URBAN RENEWAL GROUP WILL MEET MONDAY

The Urban Renewal Committee will meet next Monday night in the Selectmen's office to hear a report from the planning consultants.

A representative of Candeb and Fleissig will speak to the Committee and outline his firm's preliminary plans for the town. It is expected that an area for the renewal program will be discussed in some detail.

Town meeting approval of such an area must be obtained before an application containing the information can be processed by the Housing Authority for federal approval.

Taxpayers grumbled and rumbled throughout the town this week, echoing one general complaint: "My valuation is too high".

And as the final batch of official notices went out Tuesday, the assessors office in town hall resembled Grand Central Station, with taxpayers swarming to ask questions, file required forms for personal interviews or just complain. Punctuating the general clamor occasionally was a quiet voice saying "I've nothing to complain about".

Despite the general town-wide disturbance, officials felt Wednesday that the worst might be nearly over. They explained that the initial shock always produces many complaints, while taxpayers who have profited from the revaluation quietly mind their own business.

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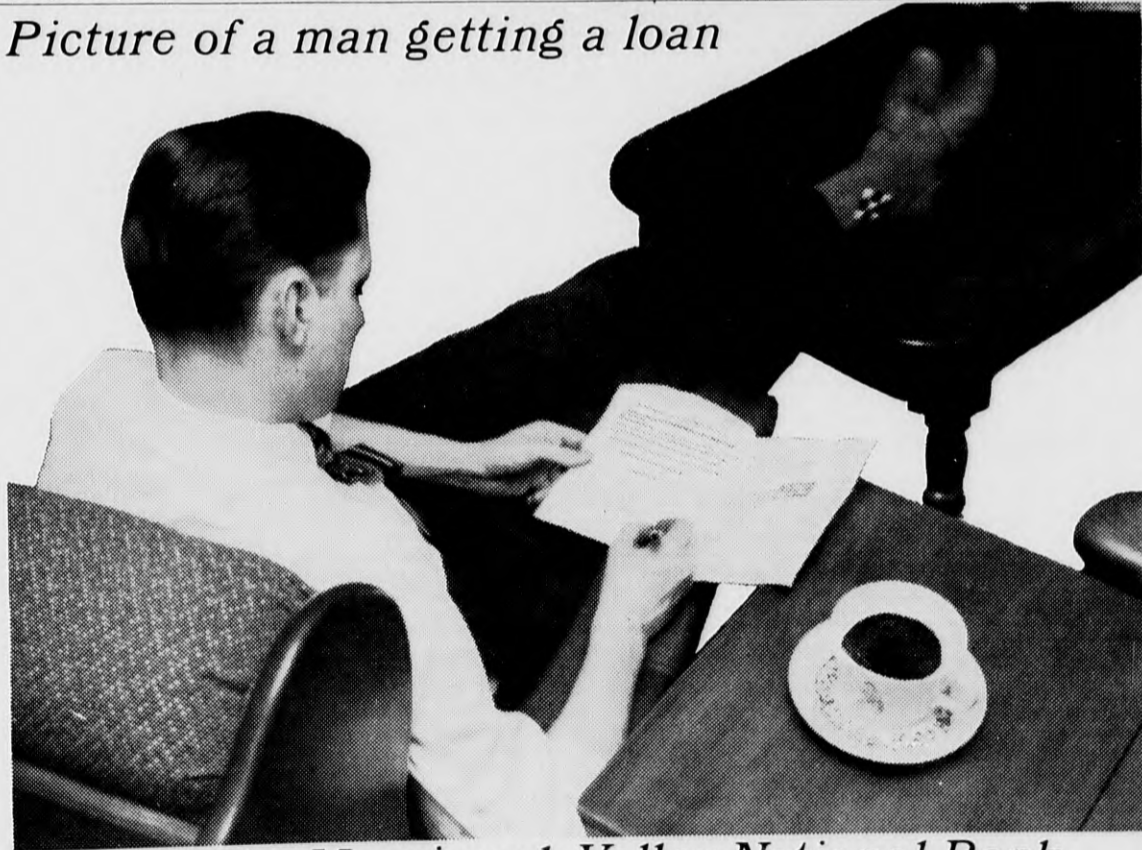
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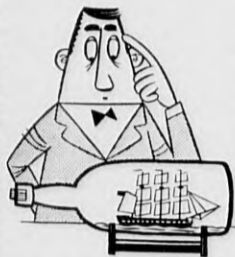

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EDITORIAL THOUGHTS

The State Is At Fault

Quite a fuss has been stirred up over Shawsheen rd. reconstruction — with residents generally unhappy over a lack of farsightedness and town officials worried over a portion of the road that has sunk.

We've been critical of the Board of Public Works during the years, when members' actions called for it. But this time, the Board can't be blamed.

The state has absolute direction of Chapter 90 reconstruction — draws the plans, does the engineering, writes specifications, calls for bids and supervises the work. All the town does is pay one-fourth of the cost.

Apparently state engineers goofed. Plans and specifications were drawn that did not include all the work — sidewalks that would need fixing, walls that required lowering; other incidental repairs that always accompany a major construction project. We've been told the engineers also forgot to include more than 30 trees that would have to be removed and this work later was added as an extra.

No one exactly knows why the sunken road could not have been anticipated. Apparently there is 20 feet of peat at that point and it should have been obvious that this would make an unstable base. But the work was done. The road sank. And all winter there have been wooden horses around the section to keep cars away.

This tragedy of errors shouldn't have happened. But as long as it did, the record should be set straight as to where the fault lies.

After all, the Board of Public Works has been justly criticized for many of its decisions. And when that Board is blameless, it would be unfair to ignore that fact.

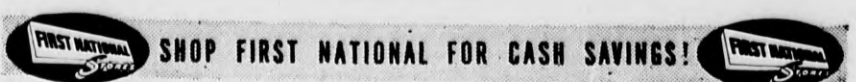

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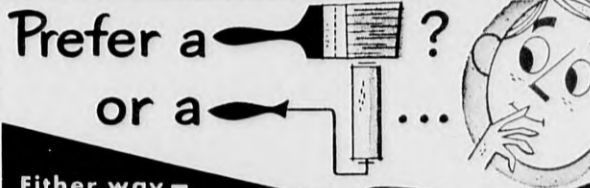

"The poppies which we all will wear are not, of course, natural flowers from the battlefields. They are flowers which have even greater significance than any nature could produce. They have bloomed under the hands of men disabled in war - the comrades of those in whose honor they will be worn. Their petals are only paper and their stems of wire, yet into them has been breathed the spirit of patriotic sacrifice, the spirit of those days when life itself was not too much to give for America. We wear them not only as a tribute to the memory of the war dead but also as a means of aiding those who are bearing war's afflictions."

ness and hope nothing happens to change their land and building values. And thus officials were inclined generally to discount mutterings that a committee would be organized to seek town meeting action on either putting off or revoking the entire revaluation plan.

Follow Procedure
The first part of the formal notices was sent out last Friday and appeared to be followed by a stunned silence. Although the assessors were well aware of some discontent, few persons asked for a hearing. But by Tuesday, as the bulk of the notices were mailed, residents began following the necessary procedure, required of every property owner who wishes a hearing.

The forms enclosed with the notices had to be filled out and both documents — the form plus the notice — returned in person to the town hall. There, a personal interview was arranged for a specific date in June.

All property owners desiring a hearing with a representative of the Cole, Laver and Trumble revaluation firm must follow this procedure. Forms returned by mail will not result in an interview.

Even as the requests for interviews began to mount early this week, many other taxpayers were merely seeking information. Some wanted to know what their neigh-

bors will pay, as a basis of comparison for their own property. And that information is being given anyone that asks it.

Others, who failed to put in an appearance at the town hall, were spreading their complaints all over town, while failing to take official steps to obtain relief. Some of these, it was learned, had refused the revaluing experts an opportunity to see the interior of their homes and thus perhaps had a higher valuation placed on the property than might otherwise have been the case.

How Much?
At the root of many complaints and queries was the apparent belief that the revaluation and subsequent collection of taxes will result in a surplus for the town.

Officials explained, however, that this is illegal. The net amount to be raised by taxation, according to the recapitulation sheet used in cooperation with the state in figuring the tax rate, stands at \$1,968,908.74. This is a net amount, after all allowances for anticipated state income and various obligations have been made.

On the other side of the ledger, new assessed real estate values stand in round figures at \$77,000,000. Another approximate \$3,000,000 in personal property assessable value can be added, to reach a total assessable value of eighty million dollars, in round figures.

When this total value is multiplied by the tentative tax rate, per thousand, of \$26, officials point out that this would produce somewhat over \$100,000 in excess of the net amount to be raised. But

they explain that the hearings this June will no doubt produce some changes, presumably downward, in individual values. Thus there is roughly a \$100,000 leeway and if this should be exhausted, the rate might even have to go up slightly. But this seemed a remote possibility, while many officials spoke about the chance that the rate might even be further reduced, perhaps even to \$25, after all the hearings are ended.

Some idea of the tremendous change in assessed values can be gained from comparing these figures: in 1957, the total real estate assessed valuation was \$23,012,000. This year it is \$77,000,000.

Residential values went up 370 percent; industrial values only went up 333 percent. No breakdown is yet available on commercial and business properties, although it has been estimated that they did not go up as much as the residential.

One-Third Up
In line with this readjustment, officials further explained the

premise that one-third of the property goes up, one-third goes down and the other third remains the same.

If an industrial plant or a place of business, or even a piece of residential property takes a substantial cut in value, then the

and a third constant comes into play. This does not mean, then, that every third home must go down or up as the case may be. For to equal one reduction of a substantial size, several homes may have been increased to compensate.

pensate for the reduction.

Have Taken Cut

Actually, it has been discovered that some residents are complaining about an increase when they actually are taking a cut in the over-all tax bill.

To determine whether an increase has been received under the revaluation program, property owners have been asked to figure out their tax bill at the rate of \$76 per thousand under their old valuation and compare it with \$26 at the new values. They have been reminded that town meeting last March appropriated funds resulting in an increase, under the old values, from \$64 to \$76.

Thus the only comparison to make is between what the bill would have been at the \$76 rate, with the new one. Several visitors to the assessors office had compared their new approximate tax bill with the one they paid last year and complained of the increase. But they found actually that they were paying less under the new values and new rate than might have been the case under old values at a \$76 rate.

Will Publish List

In order to make full facts available to all residents of the community, the TOWNSMAN has received permission from the Board of Selectmen-Assessors to publish all valuations, both new and old, with the estimated tax bill that would have been received at a \$76 rate and at the \$26 rate. This long listing will begin as quickly as possible.

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Waiting For Data On Road Problem

The whole Shawsheen rd. problem still appears unsettled, following brief discussion at the Board of Public Works meeting Monday night. Adopting a wait-and-see attitude, members decided to sit tight for the moment and see what the state may come up with in the way of answers to the vexing problems. State Department of Public Works officials met with the Board last week to talk about the sunken section and the completion of various smaller repair jobs caused by the reconstruction. One stone wall was cited as an example. It has been left "hanging" about a foot above the level of the new sidewalk and the owner wants it put back in proper shape. Several other requests have been received regarding drainage problems that residents believe have been caused by the road construction and about stone walls that owners believe are affected by the work. As none of these items were included in the state-drawn plans for the job, the BPW is faced with a decision on paying for the work. During the discussion Monday night, members spoke about \$2500 as the town's one-quarter

share of the extra work. But they also said that the state will not move forward to do any of this work until the town comes up with its share. As far as the sunken road went, members felt that the state might pay for this repair when they find the answer to the problem. It was explained that the cost of the project, as done to date, is 60 percent over the bid price of \$54,000. Extras were required, members said, for such things as cutting down over 30 trees that state engineers had not drawn on the plan used by contractors in bidding the job. The state drew
