Tax Rate Of \$26 Per \$1000 Is Announced

\$15.04 Earmarked For Operation Of Schools

The \$26 per thousand tax rate estimated by the assessors three months ago was confirmed Monday evening when by unanimous vote the board established the figure as the official 1958 levy.

Last year's rate was \$64 per thousand. The big decrease was the result of a revaluation survey which boosted property values to \$77,000,000, nearly four times the valuations of the previous year.

Of each \$26 collected by the town this year, \$15.04 will go for school operation while the balance of \$10.96 will be used to maintain all other town services.

Last year, schools took \$28.89 of the \$64 rate while the balance of \$35.11 was used for other town operations. The split in 1956 when the tax rate was \$60, was \$23.01 for schools and \$36.99 for general services.

Andover's revaluation, which has caused a great deal of discussion among tax payers and not a few protests, was carried out by the firm of Cole, Laver and Trumble. Back in April, the assessors agreed with the survey firm to peg property values for the town at \$77,000,000 which was about 90 percent of the fair market value. The survey makers found that Andover had property valued at more than 85 million dollars if 100 percent of the value was to be taken.

The establishment of the 1958 tax rate Monday night was taken

despite a last minute appeal by the Andover Taxpayers Association to the selectmen-assessors to avoid placing the entire revaluation program into effect this year. The Taxpayers Association favored a general working into the system over a period of years.

Harold Haller, president of the Taxpayers Association and Henry Wolfson, a past president, appeared before the selectmen Monday evening and carried on a long discussion of the tax rate problem. At the conclusion of the discussion, Dr. William V. Emmons moved for the establishment of the \$26 rate and the motion was seconded by Stafford A. Lindsay and agreed to by Chairman Sidney P. White. The rate must be approved by the Massachusetts Commissioner of Corporations and Taxation. This is expected to be a formality and the preparation of tax bills is expected to get underway soon.

Mr. Wolfson requested the board to spread the system over a period of years in order to permit taxpayers to accumulate funds with which to pay what may be higher tax bills for some property owners. He represented figures to show how the association plan would work out over the next three years. Mr. Haller asked the assessors to provide comparison records showing how many taxpayers will

BPW Delays Andover St. Road Start

The town's plan to improve Andover st. from the Shawshen river to Woburn st., voted by the board of public works on July 21, was held up by the board at Monday night's meeting. The delay was ordered after it was learned the state is planning some Chapter 90 work in the area and the board members feel they should determine the state's plans before going ahead. It could be that the town will save a considerable sum through the state's activity.

Calvin E. Metcalf, office manager for the B.P.W., was requested to communicate with state officials and determine if the section under consideration for improvement by Andover is also included in the state's plans.

Will Improve Lighting Near Raytheon Plant

After taking a view of the York st. area Monday night, members of the board of public works agreed that the request of the Raytheon company for improved street lighting there should be granted. The board voted to request the Merrimack Essex Electric company to survey the district and make recommendations. The Raytheon request was received a week ago and at that time the board decided to have some tree limbs trimmed from around existing lights before taking action.

Tree branches were removed by the tree department but the added illumination was not enough to provide adequate safety for those who use the large Raytheon

parking area.

Street lighting was the main topic at Monday night's B.P.W. session. However, the members agreed that further request for improved street lighting would have to be tabled since the funds are exhausted. Some projects for which money has already been provided will be carried out.

In the future, lighting requests will be dated and placed on file. They will be acted on in order when funds become available.

The members voted improvements for Alden rd. and Nutmeg ln., two requests received some time ago and placed on file. Both areas were previously viewed by the board and the electric company which recommended better lighting. Additional applications are expected to be taken from the files as money becomes available.

No action has yet been taken on a section of North Main st. which does not yet have mercury vapor lamps. The matter was held up until the board was assured that underground wiring would

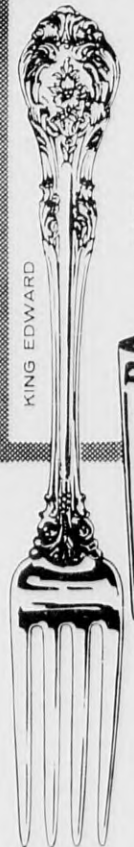

Early Morning Check On Cars

Andover police, state troopers of the Andover barracks and other enforcement agencies of the area are expected to participate in a state-wide plan of traffic inspection which was announced by Registrar of Motor Vehicles Clement A. Riley.

This campaign will be known as "Operation Road Watch". All motor vehicles will be stopped by enforcement officials working as a team between the hours of 1 a.m. and 4 a.m. The first official checkup will be known as "Operation Road Watch No. 1". There will be no advance publicity. The date and time will be announced on the police communication system.

Enforcement officials will check the license, registration, equipment and operator of every vehicle in a safe, well-lighted area without causing traffic congestion or highway hazards. "Operation Road Watch" will be a sincere attempt to remove from the highways drinking drivers and speeders. Violators of all motor vehicle and criminal laws will be apprehended.

A sticker will be placed on the lower right-hand corner on the outside of the windshield so that motorists will not be unnecessarily delayed after one checkup. The stickers will be a different color during this series of checkups and will be distributed by Registrar Riley, Chairman of the Committee, and police officials are requested to inform motorists to remove the sticker the day following an "Operation Road Watch" checkup.

During the hours of "Operation Road Watch", the communications network of the State Police, Registry of Motor Vehicles, Metropolitan District Commission, and community police will be available to verify license and registration information that may be desired.

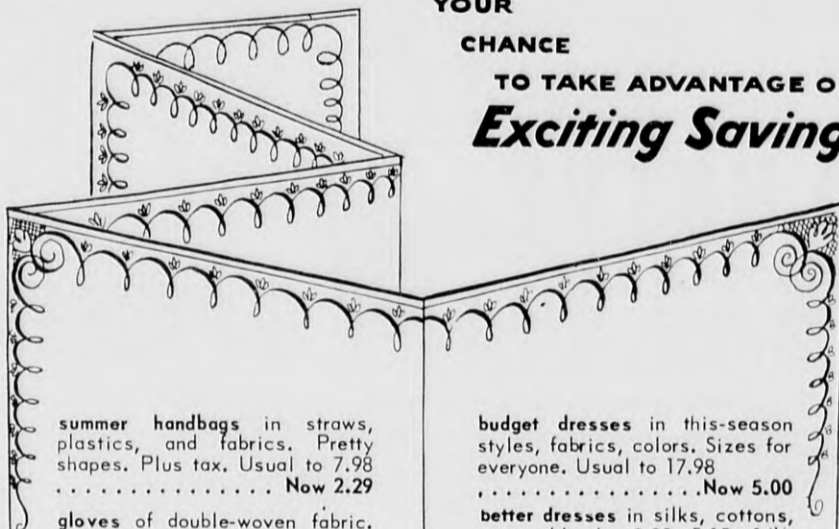

Reading Booster Course At YWCA

Income Tax Law On Summer Jobs

Most parents will not lose the \$600 exemption they may claim on their Federal income tax returns for each dependent child spending the summer vacation at a part-time job, according to the District Director of Internal Revenue.

Children who will still be under 19 years of age at the end of the year, and children who are full-time students, regardless of age,

come under this special exemption rule of the Federal income tax law.

Parents who contribute more than half the support of a child in one of these categories may claim a dependency exemption regardless of the amount earned by the child.

Working children are entitled to a \$600 personal exemption and may be due a refund of part or all the Federal income tax withheld from their wages. They will have to file an income tax return claiming refund of any amount withheld

in excess of the actual tax liability.

Questions concerning individual cases can be answered at Internal Revenue Offices.

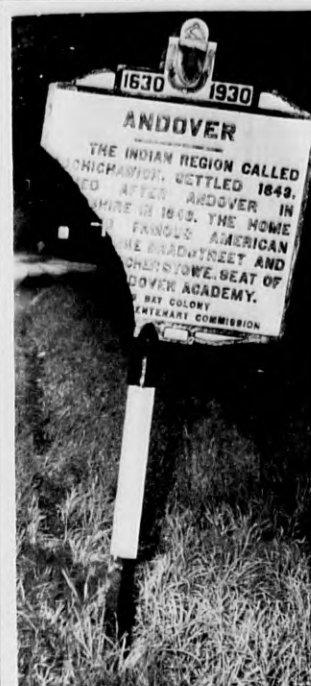

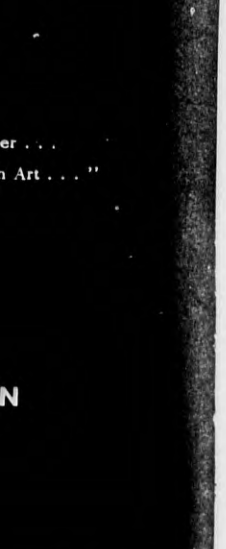

John R. Lux, a teacher at Phillips Academy has been selected to attend the Academic Year Institute for High School Teachers of Science and Mathematics to be conducted at the University of Pennsylvania in 1958-59.

Lux, who lives at 73 Bartlett st., will specialize in the study of mathematics at the institute, which is one of 19 to be held at various colleges and universities under the sponsorship of the National Science Foundation.

The 50 teachers who will study at the University of Pennsylvania, in Philadelphia, were selected from among nearly 700 who applied for admission to the institute there. The institute will open in September and close in June.

Dr. Ramsdell is married to the former Margaret L. Davidson of Providence, R. I. The couple has three children, John, Marleah and Carolyn.

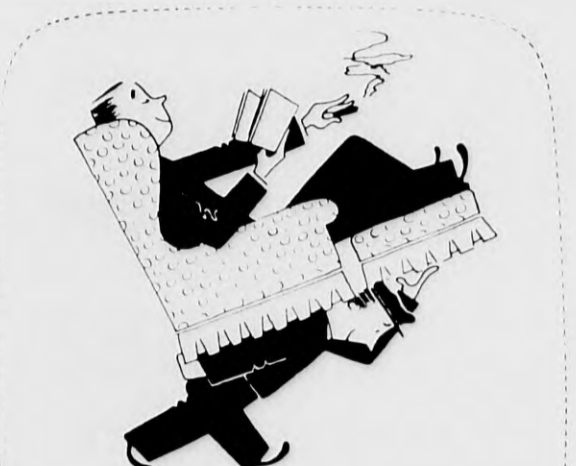

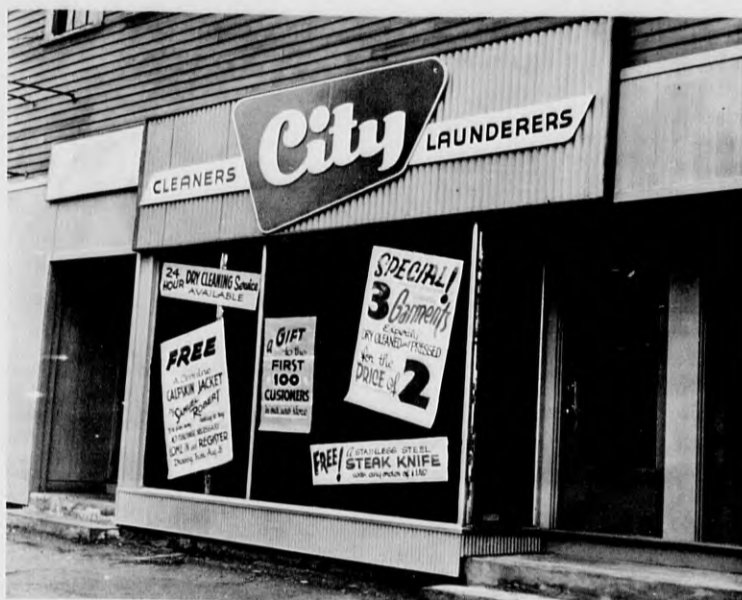

Initialed Plates

The Massachusetts Senate has passed a bill to permit the issuance of initialed number plates to motorists. The measure has been sent to the House.

"Ostentation," says Webster, "is unnecessary show; pretentious parade". The first part of the definition seems to aptly fit the possibilities in the process of being set up by the legislature.

Sen. Charles S. Marston 3rd, of Haverhill, who supported the bill, is convinced that a lot of people will want to put on a "pretentious parade". It will be quite a production, according to the Haverhill solon, participated in by 40,000 car owners of the Commonwealth who will shell out more than half a million dollars for the satisfaction of letting the driver behind know that their initials are G.U.S. or some other combination of capital letters.

"We would be giving the people something they want and it is an easy way to pick up more than half a million dollars a year" was a quotation attributed to Sen. Marston following the Senate's action last week.

The registry of motor vehicles is opposed to the plan and has been for years. It will cost a great deal for new filing systems and other records. Besides, the registry has always been opposed to any needless letters on number plates.

It has been repeatedly suggested that Massachusetts use an advertising slogan on registration plates as do most of the other states. But former registrar Rudolph F. King opposed this for years on the grounds there was not enough room on the plates to allow for use as traveling billboards.

It would not have cost the individual motorist an additional penny to advertise some of the present or past glories of the Bay State, but according to the bill passed by a 26 to 4 vote in the Senate last week, any car owner who wants to decorate his registration plates with somewhat meaningless initials will have to contribute \$15 to the state treasury. The original bill called for a \$5 fee which is the amount charged in other states that follow the practice of issuing initialed plates. Sen. Donald L. Gibbs, Newton, opposed the suggested \$15 charge and said it would be "the highest in the country".

The anticipated revenue will be added to the Massachusetts Highway fund. According to Sen. Marston, it will bring in some \$600,000. The plan has a bargain angle to it, since the plates will be handled by prison labor at a cost of only 35 cents each.

The Senate amended the bill to protect present low plate numbers and to eliminate those registrations which already have a letter preceding the figures. This would seem to ban a great many motorists from applying for initialed plates.

It was only a few years back when Massachusetts registrations passed the one million mark that the registry of motor vehicles adopted the plan of using a letter instead of lengthening the number.

Whether or not 40,000 of the state's 1,600,000 registered cars will sport initialed plates remains to be seen if the law is enacted.

Such plates should be a boon to those forgetful folks who can never remember their registration number. One wonders if they will be able to recall their own initials.

Fire Prevention

Nothing is more horrible than death by fire. And this grisly way of dying is suffered by someone every 47 minutes in the United States.

The greatest single death toll in our history occurred on October 8, 1871, when fire engulfed the town of Peshtigo, Wisconsin, and claimed 1,152 lives. That disaster is immortalized in history, and people still write about it. But Peshtigo was unique only in the fact that so many perished in so brief a period of time. The truth is that our average annual fire toll is more than 10 times the Peshtigo figure.

Last year, for instance, fire killed 11,300 people. The average over the last seven years has been 11,616. And, as is to be expected, fire exacts its largest human toll among the old and the young — the two extremes of the human spectrum. The highest death rate is among persons 65 or older, and the second highest is among infants under five.

Will we continue to endure what amounts to 10 Peshtigo cataclysms every year? The answer to that can come from only one source — the people of this country. Almost all fires are the result of human error, ignorance, or carelessness. Almost all fires, therefore, need never happen. If everyone in the country would do his share in the great cause of fire prevention we would save thousands of lives a year — to say nothing of hundreds of millions of dollars worth of property.

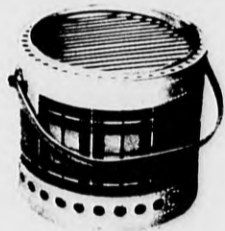

Raytheon Sale And Earnings Are Higher

Raytheon Manufacturing Company today reported higher sales and earnings for both the second quarter and first half of 1958 compared with a year ago. Charles F. Adams, Raytheon president, announced earnings of \$2,156,000 in the second quarter ended June 29, 1958, equal to \$.71 per share on the 3,020,449 shares of common stock outstanding on June 29. Earnings from operations in the same period a year ago were \$1,153,000, or \$.41 a share on the 2,830,880 shares then outstanding. These 1957 earnings were before a special gain of \$2,672,000 or \$.94 a share. Second quarter sales this year were \$98,708,000 compared with \$59,680,000 in the like period a year ago. Earnings for the first half of 1958, based on unaudited figures, were \$3,890,000 on sales of \$179,101,000. First half earnings from operations in 1957 were \$2,296,000, before the special gain noted above, on sales of \$111,950,000. The six months earnings this year represent \$1.29 per share compared with \$.81 per share from operations on the lesser number of shares outstanding a year ago. Profit margins also showed improvement. Mr. Adams said that new orders received from the government during the second quarter offset the increased volume of shipments with the result that the backlog of government business continues in excess of \$325,000,000. More than 32,000 employees were on the Raytheon payroll at

the end of June. This represents an increase of 4,000 jobs since the first of the year and 10,000 since the beginning of 1957.

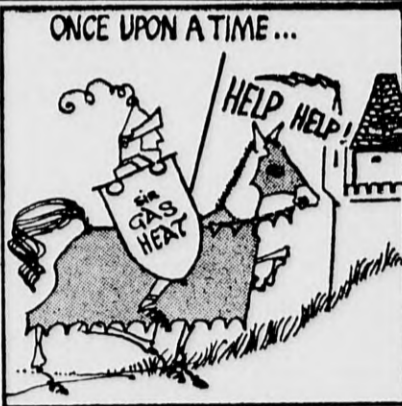

Rules For Proper Care Of Trees

The crown of a tree is like a sail. A wise mariner reefs before a storm. Tree owners should too. The tree built by Nature to best withstand high winds is a fir because it is steeple-shaped. Deciduous trees grow tall and over-weighted with leaves have a far tougher time when wind storms strike. They may be blown over or shattered, endangering traffic and buildings.

Maples, especially Norway, as well as oaks have leaf surfaces that are like a wall resisting winds. Round or oval-headed trees of all varieties are in special danger during a hurricane. As the air rushes along the ground there is also a lifting force that may seize the crown and blow the tree down.

Trees can be made safe by "reefing" - or pruning, cabling and bracing. The first step is to reduce the crown area by shortening long branches to lessen the tremendous leverage exerted by winds.

Do this by heading back quite severely. Theoretically, a tree with a crown 40 feet in diameter can have its cross-sectional area reduced by as much as 25% by cutting it back only 5 feet all around the crown.

With pruning finesse, the natural symmetry or contour of the tree still can be retained. Both its beauty, health and structural strength will thus be enhanced.

Pruning is not all. Cabling and bracing of weak crotches may be required. And it is always wise to continue to feed shade trees so that their roots will grow downward and provide a firm anchorage.

ANDOVER'S SHARE

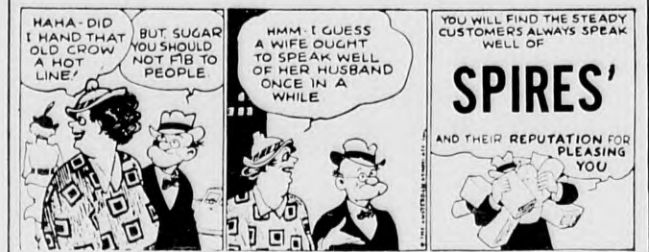

Master Hears Drainage Case

A master's decision is being awaited following a hearing in the Superior courthouse at Lawrence on the petition of Mrs. Charlotte Miller of Andover asking that Merwyn K. Darby and Edward P. Hall, both of Andover, be held in contempt of a court order concerning a drainage condition near the junction of Clark rd. and Bannister rd. The petitioner alleged that by a decree of the Superior court on November 7, 1957, the defendants were restrained from collecting water in a trench that they have refused to comply with the decree and are continuing to collect water in the trench permitting it to be discharged on the plaintiff's premises causing her cellar to be flooded to the extent of three feet, and also causing toilet facilities to be in bad repair and placing the petitioner in the position of violating the public health laws.

Concerned Over Cars Chasing Fires

Public safety officials of Andover are planning a program seeking the cooperation of motorists who make a practice of answering fire alarms and at times interfere with the passage of fire apparatus. Fire Chief Henry L. Hilton and Police Chief David L. Nicoll have conferred on the subject and are anxious to educate drivers not to impede the passage of the fire trucks when they are on the way to answer an alarm. Several times of late many motorists have hastened to the scene of fires. This occurs both during the day and night. At times the drivers are at the fire scene and park their vehicles in such a manner that fire apparatus is blocked or firefighters are delayed in getting water on the flames.

According to law, motorists who are in the path of fire trucks going to an alarm must pull as far as possible to the right of the road and bring their cars to a stop until the trucks have passed. Some drivers attempt to outdistance the fire apparatus and this at times has caused delay.

Operators are required to remain 300 feet behind fire apparatus responding to an alarm and they are not permitted to leave an unattended vehicle within 800 feet of the fire scene. These rules have been violated a number of times in recent months and the situation has caused the fire department head to be concerned.

It is the desire of both police and fire officials that the general public realize the danger of chasing to fire scenes and stop the practice. Otherwise, police feel they will have to take sterner steps.

TAX RATE SET BY ASSESSORS

get increased bills, how many will remain the same and how many will decrease.
Chairman White explained that limited time has prevented the board from getting a complete comparison, but he assured the Taxpayer Association representatives that a substantial number of property owners in the town will get lower tax bills.
Officials stressed the fact that those persons who are going to get tax relief should not be made to wait for it over a period of years, while those who have not been sharing a fair portion of the tax burden should not be allowed to continue this advantage over their fellow townspeople.
Donald Wood, state tax supervisor was present at Monday evening's meeting and explained that the plan proposed by the Taxpayers group would be unconstitutional according to a recent state supreme court decision. He quoted the law and said that the Andover assessors were carrying it out according to the court's opinion.
Mr. Wolfson suggested that since the survey took considerable time and delayed announcement of the 1958 tax rate, the 1957 system be followed with conversion to the new plan in 1959. He said that a recent meeting was recorded in favor of a delay until next year.
Chairman White pointed out that those whose taxes will be lower would have a right to insist on immediate relief. He also brought out that there has been a heavy work load in the assessors office

and it was not possible to break down the figures any more than they are at present.
When Mr. Wolfson contended that unless the complete break down was available, the board would not be able to present a complete explanation of the system to the taxpayers. Chairman White assured him that the assessors had made a thorough study of the figures and were prepared to establish the 1958 tax rate.
It was brought out during the discussion that the so-called "one-third" theory would pretty much work out in Andover. This means that one third of the taxpayers will get an increase, one-third will remain the same, and one-third will be taxed less.
Through the survey conducted by Cole, Layer and Trumble, as authorized at town meeting, total valuation in the town increased to \$79,333,475, the board announced. The 1957 figure was \$25,000,000.
The amount to be raised by taxation will be \$2,073,050.35 this year. Last year \$1,628,000 was raised by taxation.
While the \$64 rate is far below the \$64 rate used in 1957, the board pointed out that last year's levy was based on valuation figures averaging between 22 to 25 percent of valuation.

Increased Survivor Benefit Payments Announced By VA

An increase in survivor benefit payments from the Veterans Administration has been granted to many widows of deceased veterans whose death resulted from service-connected illnesses or injuries, it was announced today by Massachusetts Commissioner of Veterans' Services, Charles N. Collatos.
As a result of the new military pay bill effective June 1, 1958, this additional benefit will be computed in relation to the basic pay of a serviceman whose rank and years of service are the same as those of the deceased veteran.
It will not be necessary for the widow who may be entitled to the increased payment to file an application to receive the additional amount. It will be paid automatically and will be retroactive to June 1, 1958.
All widows whose veteran husbands died of service-connected causes will not receive the increase, because the new military pay bill does not increase the basic pay of all servicemen.
"As it will take the Veterans Administration several months to

examine individually each case", it is suggested that those concerned do not write to the VA as it will only add to the burden of work and act to slow up the payment increases.
