High School in Maine. He studied at Colby College and Boston University, receiving both the bachelor's and master's degrees from the latter institution. In his graduate work, Mr. Igoe majored in guidance and was awarded his master's degree in that field. He has worked in close association with Mr. Kellmurray and has thus become thoroughly acquainted with the total guidance program, which extends throughout the school system from kindergarten through grade twelve. As director of guidance, he will have general supervision over all guidance and counseling activities and will be in charge of test programs administered throughout all grades. The supervision of testing has become a more demanding service of late, with the introduction of various new programs being conducted nationally for both admission and scholarships aid for colleges and independent secondary schools. The duties also extend to all grades in conferences about individual pupils in need of special help, in which cases the guidance director works with the elementary school principals and any other persons or agencies which may be of assistance.

In addition to these educational and clinical duties, the work of the position includes some responsibility for liaison with the armed forces, with representatives of other schools and colleges and with industry. In the latter instance, Mr. Igoe has already had considerable experience, having had charge of industrial placement at the high school during the past two years.

In entering upon his new position, Mr. Igoe will be in charge of

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one of the oldest formally organized guidance departments in the commonwealth, now in its 18th consecutive year of operation. Other personnel include the deans of girls in the junior and senior high schools, as well as a counselor for boys in both schools.

Mr. Igoe, a native of Lawrence, resides on Vine st. with his wife, the former Regina Kyle and four children. He is, at present, vice-president of the Merrimack Valley Guidance Association and is supervisor of the Andover center of the College Entrance Examination Board.

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Proposes Coordinated Recreation Facilities

All residents interested in the town's recreational program — both on the playgrounds during the summer and the school-spon-

sored programs — have been invited to attend a meeting next Wednesday night at 7:30 at the Andover Youth Center.

Donald D. Dunn, director of physical education for the public schools, suggested the meeting to determine whether all groups and individuals can combine their efforts to make maximum use of present facilities. The group would also, as Dunn sees it, take steps to ask the town for added facilities in years to come. The Recreation Committee, Dunn said, is in favor of exploring the possibilities and will send a representative to the meeting. The Board of Public Works, who

now has charge of the physical facilities, also has been invited and has agreed to send one of its members.

Dunn also listed the Little League, Junior League, New England League, the School Department and the Boosters Club as interested organizations.

All other residents with an interest in improving the use of facilities and coordinating activities are welcome at the session, he said.

Dunn explained that there now is no single coordinating group, with the result that schedules conflict, present facilities tend to become inadequate and other athletic facilities, needed for a well-rounded program, are not available.

obtained for a renewal project. At least two steps of the program require town meeting approval.

Must OK Application

The work now being done by the consultants must be OK'd by town meeting, before the application for a renewal project can be formally presented to the government agency. Although the firm can finish this phase of the work in 30-60 days, Committee members were informed that it may be necessary to call a special town meeting in the fall rather than this spring.

Action will come, at that meeting, on approving the area chosen by the consultants and Housing Authority for a renewal project. Once the area has been established and approved, application can be made to the government.

If approved, detailed studies, plans and cost estimates must be prepared. The government pays for this work, without municipal financial participation of any kind. And at any time during this stage, right up to final town meeting approval of a contract with the government for the actual work, the town may abandon the project without financial obligation. Once a final contract is approved however, the cost of the planning stage is added to the over-all pro-

ject cost.

Two Thirds Payment

Federal funds are available under this program, to the extent of paying two-thirds of net costs. This figure is obtained by figuring the entire cost of land purchases, demolition of buildings, plans and all other administrative costs, less the income received from the sale of the cleared land.

Thus, if \$2,000,000 is the over-all cost and land sales bring in \$800,000, the total net cost will be \$1,200,000. Federal money pays for two-thirds of this and the town would pay \$400,000.

But this might not be a cash outlay. Mr. Maloney explained that, for example, the town hall and fire station could fall within the renewal area. Money received by the town for this cleared area might nearly balance out the town's obligation. Other municipal services provided — such as roads into a renewed area, sewer lines or demolition work performed by town crews — would be listed to the town's credit, thus reducing the cash obligation.

In any event, the consultant said additional tax revenue, from the sale and re-use of the land, will pay off any municipal cost in seven to 11 years. This time span is a national average, he explained, but in some communities increased tax revenues have paid for the town's share of the project in a shorter time.

Plans Take Time

Mr. Maloney said his firm, while needing only 30 to 60 days for the preliminary study, may need a year or more for complete plans, if it is retained for that job.

To date, the firm has been retained only for the preliminary application work. If a town meeting approves this application and federal authority is forthcoming, the Housing Authority, or a special Renewal Authority, would have power to retain consultants for the advanced plans.

The problem with special town meetings was cited, both as to obtaining a quorum and the appropriation of funds at a special meeting. If a special meeting gave its approval to the application sometime this year, it would be doubtful whether the advanced plans could be ready for action at the annual meeting in March, 1959. And the Committee was told that there is some question whether final action, which involves approving expenditures, could be acted upon at a special town meeting later that year. Thus the

possible date of 1960 was mentioned.

The meeting opened with comments by Housing Authority Chairman George Noury. Wallace Haseltine, executive vice president of the Merrimack Valley National Bank, presided. He commented that the bank, interested in the future of the town, had agreed to provide funds for the initial application planning, without any strings attached, and as a contribution to the community. He introduced Mr. Maloney, whose background includes working for the federal agency responsible for approving renewal projects.

cated by the use of special agents while rats and mice can be controlled by the proper use of baits and rodenticides.

The purpose of Pest Control Week is to make Andover a healthier town and since most pest control problems are actually problems of the home owner or tenant, the Board of Health is hoping that the townspeople will cooperate in making this an extensive pest eradication program.

The Board will sponsor an educational program featured by a panel discussion on insecticides, rodenticides and herbicides Monday evening, May 5, at 8 at the Central Elementary Auditorium.

The panelists will be: Dr. Maynard W. Quimby, Massachusetts College of Pharmacy, Topic — Herbicides;

Harold D. Rose, field program supervisor, Massachusetts State Department of Public Health, Topic — Insecticides;

Henry Merrill, regional supervisor, Fish and Wildlife Service, United States Government, Department of the Interior Topic — Rodenticides.

The panel discussion will be moderated by Robert A. Walsh, chairman, Andover Board of Health.

The panelists are all experts in their particular field and they will each be allotted 15 minutes to introduce their topic. Following this brief introduction, the rest of the evening will be devoted to a question and answer period with audience participation.

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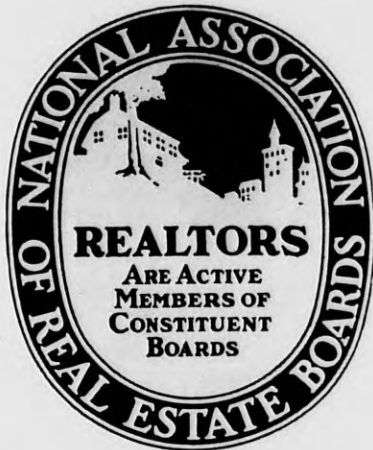

The talents of many students at Andover High School will be on display at the annual Science Fair April 23.

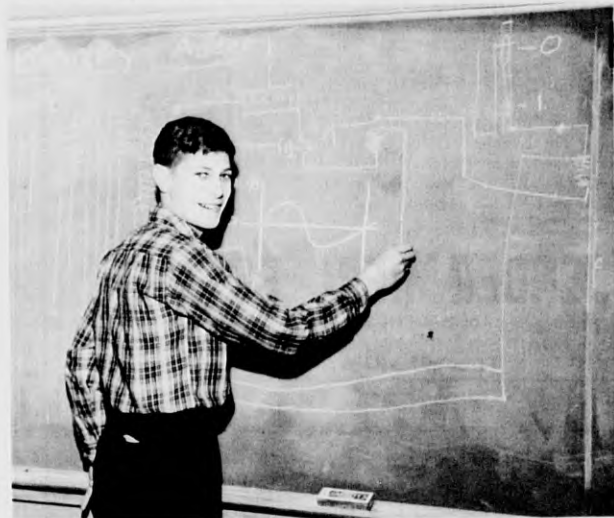
The exhibition will be open for the public that evening from 7-10, while judging will take place during the day.

EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

Why Just In April?

The Registry of Motor Vehicles has served notice it will suspend licenses of drivers breaking the law — practically any law pertaining to the highways or vehicles themselves — during the month of April.

Under the ruling, many men and women will get three-day suspensions for violations that normally might draw a warning from the Registry. Even equipment defects, if they appear to have occurred long enough in the past to have given the driver a chance to have them corrected, will get the driver a suspension.

The Registry does not indicate that it intends to be arbitrary. If a headlight goes out while the car is being used, or some other defect appears suddenly, the driver will presumably get the normal ticket that requires the car owner to report to the Registry with proof that the defect has been repaired.

Why, we would like to know, is this type of enforcement confined to April?

Wouldn't a rigid enforcement of the laws, even of some of the "petty" ones, eventually result in more highway safety? Certainly anyone suffering a three-day, or longer, suspension for some violation will be careful the next time.

Or at least, that's the way it should work.

As one local enforcement officer commented the other day: "It's the fixes and the politicians that ruin the system".

He made the point that the persons with certain influence in the right places are more than willing to help a citizen whose license has been suspended. Not for any payment, except possibly a vote at election time.

Until this situation is corrected, this officer went on, it is almost hopeless to conduct a campaign of the type now being waged by the Registry. All it will accomplish, this officer believes, will be added calls to the Registry

by the politicians and more fixes, in direct proportion to the additional suspensions handed out.

Now this may be true. It is a time-honored custom for an individual to call someone — a legislator, another officer, a local officeholder, anyone in a possible position of influence — whenever his traffic violation has been noted by an officer and trouble may follow. It has reached the point where many men and women are disdainful, for they actually believe all they have to do is call someone, if they get a ticket for a violation. And if that's all there is to it, why bother worrying about being stopped?

We wonder, even with the knowledge that all this fixing goes on, if the Registry couldn't make its enforcement policies stick. It would take some courage on the part of Registry officials in Boston, who would have to say no to many politicians.

But for every frown they received from that source, there would be countless smiles of gratitude from residents of this state, who realize that safety on the highway is more important than votes.

Why not give this enforcement policy a try for a longer period than a month, coupling it with a rigid no-fix policy?

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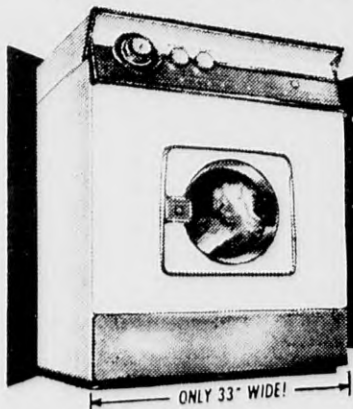

Political Slush Fund?

Somehow, to us, the governor's request for a multi-million dollar fund to provide employment in Massachusetts falls flat on its face.

It's necessary to provide employment, to be sure. But is this the way?

Why not speed up such projects as Route 28, part of which is under construction? Couldn't, for example, the governor of this Commonwealth cut the red tape so that the portion of Route 28 north of the river could be started sooner than now anticipated? Outdoor work, during good weather, could provide a lot of jobs for unemployed men.

And in other fields, where the state eventually will buy merchandise, couldn't orders be placed now, to stimulate business and thus employment? Many women, now out of work, would thus have an opportunity to become gainfully employed.

Somehow the \$50,000,000 fund requested by the governor smacks of W.P.A.-type thinking. After all, this is election year and what better way is there to win friends and influence people than to pass out jobs by the thousands? We should beware of such huge funds that might be turned into a slush fund for political purposes.

The second in a series of rabies vaccine inoculation clinics will be held Saturday, April 26, from 8:30 a.m. to 12 at the Junior High School.

Although many dog owners took advantage of the first clinic and had their dogs vaccinated, the inclement weather of last Saturday kept many owners and their pets indoors.

The Board of Health would like to point out that while Rabies is a somewhat dormant condition at the present time, vaccine protection of dogs is an insurance to the dog owner that his dog cannot contract the disease or infect some human with this condition. Further, a dog bearing a "rabies vaccine tag" is not subject to possible rabies quarantine if it should bite a child.

Since the Town of Andover is one of the few towns or cities in the state offering this type of clinic, dog owners are urged to take advantage of this service so that the local Board of Health will be encouraged to continue this program next year.
